

Ivory Coast—The annual fellowship conference of Free Will Baptist churches in the Ivory Coast met at Goumere July 12-15 according to a belated report from Robert Bryan. Approximately 125 people attended from three language groups: Lobi, Koulango, and Mossi. A special guest at this year's meeting was the Sousprefet (governor) of the region. This was the first time any government official ever visited the conference.

Four evangelists had their licenses renewed for the coming year: Daniel Yamyego, Koffi Theodore Thya, Kouadjo Jean-Baptiste Kouman, and Jonas Tchenon.

Boating Mishap Takes Lives of Youth Leaders

Japan—Two young Japanese men, youth leaders from Airin Chapel in Sapporo, lost their lives in a tragic boating accident on August 1. Peter Fujii and Sugio Harada were mysteriously drowned in a deep crater lake near Sapporo when they went out in a rowboat.

Peter Fujii attended Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville during the 1973 school year. He returned to Japan and continued to study in a small Bible school in Sapporo. He had completed his second year and married one of the students this past spring. The couple had just returned from Hong Kong where they had hopes of preparing for evangelism among the Chinese.

Young Harada was a third-year student at Sapporo University and was very active in the work at Airin Chapel. He served as president of the young people's group, was a member of a gospel folk music group from the church, and was active in coffee shop evangelism.

A special memorial service was held at Airin Chapel on Saturday evening, August 7.

At last report the bodies had not been recovered.

vangelism Seminars Set for Ivorian Christians

Ivory Coast—One-week evangelism seminars will be held in eight different centers of the Ivory Coast this year, reports Robert Bryan. The program was devised by the missionary educational committee and three members of the Ivory Coast Free Will Baptist churches who met together.

At last report plans were not detailed but tentatively included classes on methods of evangelism, how to approach people, Bible memorization, personal evangelism, and strategy for reaching new villages. Plans considered include prayer time, study time, and team involvement in going to a new village.

Prayer was requested for their complete recovery and for the repair of their vehicle.


The Mileys have only been in the Ivory Coast since late August.

The converts who have been instructed in the Word are beginning to win others," he declared. "During the month of July there were six professions of faith, and five of these were directly related to the personal witnessing of the believers."
