


Board Meets, Reinstates Cowarts, Okays Doctor

Nashville, Tenn.—The Board of Foreign Missions held its annual session April 30-May 2 at the National Offices building in Nashville, Tenn.

The board reinstated Jim and Karen Cowart as missionaries to Brazil. The Cowarts had resigned in 1987 to pursue further training and to seek a ministry through aviation.

That door has closed and they have expressed a genuine desire to return to Brazil.

Dr. Priscilla Welch of Turbeville, S.C., was approved for a

Tanya Hart, a teacher at Trinity Christian School in Greenville, N.C., was approved to serve during the summer with Jim and Vicki Sturgill in Brazil.

Larry and Priscilla Inscoe of Panama and Sherwood and Vada Lee of Ivory Coast were both granted a leave of absence for one year. The Inscoes—who made their request due to medical, emotional, and educational needs—began their leave on April 15. The Lees have asked for leave due to health needs and are scheduled to begin their inactive status following the foreign missions retreat in August.

The Japan field council was authorized to set up a school to educate their children. Miss Vivian Waller is scheduled to be the teacher.

The board adopted a budget for 1991 of \$3,979,859 and an additional \$150,000 for Advance.

Several prospective missionary candidates were interviewed.

Joe Grizzle, who visited Ivory Coast in April, shared with the board and staff a videotape of his trip, and Dan Cronk showed slides of his trip to India and Spain.

Meeting dates were set for December 3-6, 1990; April 29-May 1, 1991; and retreat—July 29-August 2, 1991.

Board officers were retained for the coming year: chairman, Bill Jones; vice chairman, Norwood Gibson; and clerk, Galen Dunbar.

Christians in Ribeirão Present Drama at Easter

Brazil—Twelve people from the First Free Will Baptist Church in Ribeirão Preto, Brazil, presented an hourlong drama, "Before Nightfall," in three FWB churches in the area on Easter weekend. The production was based on the parable of the Good Samaritan.

According to Bobby and Geneva Poole, the group received two other invitations to present the drama.

Grizzles Visit Mission Works in Côte d'Ivoire

Norman, Okla.—Joe Grizzle, pastor of First Free Will Baptist Church in Norman, Okla., and his wife, Billie, left for Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast) on March 26. The couple was accompanied by Betty Wood, a member of the church. They returned to the United States on April 13.

Although they visited other areas, the three spent much of the time in the area of Bouna with Mike and Deleen Cousineau who are members of the Norman church.

The church raised the money for the Grizzles' trip as a love gift.

Joe is a member of the Board of Foreign Missions.

Panama—"We celebrated our missionary conference April 25-29," write Steve and Judy Lytle from Panama City, Panama. "We were a bit disappointed that we had not met

our faith-promise goal set last April, but we were thankful that in the midst of the worst economic crisis in Panama's history, Betania FWB Church gave \$1,734 to world missions."

23 Baptized in Bouna, Flakiedougou Areas

Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast)—Ten young people from the Bouna church were baptized in March by missionaries Clint Morgan and Mike Cousineau.

One week later on April 1 at Flakiedougou, a village 100 kilometers south of Bouna, 13 more converts were baptized.

Jerome, a Bible institute student, has been working in this area. He is conducting two more classes of 18 and 35 who are preparing for baptism. He hopes to see all 53 baptized before the Morgans and Cousineaus depart for furlough this summer.

Candidate School Held in April for Two Couples

Nashville, Tenn.—A one-week Candidate School program was conducted April 16-20 in Nashville, Tenn., for two couples already appointed to missionary service. Associate missionaries Paul and Rhoda Creech and Mark and Juli Riggs were the student participants.

Jimmy Aldridge, overseas secretary, planned and coordinated the program of the school. Administrative staff members and missionaries conducted the classes.

Paschalls to Leave for Côte d'Ivoire on July 2

Detroit, Mich.—Dr. Mark Paschall and his wife, Kathy, are scheduled to leave July 2 for Doropo, Côte d'Ivoire, where the doctor will serve at the medical center.

Mark and Kathy originally planned to leave in April or May but were delayed due to pending surgery on their son, Ethan, 14 months old. Surgery was performed on the child's heel on April 30 and a long cast was placed on the leg. He was scheduled to wear the cast four weeks, then he was expected to have a shorter cast for another two weeks.

The Paschalls also have a threeyear-old daughter, Emily. Mark and Kathy plan to return to the United States on August 22.

Georgia Couple Visits Russia, Carries Bibles

Decatur, Ga.—Chuck and Fleda Snow of Decatur, Ga., visited the Soviet Union from April 17 to May 1 as part of a Friendship Force exchange between the Russian state of Georgia and the state of Georgia in the U.S. While they were in Russia, 250 Soviet Georgians were visiting in the Atlanta area.

The Snows, parents of missionary appointee Rhoda Creech, carried 100 New Testaments in Russian which included a study guide. They experienced no difficulty in giving

the Bibles to people who wanted them. Chuck gave one to the airline pilot and another to a Muslim and said it was the first time a Bible had ever been seen in the man's village.

Chuck and Fleda were hosted by a couple with a 14-year-old son. The husband is an engineer while the wife is a school teacher.

The chairman of the Soviet television station in the area came to see the Snows in the home of their hosts and thanked them for bringing the New Testaments. He indicated he was planning to give a public "thank-you" on television.

Mini Reports from Around the Globe

Japan—A recent report from Fred and Evelyn Hersey in Japan indicated Evelyn had another small malignant lump removed in May. Christians were urged to pray for the couple. They will remain on the field, and Evelyn will continue to receive special hormone treatment to combat any future reoccurrences.

Nashville, Tenn.—Foreign missions board members Bob Trimble and Galen Dunbar are scheduled to visit the fields of France and Spain during June and July. Bob's wife, Nancy, and Galen's wife, Barbara, will accompany the duo as they look over the work and encourage the missionaries. The Trimbles plan to depart on June 15 and the Dunbars will depart on June 18. Both couples plan to return on July 6.

Second Burglary in Six Months Hits Hughes Home

Brazil—According to missionaries Tom and Nancy Hughes in Uberlandia, Brazil, robbers broke into their home in March and stole around \$1,000 worth of mission and personal items. This was the second burglary in the past six months.

"We are in the process of installing heavier bars on the windows and reinforced steel doors," writes Tom. "In this time of economic crisis, robbery has been an increasing problem."

Morgan Auto Hits Child on Bouake Street

Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast)—While in Bouake to pick up his boys from school during the last week of March, missionary Clint Morgan was involved in an auto accident in which his car struck a four-year-old girl.

According to Lynette, "The Lord's hand was on him because at the same time he hit the child on the right bumper he hit a car on the left. This lessened the blow to the child. She was thrown four and one-half meters but was not seriously injured."

When Morgan took the boys back to school, he visited the police who indicated all was over except for the insurance payment on repairs to the auto and the child's medical bills.
