

Atlanta Consultation 2001

Where Missionaries Got Together!

It was about change. It involved the entire Free Will Baptist for-Leign missionary family. And it was a first! We called it Atlanta Consultation 2001.

This unique gathering marked the first time all active foreign missionaries were able to meet in one place at the same time. Only two were unable to attend. Even many former missionaries joined the activities.

The presence of four of the five men who have served as general director made this even more unique. Only J. Reford Wilson who died in 1995 was not with us.

When the 174 participants convened at the Simpsonwood Retreat Center in Norcross, Ga., on April 28, excitement and questioning permeated the air. The Foreign Missions family wondered who they would see for the first time. What proposals would they encounter? What could

they expect to take with them when the consultation concluded?

In truth, many were surprised! Some were a little disappointed. But most were challenged and optimistic for the future mobilization of our denomination for world outreach.

This unique gathering marked the first time all active foreign missionaries were able to meet in one place at the same time.

Since the Foreign Missions staff developed a 10-year strategic plan for world outreach in 1998, missionary field councils have sought to become more strategic in their approach to church planting. Foreign

Missions publications have become more reader oriented, the home office staff has restructured for growth, and a powerful new video series, "Embracing the Vision," has been distributed to more than 600 churches.


One of the chief emphases in the video series is the "paradigm" shift in our approach to missions. Since the staff has regularly sought to communicate this shift to our churches over the past two years, we also felt it necessary to convey this new approach to our missionaries. Equally important was the dynamic gained by having all missionaries, staff, board members and former missionaries together to hear the proposals at the same time.

Global Focus, an independent group headquartered in Atlanta, Ga., provided the main seminar training during three days. The purpose of

Global Focus is "to serve local churches by helping pastors and church leaders become more effective in leading their churches to reach the world for Christ."

The majority of those attending declared this to be one of the best meetings ever attempted by Foreign Missions. One missionary declared it was "the best of the best."

While most attendees had limited prior knowledge regarding the content of this consultation or the seminar, many admitted it provided them insights and challenges. Some renewed their vision of the whole world. Eddie Bowerman of Panama put it this way: "I feel challenged overall to dream bigger."

Jaimie Lancaster of Uruguay declared, "The consultation opened my eyes to the importance of partnerships." He referred to missionaries and local churches partnering to mobilize people to become more effective in world outreach.

Basically the consultation program began on Saturday evening, April 28, with a special welcome

and a time of singing, prayer and praise led by Doug Little, chairman of the Board of Foreign Missions.

The majority of those attending declared this to be one of the best meetings ever attempted by Foreign Missions.

On Sunday morning R. Eugene Waddell, former general director, plunged into Isaiah 40:27-31 in an effort to fortify those who might be weary or discouraged. "God's strength is available when we need it," he declared. Waiting on the Lord "lifts us above the things down here and we see the big picture."

That evening the group reconvened for a concert of prayer, praise and worship conducted by Doug Little. God really spoke to hearts, preparing them for what followed during the week.

Field councils grouped on Monday morning to discuss their future plans, etc. Then at 1:00 p.m. the Global Focus team, headed by founder and president Dr. Larry Reesor, began the powerpoint seminar presentation "Growing a Great Commission Church." The seminar continued during the daytime and concluded Wednesday at 5:00 p.m.

Reesor and his team made it plain: "The local church is God's primary instrument to evangelize the world." Then, they challenged the missionaries to recognize that "mis-

sions is not the ultimate goal of the church; worship is. Missions exists because worship doesn't" (John Piper in Let the Nations Be Glad).

"Missionaries must no longer see themselves solely as implementers of the missionary task, but also as mobilizers of the missionary resource," emphasized the Global Focus president. "Missionaries are finding that they can accomplish much more through synergistic partnerships than they could ever do alone."

Most missionaries saw the seminar as very good. Jeff Turnbough of Spain indicated the sessions and the consultation provided a "challenge for following God's leading and launching out with something new for our whole mission." Eddie Payne, director of mobilization and recruitment, says this "brought an awareness to the missionary family regarding the need for cooperation in scheduling and coordinating visits to mission fields."

Reesor and his team made it plain: "The local church is God's primary instrument to evangelize the world."

While the days were occupied by GF, evenings were reserved for missionaries, staff and board members to spend time reminiscing, praying, rejoicing and laughing.

Monday night appeared to be the highlight of the week for most as we honored our heritage. Participants viewed a short video showing early missions in India and Cuba. It also contained brief scenes taken by missionaries and the staff. The video concluded with a summary take from the film "Letter to Melitino."

Prayer time followed the presen-

tation. Raymond Riggs, the first general director of Foreign Missions, led the prayer. He wept as he noted all of those present who had gone out since the 1950s when he predicted that one day many would go to the regions beyond. In response to requests from missionaries, the aging leader asked "the Lord of the Harvest" to send many more laborers into the field.

The evening concluded with a succinct video featuring Foreign Missions personnel who are now with the Lord. Hearts were stirred as viewers saw those saints on the screen along with subscripts clarifying where and when they had served and their date of death. This presentation was accompanied by the emotional song "Safely Home" by Steve Green.

A special fun night captured attention on Tuesday evening with missionaries participating and viewing short video clips that brought rousing laughter. The humanness of the missionaries, staff members and the board revealed itself in the antics of the evening. It proved refreshing!

Wednesday's evening service featured former board chairman Joe Grizzle of Norman, Okla. He urged the missionaries to guard their lives

and ministries for the Lord. Through tears of sorrow he told of friends who had not taken heed and had ruined their ministries.


A moving service of communion and feetwashing followed with board members serving. Former director Rolla Smith led in prayer. Missionaries, staff and board members embraced one another in humility and adoration for our Lord's example. Songs of praise erupted and continued throughout the session.

On Thursday morning the entire missionary family gathered to recap the week's emphasis, and to share views and conclusions. General Director James Forlines chaired the session and fielded questions. Time ran short with many, many questions left unanswered. Brother Forlines declared he was not surprised at the questions. He urged every missionary and every field council to take what was shared and determine the strategy and cooperation needed to implement a program of partnership to mobilize Free Will Baptists.

So, what conclusion was reached? Were the time and expense worth it? Can we expect immediate results? Board chairman Little says, "The long-term impact of the Atlanta consultation has yet to be seen, but I am confident it will be evident. And the renewed vision, passion, and commitment of our missionary family will help pastors and churches in the States be more effective than ever before in fulfilling the Great Commission."

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Forlines' Focus

Fellowship

Second, the fellowship was wonderful. Many commented that it was a foretaste of Heaven. I have been in the homes of our missionaries around the world. They pray for each other, but few of our missionaries have ever met all of their fellowlaborers. Their service on the field has prevented it. It was great to see them as they met, hugged, and shared.

Historic Occasion

First, it was an historic occasion. Never before in Free Will Baptist history has there been a gathering, in one place, with that many people directly involved in world evangelism. I was reminded of the words of Winston Churchill after World War II when commenting about the pilots of the Royal Air Force. He said, "Never before in history has so much been owed by so many to so few." Tens of thousands of people from all over the world will be in Heaven as a result of the efforts of those gathered in Atlanta.

Excitement

Third, it was exciting! I firmly believe in the collective power of a group. A dynamic exists which can only occur when critical mass has been achieved. The potential of this kind of meeting created a sense of expectancy, even anxiety. The assembling of this many people who care deeply about world evangelism created an atmosphere charged with excitement.

Those were some of the reasons I was glad to be there, but all of these were really about "me" and the

"missionaries"—not necessarily about HIM. As beneficial as these three reasons appeared, they would not have warranted this meeting. A tremendous by-product, yes! HE works that way sometimes. But our board and staff would never have called the meeting just to make history, or to promote fellowship, or to share the excitement of being together. A purpose that could not be accomplished any other way had to compel such a gathering.

God at Work

We sense that God is working in an unusual way among Free Will Baptists. People from various walks of life are sensing that God has a place for them in reaching the unreached. Local churches are taking greater interest than ever in "handson" participation in the worldwide harvest. The opportunities and challenges are greater than ever.

The board and staff concluded that the only way to maximize denominational mobilization was for all of our missionaries to be briefed together concerning what is happening on the home front. As God is at work among us, He was certainly at work in Atlanta! Keep praying with us for wisdom, as we are sensitive to His leading. James Forlines
