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

The problems and opportunities of missionary outreach in Brazil are surveyed in this penetrating first-hand report by J. REFORD WILSON

to the South

THE GIANT of South America, Brazil, is stretching itself. Jungle areas are cleared as the giant takes its step. Coffee fields dot the hill sides. Skyscrapers appear almost overnight in the rapidly growing cities. Industries select country sites near the cities, and like an overflowing river the cities quickly engulf the factories.

The evangelical church has its golden day of opportunity. The giant has multitudes in its hands lifting them out of tradition and family ties. People are waiting to be embraced with the arms of those who care and understand. It doesn't really matter to them whether it is communism or Christianity. They are looking for shelter, food, and clothing.

At Port Alegre, on my way to Uruguay, a crowd had gathered at the airport to welcome Dr. Joao Soren, president of World Baptist Alliance. Ken Eagleton and I introduced ourselves, and as I discussed with Dr. Soren the spiritual possibilities of this great country, he said, "Brazil has the greatest receptivity of the gospel of any country I know." The church must claim Brazil for Christ or the communists will capture it for Satan.

As goes Brazil, so goes all of Latin America. Communism is a definite threat to Brazil's 70 million people. Religiously, Brazil is a Roman Catholic country, but less than five per cent attend church. There are ten million spiritists in Brazil compared with three million Protestant Christians.

Free Will Baptist missionaries are entering the open doors of this great country and preaching Christ as the answer to Brazil's need. Our first vacation Bible school in Brazil was conducted by Bobby and Sue Aycock and Laercio (Larry) Miguel, one of our national pastors, at Pirassununga. Following the vacation Bible school on a Wednesday night, 11 people were saved.

I preached at this place the following Saturday night in the small seven by nine feet front room of the family who had only been saved six months, and two men and a woman were saved. Pastor Larry returned to Pirassununga for a service on Sunday afternoon and evening, and the next Wednesday night 18 people had been saved in this city. A house and lot have been purchased for this church and a loan of \$400 (not a gift) is needed to give this work a real boost.

The city of Riberao Preto, where the Rev. and Mrs. Bobby Poole are working, may well become a center of evangelical witness because of the Christian radio station now serving this area. Several cities in this area with four to 15 thousand population have no evangelical work. Until recently, Bobby and Geneva Poole were the only foreign missionaries living in Riberao Preto.

A young man attending the church at Riberao Preto went with Bobby Poole and me to the country for the farm service. On the way out of town we passed a football-soccer stadium and he was telling me about some of their players and the fantastic sums of money they were paid. I looked at Benedito and asked him a Holy Spirit directed question, "Benedito, what do you want out of life?"

I had expected him to answer with the desire to have a machine shop of his own and to become a famed soccer player. His answer, however, was directed by God's Spirit. He said, "I want salvation most of all."

Bobby Poole asked, "Benedito, do you mean you want to be saved now?"

His reply, "I do." The jeep was pulled to the side of the rough, red dirt road. There we prayed, and Benedito was saved. We went on our way rejoicing.

Radio is an effective tool in the ministry of the missionary and on Saturday, February 9, the Rev. Sammy Wilkinson inaugurated his radio ministry at Jaboticabal.

A street service was conducted that evening in the main plaza preceding the regular service in the church. This was a historical meeting for Free Will Baptists in the city of Jaboticabal. The believers were being officially organized into the second Free Will Baptist church of Brazil. Ken Eagleton, field director of Brazil, preached the organizational message. The proposed constitution was read and adopted, and 23 charter members were received into the organization. I spoke of the example of the Thessalonian church and presented the Bible and gave the charge to the

Easter in Brazil

JUDAS HANGS ON CROSS IN REVENGE FOR THE DEATH OF CHRIST AND IF CHRIST be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain. And if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain, ye are yet in your sins. Then they also which are fallen asleep in Christ are perished" (I Cor. 15:14, 17, 18).

Have you ever stopped to think what our situation would be if Christ had not risen from the dead?

From Easter celebrations here in Brazil one would hardly get the idea that Christ rose from the dead and today is the living Christ at the right hand of the throne of God. His portrait is that of the dead Christ, and it seems that a spirit of hopelessness sweeps over the people as they mourn His death rather than rejoice in His glorious resurrection.

Some celebrations which reach their climax on Easter are begun many days before. One of these practices is the moving of the image of the virgin Mary, called "Nossa Senhora de Aparecida" (Our Lady of the Appearance), from house to house in all sections of town. The image usually stays from one to three or more days in each house. When it is moved, it is usually at night and is

congregation on Sunday morning.

I returned on Sunday evening with Ken Eagleton for services in the church at Campinas. This church is training its members through its leagues woman's auxiliary, visitation, and street services. Our churches are in need of literature which would make their work more effective.

There are 160 literature publishing agencies in Latin America but only 50 bookstores. A circulation of available

literature therefore is a problem. There is a need for a greater range of books published in Portuguese. It is reported that there are more Portuguese-speaking evangelicals than Spanish. The need of study material is urgent for our church in Latin America.

Free Will Baptists have their opportunity in Brazil. The greatest need at this hour is the establishing of a training school for national pastors. There is the need for personnel dedicated to the literature ministry. The ministry of nursing through the missionary church

accompanied by a small group of people carrying lighted candles and chanting a wierd song. The home that is host to the image is supposed to receive special blessings and helps in their lives.

Palm Sunday is not without its celebration. Mass has a special attraction. Also, children are seen with weeds, grass, and branches from trees. Their objective is to celebrate the triumphal entry of Christ into Jerusalem before His crucifixion. During the week, almost everyone attends a four to five-hour long movie portraying the story of His suffering to the resurrection.

My first year in Brazil I happened to be downtown in Campinas on Friday before Easter. I noticed that there was a great crowd of people coming from every direction and making their way toward the center of town. Being curious, I went to see what was coming off. Everyone was headed toward the big Roman Catholic cathedral. Shortly, a procession began which was made up of priests, nuns, altar boys, and a great host of regular members.

There were banners, incense vessels, and crucifixes. A group of men passed who had the appearance of pallbearers

supposedly carrying the body of Christ in a casket. The people following had their rosaries and prayed to the virgin Mary as they marched. When the body of Christ passed, the bystanders knelt down and repeated a memorized prayer making the sign of the cross.

If you should pass through the sections of town late Good Friday afternoon, you will see a stuffed dummy of a man. He is usually tied to a pole and sometimes even on a cross. This is Judas Iscariot. They have put him in Christ's place. He remains on the pole or cross until Saturday, at which time he is taken down and whipped and in many cases burned. The significance—it is revenge for the death for Christ.

Easter celebrations come to a close with a special mass on Easter Sunday.

Even though Christ said, "I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live" (John 11:25), millions sit in the darkness of sin without hope of life eternal.

This is the reason we are in Brazil today—to proclaim the glorious message of resurrection life to these who otherwise will never hear.

has been proven effective by Eula Mae Martin, R.N. The radio ministry of our missionaries can be greatly enlarged. Possibilities are tremendous.

I believe the National Association of Free Will Baptists has just begun to awaken to its great missionary potential. I met missionaries in Brazil whose denomination in the United States has one missionary for every two churches. The awakening of missionary interest among Free Will Baptists is seen in the fact that out of the 49 missionaries under appointment, 37 of them are in

their first term of service. This is our hour. There is no time for delay.

GOD WORKED BEHIND CUBAN BARS

MIAMI—The story of Cuban Brigade 2506 is now history. Except for the story of Juan Cabrera and the way God used him behind prison bars.

Jaun had been a Free Will Baptist lay preacher in pre-Castro Cuba. He was a rifle-carrying soldier when captured following the Bay of Pigs battle. He was taken to the El Principe prison in Hayana.

There Jaun started a Bible class in his three feet by six feet room. The original four members grew. Even the communist guard was found listening attentatively. And men began to come to Christ. Out of the group of 214 men

imprisoned with Jaun, some 50 were won to the Lord.

Now the prisoners are free men. The Christians remain together, most of them attending the Free Will Baptist Spanish mission here. Of Juan Cabrera, leaders of Brigade 2506 say, "There, indeed, is a Godly man."

The church sponsors a weekly radio program "The Royal Message." Sunday school attendance is averaging 45. Five other preaching points in the area are being maintained.



CENTRAL FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH



THE THRILL of my first missionary conference at Edgemont church in North Carolina has never worn off. That was the first abiding impact that the world-wide cause of missions ever made in my life. From that day until this the great enterprise of world-wide evangelization has been a constant challenge and thrill.

The value of a strong missionary emphasis in the churches that I have pastored has been inestimable. It would be hard to compute all of the many wonderful results that come to a church that emphasizes the one thing nearest to the heart of God. Nevertheless, several things come to my mind immediately.

A church that is informed and challenged concerning the needs of the world will be a church that will pray much for missions. Secondly, a well-informed church will give as they have never given before. Thirdly, a missionary-minded church will send forth a constant stream of courageous, dedicated men and women into the harvest fields of the world. Fourthly, a strong missionary emphasis will help the local

church and the individual Christian to keep eternal values in view.

In Central church the Lord has more than met our needs on the home front. For instance, eight years ago the church had two full-time workers and one part-time worker. Today the church has four full-time workers and one part-time worker. The church also supports two missionary interns. All through the years there has been a strong emphasis on missions giving, praying, and going at the Central church. Consequently, the Lord has seen fit to put His stamp of approval on this work from its very beginning.

There is a tremendous amount of truth in the statement, "The light that shines the fartherest, shines the brightest at home." Central church has never robbed its missions giving to take care of the home needs. During the last eight years our church has been engaged in an expansion program at home which has cost more than one half million dollars. At the same time this was going on we have been steadily climbing in our missions giving.

During this eight-year period from

1955 through 1962 our church has given a total of \$83,582.04 to foreign missions and a total of \$9,541.81 to home missions making a total of \$93,123.85 given to missions during years of a strenuous building program. This is per capita giving of \$16.63 per member per year for mission causes outside of our own local church. We believe that this is why God has blessed in every other way so abundantly.

During this same period there were 759 conversions at the altars of the church. This is an average of 95 per year. There were 440 people who followed the Lord in believer's baptism, or an average of 55 each year. There were 624 new members added to the church roll, or an average increase of

78 new members per year.

The Sunday school likewise has grown. From the end of 1955 until the end of 1962 the average Sunday school attendance increased from 431 to 666. Overall giving in the church has realized a steady increase also. Church income has increased from \$55,000 per year in 1955 to nearly \$100,000 per year. This is almost a 100% increase in total giving.

One of the greatest tools available to Free Will Baptists today to further the cause of foreign missions is the annual missionary conference on a local church level. Three months ago we had our annual missionary conference in the Central church. The impact of this conference was tremendous. Total pledges for foreign missions reached \$15,000. Since the end of that conference, which was December 2, 1962, our church has given a total of more than \$5,900 to foreign missions.

If you want your church to be aflame for God, start emphasizing missions. Preach missions. Teach missions. Pray for missions. Have missionary conferences. You will be ever so glad that you did.

CUBAN SITUATION SEES REPRISALS

THE MOTIVE of the present letter is to inform you of the actual tribulations that are being suffered in Cuba," writes a Christian from Havana. "A few days ago a great shipment of Bibles was received from Mexico, England and Canada. The majority of these have already been taken to the National Paper Factory, and there they have been ground up and taken to be converted into cardboard to be used in making posters and notices with which they plan to convert the minds of the Cubans to Communism. So far, 12,000 Bibles have been destroyed."

The Havana reporter further states that a representative of the President, when approached by Christian workers asking for an explanation of the barbarous act committed against the faith through destruction of Bibles, told them they would not receive any more clothing and shoes as long as they were in the Lord's work, because they were "out of production." (The writer explains that in reality even the agricultural workers are not receiving clothing or shoes, and as a result some are refusing to cut cane.)

In the Oriente province and in the province of Las Villas several churches have been closed, according to the writer. When the Christians go to protest and claim their rights before the authorities, they are answered heartlessly: "You have no right, as

there are too many things to do in the fields and in production for you to be wasting your time praying and gathering in churches."

The writer was deeply distressed by what he called "men, apostate from Christ." These, he says, continue to call themselves Christians but spend their time propagating the Communist line. One of them writes a column for the newspaper *El Mundo* (operated by "the old Communist, Gomez Wanguemert") defending socialism.

WYCLIFFE BIBLE TRANSLATORS SLAIN IN VIET NAM

SAIGON, VIET NAM—Two members of the Wycliffe Bible Translators were slain in South Viet Nam on March 4 by Viet Cong (Communist) guerrillas. Shot down without apparent reason or provocation were translators Elwood Jacobsen, 36, of Foreston, Minnesota, and Gaspar Makil, 36, Wycliffe's Filipino member. One of Mr. Makil's four-month old twins, Janie, and his three-year old son Thomas were seriously wounded by the burst of gunfire. Janie died the following day in a Saigon hospital.

The Wycliffe party of nine, comprising the Jacobsen and Makil families, was traveling by Land Rover in a convoy of some 30 vehicles stopped by the guerrilla roadblock. When the roadblock was encountered, instructions to

ROMAN CATHOLICS SET TO MODIFY POLITICAL STRATEGY IN LATIN AMERICA

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Roman Catholic Church in Latin America is moving to identify itself more closely with the social and economic changes developing in Latin America, says an article in *The Washington Post* (February 21, 1963).

In keeping with the dictum of Pope John XXIII—"Let us recognize our failures"—the Catholic Church in Latin America blames itself for not adapting rapidly enough to the constant social and economic changes taking place in the area.

Bishop Mark McGrath of Panama City said recently that new generations are emerging "who are ignorant of the profound social aspects of the church." A strong supporter of land reform and strengthening of the labor movement in Latin America, the Bishop believes the area will serve as a guide to worldwide social revolution.

Burdened by the sight of multitudes who still have not heard and prodded by a growing dedication to doing the will of God, Mary Ellen Rice gave herself

TO MAKE HIM KNOWN

THE STARS had never seemed so bright, the moon so full, nor the night so radiant as it did that summer night of April 28, 1947.

"The message was preached clearly and plainly by our evangelist, the Rev. Seldon Bullard of Darlington, S. C. During the invitation, I walked down the aisle, knelt at the old fashioned altar, gave my hand to the preacher, and my heart to the Lord Iesus."

Thus begins the testimony of Mary Ellen Rice. At the age of 12 she received Christ as Saviour, and "from that time until the close of high school I knew God had a special purpose and plan for my life."

Mary Ellen prayed much, studied much, and counseled much to find God's plan for her life. Mrs. Ethel Whaley, now a missionary to Alaska, was instrumental in pointing Mary Ellen to a furtherance of her education at Free Will Baptist Bible College.

With the help of interested friends, Mary Ellen attended college. "I somehow had that instinct that God wanted me to be a missionary on foreign soil. And in college I gained full assurance that this was God's will for me."

Years of discouragement followed college, and Mary Ellen testifies that she "became somewhat indifferent toward the Lord and tried to get away from His will for my life. As I reflect on these days, I know that it was through the encouragement of Mr. Bullard, who had become my pastor, and Christian friends in my church that I was drawn back into the fellowship and will of God."

In 1961, Mary Ellen entered Missionary Internship in Detroit, Mich., while there she was an intern at Central Free Will Baptist Church, pastored by the Rev.
