Columbia, Mo.—Howard Filkins, missionary to Ivory Coast, returned to the States recently and underwent knee surgery in the Veterans' Hospital here on October 21. A previous injury during military service combined with this recent injury made removal of the cartilage necessary.

With doctors' assurance that Howard should have a quick recovery, the Filkins planned to return by early December to their ministry as dorm parents at the Ivorv Coast Academy in Bouake.

Furlough Home Provided for Deeds Family

Tulsa, Okla.—Earnie and Jean Deeds expressed praise to the Lord recently for the East Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church members and their pastor, R. D. Hester, who have provided them a furlough home.

"The East Tulsa members not only decided to pay the rent for us, but, together with some other churches, have furnished it, even to stocking the cabinets and refrigerator with groceries," Earnie declared.

I arrived in Japan," reflects Mirial Gainer from her ministry in Sapporo, Japan, "but now I face another challenging year working for the Lord both in Hokkaido International School and in the mission."

In addition to her many activities as teacher and librarian at the school, Mirial has been conducting English classes two nights a week at Airin Chapel and has been helping in the church's coffee shop ministry. At the Kita Hiroshima church, where Jerry Banks pastors, Miss Gainer plays the organ for the worship services and assists in the Sunday school.

Mirial requested prayer for Miss Nakano, a student in her English class, who is seeking the Lord but has made no decision as yet. She also noted that Martha Muramoto, who returned this year to Japan after attending Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tenn., has continued her studies in English in order to be more effective in translation work for the mission.

Construction of the Barbacena church is underway with the foundation and baptistry completed. "We are planning to use our new baptistry in an open-air service soon," writes Aycock. "We have 14 people to baptize."

November 2 marked the "day of the dead" in Brazil, a holiday when families visit the gravesites of their loved ones. The Barbacena church organized a special effort to reach the community on that day. Two thousand copies of the Gospel of John were given out and cassette players with gospel messages and songs were located at the distribution points.

Amid these activities the Aycocks have been hindered with health problems: Bobby has a slipped disc in his back and Sue has been suffering from rheumatism and a kidney infection. They requested prayer regarding these problems.

Sparks' first baptismal service in Alcala was conducted in the afternoon with six people participating. After a church dinner and time of fellowship, the allday services were concluded with a film in the evening.

Acting as advisor to the Agua Buena church, Steve recently taught a series of leadership training classes on evangelism. At the conclusion of the classes the church went out in the community to witness. Ten new people were in Sunday school the following Sunday and an elderly man gave his heart to the Lord.

"The Lord has also given us an opportunity to help train some of our Panamanian brethren individually," Steve noted. "Martin, a young Christian from the Agua Buena church, comes to our home each week for Bible classes. Three young ladies come every Monday for training in teaching, Christian living, etc."

eading Room Serves to Open New Doors

Ivory Coast—In recent correspondence from Sarah Mayhew, she urged people to pray for the work in Tanda where they have opened a reading room in an effort to reach collegians, Muslims, Catholics, etc. with the gospel.

"If we can just reach those collegians for the Lord," writes Sarah, "He can use them to evangelize their villages." Many of the students speak English, and they like to practice on the missionaries. This affords other opportunities of witness.

Plans are being made to use filmstrips at night and flannelgraph presentations in the afternoon at Tanda. The door "is really wide open" says Sarah. "Six people could work out from there and have separate ministries."
