
Showing God at work around the world



n September 11 the worst terrorist attack in American history occurred. The Twin Towers of the World Trade Center collapsed after being hit by hijacked airliners. The terrorists have been identified as a part of the world's fastest growing religion, Islam. Who are these people who have declared a Jihad ("to struggle" or "to war against") against our nation?

Islam is the religion founded by Mohammed in the seventh century.

Followers of Mohammed are called Muslims. Islam means "submission or surrender to God." Muslim means "the one who submits." More than one billion Muslims can be found worldwide: over seven million call the United States home.

The Quran ("reading") is the holy book of Islam made up of revelations


names of Allah that help to describe him.

The second assumption is human goodness. Muslims view sin as a lack of obedience to Allah. Islam teaches that man does not have a sinful nature. He merely performs sinful acts.

The third assumption is a belief in divine guidance. This guidance is found in the Quran and other holy books as well as in the words of the prophets.

The fourth assumption relates to the community of submission. P. M. Holt observed, "Islam is a religion. It is also, inseparably from this, a community, a civilization, and a culture." This community, or *umma*, is based on submission to the will of Allah.

The fifth assumption regards the teaching that the Muslim culture is heavenly in origin. Because of its ori-



received by Mohammed and written in Arabic. The Hadith, the teachings of Mohammed, are equally important to Muslims.

Islam has no priesthood or sacraments. The place of worship for Muslims is called a mosque. A minaret is a tall, slender tower attached to the mosque. The muezzin or crier stands on a balcony of the minaret and calls the people to prayer.

Muslims believe that Allah is far above man and cannot be known by him.


According to William J. Saal, Muslims hold five basic assumptions. The first assumption is a belief in the absolute transcendence of God. Muslims believe that Allah is far above man and cannot be known by him, although the Quran lists 99

gin it is thought to be superior to all other cultures.

The central teachings of Islam are referred to as the Five Pillars of *Islam*. The first pillar is called Shahada or creed. "There is no God but Allah, and Mohammed is his prophet." The acceptance of this creed is all that is required to become a Muslim.



The second pillar is Salat or prayer. Muslims are to pray at five set times each day facing the city of Mecca, Saudi Arabia, the birthplace of Mohammed. Zakat or almsgiving is the third pillar. Muslims seek to gain God's favor by helping the poor.

The fourth pillar is Saum or fasting. Each year Muslims observe a month-long fast called Ramadan. Hajj or pilgrimage is the fifth pillar. Each Muslim is expected to make a pilgrimage to Mecca once in his lifetime.

Since Mohammed was an Arab and Arabs are descendants of Ishmael, the son of Abraham by Hagar, Sarah's maidservant who was cast out, enmity between them and the Jews has continued for thousands of years. Much of the conflict witnessed in all of the Middle East has its roots in this fact. Most of the non-Jewish peoples of this region are Muslims.

God loves them and Jesus died for them just as He did for us!

In part, what happened in New York stemmed from this ongoing dispute, yet not all Muslims are extremists. The perpetrators must be dealt with, but what should be the Christian's response to this tragedy?

Jesus said to "love your enemies" (Matthew 5:44). God loves them and Jesus died for them just as He did for us! We must share our faith and pray for them that they might be saved.

How can Muslims be reached for Christ? Patiently, over a period of time. Missionary George Braswell, Jr., gives these guidelines for sharing your faith with Muslims.

- Don't accentuate the negative at the beginning of a conversation. Leave the deeper, more controversial subjects for later.
- La Don't demean Islam, the Quran, or Mohammed.
- **■** Don't start arguments or hostile disputes.
- Don't relate one-on-one with members of the opposite sex.
- **▮** Show honor and respect for Muslims and their beliefs.
- La Cultivate relationships with

- Muslims by discussing common areas of interest.
- Learn Muslim social customs, especially those pertaining to the roles of men and women, greetings, and diet. This will minimize embarrassing moments during interactions with those you are witnessing to.

Keep in mind these qualities and characteristics of Muslims as you attempt to win them to Christ. Muslims are a family-oriented people. They will often put the needs of the whole family above their personal needs. When meeting with a Muslim friend, show interest in his entire family.

Muslims are a hospitable people. They will often go to great expense to provide for their guests. However, a Muslim may need to be invited to your home several times before he accepts. In his culture, to accept an invitation too readily would seem rude, almost greedy.

One Islamic scholar pointed out, "there is no separation between the sacred and the secular, between church and state" for the Muslim. His religion provides the structure and framework for every aspect of his life, and he will view you as a Christian in the same way. To him, your culture is your Christianity.

News In Review

Korean National Held in Seoul September 27, 28

The annual convention for the National Association of Free Will Baptists of Korea was held September 27, 28 at the Free Will Baptist Church of Peace in Seoul. Dr. Hack Bong Chung was reelected president of the association.

Missionary Ken Bailey of Japan attended the convention as a representative of the Department of Foreign Missions.

According to missionary John Chang, the Free Will Baptist Church for All Nations moved September 24 to the property at Mission Point. The name of the church was changed to FWB Garden Church for All Nations.

ICA Outreach Records 11 Saved in Village

According to Shane Davison at International Christian Academy in Bouaké, Côte d'Ivoire, the student outreach on September 22 recorded 11 decisions for Christ. Between 70 and 80 people went to a Baoulé village where they set up a medical team to treat open

wounds, cuts, scrapes and other minor medical needs. After their Evangelism Explosion team did their work, the group concluded the evening by showing the Jesus film in the Baoulé language.

Three NTM Hostages Killed by Their Captors

A late September report from New Tribes Missions indicated that missionaries Dave Mankins, Mark Rich, and Rick Tenenoff were killed by their captors in mid-1996.

The three missionaries had been abducted in January of 1993 by guerrilla forces deep in the Darien jungles of Panama and taken across the border into Colombia. Two-way radio contact with the guerrillas brought demands, threats, and deadlines, but also a chance to hear the voices of the three missionaries. Since that time the plight of the captives has been uncertain.

In September a captured member of the guerrilla forces in a Colombian prison revealed what happened and confirmed the death of the three hostages.

The São José Free Will Baptist Church in Campinas, Brazil, held the first service in their new building on Saturday, September 29. The young people of the church were in charge of the service which dealt with drugs and hope in Christ. The teens handed out approximately 1,000 invitations to the service.

Curt Holland noted that while the building is not finished, it is usable. He says, "The pews that we have are now full and we hope to order more this week."

Holland added that two people were saved during the past month and 10 candidates were awaiting baptism in the new building on October 14.

The Creeches' resignation was effective as of September 1, 2001.


Three Follow the Lord in Baptism in Villalba

Christian/Muslim Fury Suspends B.L. Ministry

Long-running tensions between Muslims and Christians in the Plateau state of Nigeria, Africa, ignited in September on the Muslim day of prayer. According to Jerry Farouk, director of the Bible League in Nigeria, dozens of cars were torched, and bodies of murdered victims lay in the streets.

Farouk maintains that though the violence is being labeled a Muslim/Christian conflict, "the ones doing most of the fighting are not really born-again."

The conflict virtually shut down evangelistic activity by all Christian groups.

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Forlines' Focus

This is the natural response. But is it the appropriate response for a Christian? I don't think so. You see, Jesus turned the value system of the world on its ear. He pronounced blessings on those who are poor in spirit, those who mourn, and the meek of the earth. He said the least will be the greatest and the first will be the last. His teaching was very strange to those committed to this world's values. Yet His words were words of authority.

Dealing with Hatred

"Why They Hate Us." That is the title on the cover of the October 15, 2001, issue of *Newsweek* magazine. Pictured is a young, turbaned Muslim boy at an anti-U.S. rally in Islamabad, Pakistan.

When we are confronted with this unexpected rage most of us are like President George W. Bush when he said that he just couldn't understand why anyone would hate the U.S.A.

The U.S. military and intelligence departments are trying to fully understand this question, "Why do they hate us?" This is a worthwhile question. But perhaps Christians should ask another question: "What should be our response to this expression of hate?"

Human beings have an innate response to those who hate us. We respond in kind. Visual images of thousands marching, burning the American flag, and chanting "Death to America!" can cause our pulse to quicken and a knot to come in our stomach. The emotion of hate can take root deep in our heart.

Considering Our Enemies

Jesus also had some things to say about how we should treat our enemies. As He stood teaching on the mountain in Matthew 5, He declared, "Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbor, and hate thine enemy. But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you" (Matthew 5:43, 44).

In Luke 6 He expounded on the same theme in verses 35 and 36, concluding with, "Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful."

Does this mean that the United States should not retaliate for the terrorist attacks committed against us? I do not believe the Bible teaches such passivity. In Romans 13 the Apostle Paul clearly shows the governmental leader is, "the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil" (Romans 13:4c).

Maintaining A Witness

While this is right for government, I believe Christians should be clearly manifesting the love of Christ to Muslims around the world even while our government is retaliating. This may mean reaching out in love and understanding to those who live in our communities. It certainly means we should support efforts to share Christ with unreached Muslim people groups around the world.

In the Old Testament a foreign missionary had to deal with this problem of hate. Jonah hated the Assyrians, yet God called him to go to their capital city and preach repentance. He never completely overcame his hate, but read Jonah chapter four to see how God views those who are His enemies.

We serve a compassionate and merciful God. He wants to redeem to Himself worshippers from every people group on the face of the earth. This includes every Muslim people group. Let us recommit ourselves to have the mind of Christ who said to each of us, "as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you" (John 20:21b).
