Jean-Baptiste Succumbs; Notes of Victory Sounded

Ivory Coast—Approximately 500 people from villages throughout the Bondoukou Circle of Ivory Coast attended funeral and burial services on Sunday, August 21 for national pastor Jean-Baptiste (John the Baptist) in the village of Taoudi. Baptiste died at 1:20 a.m. Saturday, August 20, in Bondoukou after having suffered for several months due to kidney failure.

According to reports from missionaries on the field, the Christians and missionaries spent the night prior to burial singing, testifying, and preaching. "I sensed an atmosphere of victorious joy more than grief and sadness," writes missionary Alice Smith. For the benefit of the pagans present, Bondoukou pastor Anany Victor explained the significance of the body in the casket and the fact that Jean (John) was not in the casket but with the Lord.

"Not one prayer was prayed during the funeral," says Alice. "John's future had been taken care of." African culture would call for seeking to appease the fetish, etc. so the dead could join the ancestors.

Following Victor's message, Jimmy Aldridge preached. He reminded listeners that over the years Jean had bicycled miles into the bush to preach until his voice sometimes gave out. Then he related that God had chosen to permanently heal the young preacher of all illnesses rather than grant the partial, temporary healing for which Christians had prayed.

Teresa, John's widow, stood faithfully by her husband during his final months. She testified at his burial, giving evidence of her faith and trust in Christ. This was in great contrast to lvory Coast pagan custom.

The Bondoukou Free Will Baptist Church assumed responsibility for funeral expenses and committed themselves to provide for the widow and her six-year-old son, Gideon, as the Bible directed.

Jean-Baptiste was one of only three ordained FWB preachers from the lvory Coast.

Hanna Reports on South India Work, Urges Prayer

India—Following a visit to the South India work, Carlisle Hanna reports, "Three of our churches there are doing well. Our Immanuel Free Will Baptist Church in Kotagiri is without a pastor. Please pray with us and with them for the pastor they need."

Carlisle noted he was able to attend and speak at the opening of both of the Free Will Baptist schools there on June 20.

Bryans Victims of Thieves But Culprits Caught

Ivory Coast—Thieves in the Ivory Coast took advantage of missionaries Robert and Judy Bryan during the month of June:

While the Bryans were in Abidjan, thieves broke into their car and stole their cassette player and speakers. During the same period, someone burglarized their home in Tanda and stole some glasses, cutlery and food from their freezer. Thieves returned a second and third time about a week apart and stole a total of about \$330 in cash and personal items worth over \$300.

In August, Robert revealed the thieves had been caught and were in jail at Bondoukou awaiting trial.

"We recovered almost all the articles stolen and about 80 percent of the money," writes Robert. "The two thieves are two young men who have been quite active in the youth group at church."

Eagletons Commemorate 25 Years Serving in Brazil

Brazil—Approximately 90 people were present at the Araras Free Will Baptist Church in Brazil on July 3 to commemorate 25 years of missionary service by Ken and Marvis Eagleton.

The special service included a baby dedication, a message, and slides demonstrating the family's involvement in the ministry of Free Will Baptists in Brazil. Three of the Eagletons' four sons were born in Brazil.

According to Ken, three people from Araras made decisions for Christ during July: two of these following Sunday night services and one during camp. Two college men were among those making decisions.

The second semester of Bible institute classes in Araras began August 4, following winter vacation through the month of July.

Ellisons Rent Hall, Get Permanent Documents

Uruguay—Missionaries Walter and Marcia Ellison reported in late July having signed a contract for a meeting hall in Montevideo, Uruguay.

"We are still meeting in our livingroom, but have already signed a contract for a nice second-floor place with a nice terrace where we can have Bible classes in the warmer months," write the Ellisons. "One reason we had such a trying time finding a place was that folks in our neighborhood are 'thumbs down' on the Mormons, and as we were American and religious, they put us in the same category."

The Ellisons noted that their neighborhood was without a single evangelical church. On the other hand, the Jehovah's Witnesses, the Mormons, the Catholics, and an ecumenical church can be found. "Also if you look about 12 blocks down the street, on the beach, you will find remains of spiritist activity broken bottles, dead chickens, fruit, flowers, etc.," the Ellisons concluded.

Walter and Marcia reported having finally received their permanent documents for residence in Uruguay. These came after many days of waiting in line, filling out forms, etc., but the Ellisons were praising the Lord for their papers.

Tokyo Area FWB Churches Join for Mountain Retreat

Japan—The Iriso and Tokyo Free Will Baptist churches met together August 13-15 in the mountains above the city for a special retreat. Twenty-two people attended the event.

According to missionary Fred Hersey, he and pastor Bonde did the preaching.

"I felt impressed to give a challenge, especially to the young people to fully surrender everything to the Lord," writes Fred. "A few decisions were made. At a testimony meeting later one of the young men said that it was the first time he had been challenged personally."

280 Professions of Faith Recorded in Tanda

Ivory Coast—According to missionary Robert Bryan, the evangelistic campaign held July 26-31 in Tanda, Ivory Coast netted more than 280 professions of faith in Christ as Savior.

"Now we're trying to follow up on these people and we're finding that follow-up is much more difficult than evangelism!" writes Bryan. "We had 48 in church yesterday morning and more than 60 there for a film last night," he concluded.


West Virginia Walks for Missions; Sends Sturgills

McCullough reported 13 people from the St. Nazaire church traveled to Nantes to share in their monthly fellowship dinner. The baptismal service followed the meal.



Japan—Missionary Fred Hersey expressed concern that a number of unsaved people are "close to making decisions for salvation." He requested prayer especially for the Muroka family. "A few weeks ago they visited our home and expressed a desire to become Christians," Fred acknowledged.

The Herseys' daughter, Vivian, will be staying in Japan rather than returning to Free Will Baptist Bible College this year. Fred disclosed that she will be teaching English for a church in an area where no foreigners live. He explained, the main objective of that church is to evangelize, using English as a tool. "This should be a good experience for Vivian," Fred stated. "She will be living with a Japanese family."

The Iriso church also has a ministry among those interested in studying English. Fred requested prayer for these students as well.
