





#### **Tokyo Team to Start** "Good News Chapel"

According to missionaries Ken and Judy Bailey, the Tokyo churchplanting team will call their new work "Good News Chapel." A recent Bible college graduate, Mrs. Amano, will start working with the team in May in their recently acquired facilities.

The Iriso church is cooperating with the new team, and Miss Brenda Wendlandt, a short termer, will be teaching English as a means of making contacts for the new church.

#### **Bowermans Reconfirm Commitment to Kuna**

Eddie and LaRhonda Bowerman have reconfirmed their original commitment to work among the Kuna Indians in Panama. The last issue of HeartBeat reported that the Bowermans and the Panama field council had decided not to pursue a ministry among

#### the Kuna.

Eddie explained that they had considered not returning to the tribe due to the potential of creating factions as a result of other groups visiting the Kuna in their absence. These had caused problems in the tribe previously. In retrospect, the Bowermans feel they have developed significant relationships among the Kuna people to make their potential for evangelization greater than many of the other groups.

Eddie and LaRhonda indicated they have gained new assurances from the Lord that they should continue working with the Kuna people. They are excited at how the Holy Spirit has been moving in their lives and ministry, assuring them of God's continued interest in both the Kuna ministry and their participation in it.

Currently the Bowermans are hoping to return to Panama City in July. They expect to start renewing contact and studying the Kuna language by August or Sep-

Plans call for the Moores to work with youth and young couples and teach in the Bible institute next semester. Andv also will preach some in addition to visiting and teaching Sunday school.

#### **Alice Smith Reports** on I. C. Evangelism

The Ivory Coast Free Will Baptist young people held their annual Easter evangelistic campaign in Tanda March 27-30.

Missionary Alice Smith of Agnibilekrou reported 33 decisions for Christ during the campaign. She urged people to pray for pastor Théophile and the Tanda church as they disciple these new converts.

In Agnibilekrou four people made decisions for Christ on Easter Sunday morning. "I'm especially rejoicing over Madame Kambou's salvation," says Alice. "She is a little Lobi woman for whom we've been praying a long time."






# OUR ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE






#### **2001 Sources of Foreign Missions Income**



#### Lytle Visits India, **Expresses Highlights**

Steve Lytle, director of field operations, visited India March 4-21. He attended the annual conference of Free Will Baptists on the mission compound in Sonapurhat, West Bengal, in North India March 7-10.

Approximately 2,500 people attended this year's meeting, including more than 100 from Nepal. A highlight of the conference was the testimony of a Nepali woman who is over 100 years of age. She told how she was saved just a few years ago.

Lytle had the opportunity to speak twice during plenary sessions, twice more during Bible classes to the Nepali people, at a cottage prayer meeting, and to all of the pastors. He also gave a devotional at the baptism of 36 new believers. Brother Hanna reported 525 conversions and 510 baptisms in India and Nepal during 2001.

From North India Steve traveled to Coimbatore to visit the Free Will Baptist work in South India. During the week of March 12-19 he spoke in seven churches. He also conducted a seminar for the South India pastors, Bible institute students, and evangelists.

of my trip were the North India conference, the opportunity to fellowship with Brother Carlisle Hanna, a true missionary hero, and seeing the place where Laura Belle Barnard and Volena Wilson lived and worked in South India," declared Lytle. He returned to Nashville, Tenn., on March 21.

#### Global Focus Impacts Russellville, Pastors

The Global Focus Leadership Seminar March 6-8 and Global Impact Celebration March 6-10 at First Free Will Baptist Church in Russellville, Ark., made a significant impact on the church and leaders.

More than 60 participants from 14 states were enrolled in the leadership seminar. "Wow! I wish my whole church could have been here! Very insightful, instructional, inspirational and very practical," said Pastor Mike Mounts of the Westerville FWB Church in Westerville, Ohio.

David Joslin, executive director of Arkansas Free Will Baptists, said, "From my perspective, the session with Global Focus was highly successful."

Home missionary Tim Lewis of Ogden, Utah, said he wants to "help our church see that even though we are small, we can make a global impact."

The Global Impact Celebration (the church's missionary conference) motivated 17 people to declare willingness to serve as career missionaries and 169 to express willingness to serve as short-term missionaries. Offerings plus faithpromise commitments totaled \$178,000 for the year for local, national and international missions.

Pastor Doug Little declared, "I have great expectations and I know this church will never be the same."

#### Sturgill Reports Records at Belo Horizonte

Missionary Jim Sturgill says several records have been broken in the Belo Horizonte church in Brazil since the first of January.

New record highs included attendance in children's church in a single night, 22; number present for a church service with no special activity, 61; monthly average attendance for church services, 50; and Carnaval retreat average, 50.

In another note Sturgill indicated all the work on the church building was finished so the engineer can give final approval. It has been nearly an 11-year battle to complete the building.

#### Miharashidai Chapel **Rents Two-story House**

missionary The team in Hokkaido, Japan, has reported renting a larger facility for the Miharashidai Chapel at a lower cost. The church, which has been meeting in a one-room storefront building, will now meet in a house with two stories and four rooms on each floor.

Missionaries indicated that two of the downstairs rooms will be combined to make a large worship center and the children's church will be conducted in another room

#### **Pastor Faces Loss Over Full-time Status**

Osmír, newly elected pastor of the São José Free Will Baptist Church in Campinas, Brazil, faces possible loss of a large amount of his retirement if he assumes fulltime status for the church. The church voted to hire him full time.

According to missionary Curt Holland, if Osmír just guits his current job without permission, his retirement fund may be jeopardized. The law says he can be given his retirement after three years with special consent. Curt urged people to pray that Osmír will make the right decision regarding this circumstance.

#### **Seven Saved at Family Camp in Uruguay**

Seven people made decisions for Christ during the family camp held February 9-15 in Uruguay. According to missionary Molly Barker, 71 campers and 36 visitors attended.

Those saved included six teenage boys and one 20-year-old man.

Miss Barker, who lives and labors in the area of Rivera, indicated another mini-family camp was planned for March 27-30. In addition to the camps, five vacation Bible schools were conducted in the Rivera area, two in January and three in February.

Having served approximately 10 years as missionary to Côte d'Ivoire, Neil sought to address the needs of those in that setting. He returned to the United States on March 22.

#### **21 Enrolled in Bible** Institute in Barbacena

According to Bobby Aycock, 21 students are studying in the Bible institute which is held in a spacious apartment in the center of Barbacena, Brazil. Eight students are from Conselheiro Lafaiete,

one is from Antonio Carlos, and the rest are from Barbacena.

Nine students are men and seven of these feel called to fulltime ministry. Some of the young ladies are dating preachers and other young ladies aspire to be preachers' wives.

Doug and Patty Chamberlin have reared their children to be concerned with the needs of unreached people around the world. It was no surprise when their daughter Leah attended missions camp at Free Will Baptist Bible College during the summer and eventually went on several missions trips. Neither was it incredible when Andrew, their son, participated in teen missions trips.

But God had more in store for the Chamberlins than just involvement through their children. With Leah finishing college (and preparing for the

mission field) and Andrew finishing high school, God spoke to Doug and Patty themselves. They are currently seeking support to go to Spain for a two-year assignment. Someone asked them, "Have you retired?" "No," they
