

The Creativity of the Call



and certainly not everyone comes to believe. However, by compassionately serving people doors have been opened to plant the seed of the gospel. In fact, I believe it is more effective than the traditional missionary approach that some freely practice in "open" countries. We know of many people who have encountered the truth of Christ because of our presence in a place that can only be creatively accessed.

The Validity of the Call

As we show unreached people the Good News in action, we validate the claims of the gospel. As kids, it didn't matter how often our parents told us not to drink alcoholic beverages. If they drank, their message was in vain. I believe one of our downfalls in the West and with the traditional missions approach is that we don't give priority to issues of character and compassion.

When the gospel is coupled with Christlikeness and acts of mercy, it is harder to deny. This does not mean that all will accept. In fact, the religious crowd crucified Christ, who

fully embodied what we are to model here on the earth. But again, my experience has proven that sincere service blazes the trail for speaking the words of the gospel.

When the gospel is coupled with Christlikeness and acts of mercy it is harder to deny.

Why did I go? God gave me a dream of being His ambassador in the dark land of Afghanistan. Understanding His heart for the nations, times of prayer and fasting, the encouragement of others, the enormous need of the area, several divine door openings and sovereign leading brought me to this place.

What do I do? We serve the Afghan people by providing relief and development programs such as food

distributions, shelter and school buildings, various work programs, educational or community development, and road, water and irrigation projects. The goal is to help them rebuild their lives and give them hope. By doing so, we have the priceless privilege of access. We are there as God's children sharing His life, love and desire to bless the peoples of the earth. But we don't just tell them, we show them.

Some people wonder why I stayed after September 11, 2001. I had already been living on the front line for over a year. God had strategically placed us there on a mission of mercy. Why leave when you know you are where you need to be? Isn't the safest place right in the center of God's will?

7,900 Attend National; Williams on FM Board

The National Association of Free Will Baptists met July 21-25 in Memphis, Tenn., with 7,900 people registered in three concurrent conventions.

Danny Williams of Winfield, Ala., was elected to the Board of Foreign Missions to succeed Terry Eagleton of Nashville, Tenn.,

Some 28 foreign missionaries and 56 home missionaries were on hand. A 2003 Foreign Missions budget of 7.4 million dollars was adopted.

Foreign Missions and Home Missions sponsored a joint rally on Tuesday afternoon, July 23, featuring Dr. Richard Harris, a Southern Baptist church growth specialist.

Missionary Ron Callaway spoke during a seminar of the Commission for Theological Integrity dealing with "The Omniscience of God and Open Theism."

Tim and Kristi Johnson teamed to present a missionary challenge Tuesday during the 11:00 a.m. service for Women Nationally Active for Christ.

Andersons Detained by Police; Robberies Noted

During a Friday night outing in June, Verlin and Debbie Anderson and their family were confronted by policemen as they drove from a deserted airstrip just outside of Bouna, Côte d'Ivoire. "Two policemen stepped out abruptly from the side of the dirt road and waved us to a halt," cite the Andersons. "After a verbal barrage to ascertain who we were, they pointed at the car with their machine guns and said, 'Get out of the car and follow us.'"

The police were afraid the Andersons were bandits coming to attack them. The situation soon calmed down. Only later did the missionaries find out that while they were at the airstrip a robbery and shooting took place five miles down the road.

18 Visit France, Help with Church Building

Eighteen people from the Liberty Bible Free Will Baptist Church in Gainesville, Ga., went to France June 12-24 to work on the church building in Nantes, participate in distribution of literature, and help with youth activities.

The group was made up of 14 students and four adults. Leading them were Matthew and Cristina Price who had spent a year in France studying and working with the Nantes church.

Robbery, Murder Darken ICA; Cousineau Hurt

A hail of head-on gunfire met missionary Mike Cousineau as he drove his car onto the International Christian Academy campus in Bouaké, Côte d'Ivoire, on July 17.

Responding to a report that thieves were on campus, Mike soon discovered that seven armed robbers had forced their way onto the compound.

Cousineau was ordered from his vehicle and taken to the Free Will Baptist dorm. He found members of two building teams from the United States as well as Terry and D.D. Vandivort and a campus guard face down on the floor with gunmen in charge.

When Mike, who is the business manager for the school, told them the money was not there, he was pistol-whipped several times, suffering a fractured socket of the right eye, cuts and bruises. As they led Mike out to his vehicle, one of the men turned and shot the guard as he lay on the floor, killing him instantly.

Leaving the campus in Cousineau's auto the villains told Mike he was going to die. When they turned off the main road and stopped the car, Mike jumped out and ran a zigzag course into the bush as the men opened fire. Fortunately, he was not hit.

Eventually Cousineau was able to get help and return to campus. Deleen was at home, so she was not involved. They expressed praise to the Lord for His protec-

tion in helping Mike to escape and staying the gunmen from further murders.

The builders, though shocked and fearful, remained to finish their task on the new Free Will Baptist church building. Mike and Deleen and the Vandivorts returned to the States and the builders have returned home.

The Cousineaus left for Côte d'Ivoire August 16 to prepare for the next school term. The Vandivorts will retool in the U.S. for future ministry.

Missouri Church Group Ministers in Panama

A group of 27 people from Calvary Chapel Free Will Baptist Church in Buffalo, Mo., traveled to Panama on July 8 for a week of work on two main churches in the Panama City area.

The team did electrical installations, construction and poured a 20 x 30-foot slab of concrete for the Nueva Esperanza church which serves meals to 150-200 children three times a week.

The group was able to share the message of Christ with approximately 1,000 children in a Panamanian public school.

Indiana Teen Outreach Labors, Learns in Africa

According to Dr. Kenneth Eagleton, nine teens and three adult sponsors from five Free Will Baptist churches in Indiana arrived in Bouna, Côte d' Ivoire, on June 8 and continued for 19 days. The team was led by Joe and Carla Picklesimer of Emmanuel FWB Church in Wabash, Ind.

While in Bouna the group helped finish a house for a blind couple. They had raised the funds for the house.

Two classes were held each weekday morning to introduce the team to animism and African culture.



The Persecuted Church

In the cover article of this HEARTBEAT John Weaver gives a brief description of his ministry in Afghanistan. We thank the Lord that Free Will Baptists contributed to the training which allows him to make a difference in the Kingdom.

Two years ago it would have been safe to assume that very few people could point to Afghanistan on the world map. It simply was not on our personal radar screens. Almost no one had heard of the Taliban. Osama bin Laden was only familiar to news junkies who watched C-Span and MSNBC. September 11, however, changed all of that overnight.

What happened? A crisis! A crisis that hit close to home and exposed our vulnerabilities. It is now one year since those horrible events. What lessons should we consider? As Americans we face security issues and economic concerns.

But ask that question now from our perspective as Christians, followers of the example of Christ. What things should be awakened within us?

Afghanistan is not the only country where advancing the Christian faith is difficult. Some missiologists and historians estimate that more people have died for the Christian faith in the last 20 years than in all of Church history before.

We have heard of the Abu Sayyaf in the Philippines who killed missionary Martin Burnham. The al-Qaeda network is prominently featured in newscasts. We all shudder when we hear reports of abuse in China, India, and North Korea. But in addition to these glaring examples, in nations rarely mentioned in our news media, our brothers and sisters in Christ are suffering horribly.

Are you aware of the level of persecution that exists now in countries like Sudan, Bhutan, Turkmenistan, Algeria, and Saudi Arabia? We do not know the names of most of our family members who are suffering there. We will not see their faces until we join them in the congregation mentioned in Revelation 5. No, their cases are not mentioned on nightly newscasts. But the suffering is very real, often incredible.

God has a special concern for the persecuted and the oppressed. Perhaps this is because His Son was included among them. Can we read Hebrews 13:3 and Matthew 25:31-46 without feeling as though we should become involved? I hope not!

Each year in November a Sunday is

set aside for this purpose. It is called "The International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church." Though we should give more attention to this growing and horrific tragedy than just one Sunday a year, certainly this day should focus our attention and cause us to become more informed. The 2002 date is Sunday, November 10.
