Panamanian Men Join to Construct Church

Panama—On March 23-26 a group of approximately 45 men from the Panama City churches traveled to Las Tablas to help construct a church building. According to Stan Bunch the crew was also involved in evangelizing Las Tablas and Parita while in the area.

Bunch noted a pastors' retreat had been held recently with 15 men on hand. Steve Lytle shared tips for a pastor's survival and Bunch dealt with the danger of too much emphasis on experience and the baptism of the Holy Ghost.

The Bunches were scheduled to arrive in Tulsa, Okla., on April 12 to begin their furlough.

Tallent Requests Prayer for Lorient Ministry

France—After being away from France for two and one-half years, missionary Charolette Tallent faced many changes in Lorient, France, when she returned. She has requested special prayer in four different areas: (1) for Satan's stronghold over Lorient to be broken, (2) for dependence upon God's strength for overcoming discouragement, (3) for French Christians of Lorient to sense the urgency of evangelizing their city, and (4) for evangelistic boldness for the missionary team as evidenced in Acts.

Charolette noted that evangelistic outreach through music and testimony was scheduled in Lorient for April 22 and 23. She reported that March 27 had been set aside for Free Will Baptist churches to gather in St. Nazaire for a day of edification and fellowship.

Darrell Testerman of Owasso, Okla., will represent Hillsdale FWB College and foreign missions while serving in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire. Miss Vicky Christy of Ashland City, Tenn., is a graduate of FWBBC and is attending Columbia Biblical Seminary and Graduate School of Missions. She will go to Tokyo, Japan, with the Ken Baileys.

Joel and Hope Nason are students at Bob Jones University and will be going to Doropo, Cote d'Ivoire. They are from Taylors, S.C.

Joshua Lopez, who attends Miami Christian College, will work with the Walter Ellisons in Montevideo, Uruguay.

Besides the main speaking ministries of Dr. Mary R. Wisehart and "Mom" Mabel Willey, eight workshops were conducted during the retreat. These included hospitality, evangelism, how to be a healthy Christian, how senior citizens can serve, how singles can serve the church, how a young person can serve the church, and how a mother can serve the church. All workshops except twoone by Brenda and one by "Mom" Willey-were given by Panamanian Free Will Baptist women.

The women overcame serious lastminute problems in order to have the retreat. The contracted transportation canceled one hour before departure and the cooks did not show up. Other transportation was finally arranged, and the ladies themselves pitched in and cooked.

Uruguay—Martin, the young student who broke his arm last year, recently had a plate put in the arm. Shortly thereafter he accidentally broke the arm again at its weakest point. At last report he was suffering with severe pain but was in good spirits. Doctors remained undecided regarding what they could do for the arm.

Chicago, III.—Paul Hersey, son of missionaries Fred and Evelyn Hersey, is scheduled to graduate in June from Northwestern University in Chicago, III., with a double major in physics and piano (a five-year program). At press time Paul had set no future plans.

Brazil Central Bible College Has 27 Students

Brazil—According to reports from the central Bible college in Jaboticabal, Brazil, 27 students were enrolled for the second year which began February 27.

Reports indicated six full-time resident students were enrolled—four male and two female. Twenty-one other students were signed up for night classes or partial programs. Five of those enrolled are ministerial students.

In addition to the classes held at Jaboticabal, extension courses have been opened in Araras under the direction of interim pastor Eliseu.

Christians in Tehini Face Starvation Crisis

Cote d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast)—Dr. Kenneth Eagleton reported in April that Christians in the village of Tehini, where he ministers in Cote d'Ivoire, are facing starvation due to crop failure.

"I sat down with the church leaders and counted 26 adults and 27 children from 13 families who are staring hunger in the eye," writes Kenneth.

"I calculate it will take about \$200 per month to buy grain to keep them from starving. This will need to continue until July or August when they start gathering new crops."
