

FROM PAGE 1 divide the land and sell to his workers. As a result, many families now living in the village own their own land. Population is about 250.

Winding down the farm road leading to Albertina, the three of us—Dave Franks, my husband Bobby, and myself—prayed that the Holy Spirit would work through us and also that the rains would be stayed until after our return trip. We knew that rain would make the tiny road impassable.

We introduced ourselves to the villagers, sang a few hymns, and delivered a short message. The folks of Albertina invited us to return.

Hearing our Jeep station wagon bump over the rocky road as we returned each Wednesday evening, boys, girls, men, and women with babies in their arms would leave their small homes and walk down the dusty road to wait patiently for us to prepare our equipment for a service.

We showed filmstrips, played recorded hymns, preached to the people. They would tell us, "We want you to come back. We like the music, messages, filmstrips, and everything. But we do not understand."

THEN WE began to hold Sunday school on Sunday afternoons. Children were eager to hear flannelgraph stories. Some Sundays we had around 50 present.

After each service in which the gospel was presented, we prayed that the Holy Spirit would open their hearts to the Truth. And God answered our prayers.

Following one service, our hearts were overjoyed to see one of the men step out for Christ as the invitation was given following the message. Within a few weeks four others received Him.

Then we knew we were getting somewhere. Real trouble started.

The public school teacher began telling the children that if they attended our services she would not let them study any more at school. Most believed her and stayed away. She also led in demonstrations to interrupt services.

One Wednesday night someone put nails under our tires. Fortunately, a friend removed them. Rocks were placed in the road, and we had to move them before we could pass. There was talk of stoning us next time.

FOR A month, the Lord worked things so that we were unable to return to Albertina. Finally, we came once again to the village. We were unable to hold a service, but we found those who had been saved still faithful to Christ, and we had wonderful fellowship with them.

We also were thrilled to learn that the Christians had won another to Christ in our absence.

One of the Christian ladies invited us to hold services in her home, so the meetings have resumed. Our group of believers has grown to 11. Three of these have completed a new convert study course on the book of John and have begun to study the book of Acts. At least one of the girls has expressed interest in attending our Bible institute.

In the midst of seeing God build His Church even in the face of adversity, this verse has been proved to us once again, "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap if we faint not."

WHY NOT JUST BE CHRISTIANS?

IF THE CHURCH would only be the church—if Christians would only be Christians—nothing could halt our onward march. We are like the early Christians "behind closed doors for fear." We are smitten with an inferiority

complex.

The answer is not in church unification. We need not huddle together in self defense; we need to scatter in all directions preaching the Word. We have the answer to our problems and to everybody else's problems. We were here first. The early church faced a pagan civilization, but they did not meet it with panel discussions on Caesar and slavery. Paul did not join a symposium of pagan philosophers to discuss the problems of the times. Whittaker Chambers said, "Communism is no stronger than the failure of other faiths." All of our adversaries are no stronger than the failure of the church to rise to its duty.

a word from the general director

■ Missions is an essential, not a luxury. Obedience to the great commission is an integral part of church life. New churches in new areas, an outreach of the Department of Home Missions



and Church Extension, almost without exception have recognized this and are zealous in missionary support. The churches of New England, Canada, the North West, Alaska, and Hawaii have manifested a vision of world-wide evangelism. Special emphasis is being given this month to home missions. Our foreign ministry is dependent on the strength of our home front. We must have more large, strong churches at home to continue expanding our foreign program. No Free Will Baptist Church can afford to escape its missionary responsibility. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" can be spoken to the Church as well as to individual disciples. As we have given missions its proper emphasis, our denomination has increased at home and abroad. Missionary education begins in the local church in Sunday school classes and Church Training Service. From these will come our missionary personnel. There are missionary societies "crying" for called and qualified missionaries. The lack of workers and support is an indictment against an idle and rich Church in America. Again, MISSIONS IS AN ESSENTIAL, NOT A LUXURY. How long has it been since a real challenge for missions has come from the pulpit of your church? How long has it been since your heart had a real burden of prayer for your missionaries? How long has it been since you gave cheerfully to reach the uttermost? This is a ministry which involves every Christian. Our measure of concern for the multitudes without the gospel will largely determine our spiritual growth. We dare not let the things of earth dim our vision of the fields waiting for harvest. Our missionaries and the heathen multitudes are waiting for our response.
