#### persecution strengthens faith

Bouna, Ivory Coast—Christians in the village of Ngatokro have suffered persecution because they refused to observe the fetish sacrifice days. The chief ordered them to leave the village immediately or be beaten.

"To be forced to leave their fields before harvest, to have their families reject them, to be mocked and ridiculed continually seemed a heavy load," writes Norman Richards. "But they committed this situation to God and trusted Him to work it out for His glory. And He did!"

Norman indicated permission was granted for them to remain in the village. Attendance increased noticeably for both the Bible class on Sunday and the Moody Bible filmstrip showings on Monday nights. The Christians became spiritually stronger as a result of the persecution.

#### distressed over mishap

Rennes, France—Jerry and Barbara Gibbs, who moved here in September to begin their ministry, have been distressed due to a simple mishap while moving a piece of furniture they bought at an auction. A plank came loose, slid down some steps, and hit an elderly lady on the leg.

Reason for distress: The lady has phlebitis and the Gibbs are concerned that the family might seek a

## medical missions need help

Nashville, Tenn.—Medical mission work has been severely handicapped due to restrictions by Internal Revenue Code legislation of 1969. Large corporations which deal in medical supplies can no longer take income tax deductions on fair market value of goods donated. Overhead, packaging, handling, transportation, etc., thus became extra expenses for the corporations and have greatly limited donations.

Five identical bills have been introduced in Congress to permit corporations to have an income-tax deduction of 50 percent of the excess of fair market value on goods donated to medical agencies. Those interested in helping to insure pass-

MAP has supplied medicines, instruments, equipment, bandages, etc., since the beginning of the Free Will Baptist medical ministry in the Ivory Coast.

Missionary LaVerne Miley, M.D., says, "Supplies available to us have decreased. However, the number of patients continues to increase. I see no way to minister adequately to these medically deprived people."

The identical bills in Congress are HR 1690, 5845, 6233, 8200, and 8293.

## french layman to africa

Rennes, France—Aroused by the need for school teachers and Christian witness in West Africa, Gerard, a French school professor in the church here, moved to Bondoukou, lvory Coast. He is now employed as a teacher in the public school where he witnesses for Christ. He is also actively involved in the ministry of limmy and Janie Aldridge.

Gerard was converted under the ministry of Missionary Joe Haas. His positive response has given the church in Rennes a new sense of involvement. And, according to information received from the Aldridges, the attitude and cooperation demonstrated by the young professor have proven to be outstanding. His ability in art is expected to make a great contribution to the ministry in Bondoukou.

#### thirteen decisions

Tokyo, Japan—Special evangelistic services were conducted October 16-19 in the Iriso church here by Gombei Uchikoshi, pastor of the Sapporo church. Missionary Fred Hersey reported many decisions during the services, thirteen for salvation.

A ladies' luncheon at the church initiated the meeting on Thursday, October 16, with 37 women, three men, and 15 children attending. Seven people made decisions at the close of that service.

At other services during the week more decisions were reported. A high school chemistry teacher, Mr. Kazama, responded to the invitation to receive Christ. A woman who had been involved in a cult movement decided to trust Jesus. Counseled by Fred Hersey, she agreed to destroy her idol. She called Fred later to inform him she had burned the image.

According to Fred, evidence indicates many of these decisions were genuine. The chemistry teacher, for example, has expressed interest in his wife's salvation so they might have a Christian home. Others have testified of their salvation in Christ.

Nashville, Tenn.—The semi-annual meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions is scheduled for December 8-11 at the Free Will Baptist national office building here.

Agua Buena, Panama—Christians from the church here have launched a new work in the area of La Cabima located between Panama City and Agua Buena. This work is being conducted totally by the Panamanian Christians.

Barbacena, Brazil—Jim Sturgill reports decisions were made recently by a couple who had come to him for marriage counseling after hearing the radio program. Pray for the follow-up work with this couple.

Koun, Ivory Coast—Andre, a recent convert, is the only Christian in his village. Norman Richards disclosed

Panama City, Panama—A recent letter from Mabel "Mom" Willey expressed hope that permission might be granted by the Cuban government for someone to attend the annual Free Will Baptist convention in Cuba during the month of February, 1976. Prayer has been requested that this possibility might become a reality.

Nashville, Tenn.—According to a recent report in The Church Around The World, oil-rich Arab/Muslim countries are using their new wealth to promote Islam. Recipients of Arab foreign aid must agree to uphold Muslim traditions. Christian penetration of Arab populations has been minimal.

Koun, Ivory Coast—Norman Richards reported he recently began a Bible class in the public school at Koun-fao on Saturday afternoons. Between 150 and 200 have been attending.

Rennes, France—Several people have been saved during recent weeks in the church here. One recent convert is the owner of a rental agency in Rennes, Joe Haas revealed. He is reportedly very active in witnessing for the Lord.

#### family retreat

Conselheiro Lafaiete, Brazil—A family retreat was held November 15 on a farm near here as a combined effort by the local congregation and the church in Barbacena. This was the first time the two groups had met together for any type of fellowship. The day featured preaching, singing, and youth and children's activities.

A total of 83 persons attended the event; 42 of these traveled from Barbacena by chartered bus.
