

J. Reford Wilson Resigns After Serving 13¹/₂ Years





They sat stunned for a few moments! Silence pervaded the conference room! The Board of Foreign Missions had just been handed a letter of resignation by General Director of Foreign Missions, J. Reford Wilson. Board and staff alike were unprepared for the shock.

But after collecting composure, receiving a few minutes of explanation, and having been given the assurance by "the chief" that he would not reconsider, the board "reluctantly" accepted his resignation with "deep appreciation and commendation" for his faithful and untiring service at the helm of the Free Will Baptist foreign missionary force.

J. Reford Wilson, thought of by many missionaries as their "pastor," has served in the capacity of General Director since 1962—13½ years. He acknowledged the difficulty he felt in leaving this "pastorate," and he expressed gratitude to the National Association of Free Will Baptists for their faith and trust in him, to the Board of Foreign Missions for their cooperation and consideration, to the staff and missionaries for the privilege of serving with them, to his family for understanding the demands of his ministry, and to all who have stood behind him through the years for their prayers and friendship.

Then, he gave this explanation: "I am very conscious of my inabilities to meet the growing complexities of administering the affairs of our tremendous world-wide ministries. After much prayer in seeking divine leadership and in consultation with my family, I have discerned that this is the time for me to submit my resignation. I am confident that

Although he has long desired to teach missions, he stated, "I thought my day of opportunity had passed." When he was confronted with the possibility of fulfilling this desire, he was forced to consider it seriously. It was after this prayerful deliberation that he decided to accept the position as Professor of Missions and Bible at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Moore, Okla. In that position he hopes to continue influencing people for world-wide evangelism.

Termination date for Mr. Wilson as the leader of the foreign missions department has been set at July 31, 1975. His successor has not yet been chosen, but the board is seeking and screening men who would have the potential to fill the vital role.

Barbacena, Brazil-Ten people, including two married couples, were baptized here on April 6 by Missionary Bobby Aycock. He noted that a special dedication service was conducted the same evening for the baby of one of the baptized couples.

In the same communication, Bobby indicated that three more people had made decisions recently. These included a thirteen-year-old girl, a neighbor lady, and the wife of a man already attending the church.

Two men were recently appointed to act as a commission to work closely with the missionary. They were set apart in a special prayer of consecration during a Sunday eve-

Livramento, Brazil-Revival fires continue to burn on the Brazil-Uruguay border. Last month's Heartbeat reported a spontaneous revival in Santa Teresa, Uruguay. Reporting on a number of other recent meetings Walter (Dub) Ellison gave these results:

The meeting with Bobby Aycock (previously reported) showed 47 decisions, 12 of which were first-time commitments. Next was the meeting at Santa Teresa which resulted in approximately 50 decisions. Following this, Dub went to Palomas with Wilson Krenn, national worker in
