Stewardship demanded that we remove duplicate addresses, reducing the numbers and



WAR, FRIENDSHIP, AND FAITH BY MIKE COUSINEAU

NOVEMBER 4, 2004, 7:15 AM –BOUAKÉ UNDER ATTACK

Rockets rained down and 1,000-pound bombs exploded, shaking the entire city. Rebels and civilians died as government fighter planes hit strategic locations throughout the area. The tenuous cease-fire ended abruptly. We watched uncertainly as Ivorian fighter planes flew close to our campus heading for nearby rebel military installations.

My wife, Deleen, and I had returned to the International Christian Academy (ICA) campus on the outskirts of Bouaké less than three months before the attack. Bouaké, Côte d'Ivoire's second largest city, had served as rebel headquarters since the civil war began on September 19, 2002. We had returned somewhat apprehensive about being behind rebel lines, yet confident this was where God wanted us.

ICA had become a strategic installation for the French military, and we were given a unique opportunity to live on the same site as the soldiers. ICA staff and French officials negotiated a "common life agreement" to make sharing the campus work. God placed approximately 150 French soldiers on our doorstep. We prayed for opportunities to build relationships and friendships.

Security concerns had been minimal since ICA reopened. The bombing required us to act quickly to insure the safety of our staff and students. We increased security significantly, and French military representatives briefed us several times daily.

In an effort to handicap rebel forces, the Ivorian government cut all electricity, water, and communications to the northern half of the country. Thankfully, we had plenty of food and water on hand.

However, I had the only contact with the outside world through a satellite phone.

As the bombing continued, our oncampus crisis management team began making plans to evacuate the staff and students. We could not travel south since the capital city was in flames. Throughout the country a massive evacuation of westerners was underway.

A French military camp about a mile from our campus was bombed, killing several soldiers and wounding many more. A week later Mr. Koné, a rebel leader I had befriended a year earlier, gave us an influential escort for our caravan. We had eight vehicles loaded with 53 people. Mr. Koné's presence made the passage uneventful as the group journeyed through a dozen rebel checkpoints to the northern horder.

As the staff and students left campus, I stood at the school entrance and watched

them drive out of sight. Tears streamed down my cheeks as I realized most of them would never set foot on campus again.


I stood at the gate mourning the death of a 44-year ministry. François Noël, the commander of the 28th Geographic Battalion, approached and invited me and the other staff person who stayed behind to eat our meals with his unit. He stated it would not be good for us to eat alone. We accepted and were warmly received by his unit.

One evening I felt impressed to take coffee to the soldiers on guard duty at the front of the campus. During our conversation Thomas inquired, "Michel, I know why we are here. We are military and are ordered to be here. Why in the world are you still here?" That night I told him and his buddies on duty about the love God gave me for the Ivorian people. I spoke of my love for Christ, and what He has done for me and for all peoples of the world. Thomas told me that he wanted to discuss these things further.


When hostilities first heightened, Cedrick, a French soldier with a three-year-old son and a pregnant wife, begged me to allow him to call his wife and let her know he was okay. He knew she would hear about the bombing of the location where he was stationed. I felt impressed to meet Cedrick's need and dialed the number of his residence in France. When his wife was on the line, I handed the phone to him. The biggest smile I had seen since the bombing began illuminated his face. This began a friendship I'm sure will last a lifetime.

My relationship with some of the soldiers grew stronger as the weeks passed. Cedrick and several of his friends came to my house almost nightly for coffee and cake. We discussed military logistics and personal struggles, and opened our lives to one another. I even had the opportunity to talk to Cedrick and Cyrille about the Christian philosophy of marriage and child rearing.

One afternoon I presented a Bible to Cedrick. He held it with both hands as if it







were the greatest treasure he had ever received. Tears filled his eyes as he said to me, "Michel, I have never had a Bible. Thank you so much."

When Cedrick's wife had complications with her pregnancy, we prayed together. I assured him I would continue to pray for her and for him. He responded, "This makes me very happy."

One evening about a week before my return to the United States I was visiting with Cyrille, a six foot, five inch, blondeheaded soldier. With all his military gear

and sunglasses, he was quite impressive. But underneath the protective gear the young man was hurting. This particular evening, he began to share some of the difficulty in his life. I was exhausted, so around 11 p.m. I quietly asked God to send him on his way. Instead, God infused me with energy until Cyrille left at 1:45 a.m. I told Cyrille I would be praying for him and his pain. His face lit up and he thanked me.


DECEMBER 2, 2004, 6:00 AM —DEPARTURE DAY

Several men came to my house at 6 a.m. to tell me goodbye. Among them were Cedrick and Cyrille. Cyrille told me he had something very special to give me. He removed the gold chain from around his neck and placed it around mine. I looked up and saw big tears in his eyes. This chain serves as a constant reminder to pray for the men of the 28th Geographic Battalion. Not a day has gone by that I have not prayed for them.

The civil war has been devasting for Côte d'Ivoire. It has caused the country to regress in almost every way imaginable. However, I can honestly say the Ivorian Christians have grown spiritually.

Even as bombs fell from the sky and tanks fired missiles in our direction, God gave us golden moments to share boldly the reason for being in Bouaké, Côte d'Ivoire. Without the civil war, I would not have been given the opportunity to share my faith with French soldiers. New friendships were made that will not be broken. God provided many opportunities to pray with my new friends. I look forward to the moment when I can take these friends to the cross of Jesus.

Mike and Deleen Cousineau have ministered in Côte d'Ivoire since 1978. Mike is currently making trips to Bouaké to minister to both French military and Ivorians. His dream is to see the church-planting effort in Bouaké restarted. Presently, Deleen remains stateside until the country's situation stabilizes.

the unreached peoples of the world? Through planting churches! The fastest way to reach lost people is to start new churches where people are. This is true in the United States and abroad.

Church planting has always been the focus of Free Will Baptist Inter-

national Missions. Your international missionaries serve as church planters or in roles that contribute to the process of planting churches.

Lost people must be won to Christ and converts gathered into groups of believers who will become self-supporting, self-governing, and self-propagating churches. As these churches multiply they become church-planting movements extending the gospel to their own people group and beyond.

Every church in every culture has a role to play in God's global harvest. Free Will Baptist churches overseas are sending workers into their own "Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" in greater numbers than ever before. This is as it should be. As church-planting efforts abound, so will the influence of the gospel!

Some parts of the world are open and responsive to church planting efforts. Missionaries are welcomed, and the people groups are receptive to the message they declare. The greatest advance in planting churches is in areas where numbers of national believers have responded to the call of God to become lay or ordained preachers. Under the faithful tutelage of your missionaries, national Christians are leading church-planting efforts in fulfillment of the Great Commission. This often occurs in spite of intense persecution from their families and countrymen.

In other parts of the world church planting is slow and difficult. Although borders are open to missionary workers, the people are often resistant to the presence of American missionaries and the message of the gospel which conflicts with their worldview. In these areas, the response of national believers to God's call to plant and lead churches has been slow. Many who respond face spiritual and cultural opposition, often to the point of defeat. Your missionaries serving in these areas continue to labor faithfully, praying the Lord of the harvest will send forth laborers from the churches they establish.

Most unreached peoples of the world live in areas where open evangelism and church-planting efforts are severely limited

or even prohibited by their governments. Generally, these countries will not receive Christians who come as missionaries but welcome Christians to assist in the development of their communities and families. Free Will Baptists can meet peoples' individual needs as Christ did and, through the rela-

tionships established, share the message of hope and forgiveness found in the gospel.

Underground churches are thriving in many parts of the world. Creative access to unreached peoples also provides for winning and training core groups of believers. They will be ready to step into leadership roles when God opens doors for public churches to be established in their countries. Free Will Baptists are moving to take advantage of these opportunities. Personnel assigned to these regions may not always be identified publicly as missionaries but will represent Christ to their hosts and share the message of love as people inquire.

Church planting is how the apostles spread the gospel in the first century. Church planting is how Free Will Baptists are spreading the gospel 21 centuries later. Every Christian needs to find his or her role in taking the gospel to the ends of the earth. Together we can make a significant impact as we all use our God-given gifts, talents and abilities to extend His Kingdom to every people group on earth.

DELAYED REACTION FROM CUBA

Students are seeing for themselves what the Lord of Harvest is reaping among the cities and villages of the "Pearl of the Antilles."


It is June 2000, and missionary Kenneth Eagleton is celebrating his 70th birthday in Cuba. He is leading the first TEAM (teens equipped and active in missions) trip to Cuba. While the high school team members and their Cuban brothers and sisters celebrate his birthday, he reminds them that just 50 years earlier he was a student missionary spending a summer working with Thomas and Mabel Willey. He was not the only Free Will Baptist student who served in Cuba. Students like Chuck Snow, Mark Vandivort. and Dave Franks served with and learned from the Willey families, the Phenicies, Lucy Wisehart, and others. However, from the Cuban revolution in 1959 until the summer

of 2000, no other Free Will Baptist students had been able to serve with the Cuban Free Will Baptist Convention.

Envision now March 2005 and 10 Free Will Baptist Bible College students traveling to Cuba to revive a working tradition that will continue in the coming years. In the group are pastoral, mission, business, Christian education, and teacher education students.

The students have raised support from their churches and friends and, as Spring Break begins, the group flies to Miami and then to Havana.

The flight takes about an hour. From Havana the group travels west by bus to Pinar del Río. They have only eight days on



the island, and the Cuban Free Will Baptist Convention has planned an itinerary that will give the group maximum exposure to the two main provinces of La Habana and Pinar del Río where the majority of the Free Will Baptist churches are located. Several of the Cuban pastors are becoming proficient in English and serve as translators for the group as they sing, witness, teach Sunday School, and preach. However, the students are primarily visiting the Cuban Convention to learn from brothers and sisters who have been faithful to Christ and have seen their denomination more than double during the past 10 years.

Students are seeing for themselves what the Lord of Harvest is reaping among the cities and villages of the "Pearl of the Antilles." Close, personal contact with Cuban brothers and sisters provides the students with an opportunity to begin to understand how the Gospel affects people in another culture. The joy of the Cuban Christians is infectious, and laughter is never far away from the group as it moves, via bus and truck, across the two western provinces of Cuba.

On the western end of the island, the group is shown some of the hurricane damage (2004) done to the churches of La Fe and Las Martinas, but already repairs are being made. These two congregations continue to meet and reach into their communities. On Monday night,

an important chapel service is held on the campus of the Free Will Baptist seminary as a group of Cuban students and those from FWBBC share testimonies of what the Lord Jesus has done and is doing for and in each one.

The second half of the week—one that has gone by all too fast—is spent in the La Habana province with the Jaruco and Jibacoa churches. The last full day is spent visiting the Free Will Baptist church of Matanzas and the surrounding area.

With songs sung, sermons preached, and children taught, the group says its good-byes to new friends at the José Marti Airport. The 10 students now wait for the short flight back to Miami. What is in their minds, their hearts? Are they just thinking how glad they are to be finished with meals of rice and beans, and how they can't wait for a hamburger at Miami International? Or perhaps their thoughts are with the Cuban brothers and sisters with whom they just spent the last 192 hours? Are they ready to leave, or do they want to stay?

I am writing this article in January, almost 45 days before the trip just described. The places mentioned are the ones we will visit. But am I guilty of falsifying the story? Why don't you contact me at rcally@fwbbc.edu to find out? Maybe I'll have been mistaken. Maybe, but I don't think so. I believe that without exception every student in the group will tell you that being among the Christians of Cuba is a life-changing experience. These 10 students are part of a FWBBC student body of whom more than 50 percent have been involved in mission trips-trips that are not a "spring break or summer thing," but represent a genuine desire to know God's will and to serve Him wherever He may lead them.


As expected, our five-year-old son Ryan napped during the film. But our 10-year-old daughter Erin watched attentively as the story of Sergej Bessarab's life, conversion, and martyrdom unfolded. We were all moved by the radical transformation of his life after coming to know Jesus and his commitment to preach the gospel even in the face of personal danger.

My husband Mike and I discussed the film as we drove home. Erin piped in from the back seat. After seeing what Sergej had done, she felt she needed to do something to help people learn more about God. Erin began brainstorming. By the time we pulled into the driveway she had decided to host an after-school Bible study for some of her friends every Tuesday.

We expected her youthful enthusiasm to die out before Tuesday came around. However, when I walked in the door from work the following Tuesday I found four children at the kitchen table. They were reading from the book of Genesis and completing a crossword puzzle from a coloring book purchased months before. They decided to continue meeting every week, reading the Bible and completing puzzles and activities from the various materials around the house. They have since read about Samson and King Solomon and have studied the Ten Commandments.

It has been a couple of months since that first night around the table. Although we had a short reprieve due to the Christmas holidays, the children still gather to study the Bible. Response from the kids has been positive. One boy asked if he could bring a friend with him. My husband and I responded with a resounding "Yes!" We hope that soon we will have "standing room only" in our kitchen.

NEHEMIAH PROJECT AWAITS CITY APPROVAL

VILLALBA, SPAIN - Architect's plans for construction of a church building in Villalba, Spain, have been submitted to city officials. The city has a two-month window to review and approve the current plans. City officials have until the end of February to respond. Meanwhile, the church is seeking a construction loan from local banks. Historically, banks in Spain have not been favorably disposed to issue loans to evangelical organizations.

The Nehemiah Project, as the enterprise has been dubbed, has been in progress for over 10 years. Land for a permanent church building was purchased years ago, however the city previously blocked construction plans.

TSUNAMI RELIEF DONATIONS ACCEPTED

ANTIOCH, TN—The earth-quake and tsunamis that struck Asia on December 26, 2004, did not directly impact International Missions works. However, the horrific loss of life and devastating damage certainly demand Christian participation in relief efforts.


The Advisory Council will gather annually. However, their ongoing availability to give advice for specific needs renders their volunteer service invaluable.

BASQUE TERRORISTS CONTINUE VIOLENCE



the markets to sell Christian books. People are wary of me and accuse me of being in a cult. I'm tired. I'm not going to try any more. I'm fed up. Nothing is working. I'm staying home. Do Your job. Send me a sign!"

So prayed a lonely, frustrated, and discouraged missionary to France. He had done everything he knew to do. In desperation, Don Sexton prayed with his wife Billie that God would make something happen. As he concluded his prayer a knock sounded at the door. When they opened the door a man said, "I am the salesman who's come to sell you the Renault 5 for Charolette Tallent...."

This is that salesman's story.

I am Yannick. I was born in 1956 into a family of five children. Our family was Catholic by tradition, but we were nonpracticing.

From a very young age I searched for God. As a 13-year-old I envisioned becoming a Catholic priest. However, my parents didn't encourage me, and later I hoped to marry.

On January 22, 1977, I met Dominique, and she became my wife on April 28, 1978. We have three children. Samuel, 25 years old, is a fireman in Paris. Vincent, 20, is a fully, does not want to be a fireman!

My story begins in 1978, the year Dominique and I married. I was a car salesman for Renault. One day a colleague told me a pastor wanted to buy a car. My colleague was "allergic" to priests, pastors, and anyone who resembled them. Rather than meeting this pastor himself, he asked me to go. So I went to see this man with the dreadful accent. If he would buy a car from me I was willing to listen to it.

Our interview was cordial. His wife made good coffee and gave us little cakes. He had an attractive personality. He gave me his business card on which was written: "Don Sexton, Free Will Baptist Pastor."

I asked him, "Are you like the Mormons or the Jehovah's Witnesses?"

He replied that his ministry was to bring the Word of God. He said the "Free Will Baptist" label was undoubtedly difficult for me to understand, but he would explain if I would grant him a little more time.

On my second visit I had only one goal: to conclude the transaction and leave these good folks to their spirituality. Once the business was completed, Don smiled at me and said, "May I ask you two questions?" "Yes. Please do."

"Do you believe the Bible is the Word of God?"

As a good Catholic, even if I had never read the Bible, I did not want to pass for an imbecile. So I answered in the affirmative.

"If I show you a passage in the Bible that is not subject to a Baptist interpretation, are you ready to obey the Word of God?"

And there I was trapped!

I told him I would agree on one condition: he must read the passage in the Jerusalem Bible translation (the official translation of the Catholic Church). Not a problem! He picked up that translation and read the passage that changed my life forever.

"It is by grace that you are saved by means of faith and that not of yourselves. It is a gift of God, it is not by works, so that no one may glorify himself" (Ephesians 2:8,9).

For a Catholic to hear this message of salvation by grace was revolutionary. I had always been taught that if I wanted to be saved by God, it would be by works. I went home troubled. I couldn't sleep. Something in me was not the same. For the first time in my life the Bible made sense. I understood! So every day I went to visit this pastor who explained to me the Word of God. And every night I shared his comments with my wife.

He invited us to a worship service in the rented dining hall of a school on the east side of Nantes. I heard people praying and sharing what God had done in their lives. I saw what they lived daily. We were even more troubled. So we gave our lives to the Lord in 1979.

We had struggles. Our families closed





their doors to us. They felt we had betrayed them. The day we were baptized by immersion, no one from our families came to the service. It was hard.

Although both Dominique and I had very good professional situations, we took three-month-old Samuel and went for a year of biblical studies at Emmaüs Bible Institute in Switzerland. Upon returning to Nantes we continued our spiritual walk with the Murray family. They strengthened our training in the service of the church. The church of Nantes, with pastors John Murray and Steve Riggs, and the church of St Nazaire, with pastors Jerry Gibbs and Tom McCullough, prayed for us.

Today I am 48 years old. Every time I enter my church, which sits 100 meters from where I knocked on Don Sexton's door, I thank the Lord I met Don and his wife.

Recently I was unemployed for 15 months. During those 15 months, I was able to be more available for the church. Steve Riggs gave me the responsibility for the

Wednesday night prayer service. I was able to visit those in difficulty. Seeing the problems of other people allowed me to forget my own troubles.

I was happy in spite of the negative responses to my job search. Though it weighed on my morale, I had to be patient. Each month we had to take from our savings to live. Our unemployment allowances were not enough to pay our bills. But God did not allow us to be tempted beyond our strength.

Now I face a choice. The harvest is ripe, and there are few workers. What is my place? I wait today for God to confirm His call by opening the door for full-time service. I also wait for brothers and sisters of our church to recognize this call on my life.

My meeting with Don was not by chance. It is also not by chance that the church you allowed us to buy sits only 100 meters from the place Don Sexton lived! I see the hand of God who has a plan for it all.


Some quickly judge the success or failure of a ministry by the number of converts. Take care, dear brothers and sisters. God does not use the same accounting system we use. Had I been the only person needing forgiveness, Jesus would have gone to the cross just for me. I've wondered, "Did God send Don and Billie Sexton to France just for me?"

Pray for us, that we may have joy and know His will for our lives. Remind yourselves that it is not in vain that you support missionaries financially and in prayer.

My testimony is proof of that, and to Him be the glory! May the Lord bless you.



DESTINATION NORTH AMERICA

With prayerful hearts and a great desire for soul winning and church planting, we set our eyes on fields that are white with harvest. The Home Missions Department endeavors to reach the lost across the nation with a special focus on the Mid-Atlantic and Rocky Mountain regions.

MID-ATLANTIC MISSION

Forty-six million people, one out of every six Americans, live in Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware. Thirty-nine cities across this region have more than 50,000 in population. The Mid-Atlantic area has grown by one million people in four years and is expected to increase by more than a million within the next four years.

Former home missionaries, Tommy and Pam Jones, established a thriving work in Pittsburgh. That's a beginning. We are praying that God will raise up teams to go into cities like Greensburg, Williamsport, and Scranton, Pennsylvania. Our research confirms that counties in outlying areas around Baltimore, Hagertown, Frederick, and Annapolis, Maryland, are growing faster than the cities themselves. The population is shifting to the outer edges of Wilmington, Dover, and Georgetown, Delaware. The need is tremendous. The call is clear. Will you go?

ROCKY MOUNTAIN REGION

During the last few years, Colorado, Utah, and Idaho ranked as the third, fourth, and fifth fastest growing states in the nation. They will gain another 665,000 residents in four years. Several million people live in the area from Colorado Springs north along Interstate 25, through Denver into Ft. Collins (135 miles). Castle Rock, Brighton, Longmont, and Wellington, Colorado are experiencing tremendous growth. The front-range is becoming home to 177 new people each day. Currently, we have a

foothold in Colorado with four mission churches and one established church. Colorado has 26 cities with more than 50,000 people in them. Now is the time to plant churches in this quickly expanding Rocky Mountain region.


A great salt lake soon comes into view when traveling west from Ft. Collins, Colorado, across the Rocky Mountains. Mul-

In the early days of 2004, Diego picked up a Christian magazine, and his eyes were drawn to an advertisement for the Gwen Hendrix Hispanic Bible Institute. Immediately, he felt as though God had opened the door for his ministry training. He and his wife began praying earnestly for God to guide them. After discussions with their pastor and weeks of prayer, Diego, Maria, and their





LET THE NATIONS BE GLAD





In the van on the way back to our Nashville campus, I reported just two conversions. "The third boy just didn't seem to be responding," I explained.

A week later, I missed the weekly service at the reform school, but when the group returned to campus, they converged on my room. "Remember the boy you said didn't respond? Well, he won two others to the Lord...in reform school...his first week as a Christian!"

I learned it isn't what's on the face, but what's in the heart that makes the difference.


WHERE THE BIBLE MEETS LIFE

IF YOU ONLY KNEW

Squash. I couldn't stand to look at it, much less eat it when I was a kid. "If you only knew what you're missing," my mother would tell me, shaking her head as she savored each bite of the nasty stuff.

When Jesus made a point to seek a woman by Jacob's well in Samaria (John 4), he told her something similar. "If you only knew who I am and what I'm offering you," he assured her, "you would have asked me first thing for the amazing gift I can give you" (verse 10).

My thoughts run along the same lines today when people I try to reach with the gospel turn down Jesus' offer. "If you only knew what you could have if you'd just believe," I think to myself.



If you only knew . . . that none of us differs in our need.

"We shouldn't be having this conversation," she told Jesus. After all, Samaritans and Jews didn't get along. Yet what was true then holds today. Though our world divides itself into every possible faction, ultimately we all belong to one group. "All have sinned," the Scripture asserts; "there is no difference."

If you only knew . . . that your life could be so much better.

Like so many people today, this Samaritan had suffered because of a string of bad choices and bad relationships. Yet the Lord offers healing and wholeness to all those buried under the rubble of collapsed hopes.

If you only knew . . . that I am who I claim to be.

She knew about the Messiah. Evidently she had told herself there would be answers when he came—and suddenly, she met Him face to face! If Jesus is the Christ, why aren't we telling that to the people we meet?

If you only knew...that I could give you everything you've ever really wanted.


"Living water," Jesus calls it—total satisfaction. As people around us spend their lives barely treading water in the face of overwhelming tides that will eventually wear them down, only a relationship with Him will keep us above the surf and give purpose to living.

Years after their college days are over, there will be a church in Tajikistan making an impact for the Kingdom." He added, "This truly is a God-honoring legacy for these students."

CHRISTIAN SERVICE WE'RE ALL ABOUT IT! BY JOHN MURRAY

Education without experience is an oxymoron. Someone has said, "Instruction without implementation is an exercise in futility." Christian service puts into practice what is learned in the classroom.

It was a warm, fall afternoon when a student suddenly burst into my office exclaiming, "Brother Murray, we just led a man to Christ!" A man was visiting his mother in the neighborhood near the college and went for a walk. He stopped to relax on a swing near the college library. Two freshmen were in the area and asked him about his relationship with Christ. They showed him how he could be forgiven of his sins and were able to lead him to Christ. They had just learned "one verse evangelism" the day before.

This is one of the many results of Christian service. Every Free Will Baptist Bible College student is involved in a Christian service ministry each week.

It is interesting that universities across America are just now seeing the benefit of "community service." Nicholas Confessore in his article, "What Makes a College Good?" in The Atlantic Monthly notes the importance of "integration"—where students apply the knowledge they've learned in the classroom. One of the five benchmarks he emphasizes is "how well an institution promotes activity and collaborative learning," and whether the school offers "enriching educational experiences." What is a new emphasis for many colleges and universities has been a weekly experience at Free Will Baptist Bible College for 63 years. Last school year, 2003-04, our students completed more than 7,800 hours of Christian service. Twenty-two groups originated from the campus, and 33 churches benefited from the energetic ministry of our students.

Christian service is more than what we do weekly. Sometimes, unusual events in the lives of others inspire Christians to serve. During the past two falls, such events have occurred. First, a hurricane hit the coast of North Carolina devastating the churches at Davis and Stacy. During the 2003 fall break, 14 students traveled with Jeff and Calisse Caudill to North Carolina to help rebuild those churches.

The fall of 2004 saw hurricane Ivan assault the Florida gulf coast, particularly the Pensacola area. During the fall break, 16 students went with me to help three churches in Pensacola. We helped one family that was not a part of the church, and the pastor said, "You have done more in one hour to influence the husband to come to church than I have been able to do in two years." Touching lives is what Christian service is all about.

STUDENTS EXPERIENCE A VARIETY OF MINISTRIES

Each year FWBBC students choose a different Christian service. This enables each student to be exposed to a variety of ministries. They have ministered in jails, nursing homes, Bible clubs, on the street, as tutors, and as conversation partners with foreign students from area colleges. They have preached at the Nashville Union Mission (for homeless men and women), and have been involved in a host of other ministries in local churches.

One of our students named Sharon, who had a neighborhood Bible club in her home, came into my office. She said what she liked about her Christian service was "the opportunity to reach kids for Jesus and make a difference in their lives." She related that the previous Sunday three kids from her children's church group were baptized. She went on to say that one came to her later and told her he wanted to be a preacher.

WE ARE TRAINING LEADERS

Free Will Baptist Bible College is committed to training leaders. We believe bold leadership is needed in every area of ministry. The leaders of the Christian service groups that go out from the college are led by students who were in that ministry group the previous year. This provides continuity in the group and allows each leader to learn from the leader who preceded him or her.

The quality of the leadership is evident to the community where they serve. I received an email from Melissa Burka, who teaches international students at West End Middle School across the highway from the college. Our students tutor theirs in English, math, and English conversation. She wrote, "We are enjoying having your students over here to help our students. It is amazing the difference it is making for some of our students."

RESULTS THAT COUNT

I often wonder how those who have made decisions are holding out. I was pleased to have a former student call me and share his experience. He worked at Baptist Book Store. One day a gentleman came to the counter to pay for some books. He asked, "Don't I know you?" As they talked, the man reminded the student that he had been in a jail where the student ministered. He had been saved and called into the ministry. It was encouraging to hear what God is doing in the lives of those touched by Christian service.

MORE FROM CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Matt and Cristina Price, candidate missionaries to France, led their conversation partner to Christ after two years of conversation. Every week they talked to him about their faith in Jesus Christ, and eventually he accepted the Lord. Our students meet weekly with a large number of international students from area colleges. This has opened many doors to witness.

I was in the lunch line on campus. Aaron was behind me. He said, "Brother Murray, I am so excited that I have been able to personally lead five people to the Lord this year. I recently led a lady to the Lord at the women's mission." I am privileged to have students stop me on campus or come by my office to share what God is doing in their lives.


A pastor commented about one of our students, "I wish I had a hundred like him. He is committed, energetic, and totally involved in our church." About half of our students carry out their Christian service in local churches.

During prayer time in a personal evangelism class, Charles said, "I want to tell you the greatest thing that has happened to me. I led someone to Jesus last night." He had preached at the Anchor Home for young men, and two of the young men were saved.

Mrs. Campbell, activities director at Knowles Health Care Center, called to let me know our students are doing a wonderful job ministering to the residents. She shared that during the summer the residents ask frequently about our students and anticipate their return.

In a personal evangelism class, one young man asked to say a word before we prayed. He expressed concern that he had never led anyone to Christ. He also asked his dorm prayer group to pray that he might lead someone to Christ. Then, he went with a group to the Nashville Union Mission. After the service that night, one came forward to be saved and four made other decisions. The concerned student led the one to salvation. By the way, that was not his regular Christian service. Many of our students serve when it is not required.

MAKING YOUR MONEY WORK FOR YOURSELF AND FOR OTHERS

People who support Free Will Baptist ministries do so out of a spirit of generosity and concern for God's work across the world. Nonetheless, charitable contributions often can be planned to blend with personal goals and objectives donors have for themselves and their families. Charitable remainder trusts are a remarkable tool for achieving these objectives.

Rather than make a bequest to assist a Free Will Baptist ministry, you may find it advantageous to create a charitable remainder unitrust from which you will be paid annual benefits for life; the trust property will later benefit Free Will Baptist ministries.

Just what is a charitable remainder unitrust? Basically, it is a trust in which you irrevocably place cash, securities, or other property, but keep a specified income—usually for life. When the trust ends, the property in the trust passes to the Free Will Baptist ministry of your choice, much as if you had left it in your will. But because you chose to "accelerate" your bequest by means of a trust, Congress says you are entitled to a substantial income tax charitable deduction. Depending on how you arrange your trust, many other advantages are possible:

- Increased income for your family
- Capital gains tax avoidance

- Favorably taxed income
- Diverting of income to a family member in a low tax bracket
- Estate tax savings
- Avoidance of gift tax
- Professional investment of your funds
- A hedge against inflation
- Reduced estate settlement costs
- Meaningful support for FWB ministries

The unitrust provides that a specific percentage (minimum 5%) of the value of the property in trust be paid annually. If the value of the trust increases, the payout will increase, too. Decreases are also possible.

CONSIDER THE BENEFITS:

- An immediate income tax deduction is available when you create a qualified charitable remainder unitrust during your life. The amount of the deduction will depend on your age and the amount of the benefits you want to receive each year.
- You can transfer stocks or other appreciated property to the trust without paying any capital gains tax on your paper profit.
- You can decide the amount of income you will receive each year. Further, in some cases, your lifetime benefits will be favorably taxed.

ESCAPE FROM A "LOCKED-IN" POSITION

Phil has had phenomenal success in the stock market in recent years, but he hesitates to sell because of capital gains taxes on his profits. Solution? Phil transfers highly appreciated stock (that he has owned more than one year) to a tax-exempt unitrust. The trustee sells the stock, avoids all capital gains taxes, and pays income for life to Phil and his wife. Phil earmarks his gift for important programs and receives a substantial charitable deduction this year.

SAVE FOR RETIREMENT

You can make contributions to a unitrust that will pay you income during retirement and then distribute the trust assets to a Free Will Baptist ministry after your death. Advantages? A part of every contribution to the trust will be tax deductible, based on your current age and the amount of income you retain from the trust. Your retirement savings can grow within the trust, tax free, with substantial income after you retire. Your retirement trust is not subject to most of the restrictions that affect IRAs and pension plans.



Not many wives would tolerate a husband who camps out year-round, and nobody but Jane Johnson would go camping with him! For 34 of Sam and Jane Johnson's 50 married years, they've camped in a thicket 35 miles west of Nashville, Tennessee. That's how long 71-year-old, red-haired Sam has been director of Hillmont Camp.

Hillmont is Red Sam's dream job, 157 acres of trees and meadows bristling with 30 buildings 20 miles off I-40 north of White Bluff. He and Lady Jane started with the land, a hunger for leadership training, a few old buildings...and the dream.

THEY DID IT ALL

"When we started in 1971, we cooked and cleaned and painted, mowed and cut brush, nailed lumber, and prayed a lot. We did it all," Sam says. "Come to think of it, I suppose we still do a lot of that now."

His fiery red hair may have lost some of its brilliance, but Sam remembers why he launched the Hillmont dream. "I originally hoped to develop a camp providing ministry opportunities for Free Will Baptist youth in the Cumberland Association. We wanted the camp to become a laboratory for leadership training."

Sam chuckles, "We do a lot of repeat business here. They come back for Jane's homemade yeast rolls. We pay close attention to good food and clean buildings."

TURNING THE CORNER

Even though Sam has a quiet way of getting things done, folks began taking notice of the easy-going Free Will Baptist layman from North Carolina. He was named Layman of the Year in 1967.

Christian Camping International (CCI)

tapped Sam for its President's Award in 1969. He served four years (1974-1978) as editor of CCI's Christian Camping International Magazine and six years on the International Board of Trustees, In 1997 CCI jointly honored Sam and Jane with the organization's prestigious "Kingsley Living Tribute Award."

During one of Sam's most creative decades (1962-1972), he led the Church Training Service Department and organized the Hillmont Engineers (1967), a leadership training program for Free Will Baptist boys. Hillmont hosted the early Free Will Baptist Leadership Conferences for national and state leaders. Red Sam's dream was blooming in the denomination he loved.

FLEXIBILITY AND STEWARDSHIP

Hillmont attracts 150 events annually with no advertising other than word of mouth. Whether it's a small executive session with a half-dozen guests or a boisterous group of 350, the camp welcomes all comers and operates 12 months a year.

"We can handle five groups at the same time and still give them the privacy they require," Sam says.

From unique Frontier Village to the Long House near Pineview Lodge, Hillmont resembles a swirling chess match in midgame. It's a user-friendly facility that doesn't require a coat and tie. Rustic board fences, industrial-grade kitchens, gymnasium, swimming pool, and more spread the word that the Hillmont stamp means excellence.

Sam explains, "Most of our business comes from churches. We've never had a group use the camp and not pay when they finished. I told the Lord years ago

that this was His business, and I was just going to work and watch. Look at what God has done here. Give Him all the credit."

Hillmont has been debt-free 10 years. With a handful of year-round employees, Sam and Jane stand back in amazement at God's provision. Sam estimates that the \$1.5 million investment in buildings, land, and equipment would cost twice that today.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST

The Johnsons got in on the ground floor with the Free Will Baptist retirement plan. They invested all they could because, as Sam says, "We didn't know of a safer or better place to put our retirement funds."

About a year ago, Sam and Jane converted their retirement plan to a charitable remainder trust with the Free Will Baptist Foundation. "We did this for two basic reasons," Sam says. "First, the Foundation offers the flexibility we need. Second, the Foundation provides us an opportunity to continue supporting the Free Will Baptist agencies we've prayed for through the years."

Sam explains, "The trust we set up through the Foundation will, at our deaths, channel funds to Free Will Baptist Bible College, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Master's Men, the Tennessee Children's Home, Cumberland Camp and others. And in case anyone asks, Hillmont is not included in our list of trust recipients."

The charitable remainder trust provides the Johnsons a tax-deduction now as well as a revenue source, and will continue to benefit Free Will Baptist work after they die.

WHAT WOULD I DO?

Asked about his retirement plans, Sam's eyes twinkle, "Me, retire? What would I do with my time if I retired? I plan to continue serving here as long as God gives me health to do it."

Perhaps all that camping out kept him young, or maybe Sam's just too busy to age. He's dreaming about the next building project, planning for tomorrow's group, praying for a new generation of leaders.

Red Sam's legacy to the future of God's work rises majestically out of the meadows and trees in a holy place called Hillmont. Leaving the camp with his smile flashing in the rearview mirror, I wanted to shout, "Play it again, Sam!"


REACHING PEOPLE FOR CHRIST



THE CLEAR CHOICE

I admit when I first saw the promotions and heard Ron Hunter, the General Director of Randall House Publications, talk about a new curriculum being produced, I was uneasy. I was concerned about how our church would receive those new ideas. Questions must be answered when you deal with curriculum and a volunteer teaching staff—questions like, Will they understand how to use the curriculum? Will they like the new curriculum? Will the product have new approaches that will change the way classes function?

In order for anything to be successful in a local church, it must have the support of the pastor. When I returned from the National Association, it became my practice to promote the excitement and discuss the benefits of CLEAR curriculum in our services.

What are these benefits? One major benefit of CLEAR curriculum is that it helps combine Sunday School studies and

family devotions. For the first time in 43 years of being in Sunday School, my entire family is studying the same subject on the same week. CLEAR provides an opportunity for families to maximize that one-hour of Sunday School by studying the same passage together throughout the week.

The second benefit of CLEAR has been the opportunity for individuals to enjoy hands-on Bible study. In the past, our church has provided extra curricular studies, but finding a time to meet for these studies was almost impossible because of scheduling conflicts. THE DOCTOR CAN SEE YOU NOW

Dr. LaVerne Miley and his wife Lorene have already retired four times, and there's no end in sight. The bright-eyed couple retired the first time in 1979 after returning from Ivory Coast, West Africa, where they served for 17 years as medical missionaries with Free Will Baptist International Missions.

Dr. Miley retired a second time in 1996 after teaching 17 years at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Lorene's second retirement came in 1993 when she completed 14

years as editor of *CoLaborer* magazine with Women Nationally Active for Christ.

LIFE BEYOND RETIREMENT

The Mileys' ministry has always reached out to people hurting both physically and spiritually. That did not stop after their fourth retirement. At age 69 when many couples prefer a rocking chair, the Mileys again answered the call to Christian service.

In 1997 they volunteered to assist the Christian Discipleship Center (CDC) in Cortez, Colorado. The CDC outreach focuses on Native Americans, specifically the Navajo and Hopi tribes. The Mileys loaded books, clothes, and a few personal items, and surprised all their older friends by relocating to the great American West.

Dr. Miley taught Bible for two years while Lorene demonstrated another of her skills by cooking for students and faculty members. They returned to their Nashville, Tennessee, home in 1999.

But when the call came from CDC personnel in mid-2004 for LaVerne and Lorene

to continue their work with Navajo and Hopi tribesmen, the 76-year-old Mileys reloaded, repacked, and returned to the Four Corners region of Colorado for a three-month teaching stint.

RETIREMENT PLAN BENEFITS

The Mileys have participated in the Free Will Baptist retirement plan since its origin. And it's a good thing they did, because they needed a source of income in order to serve with CDC in Colorado. Dr. and Mrs. Miley both have annuities with the Board of Retirement.

"Income from our annuities allowed us to volunteer with CDC," said Lorene. "Without the annuities, we would have experienced financial hardship."

The Mileys have several streams of revenue for their retirement years. "We both draw Social Security benefits," Dr. Miley said. "Plus, I have retirement funds from my teaching days at Free Will Baptist Bible College. There's no question that our Board of Retirement annuities play an important role in allowing us to do volunteer work."

CONTINUING LOCAL OUTREACH

For the first time in 45 years, Dr. Miley did not renew his medical license in 2004 after the fee to practice medicine doubled. However, the respected husband and wife team remains active in their local church (Cofer's Chapel FWB Church) and in community outreach.

Lorene has gone to prison for 12 years! LaVerne stepped into prison ministry four years

ago. They also speak frequently at retreats. Both are widely published writers whose journalistic efforts attract readers. They continue counseling ministries as well.

On the eve of their interview for this article, an urgent call forced the Mileys to reschedule in order to help a former prison inmate whom Lorene had been counseling. They rushed 50 miles away to do again their trademark ministry—apply prayer to the hurts of society, speak a kind word, offer counsel, and do it all in lesus' name.

Even after four retirements and two tours of duty among the Navajos, the sign above LaVerne and Lorene Miley's door still reads: The Doctor Can See You Now.





ALABAMA EMPHASIZES BIBLICAL GUIDELINES FOR MARRIAGE

MADISON, AL—Delegates to the 85th annual State Association that met November 10-12, 2004, at Madison FWB Church approved a resolution supporting an amendment to the United States constitution defining marriage as "only between one man and one woman." This resolution also declares, "such an amendment should prohibit states from legally recognizing same sex unions, as civil unions or domestic partnerships."

The association adopted a \$550,000 budget including participation in the Acts 1:8 plan. Delegates also made two changes to the constitution. The first allows the general board to meet at any time during the Association meeting while the second redefines the constitutional procedures by which a church can become a member of the state association. A committee was appointed to investigate the possibility of incorporating the state association.

According to State Clerk, Kenneth Bozeman, 236 attended the meeting, including 79 ministers, 18 deacons, 26 delegates and 113 visitors. Rev. Junior Hill spoke three times in addition to messages by Rev. Danny Thompson, Rev. Mickey Crane, Rev. Barry Raper, and Rev. Tom Scott. Alabama Women Active for Christ sponsored a banquet at the Greenbrier Restaurant featuring speakers Carolyn Hendrix and Janie Aldridge.

Moderator Danny Thompson presided over the meeting and was reelected to another year of service. Other state officers elected include Assistant Moderator, Glenn Poston; Clerk, Rodney Yerby; and Assistant Clerk, Rev. Danny Williams.

The 2006 Association meeting will meet November 9-11, 2005, at the Forestdale FWB Church in Forestdale.




REACH THAT GUY PLANS HUGE YEAR IN LOUISVILLE


More than 1,000 service opportunities await volunteers this summer. Much of our work will benefit the Salvation Army.



BIG WORDS FROM A SMALL COWBOY

A TRIBUTE TO JACK WILLIAMS

Cowboy Jack is a small man in one sense. He would probably be the first to admit he barely stands eye-level with long stirrups on a short horse. But in other ways, Jack Williams is the biggest man I know. He is a preachin' cowboy who rode across several decades of Free Will Baptist history on a trusted horse called *Contact* Magazine.

He navigated the rough terrain of denominational politics and prickly issues armed only with integrity, the Word of God, the ability to communicate . . . and gallons of strong, black coffee. And when Jack rode off into the sunset in search of his next adventure, he left big tracks across this denomination. He slipped off down the trail quietly, without pomp or fanfare, but the impact of his timeless words will resonate for years to come.

We've corralled a few of his best moments. It's the least we could do for the quiet cowboy who left his brand on all of us.

CHARACTER

The best of us are difficult sometime; the rest of us are difficult more frequently.

A trust betrayed can be forgiven, but even forgiveness cannot restore abandoned integrity.

Nobody's born whining. It's an acquired tastelessness.

Biblical success is a master of disguise, robed not in superlatives but in everyday circumstances and ordinary individuals.

What's the going rate for a man's character? The principle is the same regardless of the price.

Playing second fiddle takes more talent than most people think. In fact, second fiddle may be the most important instrument in the band.

No man ever gets above being accountable, especially the man who holds a pen in one hand and a Bible in the other. It doesn't take a Ph.D. to spot the difference between constructive criticism, which is always appropriate, and malicious criticism, which is never appropriate.

The next time you feel taken for granted, rejoice because someone has that much confidence in you.

PASTORS

When you're a preacher, exams come twice each Sunday. Remember that you're a shepherd, not a CEO. The CEO may be the man in charge, but the shepherd is the one they call when life hurts.

Somewhere there may be an overpaid pastor, but I don't know any.

In my opinion, if the typical preacher were a dog, he'd be a beagle. You know the type—hard worker, loyal, warm

nose, floppy ears, eats anything he can find, wouldn't bite you on a bet, kind of clumsy in matters of social grace but all class in matters of character.

If your pastor is not overworked yet, there's a good chance he soon will be unless you do something to prevent it.

The pastor may get his orders from God, but he has to work with us.

Marriages are built on trust. So are local churches. A marriage with no trust is a prison. A local church with no trust is a barbed wire fellowship.

LIFE

I'm not noble enough to say I enjoy tough times, yet I'm realistic enough to admit I need them.

My advice to you the next time you get caught between the bull and the buffalo—be real courteous to the guy holding the rope.

Take charge of your own life. If you don't, somebody else will.

Don't worry. Making mistakes won't kill you. It might be expensive and embarrassing, and you'll probably wish you'd never done it or said it or bought it—but you will survive!

Perhaps the greatest success in Christ is the man who knows he's a failure outside of Christ.

I like the way God writes obituaries for His people. They all end, not with a period, but with a comma. Relax. One of God's unexpected detours may turn out to be the ride of your life.

Thank God for the right to make mistakes and the strength to rise above them.

If a man never lies, he won't have to worry about what he said last time.

That woman is a great woman who walks through life, head erect, whispering encouragement to the man whose dreams rest on her confidence in him.

Nobody tells the story of redemption like the man who has been redeemed.

JOURNALISM

If you have nothing to say, please don't.

Putting error into print does not make it true.

Exclamation points? Hunt them down and kill them.

What I feared most was that I would be unfair in print. Those who wield the journalistic sword must be careful where they lay the edge of the blade lest they harm the innocent while probing for truth.

There's no gentle way to say this—writing is hard work. The present may belong to you, the future to your children. But the past becomes what writers say about it.



FRIENDSHIP

While my critics keep me honest, my friends keep me interrupted.

No hurt sears deeper than when friends betray each other.

I now realize that my critics are often my best friends.

CITIZENSHIP

The Church doesn't change the nation on election day but on the Lord's day.

One of the paradoxes of Christian citizens is that we want the best, but we tolerate the worst.

FREE WILL BAPTISTS

Somehow, in 1935, our fathers found the maturity and the tolerance to put

aside personal preferences, and the foresight to recognize that the only way they could reach their goals was by sacrificially cooperating together.

The Free Will Baptist denomination owes a towering debt to a generation of gentle giants who cast long shadows across the 20th century.

That's Home Missions work—empty seats, few people, and a long, long road. Only the God-called better try it. Perhaps it's time we consider electing more stable businessmen and educators to our boards. If they're sharp enough to beat inflation Monday through Friday and dedicated enough to bow before God on Sunday, they're smart enough to serve on our national boards.

Even blind statistics will tell us that there's bound to be more untapped talent in 230,000 laymen than in 2,400 overworked pastors.

If it's in the Bible, Free Will Baptists believe it book, chapter, and verse.

The fragile flower of unity demands constant vigilance and diplomacy, especially in a denomination as diverse as ours. We cannot allow self-styled guardians, no matter how well intentioned, to force absolute conformity in areas where the denomination has not spoken and may not care to speak.

We're no longer an adolescent denomination stalking the frontier searching for our destiny. It's time we started giving God a higher return on His investment.

Free Will Baptists have driven to the one-yard line more often than any other religious group in American history. And we've fumbled so often that we resemble a quarterback with grease on his fingers.

I feel better about my denomination than the farmer who sent his wife an anniversary card with the bittersweet message: "I've never met a woman who would make a better wife than you. But I'm still looking."

THE ABANDONED TRICYCLE

She was four years old. I stood in the yard watching my daughter ride her tricycle on the sidewalk in front of our house . . . something

we never let her do unsupervised. I stepped inside to take a phone call; I was gone less than two minutes. When I returned, the tricycle sat abandoned in the driveway. My little girl was gone.

At first, I thought she had slipped into the house when I wasn't looking. I quickly checked each room and ruled out that possibility. An uneasy feeling swept over me as I returned to the front yard. My wife joined the search. Together we rushed up and down the sidewalk calling out her name, but she didn't answer.

We went house to house asking our neighbors if they had seen her. No one had. Sensing our deep concern, some of them began to help us look. My heart pounded wildly as I ran through the neighborhood. I was on the verge of panic. How could a little girl disappear into thin air?

I tried to stay calm, but fear wrapped its icy fingers around me as a frightening image flashed through my mind. Only a few weeks earlier a four-year-old girl in our community had been snatched from her front yard. Her name was Heather. She bore a striking resemblance to our daughter. Police discovered her lifeless body in an orchard on the outskirts of the city three days later. My anxiety heightened.

Adjacent to our yard was a large city park. As I stood there surveying the land-scape, something caught my eye. Several hundred yards away I saw a child playing on a swing set. I bolted for the park like a sprinter out of the starting blocks. An overwhelming sense of relief swept over me when I realized the child was my daughter.

My first impulse was to scold her. Instead, I swept her up in my arms and held her tightly while shedding tears of joy. As I carried her home I told her I loved her, and I never wanted her to wander off again.

I learned that day that nothing becomes a priority until it becomes personal. I was aware that children were abducted and harmed every day, but their plight took on a whole new meaning when my daughter was missing.

I was also reminded that concern for the lost is communicated by actions more than words. We didn't have to tell our neighbors we were worried about our daughter's disappearance. They could see it in our faces and hear it in our voices.

I still remember how it felt to embrace my little girl that day. May we never forget that God uses us to wrap His arms around a lost world . . . one person at a time.


