Call-a-thon Sunday for foreign missions was observed April 21 throughout the country. Response was much better, in many ways, than the previous years. Even though the amount called in was \$56.25 less than that reported by phone in 1973, the grand total at last check including both calls and offerings was \$19,476.17.

In 1973 a total of 181 churches reported \$15,003.28 by telephone while this year's response was \$14,947.03 with 193 churches making calls. From all indications, more churches were involved this year than in any previous year. (Official statistics were not available at press time to confirm this statement.)

The largest offering called in was \$687.91 given by Mt. Calvary Free Will Baptist Church, Hookerton, N.C. North Carolina had the highest state total given to Call-a-thon: \$2,243.52. Tennessee had the most participating churches with 28 churches calling.



#### combs to begin furlough

Campinas, Brazil—Jim and Shirley Combs, recent survivors of the disastrous flood in Tubarao, Brazil, will be arriving in the United States for early furlough some time in the early part of June.

Since the group with whom they had been working is now so scattered, the Combs were counseled to begin early furlough. This action seemed to be more advisable than reequipping and refurnishing for a one year ministry.

#### confusion causes concern

Uberaba, Brazil—Missionary Louis Coscia has expressed concern over a "far-out" religious group which has started a work about one block from their rented hall. The group, a mixture of Catholicism, spiritism, and Protestantism, is reportedly causing confusion and has apparently been damaging to all of the evangelical churches in the city.

The group uses a healing emphasis to appeal to a large segment of society.

#### news briefs

Jaboticabal, Brazil—A weekend retreat was held here near the end of March with approximately 50 high school and college students attending from five different cities. Four Bible studies a day were conducted.

Tokyo, Japan—Fred Hersey has requested prayer for special services which will be held at the Iriso church June 14-16.

Kitami, Japan—Wesley Calvery has rented a building here and will be preaching here twice a month.

Rivera, Uruguay—Molly Barker reports a "small but profitable Bible school was held recently in Santa Teresa." Four nationals taught and helped in the school. The offering was sent to the Pinkertons' missionary account.

Barbacena, Brazil—Listeners of Bobby Aycock's radio broadcasts who live in the nearby town of Caradai have sought to convince the Aycocks to open a work in their town of approximately six thousand people.
