Board Approves Seven New Missionary Candidates

The Board of Foreign Missions met here May 3-6 in their annual session. The approval of seven missionary candidates for Missionary Internship this fall and the final appointment of six missionary candidates to missionary service were among the most significant actions taken by the board.

Those approved to begin Missionary Internship included Ledgel Ferguson of Blaine, Ky.; Tom McCullough of Detroit, Mich.; Charolette Tallent of St. Louis, Mo.; John and Pansy Mur-ray of Hampton, Va.; and Jim and Karen Cowart of Nashville, Tenn.

Ron and Linda Callaway of Virginia and North Carolina were appointed to Spain. Jim and Susan Moser of Washington and South Carolina were appointed to the field of Brazil. Clint and Lynette Morgan of North Carolina and Illinois were appointed to serve in Ivory Coast.

Due to a change in circumstances which would have called for a teaching position in Japan the board decided to inform Miss Mirial Gainer that her candidacy be discontinued for the present.

Mirial, who recently completed Missionary Internship training was encouraged to seek private employment as a teacher in Japan with the possibility of entering a relationship with the board as an

associate missionary.
Other action by the board included the finalization of a \$1,415,865 budget for 1977 which will be submitted for final approval to the National Association in Tulsa, Okla.

Nantes, France—Don and Billie Sexton have initiated services here and report a total of 14 adults attended on April 4, the second or third Sunday since they began.

Bondoukou, Ivory Coast—Jimmy Aldridge recently assisted in a two-week campaign to reach new villages. Two Koulango evangelists, Anani Victor and Tea Koffi Theodore, as well as at least seven laymen from Bondoukou and Kpanan and several students from Bondoukou took part in the effort.

franks baptizes four

Conselheiro Lafaiete, Brazil—Missionary Dave Franks informed the mission office that he baptized four people here on Easter Sunday. "Three of them were young men, two of which are studying with us in our special instruction classes," writes Dave. "The fourth was the mother of four who were baptized last year."

Franks related that students from their special training classes recently participated in house-to-house visitation for their first time. "They came back from the visitation excited about the new experience," Dave continued. "This is part of the practical work in my personal evangelism class."

In the same correspondence Dave indicated the possibility of arriving

in the United States earlier than last reported. They hope to arrive in the United States some time near the end of June.

russian believers speak out

Europe—Earlier reports which indicated Russian Christians were dissatisfied with Christian mission radio broadcasting evidently did not give the whole story according to Center for Study of Religion and Communism. Actually Russian believers call programs "fountain of life." They report "millions of believers," including many government Nicodemuses "who listen in the privacy of their own room."

Eastern European Mission broadcaster Earl Poysti reports that Russian Christians estimate "at least a million" people have found Christ through radio programs since they began.

workshop to be held

Farmington, Mich.—Missionary Internship is to host a workshop in late summer for Christian personnel who anticipate overseas service with secular corporations. The workshop is designed to provide orientation for Christian men and women who, because they do not bear the title "missionary," may not have had the opportunity of specific Christian

training for cross-cultural service.

Although the date has not officially been set, the workshop will probably be held the second and third weeks of August, according to the MI announcement. Persons interested may write to Missionary Internship, Box 457, Farmintgon, Mich. 48204.

decision percentage high

Brazil—While 85 percent of Brazil's 100 million people are claimed by the Roman Catholic Church, few attend mass; and witchcraft controls 20 percent of the people. Reports by Campus Crusade workers indicate that over half the Brazilians who hear a personal presentation of the gospel receive Christ.

missionaries asked to leave

Lima, Peru—The Peruvian government has ordered 227 members of the Wycliffe Summer Institute of Linguistics to leave the country by 1977, a recent news report disclosed.

Liberation theology, nationalism, CIA revelations, rivalry of Peruvian linguists, and anthropologists have all been cited as contributing to the order issued by the government. Wycliffe's SIL expects to finish 10 or 11 New Testaments by the end of this year, making work in jungle areas 95% finished after 30 years.
