Missionary Bobby Aycock asked Sebastiao's wife if she and her husband would like to buy a Bible. When she answered that they had no money, Aycock left them one as a gift. And God began to work through His Word. The Holy Spirit began to soften Sebastiao's heart to the missionary's message

Sunday school was begun in a neighbor's home a short distance from where Sebastiao and his family lived. Sebastiao and his two older children went. This strange thing that God was working in his heart continued. Amazingly, Sebastiao found himself enjoying the gospel singing and preaching.

Next Sunday, Sebastiao listened from the other side of the fense separating his house from the yard where outdoor Sunday school was being held. Again his heart was strangely warmed. He felt he had found in the missionary a new hope for his own life and also that of his sick daughter. He asked the missionary to pray for God to make his daughter well.

And Sebastiao went to his knees searching for truth. He felt he had to know if the message he had heard was really true, that he could have forgiveness of sins through the Lord Jesus Christ, that he could have power to live victoriously over sin, and that he could have the assurance of heaven after death. He asked God to prove that this was true by making his daughter well.

IMMEDIATELY Sebastiao's daughter showed signs of improvement. The next Sunday, Sebastiao and his family returned to the Free Will Baptist mission services and in response to the invitation to receive Christ as Saviour, he and his wife came forward. The strange thing God was doing in his heart came clear. Sebastiao was being born again by the power of the Holy Spirit. Old things were passing away. God was giving him new life.

Sebastiao became a living testimony of the power of God to change sindarkened lives. He knew true peace for the first time. His family was happy. Life now had real meaning.

Today, Sebastiao's daughter is completely well. He and his wife are growing in their new walk with the Lord. And Sebastiao has given his life to be used in any way God desires.

With the purchase of property for the Brazilian Bible Institute, a caretaker was needed. Sebastiao responded to the need and now lives on the institute site, giving his talents for the glory of God.

And when school begins in January, Sebastiao will be in the first class, yielded to God's will for his life, studying to preach the gospel to his own people.

NASHVILLE—Two couples were officially appointed for service in South America during the annual meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions here March 31-April 4.

The Rev. and Mrs. Jim Combs of West Virginia and Oklahoma were given sanction to begin deputational ministry to secure necessary prayer and financial support. Mr. Combs is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College. His wife also studied at the denomina-

tional school. He has pastored in Ohio.

The Rev. and Mrs. Don Robirds also received final approval for missionary service. They hail from California where Mr. Robirds is an instructor and dean at California Bible College. He is a graduate of Free Will Baptist Bible College where his wife also studied.

In other board deliberations, the 1965 foreign missions budget to be presented to the National Association meeting in annual session in Kansas City in July was considered.

The board also authorized an investigation of Europe as a possible new mission field for Free Will Baptists.

VIEWS ON MISSIONS OUTLOOK IN INDIA

FOR SEVERAL months Red Chinese forces have been massed on the border of India just north of Free Will Baptist mission stations in North India. What is the real danger? Can the North Indian Church survive should American missionaries be compelled to leave? These questions and others were directed to veteran missionary to India Carlisle Hanna by *Heartbeat*. Here are his answers.

HEARTBEAT: What affect is the Chinese military buildup on the Indian border having on our work in North India?

HANNA: Actually, it is affecting our Indian people very little even though they understand something of what Communism is. Still, they don't seem to be too worried about it. However, we missionaries are concerned about it. We are concerned about the Church and its ability to stand in the event of Communist invasion. As we pray and as we work, we are seeking to so establish our people in the Lord that they will be able to stand should that day ever come.

Do you feel that the threat of invasion is a genuine threat or merely a scare tactic?

We feel it is an imminent threat, and they are close enough for it to be a matter of concern since we are so near the point of the largest Chinese buildup. Communist China, according to reports, claims that all Mongolian people are China's. The greater part of those living

in the Darjeeling District are Mongolian, and our mission in Sonapurhat is only a mile from the Darjeeling line.

If attack comes, what will be our response?

At the time of the last invasion, we had decided to send our wives and children to our South Indian station which would be as safe as any place in India. But I would stay with the work as long as possible. The only way out should the escape route south be cut off would be to walk out through Pakistan.

Do you anticipate having advance notice in the event of attack sufficient to take precautionary measures?

No. The American Embassy in Calcutta says that we are to watch news reports and be prepared to leave on a moment's notice. They assume no responsibility for missionaries in outlying areas.

In light of the possibility of being forced to leave the North Indian Church in the event of Communist invasion, how do you evaluate the spiritual life of the Church in North India?

I feel that our Christians are alive spiritually and that they realize the presence of the Lord in their lives day by day. Those who are able to read do read the Word. All of them are faithful in prayer. Most of those who do not read have committed portions of the Word to memory. They attend services as regularly as possible, as regularly as we can hold services for them, I should say.

Many times when they have no one to hold services for them, they have services anyway. Someone is able to read the Word, to pray, and to lead the singing.

This isn't to say that every saved person is living a victorious Christian life. We would like to see this true, and we feel it can be. A job still remains to be done in the area of strengthening the Church to stand alone. And there are so many still to be reached with the gospel.

How is the national church responding in taking the initiative in evangelizing their own area and branching out into new areas?

We find the Indian people somewhat unconcerned about others. They are used to living in their own communities. The Hindus don't care whether other people become Hindu. They are satisfied with the number they have. Moslems are the same way. This attitude carries over into the Christian community. They tend to be satisfied with the number of Christians we have and with living where they want to.

We realize that this doesn't work, and as our people have been able to grow in the Lord and know His presence in their lives they become interested in winning their lost loved ones as well as other lost Indians to the Lord Jesus Christ.

We are seeking to prepare each one to find his own place in getting the gospel out. In our very simplest Bible lessons we try to teach them that one of their first responsibilities is to witness.

Are we seeing progress in this respect?

Yes, especially among our Santal men. All the men go out and witness, usually two or three at a time. They go from village to village and they have a very effective witness.

What is the status of other religions in India today?

I think there is real growth in interest in the Hindu religion, not that people didn't classify themselves as Hindus before, but once they did not care for the festivals and for taking part in them. Now there is real interest. If we as Free Will Baptists had been able to send in personnel for an all-out thrust during those days when Hinduism was in a real slump, it would be a different story today. The revival might have been in our own work rather than in the Hindu religion.

What is the greatest obstacle faced in missionary work in North India?

I feel that the greatest obstacle is the darkness of the hearts of the Indian people. They have been darkened by Satan, blinded by men, by heathenism so long that the first step is combating this spiritual blindness. They must be prepared to receive Christ as Saviour, and I believe this is accomplished by prayer as well as by living with the people and living before the people.

Do your people in North India experience a greater problem in spiritual growth than we here in America?

We hold up higher standards for our Christians in India than the average church does here in America. And I find that our people are much more willing to take their part in Christian service than the average American church member. It may be due to the fast way we live in America.

Those MEN WHOM God set forth as a pattern of what He expected Christians to be—the apostles—regarded prayer as the most important business of their lives.

When the multiplying responsibilities of the Early Church crowded in upon them, they "called the multitude of the disciples unto them, and said, It is not reason that we should leave the Word of God, and serve tables. Wherefore, brethren, look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business. But we will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the Word." It is evident from what Paul wrote to the churches and to individuals about praying for them, that much of his time and strength and thought were given to prayer.


