Ivory Coast—Five ladies and four fellows were baptized by Norman Richards in Agnibilekrou, Ivory Coast, on November 23.

According to Norman, three people received Christ during the Sunday services of January 4 and 11. On Friday afternoon, January 9, Bessie Richards was able to lead a young man to Christ at the reading room.

Norman reports that his own diabetic condition has been well under control since his return to the Ivory Coast.

Fred Warner Assumes Church Ministries Role

Nashville, Tenn.—Fred Warner, Arkansas home missionary and wellknown pastor/evangelist, has accepted the position of director of church ministries for foreign missions beginning May 18. Fred served 12 years on the Board of Foreign Missions. He was replaced last year at the National Association in Tulsa, Okla., since he was ineligible for reelection.

Warner assumes the new position, which has been created in place of the office of associate director, with plans to expand the stateside ministries to help pastors and local churches better understand and actively participate in world outreach. He will be in charge of missionary deputational ministries, missionary conference planning, pastor's conference arrangements, missionary support development, etc.

Fred and his wife, Rachel, have four

children: Jon, age 22; Mark, age 21; Joan, age 19; and Jennifer, age 16. They have ministered in a mission church at Siloam Springs, Ark., since 1982 until the present. This was a project of the State Missions Board of Arkansas Free Will Baptists.

Warner has served as a full-time evangelist and has held pastorates in Ashland City, Tenn., North Little Rock and Russellville, Ark., and Albany, Ga. He served five years as promotional director for Arkansas Free Will Baptists.

Brazilian Elected Pastor of Jaboticabal Church

Brazil—According to a report from missionary Jim Cowart in Brazil, the Free Will Baptist church in Jaboticabal has officially elected Jeancarlo Ache as pastor. Jeancarlo recently graduated with a bachelor of theology degree from the Bible College and Institute of Ribeirao Preto.

Jim Cowart resigned as pastor of the church in light of plans to leave the field in mid-February (see "Cowarts Resign").

The church recently decided to buy a parsonage to house the new pastor who will assume responsibility for the church at the beginning of April.

Griffin Lands in Japan, Enters Language Study

Japan—Miss Debbie Griffin, missionary appointee to Japan, left the United States on December 2 for Tokyo where she has entered language study. She has already been involved in some of the church activities in the Tokyo area.

Debbie was commissioned to service on November 23 at Bellview Free Will Baptist Church in Colquitt, Ga. Bill Robinson is the pastor.

4,386 Languages Now Have Access to the Gospel

Los Angeles, Calif.—Some portion of the Scriptures is available in almost 1,700 languages. Some of these languages also have Christian radio and TV, while at least another 4,000 language groups have access to the gospel only through the spoken word of a live person or a gospel recording.

According to Gospel Recordings, based in Los Angeles, Calif., the recording of four additional languages makes the gospel now available on phonograph record or cassette in 4,386 languages. The most recent peoples to receive the gospel recorded in their own language are those speaking Jangkang, Jawan, Mdau, and Uut Danum. All of these are in Indonesia.

Payne Returns After 10 Weeks in Ivory Coast

Nashville, Tenn.—Missionary Eddie Payne spent 10 weeks at the end of 1986 in Ivory Coast ministering and videotaping Christian activities on the field. He returned to the United States on December 12.

Payne conducted seminars on Free Will Baptist church history at Bouna and Doropo. He had an average of 10 students at each station.

Eddie reported having videotaped segments in 14 villages and stated that he had been in contact with over 1,000 Christians in these villages. He expressed praise that many are being saved through the witness of laymen in these villages.

St. Nazaire Hosts 95 for Special Christmas Program

France—"Our annual Christmas program was held December 14 in the restaurant of one of our members," writes Jerry Gibbs from St. Nazaire, France. Ninety-five people attended the special event, the most the church has ever had for anything.

"There were a lot of unsaved folks there," Gibbs noted. "We had a playlet and songs by the children, an adult choir, a solo by Patty McCullough, a slide presentation by a church member, and a dramatic reading by the youth group."

Jerry requested prayer that they might be able to reach some of these people with the gospel. He also revealed that the church had started a special building fund and had already accumulated approximately \$2,500.

Pagans Burn Church in Appimadoum, Ivory Coast

Ivory Coast—A recent report from missionary Jerry Pinkerton in the Ivory Coast revealed that the Free Will Baptist church in Appimadoum had been burned by pagans.

A mother had sought to force her daughter, a Christian girl, to submit to a pagan sacrifice. "The Christians tried to get her out of the village but got caught," Jerry relayed. "We went out to try to persuade them to let the girl go with us. They refused. Later that night four fellows who had threatened to burn the church down did just that."

The latest reports indicated that the governor of that region had ordered the villagers to rebuild the church and have it ready for services in three days. Pinkerton indicated the church had still not been rebuilt after two weeks.

Jerry goes to Appimadoum regularly on Wednesday and Friday nights as well as Sunday mornings.

Japan—**Pastor Kawasaki** of Kita Hiroshima, Japan, has been bedfast with kidney problems. Jerry Banks requested prayer that the Japanese leader might recover without a long hospitalization.

Panama—**Priscilla Inscoe** had a flare-up of rheumatic fever in December and was bedridden for several days with a low grade fever. Doctors were treating her with penicillin.

Cowarts Victimized Again in Brazil by Burglar

Brazil—According to a recent report from Brazil, a burglar broke into the home of Jim and Karen Cowart one night in late December while the family was asleep. The thief took a camera, some personal items, a cassette recorder, and a calculator. The house had been burglarized on several occasions previously but generally when nobody was at home.

Jim noted that authorities in Jaboticabal suspect an individual in town who has been committing robbery in recent weeks. They indicated the man was armed and considered quite dangerous. The Cowarts expressed praise to God that no one had been harmed.

35 Saved in November Campaign at Bouna, I.C.

Ivory Coast—A special evangelistic campaign was held in Bouna, Ivory Coast, during the last week in November. Attendance averaged between 400 and 500 each night.

According to missionary Eddie Payne, the meeting lasted six nights and was held in the church building at Bouna. The Christians were challenged to bring at least five people with them each evening.

A film was shown each night, followed by a brief testimony by one of the Christians in the church. An invitation was extended and 35 first-time decisions for Christ were registered during the week. Follow-up classes have been started by the young men who operate the reading room in Bouna.

The first convert of the meeting was a 19-year-old Arab Muslim girl from Paris, France, who was visiting one of the members of the church in Bouna.

Villalba Witness Cited as Answer to Prayer

Spain—Missionary Jeff Turnbough was praising the Lord recently as a university student came to his house asking for help in English. When given a choice of books from which to study, the young man chose a Bible storybook.

Jeff had prayed specifically for the Lord to bring someone into his life with whom he could have a witness.

Turnbough also reported plans for an evangelistic campaign in Villalba for the end of January or February. A second campaign is scheduled for July.

Spanish Couple Visits North Carolina Church

Clayton, N.C.—A Christian couple from Mostoles, Spain, visited Tippett's Chapel Free Will Baptist Church in Clayton, N.C., on December 31, 1986.

Enrique Lopez and his wife, Mari Jose, from the Mostoles FWB Church came to the United States to visit their daughter, Mari Jose, who is attending a Christian school in Raleigh, N.C. Enrique gave his testimony at Tippett's Chapel while missionary Ron Callaway translated.

Bunch Merges Two Works, Baptizes Two Converts

Panama—Missionary Stanley Bunch recently revealed the combining of two new works to form a congregation of approximately 22 people. After starting a work in La Pasera, Bunch encountered a group in a neighboring town of Montero. They asked him to hold services with them.

Stan has rented a house in Montero and has purchased 35 chairs to use in the new work. He baptized two new converts on January 18 and indicated several others would be ready for baptism soon.

Bunch requested prayer for the group which was started through efforts of a Pentecostal woman preacher.

The Bunches also reported a teenage boy from La Pasera had received Christ as Savior recently in their home.

Mayhew Recovering in U.S. Following "Heart Attack"

Nashville, Tenn.—Archie Mayhew, mission board member on special assignment as missionary to Ivory Coast, suffered a severe "heart attack" in mid-December while laboring at Tanda. He and Sarah arrived in the United States on December 27 and Archie was admitted to Vanderbilt Hospital in Nashville, Tenn., on December 29.

Since he was diagnosed as having some problem with the pancreas, Mayhew was unaware he had suffered the coronary. X rays had been sent to the United States for analysis, and doctors advised Archie to come to the States for a C.T. scan.

When doctors examined Archie on his entrance to Vanderbilt, an electrocardiogram indicated he had suffered

a coronary or was in the process at the time. They rushed him to intensive care and monitored his heart during the next several days. An angiogram showed a complete blockage of the left interior descending artery and 20 percent loss (damage) of the heart muscle function, but doctors agreed that surgery was not indicated.

Following the heart catheterization for the angiogram, a blood clot developed in Archie's right leg and stopped circulation to the foot. He was rushed to the operating room for immediate surgery to remove a blood clot approximately nine inches in length. Blood thinner was administered and Archie recovered. He was released from the hospital on January 16, but his activities will be very limited for at least three months.

Cowarts Resign to Join Missionary Flying Program

Nashville, Tenn.—Jim and Karen Cowart, missionaries to Brazil, have submitted their resignation from missionary service with the Board of Foreign Missions after two terms of service. They report having an abiding and growing conviction that the Lord is directing them into missionary aviation.

The Cowarts returned to the United States on February 17 after completing their second term with the Free Will Baptist church in Jaboticabal. They plan to join a missionary aviation program later this year.

Jim and Karen were commended by the missionary staff for their work in Jaboticabal and for leading the church to call a Brazilian to head the work after their departure.

Brazil—According to a report from Ribeirao Preto, Brazil, the young people of the First Free Will Baptist Church were in charge of a special service on Sunday, November 30. Four people were baptized following the service.

Japan—A special Bible Conference was held on November 24 at Iriso Free Will Baptist Church in Japan. The conference met in conjunction with the Tokyo church. Mr. Shimada, a Bible school professor, preached two messages on the Christian life.

Brazil—According to missionary Louis Coscia in Uberaba, Brazil, a mother stood during a recent Sunday morning service and testified, "It has been one year since God healed my son of cancer. I thank Him and praise His name for this miracle of healing." This was the answer to a prayer request the Coscias had shared with people during their furlough.

India—Some 200 women gathered in North India in late December to participate in a ladies' retreat. Men attended the evening sessions and the Sunday morning worship. According to Marie Hanna, the majority of those participating were young mothers.

Conversions, Growth Still Mark Kita Hiroshima Work


