command of Christ to his disciples in reference to feeding the multitude with the loaves and fishes. Since Jesus, according to John, had in view the larger multitude, who were starving not for natural food but for the Bread of Life, there are obviously some missionary lessons to learn from this familiar story.

THE The need of spiritual vision is illustrated in Christ's view of the multitude. **VISION** "Iesus lifted up his eyes and saw a great company." The disciples also saw, but their vision was the kind that is all too often displayed today—a selfish vision. Having departed with Jesus into a private place, they seemed to selfishly consider the appearance of the multitude an intrusion.

Selfishness is one of the greatest causes of failure to share the Bread of Life. Many are so absorbed in personal interests that they are not concerned with the needs of others. Christians should have an arresting vision of the needs of the whole world—one which looks beyond personal interests and shares the Saviour's concern for mankind everywhere.

COMPASSION

THE Christ's sympathy for the multitude illustrates the need of compassion. Unlike the disciples, He was not annoyed by the crowd. Instead, He was "moved with compassion toward them."


On another occasion Jesus beheld the multitude "fainting, scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd." This is an apt description of the world today and should move the church to compassion.

THE The divine method of feeding the spiritually hungry is illustrated in the METHOD feeding of the multitude—"He gave the loaves to his disciples, and the disciples to the multitude."

The hunger of the throng is symbolic of the spiritual need of the world today. Just as Christ met that need by the multiplication of the loaves and fishes, so He can meet the spiritual needs of the famishing millions in our time-through His disciples.

EPA'S 'Most Improved Format Award' for 1961 Presented to 'Heartbeat'

SPRINGFIELD, MO.-Heartbeat was named winner of the "Most Improved Format Award" for 1961 during the annual awards program of the Evangelical Press Association. The announcement was made to some 150 editors representing various denominational and interdenominational periodicals belonging to EPA, climaxing their three-day convention here.

On hand to receive the award for Heartbeat was the editor,

Jerry Ballard, promotional secretary for the board of foreign missions. It is the first national award ever presented a Free Will

Baptist publication.

His magazine, published by Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, was named "Periodical of the Year" for 1961. Awards were also presented to leading magazines in six publication categories. There were more than 80 evangelical publications entered in the awards competition.

W. Stanley Mooneyham, assistant moderator of the National Association of Free Will Baptists and editor of United Evangelical Action, was elected vice president of EPA for 1962. R. C. Cunningham of the Evangel was named president.

Larry Ward, editor of World Vision Magazine and EPA executive secretary, reported that the group's 173 member periodicals include publications of 41 denominations as well as many interdenominational bodies.

Mileys, Palmers Arrive on Coast

ABIDJAN, IVORY COAST - The Dr. LaVerne Mileys and the Lonnie Palmers arrived here last month en route to permanent assignments in the Bondoukou Circle.

The Palmers came from Switzerland where they had been studying French. The Mileys had been studying in Paris. Both families traveled to the Coast on the same ship.

The Mileys will institute a program of medical missions in the Circle. Dr. Milev is the first Free Will Baptist medical missionary in modern history. The Palmers will work at Goumere while the Lonnie Sparkses are in the states on furlough.

Works Begun in Panama, Uruguay

PANAMA CITY, PANAMA-The John Moehlmans and Tom Willeys, Jr., have arrived at the foot of Central America, Panama, to begin a new mission work for Free Will Baptists.

The missionaries arrived in the country by auto the first of the month. Exact location of their work has not yet been determined.

The Paul Robinsons traveled to Panama with the Moehlmans and Willeys. They will proceed immediately to Montevideo, Uruguay, to begin a new work there. The Bill Fulchers, presently completing language study in San Juan, Costa Rica, will join them as soon as their papers are cleared by the Uruguayan consulate.

IN POLITICAL, governmental, scientific, and medical circles, 1962 is being approached as one of the most important years in the history of man. Decisions made this year, they say, will determine the future welfare of the human race.

This is nonetheless true in regard to worldwide missionary endeavor. Almost every spot on the globe huddles in the shadow of impending catastrophe. Yet, where the picture is darkest seems to be where the most hunger for the gospel is found. Men everywhere are feeling the need for a way out of their precarious predicaments.

God has been preparing Free Will Baptist foreign missions for today. Last year was one of investigation and preparation in many areas of the denomination's foreign ministry. Sixteen missionaries were in language study. All are now at their permanent places of assignment or en route. In every way, 1962 looks to be the year of greatest advancement in the history of Free Will Baptist foreign missions.

IN LATIN AMERICA

Cuba went behind the Iron Curtain during 1961. But God is still at work on the island through faithful pastors who are continuing to proclaim the message of salvation.

"Operation spread out" is the best description of the work in Brazil. Work was

begun in one new city during the latter part of 1961. Already this year three other areas have been entered by Free Will Baptist missionaries and national workers.

The Sammy Wilkinsons moved to Jaboticabal last September. They are having an average attendance at all services of 35. Their greatest problem is pressure from the unsaved on those who are saved. Plans call for the organization of a church in Jaboticabal this year and the beginning of work in nearby villages.

The Bobby Aycocks arrived in Araras during January. Several good contacts have already been made and a regular schedule of services is being instituted. A church here in 1962 is the goal.

The Bobby Pooles and Dave Franks have entered Ribeirao Preto. Work will start from scratch, but organization of a church during the year is being prayed for.

The Ken Eagletons and Eula Mae Martin remain in Campinas, the origin of Free Will Baptist missions in Brazil. Eula Mae is working with a Christian hospital and with the church. Ken will continue his work in strengthening the Campinas work. Some 50 decisions were reported for 1961.

Two new countries, as far as Free Will Baptist foreign missions is concerned, are being entered this month. The Tom Willeys, Jr., and the John Moehlmans have arrived in Panama to set up a missionary operation at the foot of Central America. The Paul Robinsons are en route to Uruguay. They will be followed shortly by the Bill Fulchers as Free Will Baptists expand their program to include another Latin American country.

IN INDIA

Fifty-five decisions were recorded during the year by the mission in South India. Missionary Volena Wilson maintains a full schedule of weekly Bible classes, prayer cells, and evangelism assignments with national workers. Seventeen trained Free Will Baptist nationals serve with her.

Plans for 1962 call for a gospel center to be established in Mettupalayam along with five Sunday schools. Other Sunday schools and preaching points are to be added in surrounding areas.

The Carlisle Hannas and Daniel Cronks labor in North India with the help of four

national workers. The Cronks are en route to the states on furlough now, leaving increased responsibility on the Hannas and the nationals.

There is increasing interest in the gospel by Santal communities. A more intensified program of evangelism for these people is in the offing for this year. A major need in the North Indian work is more nationals who will prepare for full-time service.

IN JAPAN

The Herbert Waids moved to Tokyo during the year and is making progress in his work with four church groups. He is working at the present among middle-class urban people and university students.

Several evangelistic meetings are set for this year. Free Will Baptists have 15 na-

tionals helping in the work.

The denomination also has a work on the island of Hokkaido administered by the Wesley Calverys.

IN THE IVORY COAST, AFRICA

The year 1961 was one of preparation, translation, and indoctrination in the Bondoukou Circle, Ivory Coast, The first Free Will Baptist medical missionaries, Dr. and Mrs. LaVerne Miley, were in France preparing for their ministry to the Lobi people. The Lonnie Palmers studied in Switzerland.

In the meantime, Dan Merkh was in the midst of a gigantic construction program, completing buildings at Goumere and Koun and hammering away at the first medical station in Doropo, which is nearing completion. The Merkhs will come to the states

on furlough during the year.

The Lonnie Sparkses and Bill Joneses have been maintaining heavy schedules of village preaching and Bible study classes in addition to the backbreaking chore of translating the gospel into the languages of the Agni and Kulango people. Language primers and translations of the Gospel of Mark will be completed in both of these languages this year. Other translation work will follow.

Literature received special attention by the department during 1961 and will continue to do so in 1962. Already this year three Portuguese pamphlets are in production in addition to Heartheat and promo-

tional literature.

EULA MAE MARTIN, MISSIONARY NURSE

Real peace in doing the will of God came only after completely yielding herself to do anything God desired

LORD, I'LL DO anything you want me to." A simple statement made in simple surroundings, but it had profound repercussions.

Eula Mae Martin was brought up on a North Carolina farm. At the age of 20 she was still unconverted. "When friends spoke to me about being saved, I thought they were trying to mind my business. One day I realized that my salvation was their concern." And Eula Mae came to the Lord.

For three or four years following her conversion, Eula Mae lived what she describes as a "mediocre Christian life." But, then the Lord began to convict her of the fact that He had something for her to do.

"I thought there was something the Lord wanted me to do," she testifies, "and many times I prayed, 'Lord, what will you have me to do?' This did not bring the real peace I longed for until one day I was so convicted that I finally said, 'Lord, I'll do anything you want me to.' From that moment on, the Lord began to make it plain to me that he definitely wanted me to carry the gospel to those who had never heard."

She knew that preparation was necessary for one to serve God in a foreign country. So, in 1952, Eula Mae entered Free Will Baptist Bible College for a three-year course of study.

God continued to lead Eula Mae in a plain path, and because of His direction she entered nurses' training at McLeod Infirmary School of Nursing, Florence, S.C., in 1955. Three years later she received the R.N. degree.

In March, 1958, Eula Mae made final application to the board of foreign missions for service as a foreign missionary. There was an urgent need for nurses to serve in

Brazil. So, Eula Mae set her face toward South America's largest nation. She was commissioned on November 30 and sailed for Brazil on January 18, 1959.

Following several months of studying Portuguese, the language of Brazil, Eula Mae began her service in a Christian hospital in Campinas.

The people of Brazil are superstitious about their health. It is a real task to persuade them to take the simplest health precautions. And this takes days of patiently showing concern until their confidence is won.

Eula Mae is a member of the Free Will Baptist church in Campinas, and a good part of her time is spent in various ministries there. Many have gained confidence in her hygenic advice so that now she is able to assist them in their health needs.

Yet, her ministry is not merely to the physical. Basically, her desire is to bring men to Christ, and medicine is one of the tools she uses.

Eula Mae greatly enjoys working with children. She also holds classes for Sunday school teachers. She works with the intermediate league. And the women of the church have elected her president of the Woman's Auxiliary for this year.

People in Brazil are hungry for the gospel, and Eula Mae has found joy in feeding these for whom Christ died.

BRAZIL, S.A. / The Bobby Aycocks moved to Araras, one and a half hours' drive from Campinas, during January to begin a new Free Will Baptist work. Laercio, a national worker, moved with them and will assist in the work. The Bobby Pooles and Dave Franks are moving to Ribeirao Preto to start a new work. This is a city of 180,000 people located 200 miles from Campinas and 50 miles from Jaboticabal, where the Wilkinsons are working. Pray for these that they will know the mind of the Lord regarding the details of beginning new works, that contacts will develop into converts, and that churches may soon be established.

CUBA / Work here continues. A gospel witness is being maintained. Pray that national pastors will have needed wisdom and strength for these days of opportunity.

INDIA / The Daniel Cronks will be leaving their posts in North India this month en route home on furlough. Pray for the work in their absence, for the Carlisle Hannas who will have added responsibilities, and for national workers.

IVORY COAST, AFRICA / Progress continues in translation work being done by Bill Jones and Lonnie Sparks in the Agni and Kulango languages. Pray that God will give needed insight into these native tongues and hasten the day that these tribes will have the Word of God in their own languages.

JAPAN / Herbert Waid is making contacts with university students in his section of Tokyo. Pray that many will respond to the gospel and then carry the message to their own people.

URUGUAY / Paul Robinson is en route here to begin a new Free Will Baptist work. Pray for God's direction in making initial contacts. Pray for the Bill Fulchers who will follow shortly.
