

GLAD TIDINGS OF RESURRECTION

AND WE DECLARE unto you glad tidings" (Acts 13:32a). In this verse Paul was referring to the fact that God had raised Jesus from the dead.

The story of Jesus Christ is filled with glad tidings. Isaiah said concerning the one who publishes salvation, "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings!" The message of the angel to the shepherds was, "I bring you good tidings of great joy." Luke said of Christ, "He went preaching and showing the glad tidings of the Kingdom of God."

But the glorious news of Christ's birth and wonderful life would have lost its significance had God failed to raise him from the grave.

How meaningful, then, are the words of I Cor. 15:20, "But now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first fruits of them that slept!"

The fact that Christ is alive is news that the entire world needs to hear. This is clearly illustrated in the story of a missionary who stated that on one occasion a number of persons who were hearing him showed great astonishment when he told them that the God he worshipped and wished them to worship is a *living* God. They said, "The foreigner's God is better than ours; ours has no life."

WORSHIPPING LIFELESS GODS

In Psalm 135:15-17 we have a graphic description of the gods of the heathen. "The idols of the heathen are silver and gold, the work of men's hands. They have mouths, but they speak not; eyes have they, but they see not; They have ears, but they hear not; neither is there any breath in their mouths."

It is tragically true that millions of people worship lifeless gods made of wood, gold and silver, and it is equally true that many people worship men who have lived and died and remain dead to this day—men whose tombs hold only the dust and ashes of their decayed bodies. There was no glorious resurrection for Mohammed, Confucius or Buddha; they died and are dead. But the tomb could not hold the body of the Christ of Calvary. He is risen and is alive forevermore!

READERS HAVE responded enthusiatically to the first issues of **Heartbeat** for which your mission staff is grateful.


A major suggestion for improvement has been made, however. It is to increase the number of pages and thus present more news and articles of missionary interest.

NEW YORK—The Lonnie Palmer family sailed from here on March 4 aboard the S.S. Queen Mary en route to Switzerland for language preparation before duty in the Ivory Coast, Africa.

Lonnie, Bernice, and children Kathleen, seven, and Marion, four, arrived in Paris March 9 for a short visit with the LaVerne Mileys in language study there. They traveled from Paris to Lausanne, Switzerland, where they are enrolled in the Institute Emmaus to study French, the trade language of the Ivory Coast.

Mr. Palmer is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College having studied in the General College of Akron (Ohio) University. Mrs. Palmer studied at Free Will Baptist Bible College in addition to training in practical nursing.

The Palmers are natives of Arkansas, Lonnie born at Pheiffer on March 9, 1932, Bernice at Cave City on January 4, 1935.

Mail to the Palmers should be addressed to them at Institute Emmaus, Vennes s. Lausanne, Switzerland. Air mail postage is 15 cents for one half ounce.

Following completion of their nine-month language course, the Palmers will join missionaries on the Bondoukou Circle in the Ivory Coast, Africa. Serving there now are the Bill Joneses, the Dan Merkhs, and the Lonnie Sparkses. Easter, 1961!

ANNIVERSARY SESSION PROGRAM


In connection with this phase of the program a special emphasis is being given to prayer for missionaries. During the months of March and April it is being requested that April is Foreign Missions Month as Free Will Baptists emphasize their obligation to carry the Gospel into all the world

a portion of each prayer meeting be given to definite prayer for Free Will Baptist missionaries.

A further suggestion is that the entire regular week-night prayer meeting preceding Easter Foreign Missions Sunday be designated as a special missionary prayer hour.

The singing of missionary hymns such as "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," "Rescue the Perishing," "The Light of the World," "We've a Story to Tell," and "The King's Business" would be appropriate. Available letters from the field could be shared with the congregation. Prayer requests found on page eight of this issue could be used in a time of specific prayer for the needs of individual missionaries. Perhaps prayer periods for each country in which Free Will Baptists have a ministry could be arranged.

Prayer is requested also for the home staff as they serve in behalf of those on the field. General Director Rolla D. Smith is currently engaged in a series of missionary conferences

in addition to his duties of directing the growing Free Will Baptist missionary program.

Mission board members need prayer for their missionary conference work. Special prayer is requested for the annual foreign mission board meeting to be held April 18-21.

Remember the need for additional funds with which to enlarge the department's missions literature program. Prayer is requested for the Rev. Jerry Ballard and his duties as promotion secretary in charge of missions literature.

Cuban nationals are carrying on the work in Cuba as the Tom Willeys, Jr. and Sr., have been forced to return to the States by the political situation there.

The Daniel Cronks, Carlisle Hannas, and Miss Volena Wilson represent Free Will Baptists in India.

In Japan there are the Wesley Calverys, Fred Herseys and Herbert Waids.

The John Moehlmans are studying language in Costa Rica. The Bill Fulchers and Paul Robinsons are doing itinerate work prior to language study in preparation for duty in Uruquay.

Mario Cignoni is the national missionary representing Free Will Baptists in Spain.

It is through these men and women that local Free Will Baptist churches in America reach *into all the world*.



The Daniel Cronks give themselves to a ministry of evangelism and education in backward India

SINGH GILL was the man's name. He stood with arms folded as his construction crew made rapid progress on the brick structure he had contracted in the North Indian town of Kishanganj.

To a passing businessman Gill would have appeared as a sharp, young contractor in deep concentration as he watched the men work on his latest project. But to a young missionary who had just arrived in this land so far away from the familiar scenes of home he was a man for whom Christ died, a man standing with arms folded, waiting for someone to bring to him the message of new life in the Lord Jesus.

The immediate contact with a national is among the most important and problematical steps in the missionary's personal witness. Yet, the meeting was accomplished; Dan Cronk had made his first fruitful contact. Singh Gill became a friend, then a partner for tea, and soon a brother in Christ as he received the Gospel and was delivered from the bondage of sin. Daniel Cronk had his first convert.

Twelve years have passed now. Others have been won, and Dan and Trula Cronk have found numerous avenues of ministry to the thousands of Bengali and Hindi speaking peoples of the Bengal and Bihor Provinces. Frequently they make camping trips to villages in the area making contacts, preaching, and gathering converts into fellowships.

The Cronks minister also to the Santals, an old aboriginal tribe now dedicated Moslems. Recent reports say that the Santals are showing a keen interest in the Gospel, and the Cronks are now praying for Santali workers to minister to their own people. Early in their ministry in North India the Cronks made contacts with several teenage boys, taking them into their care in a boy's boarding home. Today these boys have become strong national Christians.

Perhaps the most far reaching ministry the Cronks have is that of teaching. They arrange a two-week institute two or three times a year. Here they train national workers to carry the Gospel to their own.

The Cronks have developed an annual conference for Indian Christians. The most recent one was held March 1-3. More than 200 Indian believers assembled for fellowship and Bible study.

Missionaries in India are not without their problems. There is amoebic discentary, a tropical disease that saps ones vitality, a common agitation to the foreign minister. There is the volcanic atmosphere of political and social molting. For these matters, the Cronks need continual prayer support.
