easles, Diseases Add to Hospital Work

Ivory Coast—"Measles have really attacked the kids here this season," reports Sherwood Lee from the hospital in Doropo, Ivory Coast. "Yet as the season for one disease ends, another starts."

Sherwood and Dr. Miley have been very busy at the hospital since the doctor's recent return to Doropo. "We have in-patients now and see about 90 each day for consultations," Lee writes. Three days a week he teaches nursing classes for a few African Christians who help at the clinic. In coming months plans include giving the people some practical training in public health.

A recent opportunity opened at the prison in Bouna to begin Bible classes and a reading class. "There are approximately 30 for each Bible class and I have never seen a group of people more eager to learn," Lee writes. Koffi David, an African Free Will Baptist pastor, has also been allowed to hold services at the prison on Sundays.

Banks Expresses Need for Special Prayer

Japan—"The Kita Hiroshima church has been extra busy the past few weeks," Jerry Banks reports. Among the activities was a two-day children's meeting featuring Sesame Street "Muppets," film evangelism in a rented building, and a two-day meeting at the church with a young Japanese evangelist.

"Never before have we needed your prayers as much as now," continues Banks. "Jan recently had surgery and is still weak and unable to function normally." Further treatment may be necessary since the surgery was apparently unsuccessful in relieving her leg pains.

Jerry and Janice also request prayer as they assume full responsibility for the work when the McLains begin furlough in June. Also, they will be without Japanese helper, Ben Abe, who is returning to college. The Banks have considered Ben to be a definite asset as they have continued to struggle with the language.



Nashville, Tenn.—The Board of Foreign Missions met May 2-5 at the National Offices building here for their annual session with all nine board members present. Business activities included the following:

John and Pansy Murray and Charolette Tallent were officially appointed to France; Ledgel and Sharon Ferguson were appointed to Ivory Coast contingent upon a satisfactory medical report on a hearing problem which Ledgel is experiencing; and Jim and Karen Cowart were appointed to serve in Brazil.

These candidates were approved for Missionary Internship training this fall: Mike and Deleen Cousineau, recent graduates of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Oklahoma, candidates for Ivory Coast; and Dennis and Trena Owen of Florida, aspiring to go to Brazil.

Also approved to enter Missionary Internship training was Elaine Allen but she will not begin her MI course until the fall of 1978 following a year of nursing experience.

The board adopted Handbook regulations which officially set into operation the Associate Missionary program.

A budget of \$1,685,600 was adopted to be finally approved at the National Association in Detroit.

The board interviewed returned missionaries Joe and Barbara Haas, Jim Sturgill, and Bobby Poole in addition to missionary candidates.

Due to inflationary problems around the world, a new missionary salary system was adopted to alleviate personal needs which many missionaries are facing. This new system will be effective July 1, 1977. The board expressed hope that churches and individuals who support these missionaries will consider increasing their giving to help meet these needs.

A rising vote of appreciation was given to churches in the L troit, Mich., area which sponsored and assisted those in Missionary Internship.

A rising vote of thanks and commendation was given to General Director Rolla Smith.

A special project, labeled "Cuban Project," was approved.

Board officers remained the same: Raymond Riggs, chairman; James Murray, vice-chairman; and Eugene Waddell, secretary.

all-a-thon Results Lower than 1976 Total

Nashville, Tenn. — Twenty-five states, two individuals, and one foreign country participated in Call-a-thon Sunday, April 17, by phoning the foreign missions department to acknowledge their offerings.

For the second year in a row, the largest Call-a-thon gift was reported by Reverend Winston Sweeney, pastor of Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church in Kingsport, Tenn. Their special gift totaled \$4,181.

Tennessee was highest in the number of churches participating in Call-a-thon with 20 responding to the special appeal.

Missionary Don Sexton called from France to inform the missions office that the Rennes and Nantes churches had given \$650 for the Call-a-thon project. This is the first time that a foreign country has participated.

Although the final figure for 1977 Call-a-thon is expected to be much higher, the latest total showed \$16,017.22 reported by 117 churches. This was much lower than the 1976 total of \$25,574.19 given by 206 churches in 23 states.

"I teach full-time at Hokkaido International School, have a preschool English program for Japanese children after school, teach English classes two nights a week at Airin Chapel, and spend Friday nights in the coffee shop ministry which is led by several Airin Chapel members," writes Mirial.

Miss Gainer is presently studying Japanese, one lesson weekly, but plans to study full-time this summer in an intensive language course. "After that, I should be able to take more responsibility in the work," she added.

om Willey, Jr. Visits Cuban Churches

Cuba—Tom Willey, Jr. spent 14 days in April on the island of Cuba visiting Free Will Baptist churches, his first visit to that field since his family was unable to return in 1961 after Castro's army took over the government.

Tom indicated the national church is continuing to grow, and is larger today than it was prior to the new regime in spite of the fact that two-thirds of the membership was lost—one-third to the exodus immediately after the change and one-third due to lack of perseverance.

Several items are needed by

the Cuban churches, and Tom i dicated prospects for their r ceiving these items are excellent if they are sent through proper channels. As a result of this need, the Board of Foreign Missions has approved a special project to supply mimeograph equipment, paper, and other needed items. Those desiring to contribute are urged to designate their gift for the **Cuban Project**.
