Côte d'Ivoire (Ivory Coast)—The first graduating class of the Bible Institute of Côte d'Ivoire received their diplomas and certificates on June 3 after a vigorous three-year training program. R. Eugene Waddell, general director, and his wife, Genevieve, were on hand for the historic occasion.

Eight students finished their studies and at least five of these have been placed in leadership of local churches.

According to missionary Mike Cousineau, director of the institute, "Although the institute was started under adverse circumstances and though times were difficult, the results at the end of this first three years are tremendously rewarding."

The Waddells went to Côte d'Ivoire on May 21 and returned to the United States on June 23.

The children passed out 90 balloons with John 3:16 painted on them and gave gospel tracts to over 100 children and adults.


26 Decisions, Record Offering Mark National

Phoenix, Ariz.—Missions highlights of the National Association of Free Will Baptists which convened in Phoenix, Ariz., July 15-19 included 26 missions-related decisions and a record missions offering. The Wednesday night offering totaled \$24,373.12, topping last year's record of \$23,501.76.

Some 27 foreign missionaries registered for the meeting and were introduced, along with 69 home missionaries, during the Wednesday night missions service. Pastor Larry Powell of Cofer's Chapel in Nashville, Tenn., challenged the crowd to be "salt" that God can use in world evangelism. A large number of people responded to the invitation. Twenty-six of these made missions related commitments.

Other highlights of the annual event included a message by Dr. Kenneth Eagleton of Côte d'Ivoire on Tuesday morning during the WNAC program. He challenged the group with "The Great Invitation," the WNAC theme for the year.

Former missionary Janie Aldridge led a seminar entitled "Will You Carry the Invitation?" Bessie Richards, Deleen Cousineau, and Lynette Morgan of Côte d'Ivoire; Debbie Griffin, Ruth McDonald, and Judy Smith of Japan; Rejane



Eagleton of Brazil and Ivory Coast; Patsy Vanhook of France; Susan Turnbough of Spain; and Amy Robinson of Uruguay all had a part in a program called "God's Hand Extended Around the World."

Judy Smith, Ruth McDonald, and Debbie Griffin sang during the WNAC program and Enrique Jiminez Soler of Villalba, Spain, sang a solo on Wednesday evening. Enrique is fruit of missions in Spain.

R. Eugene Waddell gave the foreign missions report during the Wednesday session. He noted that more than 700 people had come to Christ in 1989 through the foreign missions ministries. More than 7,000 people were worshipping in overseas churches on Roll Call Sunday this year.

Alton Loveless, executive secretary for Ohio Free Will Baptists, was elected to the Board of Foreign Missions to succeed Dan Cronk who was ineligible for re-election. Archie Mayhew of California and Galen Dunbar of Georgia were retained.

A 1991 foreign missions budget of \$4,129,859 was adopted.

VBS Group "Buries the Devil" for Combs



Brazil—On June 17, six children were dedicated to the Lord in the First Free Will Baptist Church of Uberlandia, Brazil. The same night a young mother committed her life to the Lord. Missionary Tom Hughes noted that over the past 13 years 16 weddings had been performed for those in the congregation. From these couples have come 17 children under the age of three.

Florence, S.C.—David and Annette Aycock have announced the birth of their second daughter, Breeana Summer, born July 20 in Florence, S.C. The baby weighed eight pounds four ounces. She is the granddaughter of missionaries Bobby and Sue Aycock in Brazil.

France—Missionary Steve Riggs in Nantes, France, reports he just finished a 13-week study on the Christian life with André and Martine Belliot. "What a joy to hear them pray," says Steve. "Last Saturday evening André led his sister to faith in Christ."

Brazil—Cindy Combs, daughter of missionaries Jim and Shirley Combs in Brazil, married José Augusto de Aquino on July 7 in Araras, Brazil. Approximately 250 people were present for the wedding feast.

Spain—Ron Callaway has requested prayer for Miguel and Paloma and says, "We are convinced that Miguel will soon be saved. He knows and believes all the facts, but something is holding him back. In June he told me, 'Every time I get ready to accept Christ into my life, I think of the 33 years I have prayed to Mary and I cannot bring myself to leave her. Mary has my heart in her grasp!' France—Classes for a new Free Will Baptist training program in France are scheduled to start sometime in September. According to Allan Crowson who has been developing the training program, "We can see the Lord's hand at work."

Funeral services were held at Sophia FWB Church, Sophia, W.Va., on Saturday, August 18, at 2:00 p.m. Mrs. Combs was 73 years of age. Jim was unable to return to the States for the funeral.

Charleston, S.C.-Missionaries Carlisle and Marie Hanna arrived in the United States on July 4 for a 90-day furlough. They are scheduled to return to India in September.

Brazil-The Araras FWB Church in Brazil has felt the need to reach out to the 30,000 people on the opposite side of town from the church. The area has no gospel witness, so the church people are sacrificially trying to construct a small building to start a work in that area. Missionaries Jim and Shirley Combs are working in Araras.

Nashville, Tenn.—Gene Richards. son of Côte d'Ivoire missionaries Norman and Bessie Richards. married Miss Patti Bumpus of Wayne, Mich., on June 16, 1990, in the Donelson Free Will Baptist Church in Nashville, Tenn. Gene graduated from FWB Bible College in May.

Waco, Tex.—The Reverend M. L. Crosby, father of new missionary Dwain Crosby (Spain), died in Waco, Tex., on July 1 after sustaining an aneurysm on June 29. He had suffered from heart disease for several years. He was 57 years of age. Dwain arrived with his family in Texas just a few hours before his father's death. They returned to Spain on July 21.

Brazil-Since Bobby and Sue Aycock moved to the city of Araraquara, Brazil, they have made numerous contacts: "We have made several friends and hope to be able to win them to the Lord," write Bobby and Sue.

"The Lord gave us a contact with a young married lady who was eating at a fast-food restaurant at the time we had our lunch one day. This contact has resulted in a weekly Bible study in her home. Four Brazilian adults participated in our first study," the Aycocks continued. "Pray for Roberto, Alice, Leila, Paulo, and Walter. We anticipate their conversion in the very near future," the couple concluded.

Araraquara is a very strong spiritist city, according to Bobby and Sue. They indicated 200 spiritist centers are located in the city while only 19 legitimate evangelical churches can be found. Four of the

Therefore, we submit this resignation from foreign missions service," the Bowlings stated.

Rick and Linda were active in starting a new work in the Montevideo suburb of Malvin Norte. That work is currently under the direction of Walter Ellison and Gerardo Rodriquez.

The Bowlings have accepted the call to pastor the Martin Hill FWB Church in Booneville, Miss.

Sherwood Lee Visits India, Speaks at Conference

India-Missionary Sherwood Lee of Côte d'Ivoire visited fellow South Carolina missionaries Carlisle and Marie Hanna in India during May and June. He visited both North India and South India works and spoke at a Bible conference in North India June 1-3.
