From the General Director

COMMUNISM and YOU

HE AVERAGE AMERICAN has for several years been to some degree aware of the threat of Communism to our way of life. This realization has been greatly intensified in recent weeks by developments on the Island of Cuba-only 90 miles from Florida.

Dr. Fred Schwartz of Sydney, Australia, an outstanding Christian authority on Communism, said in a recent address, "Today a danger threatens-a danger so vast that it transcends anything else of human experience... The Communists are conquering the world. Not that they could conquer it; not that they might conquer it; they are conquering it. Winning the battle against Communism is fundamental to the survival of every free enterprise."

Dr. Schwartz said further, "The figures of Com-

munist advance are so terrifying that most of us simply do not have the honesty to acknowledge them.

"In 1903, Lenin established Bolshevism with 17 supporters; in 1917, Lenin conquered Russia with 40,000 supporters; in 1960, the party of Lenin is in iron control of 1,000,000,000."

According to these statistics, the Communists have conquered more than one third of the world's population in one generation. Nearly 2,000 years have passed since Jesus commanded that the gospel be preached in all the world. Yet, less than one half of the people who are now living on this earth have intelligently heard the Gospel.

RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHURCH

A comparison of Communism's rapid advance with the church's slowness in reaching the world with the gospel should cause every Christian to ask himself, To what extent am I responsible for the failure of the church to evangelize the world?"

Again I quote Dr. Schwartz: "We are confronted by one of the greatest paradoxes of history. We profess ourselves to be a spiritual and idealistic people. The Communists profess themselves to be utterly materialistic. They say, 'Matter in motion is the sum total of all being. Material environment determines thought processes, emotions, and ideas.' In applying these beliefs, the Communists are conquering the world with ideas while we try to combat them with the material."

The Communists are majoring on exploiting the minds and hearts of student intellectuals. The task of the church is to reach the minds and hearts of men everywhere-especially the youth-with the knowledge of Truth.

The world situation is alarming in the extreme and calls for immediate action on the part of every Christian.

It is impossible at this time to tell when the Willeys will be able to return to the island. In the meantime, they are working among Cuban refugees in Miami.


Herseys Home on Furlough

Testimony of Israel Biork, Brazil, as told by Missionary Dave Franks

ISRAEL CARLOS BIORK was born in the interior of Brazil September 3, 1937, and came to Campinas with his mother, brother, and four sisters following his father's death in 1951. Without any professional training he began working in a bakery to help support the family.

But Israel did not have peace and satisfaction in his life. He looked to the things of the world and still was not happy. He read everything he could get his hands on but still could not find what he was looking for, until one day he began reading the Bible. There he found the reason for being so unhappy. After eight months of reading the Scriptures he was converted and became a member of our church in Campinas on February 16, 1958.

Israel soon began to preach with a group from our church in homes and street meetings. With a great desire to preach, he almost left to work with a missionary in the interior but realized that he needed training.

At that time we did not have a Bible

school, so our mission agreed to support him in a Bible institute in Londrina, Parana. He studied there for a year and a half before we were able to start our own institute. Since then he has been studying with us and is our most promising student.

Israel was a disciple in school. While studying in Londrina he led a girl to the Lord who is now studying in that institution for Christian service. He was a disciple in our church. Through his influence a man was converted who later became one of our deacons. He was a disciple in his home. In January he won his brother to Christ, and his brother wants to prepare to be a disciple just like Israel. These are but three examples among several of people whom he has won to the Lord.

Israel has the ambition to become a teacher in our Bible institute and be a faithful preacher of the Word.

It is one of our jobs as missionaries to train such young men as Israel and ground them in the Christian faith and doctrine. "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations." (Matthew 28:19, American Standard Version)

HE'S A PLODDER!

William Carey, father of modern missions, believed this to be the greatest single compliment a missionary could be accorded.

To a few missionaries can this description be applied—one who day in and day out continues with singleness of heart in dedication to win the unwinsome despite hardship and heartbreak. Yet, the Carlisle Hannas have proven themselves worthy, in this sense, to be called "plodders."

Carlisle Hanna is the spiritual son of his missionary co-laborer in North India, Dan Cronk. After Carlisle was converted, Dan encouraged him to read books on missions. In 1948 young Carlisle yielded to God's will for his life, and God gave him a burden for the people of India.

Marie Hanna had already yielded her life to the service of Christ in India. During their training at Free Will Baptist Bible College Marie and Carlisle married and applied for service in India together.

The Hannas sailed for the land of India in October, 1952, with their infant daughter Sheila Marie. They joined the Cronks in North India.

As if the hardship of a foreign country so radically different from their own was not enough, heartbreak came in 1953 with the death of Sheila Marie on March 17. God was continuing to refine His servants for the ministry of patience and understanding which has endeared the Hannas to Indian villagers enabling the missionary couple to win many of them to Christ.

The Hannas live in Sonapurhat near West Bengal. It is a typical rural Indian village out in the district a good distance from towns of any size. Yet, Sonapurhat is

a hub of activity and has become the hub of spiritual activity in the area.

It is a Bible conference center to where hundreds of Indian Christians come annually for instruction in the Word and in Christian living. The Hannas carry on an extensive institute ministry in which Indian Christians come to the village for periods of training lasting a week or ten days. It has been through the institute and conference ministries that God has called forth and equipped Indian men and women to carry the message of redemption in the Lord Jesus to their own people.

In the fall after the rainy season, the missionary couple will be found camping out in surrounding villages holding training sessions with village Christians and seeking to win others through outdoor evangelistic meetings.

God is blessing as souls are being won in Garankoda, Junglabita, and other Santali and Bengali villages. God is working in answer to the prayers of His people.

CURA

The work on this island republic is being carried on entirely by national workers. God is continuing to bless in remarkable ways. Pray for continued wisdom and strength as the Cuban church maintains an active witness for the Lord Jesus during these crucial days.

INDIA

In both North and South India God is giving a breakthrough to the hearts of Indian men and women as many are coming to Christ. The need is still great for more national workers to carry the gospel to their own people. JAPAN

The Tokyo Christian Crusade is now underway. Never has there been an evangelistic undertaking that has been opposed so greatly by the forces of evil.
