Tragedy or Triumph?

Death is dreaded by most everyone. It is so mysterious! And man has been endowed with a sense of self preservation, a desire to survive. That is important to all of us! We all know that death is inevitable and, yet, we do our best to avoid it. And we often face a tragedy involving God's servants with a sense of amazement and wonder, "Why?"

Perhaps in this life we will never know the answer for sure, but we can look at seeming tragedies of the past and know that God used them to honor His name and to reach many

people with the gospel of Christ.

The murder of five missionaries in Equador in 1956 seemed like such a waste. Yet, from that incident alone hundreds of individuals have been challenged to go to the regions beyond. And through that tragedy the gospel eventually reached the very people God had burdened the martyrs to reach—the Auca Indians.

When the young Brazilian, Jose Mendes, committed his life for missionary service, Free Will Baptist missionaries and Christian friends

were thrilled. Then, he was the victim of an airplane crash and people wondered why it happened. Still, God used it to touch the lives of Jose's family and to stimulate others to full commitment to God's service.

Jean-Baptiste, one of the few national pastors in the Ivory Coast, recently died from chronic kidney failure. He was needed in the ministry but God chose to call him to glory. And He used the incident to speak to hundreds of hearts in Africa as well as in the United States.

We must never forget that when Stephen was stoned, Paul was at the scene. No doubt Stephen's death played a role in Paul's conversion. And God's purposes were fulfilled.

We honestly confess. We do not know why God chose to take John and Kay Metcalf home at this time. But we do know God and we acknowledge His omniscience and His sovereign will. We sincerely believe, "Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it" 1 Thessalonians 5:24.

Our Disappointment—God's Appointment

Who could have imagined it? When John and Kay Metcalf walked into the foreign missions office on Tuesday morning, February 28, they seemed excited. They were elated with what God was doing in their services. They shared joys and delights over their opportunities to minister to churches and challenge people in Florida and Georgia with the great commission and their personal commitment to God's call. The day was cold, snowy and dreary but—as Ruthann Hall put it-"They were like a ray of sunshine to all of us."

I felt a great deal of personal satisfaction as they shared their application of tips I had given them on making personal displays. They had done an outstanding job of making flipcharts, posters and stand-up displays pinpointing their place of anticipated ministry—Brazil.

Time was spent with Brother Rolla Smith, general director, and with Brother Eugene Waddell, associate director. The executive staff took them to lunch and spent time in discussing their ministry and sharing God's blessings. It was a blessed time together!

Then, they dismissed themselves and left in the spitting snow to return to the mission office for a short time before embarking on the concluding portion of their journey homeward to Tulsa, Okla.

Back in the offices "they seemed to be so much at ease

and acted like they really felt a part of the foreign missions family" some of the secretarial staff stated. "They were so happy—so full of plans. They acted like they just wanted to stay around and enjoy the fellowship and oneness of the family relationship. We commented about it after they finally left at about 3:45 p.m."

No one suspected the sudden shock that was just ahead. While snow had been falling intermittently all day long, it was not sticking—at least not on the streets. But as evening wore on, the temperature began to drop and the melted snow began to freeze, creating hazardous road conditions.

At 5:45 p.m. as they approached exit 82 on Interstate 40 at Jackson, Tenn., a tractor trailer loomed "out of nowhere" and before they could react in any way, a fiery crash engulfed the car in flames. And a state trooper, on the scene within 30 seconds of impact, said, "There was no way to get them out." All evidence of the accident indicated death occurred on impact.

God's final appointment came while John and Kay were en route to the field where they felt God was sending them. They were faithful to that calling but God had even better things in store. And while many of us are left wondering why, John and Kau already know the answer. We can only trust and "know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28).

More than 600 friends, relatives, and brothers and sisters in Christ gathered at West Tulsa Free Will Baptist Church in Oklahoma, on Monday afternoon, March 5, for funeral services. The obituary was read by J. Reford Wilson, the Metcalfs' missions instructor at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Moore, Okla. Keith Burden, Kay's brother-inlaw, gave the eulogy and Rolla Smith, general director of foreign missions, commented

on the Metcalfs' commitment and ministry.

Prior to the sermon by their pastor, Bailey Thompson, Doug and Joyce Little sang "Jesus Never Fails." Thompson. pastor of East Tulsa FWB Church, spoke on the Macedonian Call from Acts 16. In his early comments, he stated, "As long as we live with John and Kay in our memory, missions will always be in our heart." He shared some of John and Kau's vision and calling and challenged hearers to listen to the cry of the lost. accept God's call and make the commitment to missionary service.

Former Hillsdale president and current foreign missions board chairman Bill Jones conducted committal services at Ridge Lawn Cemetery in Collinsville, Okla.

Brazil needs missionaries and now John and Kay are greatly missed even though they never got to the field. For several years it seemed impossible to get new missionaries into the country. As that possibility changed, John and Kay came on the scene—the answer to many prayers. Now God has altered those plans. Evidently He plans to answer those prayers through others. Perhaps someone who is reading this article will respond to God's call.

Whoever or whatever— God's appointments are never disappointments to His people or His work. He is Lord! And the Metcalfs are in His wonderful, loving care.

Two Master's Men Leave for Brazil Dorm Project

Nashville, Tenn.—Mr. Carroll Poole and Mr. Don Wilbanks, both of Clarksville, Tenn. left March 12 from the airport in Nashville en route to Brazil to construct a boys' dormitory at the youth camp in Jaboticabal.

The Master's Men have taken the new building as a project, an \$8,000 effort, plus the two men agreed to donate their time and skills while working with Brazilian laborers in erecting the building.

Poole, a brother of missionary Bobby Poole, and Wilbanks are both skilled in construction work.

The men plan to return to the United States on April 7.

Nantes Church Group "Organizes" for Outreach

France—According to a report from missionary John Murray, the Nantes church group held an organizational meeting in February. The new "Evangelistic Association," which they chose to call the group, is seeking to emphasize outreach and evangelism.

"In that meeting we had four who signed to be members," writes John. "We are excited about beginning with eight people that are committed to the task of winning souls." Six or eight others are committed to soul-winning but have not yet signed as members of the new organization.

John noted a high attendance of 67 on the Sunday following the or-

ganizational meeting. Two people were baptized that Sunday and they had invited their friends to see them baptized.

Panama Churches Report Over 100 Converts in '83

Panama—Over 100 professions of faith in 1983 were reported by Panama churches at the annual convention of the Panamanian Association of Free Will Baptists. They met at the Agua Buena church on January 9, 1984.

According to missionary Steve Lytle, over 100 people were on hand to hear the reports from delegates of the churches and to conduct business. A round-table discussion highlighted the meeting as Gabriel Perez, Raul Sanes, "Mom" Willey and Steve served on the panel. Mrs. Willey was visiting Panama at the time of the convention.

Carlos Urbina, deacon of the Panama City church, was elected to his third term as president of the association.

Spain—Jeff and Susan Turnbough have moved to Alcala de Henares, Spain where they will be working with Lonnie and Anita Sparks for the remainder of their first term. They will also be completing their language study at the University of Madrid. They were living in Majadahonda.

New Bern, N.C.—William Fulcher, Sr., 82-year-old father of mission board member Bill Fulcher, Jr., died in New Bern, N.C. on Tuesday evening, February 28. He was buried on Friday, March 2. Bill, Jr. served as a missionary to Uruguay and Panama prior to his current Stateside ministry among the Hispanic population.

Bixby, Okla.—Robert and Judy Bryan became parents of their second child, Jennifer Elaine, born January 9, 1984. The new little girl weighed eight pounds, four ounces, and has brown hair and blue eyes. The Bryans actually received the baby by adoption on February 2.

Smith also reported five adult decisions for Christ in Araras, Brazil where he conducted a weekend missionary revival for Ken Eagleton. A young man also dedicated his life to full-time Christian service during the

Callaway noted their largest attendance came on Sunday morning, January 15, when they had 26 people in services.

Regular Sunday evening Bible study was begun on January 29. "We waited to start this until we saw a desire for such a meeting on the part of Christians," Ron concluded.

Ivory Coast—A city-wide evangelistic campaign is scheduled for April 10-22 by Free Will Baptists in Bondoukou, Ivory Coast.

Missionary Patrick Dickens re-

quested special prayer for the campaign:

- (1) Pastor Victor of the Bondoukou church needs strength and wisdom in preparing for the campaign.
- (2) The Christians and missionaries need revival and proper priorities.
- (3) Literature is to be distributed in an effort to prepare hearts.
- (4) Muslims need the message of Christ.
- (5) Governmental workers need Christ.
- (6) The missionaries need good health to work effectively.

Seven Nationalities Take Part in Youth Meeting

France—France and six other countries were represented at a youth meeting held on January 29 at the Nantes Free Will Baptist Church in France. Other countries represented included Camaroun, Zaire, Canada, Great Britain, Mauitius, and the United States.



Bookmobile Purchased for French Ministry

France—The French field council of Free Will Baptist missionaries purchased a bookmobile in January to be used for evangelism in open-air markets in the cities of Brittany, France.

Missionaries noted the year-old van was purchased from Operation Mobilization who had outfitted the 18-foot vehicle for carrying and selling literature. Due to personnel difficulties, the Paris-bound mission became unable to use the van, so FWB missionaries purchased the bookmobile for less than \$3,000, including insurance.

Discouragement, Blessings Reported by Earnie Deeds

Brazil—Missionary Earnie Deeds cited numerous reasons for discouragement in the work at Conselheiro Lafaiete, Brazil: non-attendance by church members, non-response to more than 200 neighborhood invitations to a weekend meeting, a deacon's marital problems, conflicts be-

tween saved and unsaved mates, recent vandalism to the church building, and the diminishing number of the missionary team in Brazil.

In spite of all this, Deeds reported a fruitful weekend meeting with Sebastian of the Barbacena Free Will Baptist Church, resumption of work on the unfinished church building, and conversion of an 18-year-old girl who has been attending church for nearly a year. Earnie also expressed praise for a time of fellowship with missionaries during the annual field council meeting.

Richards Cites Converts, Asks Prayer for Rain

Ivory Coast—Missionary Norman Richards reported two young men and a young girl had "prayed" in January. "The young lady is a sister of one of the ladies who come to our English service," says Norman. "She had been witnessed to by her sister, but Bessie showed her the plan of salvation."

Joseph, one of the young men, came as a result of the witness of a church member and the other young man had been attending church for a good while. Norman led him to Christ.

The water shortage in the Ivory

Coast is so serious, Norman requested people to pray "that when our rainy season starts, God will give us a lot of rain. There has already been a problem of food shortage. If the rains don't come as normal, there will be a famine."

Cowarts Report Progress After Return to Brazil

Brazil—Jim and Karen Cowart returned to Brazil the latter part of October, 1983 to find the church in Jaboticabal going through "tremendous trials" due to the Cowart's absence.

"Satan has tried to devour our people as a roaring lion," writes Jim. "Many of those who were nearly destroyed have returned to the Lord with renewed vigor. Two have been saved and several have rededicated their lives to the Lord and are actively working for Him."

On Sunday, January 22, Lelis Fachini, a senior pilot with the Brazilian branch of Missionary Aviation Fellowship, presented a report and slides of his work. Lelis is from the Araras Free Will Baptist Church and receives support from the Jaboticabal church.

One Year Has Passed; Thangba Is Still Alive

Ivory Coast—"We came home on furlough requesting hundreds of people to pray for Thangba," says Mike Cousineau, missionary to the Ivory Coast.

Thangba is a Lobi boy whose father is a powerful witch doctor. He had pronounced Thangba a fool for leaving the family idols and following

Steve Lytle noted that Sunday school attendance also set an all-time high of 94 on December 18.


"Our people are more enthused than I've ever seen them," says Lytle. "We now have eight adults taking baptismal classes, including two couples."
