


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The Unfinished Task

s I sat before my computer to write this article I remembered an unusual Web page I had visited before. The page itself is titled "The Unfinished Task." I typed the Internet address (http://www.the greatcom.net/the_unfinished_task.htm) and pressed enter.

As the Web page emerged, the only item on it was a table with continually running totals. It listed the total num-

ber of people born since 12:01 that morning (130,968 at 1:20 p.m.), the total born since January 1, 2001 (82,222,463), and the current world population (6,102,766,031). These were sobering numbers in themselves, but they kept getting higher and higher.


In addition, rows tabulated three other things: (1) those who are hearing and believing the gospel (14,625); (2)

those hearing and not believing the gospel (51,327); and (3) people without an adequate opportunity to hear the gospel (66,739). All the numbers shown accounted for just 13 hours and 20 minutes in that one day. Of course, these totals are only projections based on averages up to that moment and nobody knows the real tally except God. I asked God to allow me to see beyond the rapidly scrolling numbers and envision the soul each number represented.

Major blocks of people continue to have no way to hear the gospel in a culturally relevant way.

My heart was touched as I realized it took 1,430 years for Bible-believing Christians to constitute 1 percent of the world's population. After another 360 years Christianity composed 2 percent and in an additional 150 years it gained another percentage point. Within only 20 more years we reached 10 percent. Right now estimates of Bible-believing Christians stand at 11 percent of the world's population (see www.missionfrontiers.org). This means evangelical Christianity is

growing at least double the rate of world population. Truly, Christ is building His church!

In 1900 the Bible was available in only 537 languages. In the next 100 years that number increased by over 500 percent to at least 2,800 languages (see *Mission Frontiers* magazine, June 2000, page 14). The *Jesus* film, which shows the life of Jesus according to the Gospel of Luke, has been seen by over 3.3 million people worldwide (see "Operation World" by Patrick Johnstone and Jason Mandryk, pages 7 and 696). These and other encouraging signs give us reason for hope.

With all these positive advances, we still face the reality of an unfinished task. Joshua Project 2000 has catalogued over 16,000 distinct people groups throughout the world (see

www.joshuaproject.org). Of these people groups 1,200 are still considered virtually unreached. Major blocks of people continue to have no way to hear the gospel in a culturally relevant way. Currently, only three missionaries for every million Muslims are seeking to reach the 1.2 billion followers of Islam with the gospel of Christ. This includes missionaries from every evangelical missions agency. At the same time only five missionaries per million Buddhists have been sent. The number is only slightly better among Hindus and Chinese with six missionaries per million (see www.calebproject.org).

Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions is focusing on three major areas to help fulfill our part in getting the gospel to the ends of the earth. First, missionaries continue to labor on our traditional fields, winning people to Christ and planting churches. Our goal is to develop these churches into Great Commission churches. We want them to join the call to get the gospel to the unreached.

Second, we are in a two-year study to determine how Free Will Baptists can best address the incredible needs of Restricted Access Countries. Most of the world's unreached peoples live in these countries. Third, we have accepted the challenge to mobilize our entire denomination. We want every Christian to find his or her role in getting the gospel to the ends of the earth. Together we can make a significant impact as we all use our God-given gifts, talents and abilities to extend His Kingdom to every people group on earth.

The June 2000 issue of Mission. Frontiers featured a forum discussion by six evangelical mission leaders. One of the questions asked was, "What are the greatest challenges facing the global evangelical mission movement today?" One of the participants, Patrick Johnstone (author of "Operation World"), declared that we are encountering "theological fluffiness concerning the eternity of Hell and eternal lostness of the lost." In addition, he indicated we will see "a loss of the vision of the uniqueness of Christ and of a Trinitarian basis for missions."

We Free Will Baptists say the Bible teaches the existence of an eternal Hell. But how firmly is it really rooted in our hearts? We must remember that it's not just people like Saddam Hussein and Osama bin Laden who will be there unless they turn to Christ. Mothers and fathers, sisters and brothers, and others who desperately need to hear of Jesus Christ will also be in Hell. Yes, the task is unfinished. But the call still remains, "The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest" (Matt. 9:37 NKJV).

Lytles Visit Japan Work; Call for More Personnel

Steve Lytle, director of field operations, and his wife, Judy, spent October 17 to 31 in Japan visiting missionaries, seeing their work and attending their annual field council meeting.

The first week was spent with the Dale Bishops, the Nathan Snows, Debbie Griffin, and shortterm missionaries Shannon Little and Tonva Blanchard on the island of Hokkaido. The Lytles spent the second week in the Tokyo area with the Kenneth Baileys, the Donnie McDonalds, and Mirial Gainer.

At their field council meeting the Japan missionaries requested a number of new personnel including church planters and shortterm workers for Bible studies and other lessons in English. They also asked for teachers and other personnel for the Christian school in Tokyo and for the Hokkaido International School in the north.

Thieves Take Church Sound Equipment

Missionary Curt Holland from Campinas, Brazil, reported thieves entered the São José church and stole microphones and all the sound equipment on October 24. The equipment had been purchased by a church in Missouri.

In spite of the loss, Curt was rejoicing over the baptism of 12 people on Sunday, November 4. The group included a young boy, two fathers, four mothers, and five young ladies.

Survey, Jesus Film **Bring Four to Christ**

In mid-November a group from Nueva Vida and Malvin Alto along with Word of Life students from Argentina did a survey in the Malvin area of Montevideo, Uruquay.


According to Dennis Owen, a showing of the Jesus film followed the surveys. Four people responded to the invitation to receive Christ as Savior and Lord.

Eagleton Reports Many Converts, Baptisms

At the request of national Christians, Dr. Kenneth Eagleton traveled nearly 100 miles on November 25 to the village of Tolekai to baptize a group of believers. The village is located over 20 miles off of any road. The doctor found 31 candidates seeking baptism but, after examining them, retained only 12 and baptized them. Kenneth indicated the others had some problems to work out.

The church in the village was started by a man from the area who was saved in a church in the south. He returned to the village and began witnessing. Today, over 40 adult believers are meeting together. The Christians there have already built their own church building—a mud brick wall structure plastered with cement and crowned with a grass roof. The church has no pastor and they have no Bible or New Testament in their language (Loron).

"It was very encouraging to see these Christians growing in the Lord in spite of being isolated in the bush," says Eagleton.

This same type of surgery was done in 1999. Surgery was performed on December 6 and was considered successful.

Côte d'Ivoire—A pastors' retreat was held November 12-15 in Doropo, with 18 national pastors, four missionaries and 10 pastoral students attending.


Antioch, Tenn.—MK Jonathan





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Lytle's Lines

wrath of God is upon him (John 3:36). The evangelical position is one of **exclusivism**. Jesus is the only Savior, and men must personally come to Him in repentance and faith to be saved. This stand will bring cries of "religious bigotry" from many.

Sounding a Clear Message

In an age which praises relativism and worships tolerance, Bible-believing Christians must sound a clear message. This challenge has tremendous repercussions in the western world (primarily the U.S.A.) with its smorgasbord of competing ideas, ideologies and beliefs. It also impacts the two-thirds world where Christianity rivals powerful religious systems such as Hinduism, Buddhism and Islam.

The Bible declares unequivocally that Jesus is the only way to God (John 14:6). Peter echoes Christ's words in Acts 4:12, "Neither is there salvation in any other." The Old Testament also bears witness to the truth that only one God exists, and He alone is the source of salvation: "Look unto me and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth, for I am God and there is none else" (Isaiah 45:22).

Christianity is Exclusive

John's Gospel makes it clear that whoever does not believe in Jesus stands condemned (John 3:18). He will die in his sins (John 8:24) and the

Pluralism and Inclusivism

It is sad, but countless people, including some professing Christians, prefer **pluralism**—the idea that all truth is relative, no god is normative for all people in all places for all times, and some truth lies at the heart of all religions.

Others choose **inclusivism** and state that though one true God might exist and one way (Jesus) might be best, all religions ultimately will get people to God and Heaven. This idea that God excludes no one, but includes everyone, in the final analysis means that all people will be saved.

Perishing Souls

Free Will Baptists must be wakened to the sobering truth: those who reject Jesus are lost forever. Likewise, people who live and die, having never heard of Jesus, will perish eternally.

We need clear and compelling Biblical preaching and missions teaching in our churches, including the uniqueness of Jesus Christ. We must also provide information that focuses on unreached people groups and nations of the earth, including 1.2 billion Muslims. Christians desperately need to understand the mutually exclusive nature of the claims of Biblical Christianity and Islam. Then we must lovingly and compassionately carry the gospel to those other descendants of Abraham for whom Jesus died.

True Islamic Teaching

Tom White of the Voice of the Martyrs wrote: "The simple fact is: Muslims do not 'peacefully coexist' with Christians . . . Islamic teachings offer no tolerance for those who reject Mohammed for Christ. Read the Koran for yourself. Study Islamic history. Learn the truth about what is happening right now in Sudan, Saudi Arabia, Pakistan, Indonesia, Bangladesh, Yemen, Iran, Nigeria, Tunisia, Egypt, Tajikistan and other countries where Islam has a foothold."

We desperately need a revival of intercessory prayer. We need what Wesley Duewel calls "mighty prevailing prayer" for the nations. The conflict will be won as the Church advances on her knees in prayer. It will also be successful as believers in Christ know the truth, understand the truth, live the truth, and communicate the truth in culturally relevant and contextualized ways. The battle for truth and the battle for souls demand such a commitment.
