

From the General Director

REE-WAY

THE BEGINNING OF THE NEW YEAR it will be profitable for each of us to look in three directions.

LOOK BACK

Rejoice and be glad that God has blessed in so many ways during the past year. Free Will Baptists should be especially grateful for the four new missionary families that were sent out in 1960. (See page seven.) The Calverys returned to Japan for a second term.

Reports of great spiritual victories have come from each of our mission fields. Here in the homeland there is abundant evidence that God is working in and through Free Will Baptists. With the psalmist we can say, "The Lord hath done great things for us; whereof we are glad."

But the retrospective look also reveals many causes for lamentation and penitence. Christians should be made to weep over lost opportunities which are now behind closed doors. Millions of souls went into eternity last year without a knowledge of the holiness of God which is obtained only by faith in Christ.

Many doors around the world were closed last year to Christian missions. Each of us should ask himself, "To what extent am I responsible for this failure to give to those in heathen darkness the Light of Salvation?" An honest answer to this question will call for repentance and a determination either to enter or help others enter the doors that are yet open to missionary endeavor.

LOOK ABROAD

The world's spiritual need is staggering. This truth is seen in facts published in 1960 by the IFMA.

There are 2,896,686,000 people in the world. World population increases (over death rate) by 125,000 a day! More than half the people in the world have never

heard the Gospel or do not know the Way of Salvation. Missionary personnel is shrinking at the rate of 25% every decade, due to the small number of volunteers in comparison with the upsurge in world population.

Something like two million people are reached with the Gospel each year—only about one in 22 of the world's population increase.

LOOK AHEAD

The Challenge is great. The call of the unsaved upon us is urgent because their eternal destiny is at stake. Time is running out. This is the opinion of spiritual leaders in general. For example, Billy Graham thinks the world is now witnessing the "shuffling on stage for the last great drama of history."

I trust that among Free Will Baptists there is a determination to press on together and seek by faith, prayer, giving, and every other means to accomplish great things this year toward world evangelization.

The Lonnie Palmer family plans to leave for Switzerland as soon as their visas can be obtained. They will study the French language before going to Africa.

Cuban Crisis Creates 'No Retreat' Situation

Senior Cuban missionary cites unprecedented spiritual hunger; tells of being employed to reach Cubans through today's turmoil.

NINETY MILES off the Florida coast lies the hotbed of the Caribbean. It is the Republic of Cuba where a recently plauded "new day" for Evangelicals has turned into a dark night.

Some mission groups view the present situation as hopeless, a Communist stronghold from which they must retreat. Others are of the opinion that there is no need for alarm, that it is the same revolutionary troubles with which Latin America has been plagued for decades.

Somewhere between these two views, Free Will Baptists continue their message of "Christ is the Answer" for the Cuban people.

CHRISTIANITY CAN THRIVE

While there is little question that the government of Cuba is under the influence of the Communist bloc, Free Will Baptist missionaries are far from believing it is compulsory to retreat. There is the general feeling that Christianity is a power that can exist under any governmental setup as God actively continues the propagation of His great plan of redemption.

"There is a spiritual hunger, a searching for an answer which cannot be found in the confusion such as has never been seen or felt in Cuba before," remarks senior Cuban missionary Tom Willey, Sr. "We are lifting our voices and saying that 'Christ is the answer.' How well we can make ourselves heard depends on your (the denomination's) prayers and interest."

Several means are being employed to continue the Free Will Baptist ministry to Cuba in addition to the ministry of national churches with their national pastors.

RADIO EFFECTIVE

One of these is radio. "We are taking the radio as the most effective means just now to reach the masses of Cuban people. Each pastor is making a number of tapes, at least four messages on 'Christ is the Answer.' Up to this moment there has been no restraint placed upon our liberty to preach the Gospel, and none of our workers dare to endanger this precious opportunity by expressing his political views."

Mr. Willey hopes to extend the radio message to cover all sections of the island. This will necessitate at least three stations—Pinar del Rio, Havana, Matanzas, and possibly Oriente.

MOST PENETRATING WEAPON

Perhaps the most penetrating weapon available is that of literature. "Cuban people are reading more today than ever before, and there is little to read outside the communistic and government pamphlets, books, and newspapers. We must give them in Spanish the message that "Christ is the way, the truth, and the life."

This pressing need for literature for Cuban distribution is again an area which is dependent on the vision and concern of people in the hameland.

"Most of the American missionaries have left Cuba," continued Mr. Willey, "and we feel at the present this is unfortunate for their church as many of them are poorly manned and the nationals do not want them to leave."

Atlatest reports, Tom Willey, Jr., is planning to return to the island to continue his ministry there, expressing the conviction that he should not leave during this hour of crisis.

The appeal for prayer for Cuba is urgent. The future of Cuba is strategic not only for Cuba alone, but for all Latin America.

ship's load was less than capacity, the Mileys were granted first class accommodations on tourist rates.




Dr. Miley's testimony recently received from Antony (Seine) France. "We have a nice apartment-three rooms and bath-over an Evangelical Baptist Church."

She sailed to India in 1935 signalling a New Era of Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions

TTOOK A YOUNG LADY from Georgia to awaken a sleeping Free Will Baptist denomination and to snatch it from its perch of complacency into the reality of God's plan of redemption for "all the world."

The year was 1935, the same year that the Eastern and Western Conferences merged into what is now the National Association of Free Will Baptists. Missionary vision was at a low ebb. Yet, God was working in the hearts of many leading them to the realization that multitudes were lost without Christ and that Free Will Baptists had a responsibility to take the message of salvation to those who had never heard.

God was also working in the heart of a young, well educated woman. He led her to challenge the denomination to send her to the land of India, thus reviving a lost missionary program. Undoubtedly many received her enthusiasm with skeptical reluctance, but God had prepared enough hearts to receive her message and send her as the Free Will Baptist representative to India.

The woman's name was Laura Belle Barnard. Everyone knows her today as the senior missionary to India, a Free Will Baptist missionary pioneer.

From a human level, it was a lonely journey for Miss Barnard as she left the shores of her homeland to venture by faith into the "uttermost part" where God had commanded her to go. However, she went unflinchingly into the battle confident of God's presence with her and of the fact that He was doing a new thing for Free Will Baptists.

There are Free Will Baptists in India today because a young lady from Georgia felt it more important to be about her Father's business than to care for her own ambitions. There are Free Will Baptists in

Cuba, Japan, Africa, and Brazil today because someone spurred this denomination to be about the Father's business, that of publishing "glad tidings of great joy which shall be to all people."

After more than 20 years in the land of India, Miss Barnard is now continuing to propagate her burden for all the world as head of the missions department of the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee. Left behind in India today stands a Christian Day School, Free Will Baptist churches, and scores of Indians who would never have heard the Gospel had Free Will Baptist not rallied behind their lady from Georgia.

In addition to these contributions to Free Will Baptist missions, Miss Barnard is author of *His Name Among All Nations*, a book of missionary apologetics and history.

The lady from Georgia has a permanent place in Free Will Baptist missions as a radiant example of what God can accomlish in and through a yielded and dedicated instrument.

Free Will Baptists Make Mission History

AN UNPRECENTED NUMBER of missionaries are now on foreign fields under assignment by the Foreign Mission Board of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

A record number of missionaries were sent out during the last five weeks of 1960 as four couples and their families left the homeland for language study before moving to their permanent assignments. This is the first phase of an expansion of the denomination's missionary force by 50 per cent.

The first Free Will Baptist medical missionary sailed the last of November in the person of Dr. LaVerne D. Miley. He and his family are now in Paris for language study (see article page four). They will serve in the Bondoukou Circle, Ivory Coast, Africa.

The Bobby Pooles and Bobby Aycocks left by plane December 14 from Miami enroute to Campinas, Brazil, for language study prior to permanent duty there.

On December 27 the John Moehlmans flew to Costa Rica for language study before permanent assignment in Latin America.
