Brazil—Special services were held on Good Friday, April 1, at the Araras Free Will Baptist Church as the Association of Free Will Baptists in Brazil honored 25 years of FWB ministry in that country.

"Remembering, reminiscing, and learning about the bygone years proved to be a blessing as we could mentally picture the whole puzzle being filled in piece by piece," writes Geneva Poole. "The struggles and blessings, strengths and weaknesses, the defeats and victories, the failures and accomplishments, all give a picture somewhat marred by human failure, yet beautiful because it pictured what God has done to build His church."

Dave Franks, first missionary to Brazil, spoke during the worship hour challenging Free Will Baptists to grow, to become involved, and to be united in order to produce more for the Lord's glory.

Immediately following lunch, a c'rama was presented, picturing what Christ did at Calvary and how that message gives hope. Slides were shown, presenting the first missionaries and the beginning of the Free

Will Baptist works. Representatives from 12 of the works gave reports of history and progress over the years. Seven young men, all in training for the ministry, gave their testimonies.

Catons Resign After Two Terms in Spain

Nashville, Tenn.-After two terms of service in Majadahonda, Spain, Dock and Norma Caton will be following a new avenue of ministry. The Catons submitted their resignation to the Board of Foreign Missions during the May session in Nashville.

Dock and Norma are considering a cross-cultural ministry in the U.S. with a vision toward opening a new field abroad sometime in the future. Basic reasons for their resignation stemmed from philosophical differences with the Spanish field council regarding their ministry on the field.

The Catons have been encouraged by the board to explore different areas in the States where numerous Spanish-speaking immigrants have taken up residence, and they have been urged to maintain their use of the Spanish language.

During the 90 days following submission of their resignation, Dock will be doing limited deputational work in

addition to exploring these new areas of opportunity. Dock and Norma have requested people to help them close out their account in the black.

The Catons first went to Spain in July of 1974. They returned to the States this year in February and are currently residing in Tulsa, Okla.

Brazil—In January, missionary Dave Franks baptized 13 people from the Barbacena Free Will Baptist Church, and he baptized four people from Conselheiro Lafaiete on March 27. Franks is overseeing these two works while starting a new work in the city of Belo Horizonte, Brazil.

According to recent correspondence from the Franks, Dave conducted a Bible conference March 16-20 at the Barbacena church. He presented a study from the book of Galatians. One person was saved and 10 others rededicated their lives to Christ.

A neighbor of the Franks family in Belo Horizonte, a young lady, made a

Betania Church Holds VBS; 10 Children Saved

Panama—The Betania Free Will Baptist Church, in a suburb of Panama City, Panama conducted Vacation Bible School March 14-18 with an average attendance of 35 for the week. According to Steve Lytle, 10 children accepted Christ as their personal Savior.

"We held commencement on March 20," writes Steve. "Sixty-three people were there, including several adults for the first time."

Steve reports having baptized six people on March 6.

A special anniversary service was scheduled for May 14 to commemorate the beginning of the Betania work seven years ago under the ministry of Bill Fulcher.

150 Attend Christian Film at St. Nazaire

France—According to a report from Tom McCullough, 150 people, including 90 boys from an area Catholic high school, attended a Christian film showing in February at St. Nazaire.

Tom reported having distributed 4,000 invitations and having placed ads in the local newspapers to announce the film showing. Then, they gave out gospel booklets to those who attended the film.

McCullough also advised the mission office that a booth for Christian

literature was set up at a city commercial fair during the month of March. "We talked to at least three people at length about Jesus Christ and the plan of salvation and passed out 500 tracts," Tom stated.

A city-wide literature distribution campaign has been scheduled for the summer while Paul Creech, summer missionary, is there to help.

Construction Under Way at Last in Tanda, I.C.

Ivory Coast—A ground-breaking service was held at Tanda on the Sunday before Easter, and workers began digging the foundations during that week. According to Robert Bryan, the block building is expected to be usable in September.

"When finished, the building will measure 36 feet by 59 feet and should accommodate 125-150 people," Bryan stated. It will include two classrooms which can also be used as overflow rooms for the main auditorium.

"Though construction costs have gone up considerably recently," says Robert, "it appears that the church has enough money on hand to complete the first phase of this construction: getting the walls up and the roof on."

Brazil—Louis and Florine Coscia acknowledged God's protecting hand recently as they reported a bombing incident in the Uberaba church in Brazil.

In other news, the Coscias acknowledged confirmation by the doctor in a Campinas clinic that Louis does have glaucoma, cataracts, and disease of the cornea in both eyes. He is using medication which they hope will keep all three conditions under control.

Elaine Allen Reports on Lobi Conference

Ivory Coast—Missionary Elaine Allen reports having attended the annual Lobi Conference in Upper Volta during the latter part of March. Elaine accompanied 24 other people from the Doropo church in Ivory Coast.

More than 1,000 people, including 800 adults and approximately 250 children, attended the annual event. The theme of the conference centered around the return of Christ and, according to Miss Allen, several people went forward for prayer following each service.

"Many of the people sacrificed to come," writes Elaine. "One village did

not have the money for transportation, so they walked. It took them three days to get there. By this you can see that they are eager to hear the Word of God."

Elaine noted that one young man from Doropo was really touched by the message and indicated a willingness to serve the Lord with all his heart. She requested prayer for Jerome.

Miss Allen is scheduled to begin furlough from the Ivory Coast in late summer.

14 Iriso Young People Attend Special Retreat

Japan—According to a report from Fred Hersey, 14 young people from the Iriso Free Will Baptist Church in the Tokyo area of Japan attended a special retreat on March 20-21. Fred was the special speaker for the occasion.

Hersey noted a young high school student, Tokunaga, recently made a profession of faith. He urged prayer for her spiritual growth.

A Christian woman from the church recently led her children to accept Christ. "Now we pray the husband will be saved." Fred concluded.

\$8,000 Needed Soon for Brazil Dormitory

Brazil—The urgent need for a boys' dormitory at the camp property in Jaboticabal, Brazil has challenged three masonry men (Master's Men) from Arkansas. The Reverend Ronnie Whitten, Johnny Fowlks, and his brother Ronnie Fowlks have volunteered to go to Brazil at their own

expense during January and construct this building. Any others skilled in masonry who would be interested in doing the same have been urged to contact the Department of Foreign Missions.

Costs of building materials have been estimated at \$8,000. These funds must be raised before the workers can go to the field.
