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God meant it for good!



To one greeted us when we went to the village of the Kuna Indians in Panama on Tuesday morning, February 8. This seemed very odd. We immediately sensed something was wrong. Our national co-worker, Raúl Sanés, suggested that I go and check things out while he waited with LaRhonda and the girls.

After quickly looking around, I concluded the Kuna were in a special ceremony (smoking the pipe). We had been told they would not do this before February 10. I hurried to leave since I know it is their custom to have no one leave or enter during that time.

It was too late!

When I returned to the boat, we were surrounded immediately by all





the Kuna men of the village. They were very hostile and threatening toward us and demanded we pay them a fine of \$50 for coming during the ceremony. We had not seen that side of them before. Several of them began trying to take our things from the boat, and even threatened to take our motor. We told them we would pay the money but that we hadn't brought \$50 with us.

We were surrounded immediately by all the Kuna men of the village.

The men told us we would have to leave the motor and row back to the bridge. This is practically impossible since it would involve returning against the wind. This is difficult to do with a motor, much less with the boat oar. The trip normally takes approximately 35-40 minutes with a 25hp motor.

We presented our side of the story, explaining that we had understood they would hold the ceremony on February 10. We assured them we had come on February 8 to avoid coming later in the week.

We would have done better speaking to the water!

Eventually we explained it would be impossible to return to the bridge without the motor. They didn't care. Raúl pointed out we had a woman and two small girls. Then he asked if they were willing to take responsibility if something should happen in the return trip. Finally they agreed to allow us to go and return the next day with the money.

LaRhonda and I were very shaken by the whole experience. We felt very uneasy since I knew we had to return to the Indians the next day. It would be a very important meeting, but we didn't know what we should do in light of all of these events. Our confidence in the people was jolted.

When we returned to pay our fine, we had reason to praise the Lord! The meeting went much better than expected. No one was even waiting to mob us when we arrived. Everything seemed to have returned to normal, and I marveled at the power of God in our ministry.

After hanging around the boat a few moments to make sure we weren't about to be set upon by a group of Indians, we got out and went up to the house of Armando, our language helper, like we usually do. We were greeted warmly by "Mu," Armando's mother.

Following the exchange of greetings, we asked to see the chief about paying our fine. We were escorted to a different hut than usual. We met a different chief—the second in command—who is in charge of fines. This was our first time to meet and talk with him.

Once again we explained why we had come the day before. Then we pointed out that we had returned to pay the \$50 fine. We were surprised with the action of the chief. He did something we have never seen before with the Kuna. He admitted they had made some errors and were to blame for our showing up as we had. He acknowledged that the villagers should have informed us of the change in dates and should have sent word that they were not to be disturbed.

The chief also said they would put up a signal in the future so we would know not to come into the village on such an occasion. He pointed out that this ceremony is the strictest of all because they must leave their wives alone in the huts for approximately five days. Someone arriving could harm the women, etc.

The leader told us that many had spoken about how they had mistreated us the previous day. He also noted that some didn't believe we would come back to pay the fine. The fact we had returned was evidence that we were honest and truthful men. He assured us that he would present this fact before the "congreso" and would hail us as people of our word and men of God.

He asked us to bring him a Bible when we come again.

The chief gave each of us a coconut—a gift of value for the Kuna. As we thanked him and turned to leave, he surprised us once again with another "first" for the Kuna in Aguas Claras. He asked us to bring him a Bible when we come again.

Now we know what Joseph meant when he said, ". . . you thought evil against me; but God meant it unto good, to bring to pass, as it is this day, to save much people alive."

It seems all our prayer warriors have been praying and have made a remarkable difference for the Kingdom of God among the Kuna.

Korean Sets Plans with FWBBC, Randall House

Dr. Hack Bong Chung, a well-known Korean seminary professor, arrived in Nashville, Tenn., on February 4 to visit the Free Will Baptist National Offices, Randall House Publications, and Free Will Baptist Bible College. Dr. Chung has taught in seminaries in Hawaii, Japan, the Philippines and South Korea.

Professor Chung will be teaching in the new Asia Free Will Baptist Theological Seminary in Seoul, Korea (see page 5). While here, he and Dr. Tom Malone signed an agreement for the Bible college to cooperate through exchange teaching programs, etc. He and Dr. Alton Loveless of Randall House Publications also signed a basic agreement to exchange publishing on five of his books and more than 10 Randall House books.

Dr. Chung spent time with Gen-

13 Men Ordained in Cuba; 19 Studying

Thirteen men were ordained to the gospel ministry in February during a pastors' conference in Pinar del Rio, Cuba. Ronald and Linda Callaway participated in the conference in addition to teaching during a week-long family retreat at the First FWB Church in Pinar.

The Callaways went to Cuba on January 2 and spent most of January and February teaching 19 students at Cedars of Lebanon Seminary. Classes were held Tuesday through Friday. They ministered in churches on the weekends.

Callaway expressed praise that for the first time in many years they were able to have two seminary classes studying at the same time. The second year class had 11 students and the first year group had eight students.

Ronald taught "Introduction to the Doctrine of the Holy Spirit" to the first-year class while he helped the second year students with "Preparation of Expository Messages." Linda taught two classes of English.

They returned to Panama February 29.

Seminary and Church Dedicated in Korea

General Director James Forlines—accompanied by Dr. Tom Malone, Dr. Milton Fields and Dr. James Cox of Free Will Baptist Bible College—traveled to Seoul, Korea, on February 28.

The new Asia Free Will Baptist Theological Seminary in Seoul was dedicated on March 1. Dr. Malone spoke on "Training Christian Workers for the World," Mr. Forlines challenged those present with a "Free Will Baptist Global Vision," and Reverend Hyun Kyun Shin preached the dedication message.

Two buildings in Kyonggi-do, approximately 20 miles southeast of Seoul, were purchased for the seminary. The newly formed Free Will Baptist Church for All Nations, pastored by Dr. John Chang, was also dedicated and Brother Forlines spoke to the congregation on Sunday, March 5.

Dr. Chang will be president of the seminary while Reverend Kyu Suk Park will serve as academic dean and Dr. Hack Bong Chung will head the graduate program.

Those from FWBBC returned to

the United States on March 3 though Mr. Forlines remained until March 6 to finalize the purchase of the property, etc.

Missionaries Shaken by Coup d'état; None Hurt

On Christmas Eve of 1999 things drastically changed in Côte d'Ivoire when the army took control of the government in a coup d'état that canceled all services, set strict curfews and forced out the president and his regime. President Henri Konan Bedie took shelter in the French embassy before leaving the country.

According to missionaries Jerry and Carol Pinkerton in Abidjan, Côte d'Ivoire, looting and vandalism were rampant. "Jerry and I were never in danger," reports Carol. "It was a tense time but thankfully it only lasted three days."

By God's grace, none of the Free Will Baptist missionaries was hurt although Alice Smith had her car stolen (see article on page 7).

The army, under General Robert Guei, has continued to run the country with promises to restore elections in July.



Alice Smith Car Taken After I.C. Coup d'état

On December 27 in Agnibilekrou. Côte d'Ivoire-three days after the coup d'état-missionary Alice Smith had her car stolen at gunpoint.

Alice and Pastor Jérôme were leaving the Youth Center and had just closed the doors on her fourwheel drive Suzuki when two men appeared, one on each side of the car. They opened the doors and ordered Alice and Jérôme to get out and leave the keys.

"As soon as I was out, he jumped in," says Alice. "I heard the other one tell Pastor to stay put. Without thinking, I opened the back door and asked that he please let the pastor go free. I hurriedly reached in and took my purse which I had placed on the back seat."

The thieves picked up a third man and sped off. At press time her car had not been located.

Bunch Reports Deadly Virus in Panama

In late February missionary Stan Bunch reported that the National Health Department in Panama had declared the provinces of Herrera and Los Santos to be an epidemic area for the deadly Hanta Virus, also known as Bubonic Plaque.

Stan noted a few deaths had been reported and the government was taking strong measures to handle the situation. Carnaval (Mardi Gras) was canceled in that area.

Bunch stated that the disease is spread by rats and mice and so far they have found none in their house. "We are in no danger,"

says Stan. "I have been working in the Las Tablas area where the deaths have occurred but have not been exposed to any situation where the virus should be present."
