Ohio Churches Adopt India Church Project

Columbus, Oh.—Ohio Free Will Baptist churches have accepted the challenge to provide funds for construction of a church in North India. The building is expected to cost \$12,500.

In a special effort to spearhead the project, missionary Carlisle Hanna was in Ohio July 9-13 for two church services and three missionary rallies. The Dailyville church responded with \$677.59, Heritage Temple donated \$300, a Porter rally contributed \$2,590.24, a rally at Dayton First church raised \$1,306, and a Cleveland rally generated \$930.35. The rallies and church offerings had totaled approximately \$6,100 at last report.

Alton Loveless, promotional director for Ohio Free Will Baptists, wrote, "As I learned that the average income of our Free Will Baptist brothers in this area of North India was between \$7 and \$25 per month, I was convicted of our plenty and knew God...would hold us accountable if we didn't build their church...."

The building is really needed since Pastor Das has more than 100 baptized believers and about 100 more awaiting baptism. The church is located in a strong Muslim area.

Richards Baptizes Seven from Agnibilekrou Area

Ivory Coast—Missionary Norman Richards baptized seven people from the Agnibilekrou area of Ivory Coast on June 19.

Richards also revealed the church had decided to conduct an evangelism campaign in Yebouakro, a village approximately 12 miles from Agnibilekrou. The campaign is scheduled for sometime in early September. The other churches in the area plan to help in the effort.

Turnbough Baptizes Seven from Villalba Work

Spain—Seven adults from the Villalba Free Will Baptist Church were baptized in a special service at a lake following the morning service on June 19. According to missionary Jeff Turnbough, between 80 and 90 people traveled to the park in a rented bus for the special event.

Foreign missions General Director Eugene Waddell was on hand and preached during the morning service

at the church with approximately 80 people in attendance. Turnbough indicated several of these people attended a Protestant church for the first time and some heard a gospel message for the first time that day.

The church members prepared a special Spanish dish, paella, prior to the baptismal service. All of those baptized had been involved in new convert studies.

Turnbough noted the church was planning several evangelistic activities for the summer including a bookstand in open-air markets, singing and testifying in the streets and parks, and a general tract distribution effort. Steve and Linda Reeves are now assisting the Turnboughs at Villalba.

Jim Teague Rejoices at Chance to Gain Convert

Ivory Coast—Jim Teague, associate missionary serving at the Ivory Coast Academy in Bouake, recently led a young Catholic seminary student to the Lord. He had been reading English with the student and gave him a New Testament, asking God to speak to the man through His Word.

"The second week he asked, 'What does it mean when Jesus said I come not to destroy but to fulfill the law?' The answers came so easily," Jim declared, "I knew God was helping me to give further light."

Jim gave the young man the Gospel of John on cassette to assist him in his reading. "You can imagine my joy," says Teague, "as his question the next week was, 'In the story of Nicodemus, what does it mean to be born again?' The answer to our prayer and his was answered as we walked together the Romans road and Christ came into his heart."

Agua Buena Church Records 400 Decisions

Panama—The Agua Buena Free Will Baptist Church in Panama recently witnessed to over 800 people and recorded approximately 400 decisions for Christ, including rededications, etc.

The church had just completed a five and one-half month training program in evangelism and discipleship. The program was conducted with the help of a parachurch organization in Panama. Eight members of the church received certificates for having successfully completed the course.

Part of the special outreach effort included the use of films.

VBS for Ivory Coast MKs Held in Bouna

Ivory Coast—Missionaries Alice Smith, Arilla Wode, and student missionaries Joan Warner, Barbara Warner, and Michael Gragg all worked in a special vacation Bible school at Bouna for Ivory Coast MKs July 11-15. This was the first VBS to be held for the MKs in Ivory Coast.

All 12 missionary children on the field participated in the special VBS effort. Classes and crafts were held in the mornings and recreation was held each afternoon.

Japan—Missionary Don McDonald, who has been studying the Japanese language for the past two years, graduated from Japan Missionary Language Institute on July 15. He had given his graduation speech on July 13.

Dr. Noah Brannen, the author of the language textbook, was the special speaker for the event.

Don and his wife, Ruth, were scheduled to move to the northern island of Hokkaido by the end of August. They plan to work with Pastor Kawasaki at the Ai No Sato church.

Beaver Creek Women Get \$13,000 Cash Commitment

Spartanburg, S.C.—Beaver Creek District Woman's Auxiliary President Gwen Hendrix announced on June 24 that local auxiliary commitments in the district had totaled \$13,000 toward cash needed for missionary appointees Ron and Linda Moore. The announcement was made during a talent show fund-raising effort for the project.

In March the Beaver Creek women set a goal of \$12,000 for the Moores so the couple could leave for France on schedule in August. In mid-August the Moores were to be presented with at least \$6,000 of the committed amount. The remaining commitments are to be received by March of 1989.

The talent show effort netted \$600 toward the goal. Nine local church

auxiliaries participated in the event, and over 200 people attended. Seventeen auxiliaries make up the Beaver Creek district.

Cuban FWB Leaders Visit U.S. Churches in August

Nashville, Tenn.—Cuban Free Will Baptist leaders were finally granted permission to visit the United States and arrived in Miami, Fla., on August 1. They traveled to Nashville, Tenn., on Tuesday, August 2, where they participated in the annual foreign missions retreat.

According to R. Eugene Waddell, Gilberto Diaz Triana and Roberto Perez Hernandez were scheduled to visit churches in Tennessee and North Carolina, as well as in Arkansas, California, Michigan, and Florida, depending on an extension of their 15-day visas. At press time only a five-day extension had been granted.

The men assured American audiences that a very strong bond of faith and fellowship exists between Cuban and U.S. Free Will Baptists. They also rejoiced at the prospects for reopening Cedars of Lebanon Seminary and rebuilding the chapel in memory of Pop Willey.

Fred Warner, director of church ministries, coordinated the itinerary.

VBS Raises \$700 for Norman Richards' Account

Walnut Ridge, Ark.—The First Free Will Baptist Church of Walnut Ridge, Ark., held its annual vacation Bible school June 6-10, 1988, with an average attendance of 92. Their special project for the week was directed toward Norman and Bessie Richards in Ivory Coast: They gave \$700.90 to the Richards' account.

The highlight of the week, according to Pastor Larry D. Hughes, was the offering. The boys were competing with the girls to see who could give the most by weight. A large balancing scale was placed in front of the auditorium and each night the boys and girls placed their containers on the scale to see who had won.

"The majority of this offering was received in pennies!" writes Pastor Hughes. "If only we adults could achieve the enthusiasm and joy of giving that these children have, there would be no limit as to what could be done on our mission fields."

Moving Response to Wednesday Night Message, and Record Missions Offering Highlight National

Kansas City, Mo.—A moving of God's Spirit was evident during the invitation following the Wednesday night message by Fred Warner, director of church ministries for foreign missions. This, combined with a record missions offering of \$23,476.57, highlighted the National Association July 17-21 at Kansas City, Mo.

Warner preached on the theme "Perceive Our Welcome by God" using 2 Timothy 4:6-8. He challenged the audience to a faithful life and a continuing faith as prerequisites to a confident hope.

The undesignated portion of the offering that evening was divided equally by foreign and home missions.

Other foreign missions activities at the convention included the adoption of a 1989 foreign missions budget of \$3,279,414 plus \$150,000 for Advance projects.

An Advance Celebration dinner honored Advance leaders from around the country. Advance Coordinator Jimmy Aldridge commended those present and praised God for \$421,000 raised to help developing national churches abroad and to help in sending new missionaries to the field. Doug Little of Russellville, Ark., led the group in worship and praise as he sang several songs and testified of his involvement with the new church building project in St. Nazaire, France.

R. Eugene Waddell, general director, called on Free Will Baptists to pray for the Cuban Christians as they have been authorized to remodel and

enlarge the chapel at Cedars of Lebanon Seminary. It is to be renamed Pop Willey Memorial Chapel in memory of the late Pop Willey, founder of the school. Costs for the building are estimated to run about \$36,000.

The association also received and adopted the report of the special committee investigating the charges against Ivory Coast missionaries by former missionary Lonnie Palmer. The report stated the charges were false. The body passed a resolution commending the committee for its work and expressing confidence in the work of Ivory Coast missionaries, the foreign missions staff, and the Board of Foreign Missions.



Bill Reagan of Windsor, Ontario, Canada, was elected to the Board of Foreign Missions.

A special tribute was paid to former missionary Sam Wilkinson who died suddenly in April. He and his wife, June, had served 19 years in Brazil before assuming a stateside ministry in Georgia and later at Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College in Oklahoma. As a memorial, the college sponsored a

walk-a-thon for the mission work in Mexico. They raised \$2,217 for the project and presented the money to Roy Thomas, general director of home missions.

Bill Reagan of Windsor, Ontario, Canada, was elected to the spot on the foreign missions board vacated by Jim Walker who was ineligible to be re-elected. Norwood Gibson and Bob Trimble were re-elected to six-year terms.

Missionaries Featured by WNAC; \$2,500 Presented

Kansas City, Mo.—In their fifty-third session, the Woman's National Auxiliary Convention gathered 892 strong at Kansas City, Mo., July 18 and 19. Included in their activities, which revolved around the theme "Arise and Build," were a number of events involving both foreign and home missionaries.

On Tuesday morning missionary Marvis Eagleton from Brazil gave the devotion. James Munsey of Mexico preached the morning message. In the afternoon a skit, written by Barbara Fletcher of Bristol, Ga., was presented with the help of seven missionaries: Rick Bowling and Walter Ellison of Uruguay, Carol Teague of France, Dave Franks of Brazil, Lynn Midgett of Spain, Janice Banks of Japan, and Larry Inscoe of Panama.

The presentation ended by asking who, among Free Will Baptists, really cares.

Eugene Waddell, general director of foreign missions, during the Wednesday evening service following the introduction of missionaries. The money is directed toward the Sower Bible Institute in Uruguay.

Betania Church Votes to Build Addition

Panama—The Betania Free Will Baptist Church in a suburb of Panama City, Panama, recently voted to build an addition to their building. The construction will increase their seating capacity from 80 to approximately 125.

Missionary Steve Lytle noted that much of the building materials and labor was to be donated and several people have given special offerings to enable the church to build.

In additional news, Steve reported that the Los Andes group of 15-20 people is meeting on Friday nights with Daniel, associate pastor at Betania. Three times a week groups from the Betania church go to Los Andes to have follow-up studies with new believers.

Japan—The semi-annual meeting of Hokkaido Free Will Baptist churches was held June 19 at the new Ai No Sato Free Will Baptist Church. Approximately 150 people attended the meeting which was followed by a dedication service for the new

building.

Missionary Dale Bishop preached during the special service. A baptismal service was held in the morning with two people being baptized.

Japan—Reverend and Mrs. John Postlewaite, parents of missionary Ruth McDonald, traveled to Japan to visit Don and Ruth from July 27-August 17. Postlewaite led the dedication for his granddaughter, Katie McDonald, on July 31. The service was held at the Iriso Free Will Baptist Church.

Ivory Coast—Mike Cousineau reported baptizing six people from the Bouna church in July. These had just successfully completed the baptismal course. "This was an encouragement to the church," writes Mike.

Panama—Missionary Stan Bunch reported from Parita, Panama, that the son of one of the main police sergeants was converted recently. Stan has begun discipleship classes with him.

Bryan, Tex.—"Mom" Mabel Willey is planning to go to Cuba in September for the opening of the Cedars of Lebanon Seminary. The government has given permission to reopen the school and the buildings are being repaired as fast as the people can obtain materials. The chapel is being rebuilt and will be called "Pop Willey Memorial Chapel." "Mom" requested prayer that God would supply the needed funds for these building materials.

She spent a few days at the foreign missions retreat during the first week in August and visited her mother in Florence, S.C.
