

astor Devon Marendi has been bringing people to Christ for 50 years and continues to do so. He has won more people to the Lord than any person I have ever known.

Devon was one of three special young men who lived with their families in a small, ordinary village by a river in North India. He had heard a little about Christianity from his older brother who lived outside the village area. Since he was curious, he invited one of his neighbors to go with him to a Catholic mission they knew of some 50 miles away to learn something more. So the two men set off on foot to learn about Jesus. They found the priest and he promised to visit their village. They waited, but the priest did not come.

After a time, Devon and his neighbor walked the 10 miles from their village to the Sonapurhat market. While visiting the market, the pair learned a foreign couple lived in a small compound there. They returned

to the market on a Sunday and met Paul Woolsey, who was serving with our Free Will Baptist mission.

The very next day Brother Woolsey went to the men's village of Junglabita. After a few months of preaching and teaching, each family member in the village accepted Christ as Savior.

Devon loved His Lord and studied hard to learn to read and to know his Bible.

Marie and I first visited Junglabita on Sunday, November 2, 1952. We found the villagers eager to learn, but none of them were literate. We camped in the village for two weeks at a time. Early in the morning we taught the villagers to read and write, and we taught the Bible. Throughout the rest of the day we would walk many miles preaching in other villages. The three young men from Junglabita, led by

Devon, walked with us. Eventually a church was established in Junglabita and Devon became the leader.

When our family returned to Sonapur for our second term we expanded our hostel for boys. Among the new boys were the two sons of Devon-Bolen and Kolen. We soon learned they had memorized many Bible verses. I inquired about this and discovered they had learned them during the time we were teaching in their village. Devon would return home in the evenings and drill the boys in the Scriptures he had learned earlier that day. He would not let them go to sleep until they had memorized the verses.

Devon loved his Lord and studied hard to learn to read and to know his Bible. He continued to farm his own land while going from village to village to witness for Christ. Soon, invitations came from more villages than he could possibly visit.

Pastor Devon has a very effective ministry among the Santal people

group. When visiting their villages he holds non-stop evangelistic services for several days at a time. Bolen tells of a trip he took with his father two or three years ago. They entered a Santal village and immediately began preaching. The services continued for four days. Devon would rest for a few hours and Bolen would be left in charge of the meeting. Villagers would come and listen until responsibilities took them away. Later they would return to learn more. At the end of the four days 72 new believers were baptized. Another 70 or so confessed salvation, but Devon discerned they did not have a full understanding of the decision made. He postponed baptism until more instruction could be given.

For the past two or three years Devon has not been able to see well enough to read. We are all constantly amazed that he knows the Scriptures so well. Although he must ask someone else to read for him while preaching, the reader must be careful to deliver the very verse requested, because Devon knows the verse he needs at that point in his message and knows exactly what it says.

Today, Devon is pastor of our Marsal (Light) FWB Church in Junglabita and is the senior pastor for our entire India work. The other pastors respect him greatly. When a disagreement or misunderstanding occurs Devon has only to say quietly, "That's

not scriptural" or "You can't do that" to resolve the matter.


At the end of the four days 72 new believers were baptized. Another 70 or so confessed salvation.

Kolen and Bolen finished high school in our hostel, entered the ministry and became Free Will Baptist pastors. Bolen, the younger, is pastor of our church in Sonapur and is responsible for some 20 other churches. He is also in charge of our hostel with 50 boys. Kolen is pastor of Sathya (Truth) FWB Church. He is responsible for about 15 churches and serves as president of our FWB Conference.

On July 3 of this year, the day I left Sonapur, Kolen brought his father to

tell me goodbye. Devon was so weak that Kolen almost lifted him step by step. Devon's request to me was, "Please pray that He will enable me to do the work He has for me." Physically, Devon is very weak and frail; but spiritually he stands as a strong example for those in India and

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ured by the great need in the Barbacena church and the chal-✓lenge to fulfill our vision, we returned to Brazil in February of 1991. We had started the work in the city some years earlier. Our vision was to establish a strong church in Barbacena and reach out to surrounding cities.

A daily radio program contributed significantly to the church-planting process. House to house visitation, tract distribution, evangelistic home Bible studies and contacts with family and friends of new converts also were effective methods of evangelism.

The attendance neared 100 by 1982 when we left the field to teach missions at Free Will Baptist Bible College. For four years prior to our return to Barbacena, the congregation suffered the lack of a pastor or a resident missionary. The attendance plummeted to about 25. We returned with high expectations—church growth and the fulfillment of our previous outreach vision.

In 1994 we targeted Antonio Carlos, a city of 10,000 people just 10 miles away. Despite being a very difficult place to work we were able to gather a congregation and dedicated a new church building in November 1998. It is yet a mission church but

local people are involved as teachers and superintendent in the Sunday school. José Carlos Mayrink and his wife, Elza, help there and we anticipate having someone to lead the work in the near future.

Our vision was to establish a strong church in Barbacena and reach out to surrounding cities.

The church in Barbacena grew to its former strength and God began to answer our prayers for laborers. Flávio Grossi, a 16-year-old young man, came to our church. Though he had previous contact with the gospel, he was confused and without certainty of his salvation. Personal counseling and orientation helped him gain that certainty along with great excitement about our church and the Lord's work.

Flávio later announced a call to preach and asked to be trained. No Bible college was nearby, so we began Bible classes. For three consecutive vears, retired missionary Ken Eagleton came from the States to teach classes for about two months and begin our Bible institute and college. Due to the limited number of congregations, enrollment has always been small. At the beginning of 2004 we had 25 students from five different

congregations. Missionaries David and Annette Aycock and Sue and I do most of the teaching and most classes are held at night.

After being ordained and working as my assistant, Flávio assumed the pastorate of the Barbacena church in January of 2001. He and his fiancée, Sheila, plan to be married in January 2005. He is a dedicated soulwinner and a very good preacher. Alongside the ministry in Barbacena they maintain a preaching point in Campolide, a settlement about 10 miles from the city.

Other young men announced the call to preach during these years and became a part of the Bible college student body. Among these were Mário Lúcio Neves and Ricardo Trindade Costa from the Barbacena church and Daniel Gouvea from Lafaiete.

Lafaiete had one Free Will Baptist church but the need and opportunity for a second church arose. I became the overseer of this mission work and preached twice monthly. Daniel Gouvea and his wife, Fabiana, study in the Barbacena Bible college Tuesday through Friday and work in Lafaiete on weekends. Daniel expects to graduate in June of 2005 and be involved full time in the work.

Wilson de Matos, a lay preacher in the Lafaiete congregation, leads the Wednesday night Bible study and prayer service. He and his wife, Kelly, have taken several Bible college classes. Very soon, a new church building should be finished.

The work in Carandai, a city of 30,000 people about 20 miles north of Barbacena, was started in 2001. A new church building was dedicated in September of that year. Sue and I worked there with the help of Mário Lúcio, who was then a Bible college student. David Aycock assumed leadership of that work in February of 2002. Mário continued to help until he returned to Barbacena as assistant to Flávio.

Ricardo Costa started working with David in Carandaí in March of the following year. He and his wife, Edneia, have moved to the city. He has taught a number of students in evangelistic home Bible studies. Ricardo hopes to graduate from the Bible college in June of next year.

Sue and I, with the cooperation of the First church, started a new mission church in 2002 in Nova Cidade, a residential area of Barbacena. Construction of the church building was completed and dedicated in December of that year. In February 2004, David and Annette assumed leadership of the work. José Antonio Coimbra and his wife, Flávia, attend the congregation. Both are graduates of a local teacher's college and are studying in the Bible college. José Antonio has a desire to work both in and outside the church in visitation and evangelism. He also feels the Lord has called him to preach.

Although most of the preachers are young and have limited experience in the role of leadership, they are excited about learning and ministering. We

have high expectations for them, but they need prayer for spiritual growth and fruitfulness.

Planting and growing churches is not easy. Various sources estimate Brazil is 70 to 80 percent Roman Catholic with strong spiritist activity. Many who fly the Catholic flag are spiritist also. Much prayer and hard work are essential to success.

We formulated an evangelistic home Bible study based on the gospel of John. Now the converts themselves lead this study proficiently. It has become the most utilized method of evangelism in our area. Our experience has proven that people with problems are more receptive to gospel witness.

Jesus said, "I will build my church...." For everything accomplished here we praise Him. All the glory and honor belongs to Him.

But we are not finished! "The fields are white unto harvest." Other cities in our area are on our hearts but we lack laborers. We trust the Lord will continue to call Brazilians, but we also need missionaries to train Brazilian leaders and help start more churches. The task has only begun. The challenge is great!

Bobby Aycock and his wife, Sue, have served in Brazil since 1960 except for six years when Bobby taught missions at Free Will Baptist Bible College.

just returned from Panama and a life-changing experience," declared Steve Riggs a few days after the fourth gathering of the International Fellowship of Free Will Baptist Churches. "Among other things," the missionary to France continued, "the meeting reminded me of what we are about—building Christ's church of people from all nations, tongues and tribes."

Twelve countries were represented during the October 4-8 meeting in Panama City. Brazil, Canada, Côte d'Ivoire, Cuba, France, Japan, Mexico, Panama, Spain, the United States and Uruguay sent delegates and/or observers. Russia sent a visitor, Pastor Nikolay Maslyakov.

On Sunday, October 3, IFFWBC attendees were divided into small groups and assigned to visit one of the nine Panamanian FWB churches. God used brothers from Canada, Spain,

France, Mexico, and many other countries to challenge Panamanian Christians.

Messages, reports, music, prayer and fellowship times encouraged delegates during the week. Spanish pastor José Manuel Parrón summarized the event: "We enjoyed learning how the Lord is working in the hearts of so many people in many different parts of the world."

I was truly blessed to see my first Japanese convert and his wife still active in church and living for the Lord!

oarding a plane early on the morning of September 13 of this year triggered memories of April 9, 1956. As my wife and I joyfully set out for the 50th anniversary celebration of Free Will Baptist ministry in Japan, I recalled our family boarding the USS President Wilson for 14 days at sea and the beginning of my missionary adventure.

Wesley and Aileen Calvery, our only Free Will Baptist missionaries in Japan at that time, greeted us when we docked. They had arrived a scant 15 months earlier.

Following two years of Japanese language study, our family moved to the town of Bihoro in eastern Hokkaido. That was April of 1958 and I prayed the Lord would give me a male Christian friend.

In August of that year we held a tent meeting for five nights in the small town of Tsubetsu. On the second evening Noboru Hanzawa attended the meeting. He continued to come the rest of the week.

Noboru was saved in December of 1959 and was our first convert.

I rented a meeting room in Tsubetsu and held services twice a week. Noboru attended faithfully. He was saved in December of 1959 and was our first convert. The following summer he was baptized in a lake during a summer camp for our four fledgling works—Abashiri, Bihoro, Koshimizu and Tsubetsu.

friends. The Lord had answered my prayer with a Christian friend near my own age. He liked American food and visited quite often in our Bihoro home, frequently arriving by motorcycle.

One day I noticed something was bothering my friend. He related that his mother, who lived on the main island, wanted to arrange a wedding for him. As we talked and prayed he realized he should marry a Christian. Since arranged marriages are a normal Japanese custom, he asked me to find him a wife.

Noboru's job took him to many farms. One particular farmer's daughter caught his attention and he brought her to the Tsubetsu services. Kiyoko accepted the Lord as her Savior and I had the privilege of baptizing her in the Abashiri church.

Several months later I performed their wedding in the Tsubetsu church. Kiyoko wore a traditional Japanese wedding dress and hairdo for the ceremony. My son Samuel was seated on the front row near his mother who was playing the pump organ. Samuel began crying when Kiyoko entered because he didn't recognize her with

to Lake Akan, a well-known tourist attraction. A few miles down the road a big truck stopped and the driver offered us a ride because only "crazy people" walked on those roads. Although we thought he'd probably sized us up accurately, we accepted the ride and greatly enjoyed it.

On another occasion we decided to visit Lake Akan in the middle of winter. The lake was frozen and snow piled high around us. We determined to make this trip on motorcycle. I

imagine we were quite a sight. Little Noboru driving with football-playersized Fred holding on for dear life!

Noboru and Kiyoko were not always as faithful to attend church services as they should have been. He developed a constant ringing in his ear during that time. He told me later the ringing was the Lord's way of reminding him to stay true to Him and always attend church faithfully.

Through the years we have stayed in contact with one another. We've

shared triumphs and trials. I've prayed for Noboru and Kiyoko when she was ill and near death. We have enjoyed good fellowship.

Imagine the joy I felt at seeing Noboru again when I visited the Bihoro church prior to the special 50th meeting. The encounter and fellowship with this brother and sister in Christ was the highlight of my trip.

He related some of our experiences together, and was a little emotional as he finished. I must admit I was a little teary-eved myself-tears of joy and thanksgiving.

Kohns Resign from Appointment to France

St. Nazaire Hosts Doulos O.M. Ship, Book Ministry

The St. Nazaire Free Will Baptist Church in France hosted the Operation Mobilization ship, Doulos, which docked in St. Nazaire on September 3. Reports indicated the ship had over 13,000 visitors on board during its 20 days in port. Many were touched by the testimonies and lives of the 300 people from 40 different nationalities living on the ship.

Some of the people from town heard a message of hope through songs and mimes of the crew. Others visited the ship's bookstore where they bought 138 Bibles, 1,695 educational books and 2,308 Christian books.

Several conferences were held

on board the ship including a special women's conference and a regional pastor's conference. On September 18, the last weekend the ship was in port, 650 people attended a special international night in a public auditorium.

Twelve members of the St. Nazaire church, along with members from the Nantes and St. Sebastien churches, joined the ship's crew during the two weeks the Doulos was in port. Missionaries Jerry Gibbs, Steve Riggs and Dennis Teague, along with St. Nazaire church member Michel Baconnais, served as advisory team leaders for the ship's line-up team.

Missionaries Robert and Judy Bryan, who arrived in France just after the Doulos docked, served as translators and were on board almost every day until the ship departed. "Many heard the gospel through programs on board or personal conversation with crew members," says Robert.

Steve Riggs of Nantes indicated Cécile, a young girl from the Nantes church, will be serving aboard the Doulos for two years. The ship ministers in ports all around the world.

HeartBeat Ceases as Periodical Publication

This issue of *HeartBeat* will conclude publication of the bimonthly magazine. Delegates at the National Association of Free Will Baptists voted in July to discontinue departmental publications in favor of one joint publication. The new magazine is slated for production in April 2005.

Forty-three years of Free Will Baptist International Missions history has been recorded in the pages of *HeartBeat*. A 24-page commemorative issue of *HeartBeat* is currently in process. All those on the current *HeartBeat* mailing list can expect to receive the special issue in February.

The International Missions staff has committed to keep readers informed through the new publication, missionary newsletters, *IMpulse* video magazine, the Web site (www.fwbgo.com), and various other means. The Mission and editorial staff wish to express thanks to constituents for their support over the last 43 years.

Cuban Churches Have Hurricane Damage

According to Pastor Reniel of Havana, Cuba, September's Hurricane Ivan wrought some damage in the western part of Pinar del Rio, but it was less than they had feared. "Our great God had mercy on his people in Cuba," says Reniel.

Among areas hit was the church in Martinas. Although it was still standing, the church has been declared uninhabitable. Some roofs were carried off in the area of the La Fe church and other damage was evident.

Christians have been urged to pray for the emotional stability of Cuban Free Will Baptists as well as for opportunites for the churches to be powerful witnesses of God's grace.




The plate had broken into pieces and left Carlisle in severe pain.
