

THE DOORWAY OF HOPE

in Refugee City*

EVERY WEEK something is happening—amazing escapes, often with the element of tragedy, boats apprehended by Castro's coast guards.

I urge you to read the story in May's *Readers Digest* of the Cuban captain who defected with an 85-foot boat. Since I first heard the story I have had a great burden to know this valiant man.

A few weeks ago I baptized the woman who sewed together an American flag from pieces of clothing taken from women on the boat. She became a faithful member of our Spanish Free Will Baptist church here in Miami, but is now relocated in New York. Others from the boat were converted and became concerned for the captain.

Last week I finally met him. I went to his home, and my heart was moved by the dire need of his family of nine children with very little clothing and no food. I saw five potatoes and asked the Mother if she had meat. She would not answer me. I looked ► TO PAGE TWO

► in my pocket-book—broke again.

I went out to the car to pray then thought to look into my papers. There I found ten dollars someone had given me for just such an urgent need. I placed the money in her hands and saw the value of the gospel rise in her eyes.

Emboldened by the confidence that we meant business, she said, "El Capitan cannot read the little book you gave him. would you help us to get some glasses for him from somewhere?" My brother-in-law passed away a few months ago and left two pairs of glasses. Sunday afternoon I took them over and found one pair a perfect fit. Our Lord never fails us in the time of need.

Captain Rafael went to a gospel service for the first time in his life last Sunday night. We request your prayers that God will do a great work of grace in his heart and life.

From his boat, "The Nelson," a handsome Cuban television writer and actor has been coming to our services. He speaks English very well. His wife barely got off the boat in time to give birth to a baby. She is expecting another one now, so some dear ones of our Woman's Auxiliary could do us a great favor to prepare some kind of layette for the baby.

Just a week ago on Sunday two boats were picked up in the gulf with more than 40 people aboard—men, women and children. Three boats stole out into the night. One was intercepted by the com-

munist and its fate is unknown. The two boats that made it safely through were three days and two nights on the high seas without food.

A mother from one of these boats called me at the Center pleading for help. I found her a lovely woman with two sons. One was very ill from exposure in the boat. We immediately secured medicine for him. They have become other sheep that make up our fold here in Miami.

Ahead of us still a multitude of challenges—dear Cuban people who urgently need the gospel. There are the old, dying in a strange land, and the newborn. And we have so little to meet this great need.

During these past two months we have clothed 102 people of all ages, more than 500 garments given out. Each one was given a New Testament. Only five of these had previously had contact with the gospel. Ninety-seven had never heard!

We stand daily with hands of welcome outstretched as we are indeed a doorway of hope to this suffering people who shall never forget the bread cast upon the waters. We cannot stand alone. We must have your continued faithful prayers and regular financial and material assistance. And when we get to glory we'll rejoice in the fruit of the promise—"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40). ■

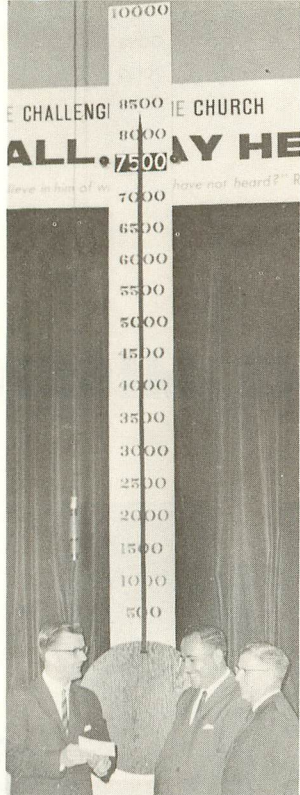

MISSIONS in ACTION AROUND THE WORLD



EQUADOR DECLARED NEW FIELD

NASHVILLE — Equador has become the newest field for penetration by Free Will Baptists. The field was officially adopted by the Board of Foreign Missions in June.

The Rev. and Mrs. John Moehlman are being transferred from Panama to direct opening denominational work in this strategic Spanish-speaking country. The Moehlmans arrived in the states June 21 on furlough prior to moving to Equador. The Rev. and Mrs. Tom Willey, Jr., and the Rev. and Mrs. Bill Phipps will man the Panamanian field.

Ella Rae Jones and Patsy Tyson, both R.N.s, have been appointed to medical missionary work in Equador. In May they received the first B.S. degrees conferred by Free Will Baptist College.

The denomination's ministry in Equador will be in cooperation with World Radio Missionary Fellowship, operators of radio stations HCJB and a veteran missionary service organization in Equador. Details of the cooperative ministry are being worked out by General Director Reford Wilson and officials of WRMF.

NEW FILMS NOW AVAILABLE
