### Tallent Cites Bible Club Effort, Plans Another

France—A six-week Bible Club effort in February and March by missionary Charolette Tallent of Lorient, France, has encouraged a repeat attempt possibly between October and December of this year.

The special club endeavor, unique because it was held in the community center, was preceded by extensive publicity through posters, letters, and invitations. The Lynn Mileys and Tim and Deanna Thompson helped in this phase.

Attendance ran 10 for two weeks, 13 during three weeks, and 19 for one week. Some 38 different children heard the message.

"The children were so interested and even asked why the club couldn't go on longer," Charolette concluded.

#### Witness to Dying Man Leads to Bible Study

Brazil—Missionary Jim Sturgill went to a new area of Campinas, Brazil, to witness to a man who was dying of cancer. The man made a profession of faith and "for about two weeks he gave a glowing testimony and then passed away," according to Vicki Sturgill. Jim preached the funeral and the family and friends were stirred. From this a Bible study sprang up.

According to the Sturgills two men have asked Jim to come and show them how to be saved. The first Bible study in the area was conducted by Vicki and the Sturgill's daughter Lynne with nine women and seven children present.

Jim and Vicki feel burdened for this new opportunity but feel they cannot handle the extra workload to begin a new congregation in this area. They have requested prayer for wisdom and for a leader for this potential congregation.

#### FM Board Meets, Plans Emergency Relief Fund

Nashville, Tenn.—The Board of Foreign Missions gathered in Nashville, Tenn., April 23-26 for the annual session. These actions were taken by the board:

Larry Lovell of Powhatan, Va., was approved for short-term missionary service in France.

Bobby and Geneva Poole and Ken and Marvis Eagleton, both from Brazil, were interviewed.

An emergency relief committee was appointed to design a program and guidelines for receiving and disbursing of emergency relief funds. Approval was given for preliminary plans of a Free Will Baptist Foreign Missions internship program with a projected date of beginning set for the summer of 1986.

A tentative budget of \$2,853,093 was approved subject to adoption by the National Association.

The same officers will serve another year: board chairman, Bill Jones; vice-chairman, Bob Trimble; and secretary. Jim Walker.

These dates were set for the 1985 sessions: annual meeting, April 22-26; retreat, July 29-August 2; and semiannual sessions, December 2-5.

#### 110 Attend 1984 FMF Retreat from FWBBC

Ivory Coast—"A few weeks ago, our family and our missionary coworkers stood on our front porch and cheered loudly," writes Norman Richards from Agnibilekrou, Ivory Coast. "Why all the excitement? It was raining! The Lord is hearing and answering the many prayers for much needed rain.

"During our 15 years in Africa," Norman continues, "we never experienced such severe drought as this year. Many towns and villages have no water. Some of our missionaries have driven to our house to do their laundry and get drinking water (a two-hour drive round trip). Much rain is needed to bring the water level up to normal in rivers and streams. Please do keep praying for an abundant rainfall for all of West Africa."

Richards noted that church attendance at Agnibilekrou has continued to increase but during the past few weeks several people have moved to other areas seeking work. African Christians are actively witnessing and teaching others in the area.

The Franks had originally scheduled furlough for August of this year but have decided to wait until January to begin a short furlough. The work in Belo Horizonte has been temporarily closed or at least cut to a limited ministry.

Japan—Missionary Jerry Banks recently baptized two children from the Kita Hiroshima work and expressed praise that the father came to the service. The baptismal service was held in Airin Chapel church. Mrs. Hara, the children's mother, is a Christian but the father has not been pleased with his family's Christian experiences.

Nashville, Tenn.—Miss Dawn Sweeney, missionary appointee to Ivory Coast, requested a transfer of appointment to France due to a change in ministry plans and the lack of a single missionary companion in the Ivory Coast.

She was to live and work with Elaine Allen, but Elaine was married recently. Although Dawn is a registered nurse, she became convinced she should not go into nursing on the field.

The France field council extended an invitation to Miss Sweeney and the Board of Foreign Missions approved her transfer during the April meeting in Nashville. Dawn plans to leave for Albertville, France in August with a follow-up language program to be carried on in Paris. She plans to work with Charolette Tallent in Lorient, France.

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market area. "We have Christian literature to be read there in the room and other literature for sale," writes Ledgel. "The main thrust, though, is personal witnessing. Different people from the church witness and tell Bible stories. One of the ladies uses a flipchart out on the porch."

Every sixth day in Goumere is dedicated to the fetish and is consequently designated as a day of rest. Since no one goes to the fields that day they go to the market to buy and sell. Every Friday is also designated as market day.

Ledgel urged Christians to pray that many will be drawn by the Holy Spirit to receive the message of Christ.

### Gillilands Leave Bouake Ministry for Furlough

Ivory Coast—Neil and Sheila Gilliland plan to begin a six-month furlough from Ivory Coast in July after a short term of service as dorm parents at the Ivory Coast Academy in Bouake.

"While other missionaries are trying to lead Africans to the way Home, we are trying to make a home for children of those missionaries," writes Neil. "We spend hours listening to the problems of these special kids who are neither totally American in culture nor totally African. I had the opportunity to lead one of our non-mission students to the Lord this past fall. And one of our boys, an MK from Upper Volta who had previously rejected Christ, turned his life over to the Lord. He is now a beautiful example of a servant."

### Call-a-thon Nets \$41,000 for New Missionaries

Nashville, Tenn.—Victory sounded in the office of foreign missions during the week of April 29, 1984, as the Call-a-thon total surpassed the \$40,000 goal by over \$1,000. Free Will Baptists in 22 states, Canada, and France responded to help new missionaries get to their fields of service.

According to Don Robirds, director of communications for foreign missions, a combination of 127 churches, individuals, and organizations participated in the foreign-missions-month effort of April.

Tennesseans came through with more than half of the total as 17 churches and a woman's auxiliary gave \$20,872.27 to the cause. The largest gift of \$10,078 came from the Fellowship Free Will Baptist Church in Kingsport, Tenn., pastored by Reverend Winston Sweeney. This is the largest single gift ever given on Call-a-thon Sunday.

"Every gift was significant in the effort," Robirds stated. "It took the cooperative activity of all those participating to reach our goal. I praise God for those who made the effort to get involved in this outstanding display of concern for world outreach. This was our best Call-athon ever."

Sturgill Hurts Back, Church People Respond

Brazil—Right in the midst of construction on the new church building in Campinas, Brazil, Jim Sturgill suddenly was unable to stand up. The problem—a herniated disk. It happened in mid-April and although no surgery has been recommended, the doctor says Jim can't travel or lift heavy things for a while.

According to Sturgill, when the people saw his incapacity, they responded with greater faithfulness in the work than ever before. And he concludes, "I hope not to have to take up the responsibilities they have

now assumed."

According to missionary Jim Cowart, the names and addresses of 83 people who agreed to accept help with a basic Bible study were given to the church. Cowart urged people to pray that the enthusiasm among the church people might continue and that they might be able to follow up on these opportunities to meet spiritual needs.

#### Las Tablas Group Seeks Land; Building Being Sold

Panama—Missionary Larry Inscoe reports from Las Tablas, Panama, that the rented building housing the church is soon to be sold. "It is necessary for us to take immediate action in raising the needed funds to buy land on which to build our own building," Larry explained.
