It didn't take me long to find out that I was something special to them. As their friends came by they seemed so proud to introduce me. "This is Yuriko Chan," they would say. "She's a special gift from God!"

Then, inevitably, my firsttime visitor would put his hands beside his face and exclaim, "I can't believe it! She looks so much like Ayumi Chan!"

I heard the name Ayumi Chan many times. Slowly I was able to piece the story together and learn why I was so special.

Daddy loved her so much. But Mommie wasn't a Christian then. Daddy was, but it was difficult for him to walk with the Lord. Christians in our little village of Koshimizu, Japan, wanted to officially organize into a church, but they lacked qualified men for deacons. Daddy had become so frustrated by Mommie's skepticism and other problems we were having in our family that he certainly wasn't deacon material. In fact, he became very inconsistent in church attendance.

My brother Makoto Chan was born about a year after Mommie and Daddy married. Before Makoto was a year old, a sweet little girl was born. She was Ayumi Chan (Chan is an endearing term added to the name of all us children in Japan). From the way Mommie and Daddy speak of her, they loved her very much.

But when Ayumi Chan was only three months old, she became very sick. In less than a week, she died. This must have made Mommie and Daddy very sad. I'm sure they cried.

The little group of Christians held their first Christian funeral. A lot of Daddy's associates from the forestry office where he works were there. Many of them heard the gospel for the first time, Daddy says. Mommie heard, too, and as a result gave her heart to Jesus. She was baptized the same day the new Koshimizu Free Will Baptist Church was officially organized.


This made our home a Christian one. Daddy was like a new man, they say. He became a deacon in the new church. Ayumi Chan came to this world to do a big job, Daddy tells people. And she did it well. Now she is in heaven with Jesus.

In May of last year, I became the newest member of the Yasutomo Tanno family. Mommie and Daddy love me a whole lot. They say God has given them back their daughter. God is so good. He loves Mommie and Daddy. And me, too.

I don't remember much about Christmas last year. I was too little. But I'm really enjoying this one. Mommie and Daddy have told Makoto Chan and me the purpose of Christmas. God loved us so much, they said, that He sent His only Son to give His life to pay for people's sins.

God must love us a whole lot to have done that. Mommie and Daddy cried when Ayumi Chan died. But now they have me and that makes them very happy. They say that this is a picture of God's gift to men, that it took the death of God's son Jesus for people like Mommie and Daddy, Makoto Chan, me and you, too, to have new life.

I'm glad God gave me to Mommie and Daddy. And I'm glad God gave the gift of His Son for all of us. Mommie and Daddy say I will understand more about all this when I grow older. But I understand more than they think. I know God is good and that He loves me. He loves you, too. He must, because He gave us such a wonderful gift!



□ Today the October issue of *Heartbeat* reached my desk and I am always interested in your section entitled, "Out of My Heart." I was startled to read that 250,000 Free Will Baptists gave \$391,700 to foreign missions last year, which as you say comes out at about three cents per member per week.

I know that comparisons are odious, and you will pardon this observation, but I don't think Free Will Baptists should in any way fall behind our Alliance people for all of us are interested in missions.

However, you will be interested to know that our 65,000 Alliance people gave over \$5,000,000 for missions last year which comes out at around \$75 per member for every man, woman, and child in the C& MA. This as you can easily see represents an overall giving of \$1.45 per member per week. We estimate that perhaps \$200,000 was given by our Alliance people for projects outside the C&MA since a number of our Alliance young people are serving under other missions and much of their support is from C& MA sources, but it is not recorded by our society.

If the Alliance people can do this, so can Free Will Baptists. I throw the challenge out.

HOLY RATS AND COWS

A RAT IN INDIA consumes five kilos of grain a year. India's two and a half billion rats eat 12 million tons of grain annually, 20 percent of the country's food grains or the equivalent of all wheat sent from the United States to famine-ridden India in 1966. At the same time, average calorie intake per person per day is 1,000 less than that which is nutritionally healthy.

These statistics have prompted the Indian government to renew its efforts to exterminate rats, but the results so far have been disappointing. The government is meeting with the indifference if not the hostility of 50 million Hindus who push respect for animal life to the absurd. At Rajastaan, rats even have a temple to which faithful Hindus bring bowls of rice every day, being careful not to get their toes bitten. Hindus generate the same attitude toward monkeys, vultures and especially cows.

At the last census, India counted 176 million cows. Almost all of them are unproductive skeletons wandering freely in the streets. Any attempt to attack the problem meets violent resistence. Last month 150,000 Hindus rioted in New Delhi over the issue and left a trail of dead and wounded.

It is impossible to separate India's continuing social and economic crises from its culturally entrenched religious beliefs. Hindu, Moslem, Sikh, Jain, Parsi and Buddhist each pursues separate ways toward a common bondage of darkness.

As the largest religious group, Hinduism conditions much of Indian outlook. Belief in reincarnation permits even the lowliest to accept their present lot in the hope of improvements in the next life. It is the only hope many have, because the "god of this world hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them."

India's nearly half billion people, comprising one seventh of the world's population, are among the two billion souls on earth this Christmas who have never heard of the birth of the Savior. The Lord's command still stands. We are to tell "every creature" throughout "all the world" that the Messiah lives.

An American soft drink company has just announced that through use of computers they are planning for every person in the world to at least have a taste of their product by 1971. They are studying their distribution daily so that the world might be reached with their soft drink. Will Bible-believing people do less?

Savannah Pastor Named New DePutional Director

Nashville—The Rev. Henry Van Kluyve, pastor of the First Free Will Baptist church of Savannah, Ga., has been named to the newly created post of director of deputation.

The post was established by the board during semi-annual session in August to meet demands for greater coordination of an expanding missions conference program and itineraries of an increasing number of furloughing missionaries and new appointees.

The new position will free present Director of Conference Ministries Rufus Coffey to work exclusively in the field assisting pastors and local churches in missions education programs.

The 36-year old Van Kluyve has pastored the Savannah church since 1963 and has seen annual giving to missions causes average \$8,600 per year during his tenure. He will move his family to Nashville and assume his new duties no later than March 1.

Van Kluyve was converted in 1950 while serving in the U.S. Navy. He joined the Fairmount Park church in Norfolk that same year where, under the ministry of the Rev. W. A. Hales, he committed him-

self to active Christian ministry.

He married Virginia Hales, his pastor's daughter, in 1952. In 1953 he entered Free Will Baptist Bible College from where he was graduated with the B.A. degree in 1957.

The Van Kluyves have three children–Johnny, 10; Ricky, nine; and Cindy, four.

World Evangelism Meeting Underscores Responsibility To Proclaim Gospel to All

Berlin-The 1,200 delegates from more than 100 nations assembled here in Kongresshalle for the first World Congress on Evangelism closed their 10-day meeting with a pledge to bring the Christian gospel to the whole human race in this generation by every means "God has given to the mind and will of men."

The congress was sponsored by Christianity Today.

Delegates approvingly applauded a 1,000-word statement that declared, "On behalf of our fellowmen everywhere, whom we love and for whom our Savior died, we promise with renewed zeal and faithfulness to bear to them the Good News of God's saving grace to a sinful and lost humanity."

The statement rejected "the notion that men are unequal because of distinction of race or color. In the name of Scripture and of Jesus Christ we condemn racialism wherever it appears."

The statement held that today, as in the Reformation, Christians are being called upon to "set God's Word above man's word." It rejected "all theology and criticism that refuses to bring itself under the divine authority of Holy Scripture, and all traditionalism which weakens that authority by adding to the Word of God."

The first of these two denunciations appeared to be directed against liberal Protestantism, the second against Roman Catholicism.

"While not all who hear the gospel will respond to it," the statement concluded, "our responsibility is to see that every one is given the opportunity to decide for Christ."

The Rev. Oral Roberts, noted Pentecostal evangelist, typified delegate response, "I've been outpreached, outprayed and outorganized. I want to thank you for opening my eyes to the mainstream of Christianity and bringing me a little closer to the Lord."





'Out of My Heart' A Word from the General Director

J. Reford Wilson

THE MEANING OF CHRISTMAS • IF I ASKED, "What is the meaning of Christmas?" how would you answer? Is it the giving of gifts? • "If thou knewest the gift of God . . ." (John 4:10a). Jesus identified Himself as the "gift of God" to the woman of Samaria. She is a symbol of a degenerate society. Her sin of adultery was known to the Lord. Christ came to blot out her ugly past and to become the gift of her glorious future. This is the meaning of Christmas to me. • The woman of Samaria is a symbol of corrupt religion. She wanted to engage Jesus in a religious dialogue-Samaritans versus Jesus. He focused her attention on her personal need and the truth of God. It is easy to expend time and talent in pursuit of elusive answers to irrelevant questions and lose the opportunity of winning souls to Jesus. The Lord knew that what this woman needed most was not an answer to religious authority but a deliverance from satanic deception. The "gift of God" is a deliverer because He has conquered the adversary. This is the meaning of Christmas to me. • The woman of Samaria is a symbol of a fallen human race. "There is none righteous, no not one." I have seen her kind in Japan, India, Spain, France, Panama, Brazil, Israel, Africa and in your town, U.S.A. The "gift of God" is for all men because all men need Jesus. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Christmas has no real significance until you discover yourself as the "whosoever." It becomes even more significant as you remember that all men *perish* who do not know Christ. • The woman at the well made this discovery and became the symbol of all missionaries. She went into the city inviting others to Christ. This is the meaning of Christmas to me. It is the most wonderful time to fulfill our missionary responsibility. You can tell those near you and through your missionaries you can tell others abroad of the "gift of God."
