Prayer Meetings Spark Rivera, Uruguay Work

Uruguay—According to missionary Paul Robinson, things have changed drastically in the Rivera churches since they began having prayer meetings twice a week in homes of the members. "It came as a need seen and felt among the brethren," writes Paul.

The Wednesday night services have increased in attendance to what they used to have on Sunday night. "And now our Sunday night attendance has jumped from around 70 or 80 to over 100," Robinson continued. "We have had several first-time professions of faith and several fence-straddlers have gotten right. Two new Bible classes have been opened in new neighborhoods by national Christians."

Brazil Youth Camps Change Many Lives

Brazil—Luiz, the Brazilian co-pastor of the Free Will Baptist church in Uberlandia, Brazil, served as evangelist at two youth camps in July.

According to a report from missionary Tom Hughes, a number of conversions were recorded during the camps. At least two were saved from the Uberlandia church group: Silvana, an 11-year-old girl, and Claudio, who moved to Uberlandia in February. Hughes urged Christians to pray for these new converts.

Lori Hughes, Tom and Nancy's daughter, visited Brazil during the summer vacation from college. She also participated in the senior camp at Jaboticabal. The other camp was held near Conselheiro Lafaiete and Barbacena.

FWBBC to Host Fall Missions Conference

Nashville, Tenn.—Free Will Baptist Bible College will host the biennial foreign missions conference November 4-7 in the college auditorium.

Three furloughing missionaries will team with three stateside foreign missions staff members to speak during the conference.

Veteran missionaries Jimmy Aldridge of the Ivory Coast, Fred Hersey of Japan, and Molly Barker of Uruguay will be on hand. Don Sexton, former missionary to France and current missionary representative,

will speak on Tuesday morning, November 6, as will foreign missions General Director Rolla Smith. R. Eugene Waddell, associate director of foreign missions, will finalize the program on Wednesday evening, November 7.

Services will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, November 4, with Jimmy Aldridge speaking. No services will be held during the day on Monday, November 5, but Fred Hersey will share his missionary burden and message at 7:30 that evening. Services will run from 8:30 a.m. until lunch on Tuesday and Wednesday. The evening service on those days will start at 7:30 p.m.

Japan—Missionary Olena McLain notified the mission office that Bihoro Pastor Sugitani Sensei was recently ordained to the gospel ministry. The ordination took place during the summer meeting of the Hokkaido Free Will Baptist churches in Bihoro on the last weekend of July.

The special speaker for the event was the head of a Bible school where the new Bihoro pastor studied. He also presided over Sugitani's ordination.

Ellison Helps Robinson; Two People Saved

Uruguay—Walter "Dub" Ellison, missionary to Montevideo, Uruguay, traveled to Rivera in July to meet with Paul Robinson regarding church construction there. One of the old church walls was about to fall. They made plans to repair the wall and add Sunday school classrooms.

While Ellison was in Rivera, he preached in two of the churches and two ladies made professions of faith

Nine from Mostoles Baptized at Church Camp

Spain—Nine people from the Mostoles church were baptized on June 17 following a Sunday morning service at the church camp in Sacerdon, Spain. According to missionary Ron Callaway, six of these were from one family.

Jeff Turnbough assisted Callaway in the baptismal service. Christians and non-Christians from all three Spanish works attended the camp.

Callaway noted that an 85-yearold grandmother, saved earlier this year, was not baptized due to her health and the distance to the camp.

316 Delegates, Visitors Attend I.C. Convention

Ivory Coast—Some 316 registered delegates and visitors representing 27 villages and churches attended the annual convention of Free Will Baptist churches in the Ivory Coast. The meeting was held at Nassian July 23-26, 1984.

According to a report from missionary Arilla Wode, Pastor Victor of Bondoukou was elected president of the convention. Pastor Koffi David of Bouna was elected vice president. Bini Koume Daniel is secretary and Yoboua Alexander is treasurer.

"Many of those attending the meetings had to sacrifice to be there," writes Arilla. "One group of Christians from Pana walked over 30 miles through the bush to come to the conference. Some of them had bicycles and a few were able to come in a bush taxi, but most of them walked."

Central theme of the convention was "Building the Church of Jesus Christ."

Rolla Smith Shares in I.C. Field Council

Nashville, Tenn.—Rolla D. Smith, general director of foreign missions, traveled to Ivory Coast on August 18 to minister and share plans, etc. with the missionaries in the Ivory Coast field council. Rolla returned to the States on September 8.

The field council met in Goumere on August 27. Jerry Pinkerton is current field chairman for Ivory Coast.

Mr. Smith preached at Doropo, Bouna, Agnibilekrou, Bondoukou and Tanda and visited with Christians in several villages. He also met with leaders of the national churches for a time of fellowship and mutual sharing of plans for the future.

The national leaders presented him with a chief's robe and designated him as "Chief Kouame" of the Koulangos.

He had hoped to dedicate the new church building at Bondoukou while he was in the Ivory Coast, but this was postponed since the building was not completed at the time.

40 Decisions Claimed in Evangelistic Effort

Panama—A special evangelization outreach was held on July 28, 29 in the neighborhood of the Betania Free Will Baptist Church in Panama City, Panama. Twelve young people from the States and approximately 20 people from the church were involved in the effort.

"We visited over 80 homes during the two afternoons," writes Steve Lytle. "Over 40 people made decisions for Christ! Praise the Lord!"

Lytle noted that from the end of April until the end of July they had over 13 decisions for Christ in the church.

Steve encouraged Christians to pray for spiritual growth among the new converts. He also requested prayer for an English Bible study which has been started for U.S. military and others in the area who speak English.

Panama—Larry Inscoe recently expressed hope that the church in Las Tablas, Panama, might be able to purchase property shortly.

France—"Last week Pansy and I were privileged to lead a Catholic lady to the Lord," writes John Murray from Nantes, France. "We praise God for His convicting power."

Panama—Missionary Larry Inscoe reported having the opportunity to preach at a graveside service for the unsaved mother of Uriel Valasquez of the Las Tablas church.
