### **Boards Unite in Joint Miami Project**

MIAMI, FLA.—The foreign and home mission boards have pooled resources and manpower for a concentrated Cüban refugee program in this resort city.

To be known as CERF (Cuban Emergency Relief Fund), the project will be under the direction of veteran Latin America missionaries, the Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Willey, Sr. The Rev. Benito Rodriquez and the Rev. Mario Perez are assisting the Willeys in addition to the home mission staff already in Miami.

The emergency program is demanded by the urgent situation in this city brought on by the hundreds of Cuban refugees arriving here weekly.

Since no budget allocations are made for this project, the foreign and home boards are appealing for emergency funds above regular missionary support to provide for needed space and equipment to maintain the agency. A building is being acquired for distribution of clothing and food and for spiritual counseling.

In addition to necessary operational funds, there is an urgent need for good, usable clothing (not rags) and for food. Canned or dried foodstuffs may be sent to CERF. However, money with which to purchase food wholesale is preferred.

All clothing and food should be sent directly to CERF, care Melitino Martinez, 441 S.W. Sixth St., Miami, Fla. Monetary contributions should be sent to the Foreign Mission Board, 3801 Richland Ave., Nashville 5, Tenn.

### Candidate Approved for Brazil


NASHVILLE, TENN.—Mary Ellen Rice of North Carolina received approval for service in Brazil during the annual foreign mission board meeting here April 2-6. Eleven prospective missionaries were interviewed.

In other business, Jerry Ballard's title was changed from promotional secretary to director of publications and information, more clearly defining his duties.

A major portion of time was spent deliberating the 1963 foreign missions budget to be recommended to the National Association in July.







NEWSPAPER HEADLINES and television accounts have told the tragic story of Cuba. Articles continually seep through the sugar cane curtain giving insight as to why nearly 2,000 Cubans are fleeing the island weekly.

While in Miami a few days ago, I read an Associated Press report about housewives fighting in Cuban market places for food with which to feed their children.

The report continued, "All of Cuba is hungry and has just emerged from its first week of rationing with hardly a hope that there will be any improvement. An entire nation is on the edge of starvation and complete economic collapse."

While visiting the Cuban Refugee Emergency Center in downtown Miami, I interviewed two groups that had just arrived from Cuba by boat. In one of the cases, 14 Cubans survived rough Caribbean waters in a 24-foot boat with a 15-horsepower motor. The motor cut off 17 times during the journey. Their first comment was that here they found friendship, freedom, and food.

Every person interviewed confirmed the fact that people in Cuba are hungry. They say that the masses are dissatisfied with communism. And, they continue to get out of Cuba any way possible.

I stood on the observation deck and watched a capacity load of refugees disembark from a Pan American flight just arrived from Havana. Their only possessions were the clothes they were wearing. There were tears of sadness for family and friends still living on the Red island prison. And,

there were tears of gladness accompanied with shouts of "We're free!" or Spanish equivalents. But, above all, there was an attitude of hope.

Every Cuban with whom I talked radiated with gratitude for America and joy just to be alive and free. I didn't hear a single complaint. And, I talked with a medical doctor who was once head of the largest hospital in Pinar del Rio, a man of wealth and prestige who now had not even a watch for his wrist.

There was the young man who formerly owned a rice plantation, a \$28,000 home with a yacht by his back door and a Chrysler

in his garage. Now he is wearing used clothes received from the Free Will Baptist refugee agency. He is content to be alive and free, and his heart is warm and receptive.

About midnight one evening I was sipping a cup of coffee at a sidewalk cafe when I heard a trill of Spanish from my left. I turned and saw two teenage boys who undoubtedly were refugees. There was the desire to witness to them, but there was also the barrier of language and the fear that they might resent intrusion. However, I had to at least give them Spanish tracts we printed in Nashville and brought down.

I approached the two young men and repeated the only Spanish phrase I know. They turned, and upon realization that I was an American spontaneously displayed expressions of gratitude and respect. I handed them the tracts, and immediately they began to read, and I saw something which broke my heart. Here were fellows who were unreachable a few days ago but now, because of the turn of events, are open and responsive to the gospel. There are thousands more just like them.

More than 100,000 refugees have already poured into Miami. Others will come. These men and women know what it is to have life, and they are open to the gospel which imparts eternal life.

This is a day of golden opportunity in Miami for Free Will Baptists. Missionaries on the scene say that there is no greater need or challenge among Latin Americans in the entire southern hemisphere. But, we must act now.

The emergency situation in Miami caught both the foreign and home mission boards unprepared. No appropriations for an emergency refugee operation were made in 1962 budgets. Yet, the need is urgent. Both boards are appealing for funds above and beyond regular missions support to provide necessary space and supplies to meet the challenge of Miami.

CERF (Cuban Emergency Relief Fund) has been set up to administrate this emergency ministry. (See article, page three.) Your help is needed.

Firstly, you can seek God's face in behalf of those working in an attempt to reach Cuban refugees for Christ and for yourself that God will clearly show you what He would have you to do about this tremendous opportunity.

Secondly, you can give sacrificially so that necessary operational funds will be available to maintain CERF. This is an emergency situation which demands emergency support. Contributions should be clearly earmarked and sent to Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions, 3801 Richland Ave., Nashville 5, Tenn.

# SERVING CHRIST IN SOUTH AMERICA

THE FACT that a missionary's testimony can vitally affect young people with whom he comes in contact is clearly seen in the lives of Sammy and June Wilkinson.

Sammy was reared in a Christian home and gave his heart to the Lord at the age of 12. It was during grammar school days that God began to plant missionary seed in his heart through the testimony of Laura Belle Barnard, pioneer Free Will Baptist missionary to India.

"Miss Barnard taught Bible in our school," Sammy relates, "and when she left to go back to India I never forgot some things I had learned. When she came home later and urged more people to go to the mission field, it seemed that the Lord was speaking to my heart about it."

The Georgia native entered Free Will Baptist Bible College in 1949, and during his first year surrendered to the will of God for foreign service.

June, too, was reared in a Christian home and by the age of 12 had received the Lord Jesus as Saviour.

"When I was about 15," June recalls, "I heard Wesley Calvery (now serving in Japan) give as his testimony Galatians 2:20, and then I realized that it was not enough just to abstain from worldly amusements but that we

must crucify self and follow the ways of the Lord."

For many months the Lord had been speaking to June regarding foreign service. "At the age of 14 I knew that the Lord was speaking to me about being a foreign missionary, yet I did not make a final surrender for foreign service until I was 16 and a senior in high school. I made a public statement to this effect at the Nationwide League Convention in 1952."

June enrolled in Free Will Baptist Bible College. It wasn't long until she met Sammy, and God led them to a ministry together in foreign service. They were married in 1955.

Today, Sammy and June are standing in the gap for Free Will Baptists in Jaboticabal, Brazil. They need your prayers. They need your support.
