Prayer-an Imperative

TREAT AND GOOD men have always realized the need and the blessing of prayer. Jacob, David, Peter, Paul, and John knew the value of prayer.

The great men of the reformation such as Calvin, Luther, Knox and Swingli were men of prayer.

Great missionaries such as Carey, Livington, and Judson relied much on prayer for spiritual victories.

MISSIONARIES NEED OUR PRAYERS

Among those who stand most in need of our prayers are our missionaries.

Paul, the greatest missionary of all time, save the Lord Jesus Christ, often requested prayer for himself:

II THESSALONIANS 3:1,2: "Finally, brethren, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified . . . And that we may be delivered from unreasonable and wicked men."

EPHESIANS 6:18,19: "Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit . . . And for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel."

Colossians 4:2,4: "Continue in prayer . . . Withal praying also for us, that God would open unto us a door of utterance, to speak the mystery of Christ . . . That I might make it manifest, as I ought to speak."

What a striking example Paul thus gives in regard to the need of prayer on behalf of every missionary. His extraordinary spiritual gifts and intellectual abilities did not exempt him from the need of prayer.

I am certain that each Free Will Baptist missionary, both home and foreign, would say with Paul and with you and me, "Brethren, pray for us."

An analysis of the Scriptures that are quoted above reveals several specific reasons for prayer that are very apt for our consideration when we pray for missionaries today.

SUGGESTIONS FOR PRAYER

I wish to submit some suggestions on how to pray for missionaries. Pray that the missionaries:

(1) Will give sufficient time to prayer and Bible

study.

(2) Will have strength, wisdom and guidance in rearing their children.

(3) Will be blessed with good health.

(4) Will appropriate grace to overcome loneliness, disappointments, misunderstandings that may arise among fellow-missionaries, and every temptation.

(5) Will live an exemplary life before those to whom they minister.

Work Progresses in Cuba

MIAMI, FLA.—The Rev. Tom Willey, Jr., is back in the states following a recent return to Cuba limited by the United States state department to 28 days.

Mr. Willey's word regarding the present state of Free Will Baptist work in Cuba is "progress." He cited growth in congregations in several island churches along with the completion of several buildings.

"What a thrill it was to see the number of new faces in the churches' there. Most outstanding of these was the church in Pinar del Rio. People whom we had known for years, had done business with, and yet had never reached were now in the church."

The radio is being used very effectively in evangelism, the missionary added. Provincial network time is being acquired reasonably, and a room at the mission is being used as a studio. Using a different pastor each month and a quartet from the Pinar del Rio church, programs are broadcast each Sunday.

It all began that first day when we went to register. As we entered the doors we were greeted with a sign which translated proved to read: "Speak only French while in this house." I wondered how far I would get with my knowledge of "oui" as an answer in the affirmative. And how does one cor-

rectly reply in the negative?

Following a crowd upstairs, we formed a line to receive entrance examinations. Non-chalantly, I accepted my test and proceeded to a table to complete it. Not many minutes later I humbly returned to the desk with a completely unsoiled sheet. A blank, helpless stare to the kind registrar's questions promptly placed me in the kindergarten class (or was it the nursery class?).

"I'm ahead of Mama. I'm in the first grade!" our seven year old son boasted who had just enrolled in the French Public School.

Dumb Missionary Wife

in Language School

So classes began. I learned later that my teacher spoke English, but you would never have guessed it the way she flung those French words at you who were accustomed only to English. "Mme Miley, voyez-vouz avec votre nez?" she asked after a week or two of school. After two or three repetitions, I finally realized she wanted to know if I saw with my nose! "No!" I finally replied. "Non," she quickly corrected, for I had not nasalized it. After spending all these many years trying not to speak through my nose, now to be told that I must do it to be correct!

But the day came. Yes, it finally did, when right off, first thing, I understood most of the questions asked. Figuring out a reply was quite another thing, like the time I had the children asking the breakfast for some-

thing. But thank the Lord for a patient teacher who gently corrects without embarrassment.

Sometimes I think if there were nothing to do except learn French, I would get along fine. But there is always cleaning, ironing, cooking, marketing, correspondence. Often after several hours of difficult, not too successful study, I will go into the kitchen and bake a chocolate cake or apple pie just to prove to myself that I can still do something well.

Reading and writing the language is not too difficult, but, oh, the speaking. And of little matter is it to the laundry man that I can conjugate numerous verbs into the various tenses or that often my daily exercises are without error—he merely wants a simple answer as to whether or not I want our laundry delivered.

A CHILD AGREES

There is a four-year old girl on the second floor who will also agree that that woman upstairs is a dumb one. Once when I was sweeping the steps she stood and watched me for several minutes. Bending down and looking at me so sweetly, she asked me something. A big grown woman unable to understand a tiny child! To this day she hasn't said another word to the American lady who can't speak right.

And don't think Satan doesn't take advantage of every opportunity, even in language school. "Why don't you just let your husband do all the learning?" he says. "You stay home. You won't need French to darn socks or serve a cup of tea. Look at so-and-so. She served in the Camerouns for three years without a knowledge of French."

But I catch a vision once again of a place of service in a remote corner of the Ivory Coast. Many lonely individuals who need to be transformed by the saving grace of our Saviour. And how will I be able to successfully impart this love to them without the communicating bond of language?

So taking a deep breath and feeling the impact of the prayers of my loved ones back home, I enter a store (with my hands in my pocket to avoid the temptation to point) and confidently begin, "Donnez-moi . . ." Perhaps I won't always be a dumb missionary wife, after all.

Called to Life of Faith

Volena Wilson yielded to the will of God for her life, and it resulted in her being sent to South India

HE EVANGELIST stood at the front with arms reaching toward the congregation. His invitation to the crowd of young people in attendance was a simple one: "Come, dedicating your lives to go wherever the Lord leads.'

A young business college student sitting midway the auditorium could resist the inner urging of the Holy Spirit no longer. She moved past those sitting in the row with her and walked down the aisle to make public her decision to follow the Lord "to the regions beyond."

With this major step taken, Miss Volena Wilson began a life of faith in which she was to see God's miraculous provision for her preparation for missionary service and His leading her to distant India.

"When I was approached by our board about India, I kept thinking how far away India was," Miss Wilson recalls. "I wished that the Lord would choose a place nearer home for me. However, I promised the board that if the Lord would give me a clear leading that India was where He wanted me, I was willing to go."

Her deep dedication to the will of the Lord made Miss Wilson's heart receptive to His leading, and in 1951 she sailed to India with Miss Laura B. Barnard, returning from a furlough in the states.

It was my particular assignment to go with our Bible woman from village to village and from house to house to witness," comments the missionary concerning her work in South India during her early days on the field. "I conducted Sunday schools in villages, was in charge of our elementary school, and taught one Bible lesson a week in the school as well as taking care of correspondence and bookkeeping for the Present Address: "Westfield," Kotagiri, South India.

school and our Free Will Baptist church. In addition, I planned a Bible lesson daily for the Indian teachers."

Years pass rapidly on the foreign field. It wasn't long until furlough time. Then upon return to South India for her second term, Miss Wilson assumed general direction of the work there.

Today, Miss Wilson lives in Kotagiri, Nilgiris, reaching from there into surrounding villages with the faithful presentation of the Gospel.

A new day has dawned in the work in South India. "I wish I had time to recount all of God's blessings here," writes Miss Wilson in a March letter.

She recounts numerous conversions. God's blessing was very evident, she remarks, in a recent youth camp.

A woman from the Kotagiri church visiting friends in a nearby village began telling them about what the Lord had done for her. The conversation turned into a village meeting lasting until midnight, and 15 made decisions for Christ.

Other miraculous conversions are being witnessed as God is faithful to the faithful in answering prayer. Yet, there is still much to be done. Pray for Miss Wilson continuing her ministry as the only Free Will Baptist missionary in South India.
