

On the Go for God!



Just a runaway! Sleeping in the back of an automobile. I thought I had the solution to my despair. But God sent a preacher—now a missionary—to rescue me from certain disaster. That night my life turned around.

I had not been raised in a Christian home but I had gone to church on the church bus because my mom and dad made me go with my five brothers. We really didn't understand why we went.

When I was 11 years old, my mom became seriously ill. At that time I didn't understand the reality of death. My dad, my little brother and I knelt and prayed at Dad's bedside. That was the first time I had ever seen my daddy do anything like that. He literally begged God to let my mother live. But in spite of our many prayers, Mom died. It was devastating to all of us! For the first time, I sensed the need of God.

I had heard in Sunday school that God loves us and wants the best for us. But this crisis arose, and even though my dad called upon God, my mother didn't get well. I couldn't understand why.

We received very little help from our church, just pats on our heads and "Sorry that your mother died." But no one expressed real sympathy like that needed by an 11-year-old girl and a seven-year-old boy.

#### I poured out my heart as I begged God to let my daddy live.

My dad had experienced a massive heart attack when I was only five, and he was not able to work. Suddenly, with the loss of Mom, I became the mother of the house and had to care for my little brother.

Just four years later my father became ill and went to the hospital. Like a flash I remembered praying with my daddy and my brother when Mother was sick. I was scared as I went to the hospital chapel. I can remember the serious moment as I walked into that beautiful little chapel with stained glass windows.

I poured out my heart as I begged God to let my daddy

live. I promised Him I would do anything. I said I would come to that chapel and pray every morning if he would make my dad well. And I did.

Dad had been in the hospital for a whole month when I entered his room on October 31 shortly after midnight. I watched him take his last breath and saw the nurses remove the oxygen mask. I didn't know what to do.

I ran out of the hospital into a heavy rain, got on my bicycle and took off. I yelled as loud as I could, "God, I hate You. You're not a God of love. You don't care about me. You don't care about my needs. I don't want anything to do with You any more. I don't want anything to do with church or anyone involved with church."

I wanted to die. I pedaled to a public park, sat on a little bridge, and wept all night. I asked God to just let me die.

After Dad's funeral, my brothers and I were all separated. Some moved to a different state, and I moved to a different town to live with my half brother and his wife.

For the first nine months after

my dad's death I went through major depression. I would cry for hours in the dark. I didn't know what to do, and I didn't have anybody to talk to. Things weren't working out where I was living. And a friend of mine, Denise, was having it difficult too. Her mom and dad were having marital problems. So we decided we would just run away. We waited until it was dark and headed out of town. It was rainy that night so we sought shelter in a little hatchback car in a driveway. We decided to sleep there and head out in the morning.

I yelled as loud as I could, "God, I hate You. You're not a God of love. You don't care about me."

We got nestled in and were just about asleep when the dogs started barking. God was about to intervene.

A guy came out of his house and walked over to the car. We were caught and didn't know what to do. The man took us into the house!

Looking at the things on the wall and things sitting around, I said to Denise, "We are in a preacher's house." This was the last place I wanted to be, and I knew she felt the same.

The man, Stan Bunch, sat us down and talked to us, but mostly to me. And I will never forget what he said: "Do you know there is someone who wants to be a Father to you tonight?" I was blown away by that. I thought to myself, "How does this guy know my feelings and my anxieties revolve around losing my daddy?"

The minister pointed out that Jesus gave His life as a sacrifice so I could have a relationship with Him and so I could have a home in heaven.

I was ready for a Father who wouldn't die in a few years. I was ready for a Father to take care of me, and I was ready to use the term "father" again. That night I accepted Christ as my personal Savior. Then I realized that Christ becomes what we need. In my situation I needed a Father!

When Dad died. I had made a

promise never to live with a preacher. But after I was saved, I moved in with Stan and Brenda Bunch.

One day shortly after my conversion, I noticed a boy from my school. I hadn't really wanted to be around him. But as a new Christian, I was zealous to win others to Christ. So, when I saw Curt, I felt I needed to witness to him. He had just returned from summer church camp. When he saw me, he remembered me as an unsaved person. So he said to himself, "This girl desperately needs the Lord."

I am thankful that God has taken the things that have happened to me and has turned them to further the gospel.

As we walked toward each other across a softball field, we intended to witness to one another. We ended up giving our testimony of what the Lord had done in our lives that summer. So, our witnessing led to dating.

Shortly after we started dating, a youth service was sponsored by Verdella Free Will Baptist Church, where Stan was pastor. I was in charge of the service with some other teenagers. A young preacher, a freshman in high school, had come to preach our youth service. Curt was affiliated with another church where his parents went, but he would go to church with me once in a while. He came that night.

To my surprise, the young preacher spoke only five

# Street Children Serenade!

LAR NOVA VIDA is a house of refuge for the children.

It had been a long day. We had just gotten in from a church service and Jim had turned on a soccer game between Brazil and the U.S.A.

"Listen. It's coming from the street," I called.

"Come quickly. It's the children. They've come to serenade!" Fifteen children making a "joyful noise" in the street. Ex-street children. No signs of bruises, burns, skin ulcers, runny eyes, rotten teeth, lice-infected hair or bloated stomachs. Just beautiful, healthy children. Our children!

The words came through the iron gate half yelled, half sung. "Ele é exaltado. Ele é o Senhor!" (He is exalted. He is the Lord!) Praise from the lips of the children. No more cursing or calling on demons and occultic saints.

They were all smiles and shiny eyes as they reached out clean hands for the candy we handed them. No begging with sad eyes, dirty skin and dirty clothes. And no professional

lies!

As they kissed us goodbye, a lump formed in my throat. "Dear God, what if we had never begun the ministry with abandoned and battered children? What if they had never seen Your love through us? Oh, what a loss if I had never felt these little arms wrapped around me in gratitude—in sheer, simple happiness!"

We had enjoyed a fruitful

multi-ministry in our Araras church, but the idea of another outreach was forming. We thought of offering a free Christian day-care in a needy area. We sought the advice of the city's office of social services and were directed to Dona Olga. We were told that Araras had so many day-cares that some weren't even full yet. Then Olga asked, "Isn't there anything else you could offer to do for the city?"

Jim and I had just talked about the serious problem of abandoned children living in the streets. Adults were being hired to murder these children who were considered pests to society.

"In the future we plan to work with street children and then with the elderly," I responded, surprising even myself.

Dona Olga became more interested. "Our city has no orphange or place for abandoned children," she explained. "Do you think your church could handle this for our city? We can help with a cook, food, rent and medical assistance."

My heart throbbed with

excitement. "Dona Olga, if the church took up your suggestion, we could not accept the help of the city with strings attached. We must have the freedom to teach them about Jesus Christ. If the gospel doesn't germinate in their lives, all the psychologists and social services in town will not transform street children to enable them to integrate into society as happy, contributing citizens."

"Oh, I certainly agree that God is important in a person's life," Olga responded. "All religions lead to God and are good," she eagerly added.

"We don't teach religion," I countered. "We'll introduce the children to a person—Jesus Christ—who said that only He leads man to God. They must have an internal force to say no to drugs and street crime."

Olga began asking questions about our church program and personnel. "Please take the idea to the church and get back with me," she concluded.

The church formed a committee which drew up a list of what they would consider positive responses from God. These would confirm His direction to begin such a ministry:

1. The need for such a ministry in Araras must be verified.

2. Financial basis would come outside the present church budget (city government, community, pledges).

3. Full-time workers would accept it as a ministry.

4. Volunteers would emerge for all areas of the program.

5. A place would be found to house the children.

While we were waiting for God to confirm this new ministry (about ten months), the police were delivering battered street children to our house. By the time all the items on the list had been confirmed, except a house, we had four children living with us. With a green light on four items and nine people in our home, we started looking for a house.

When folks found out we wanted to put street children in their rental houses, the facilities were no longer available. We prayed that God would help us find a property owner who would consider this a valuable

project.

Soon, a friend and I found a man loading his furniture into a truck outside a house. We stopped and explained our situation and asked if his house were for rent. The tall, seriousfaced man looked down at us and asked, "Do you mean you want me to rent my house to fill up with street children?"

"Yes, sir, we do."

"Well . . . I think that is a good idea," said the man. "I'll lower the rent if that will help. By the way, could you use some furniture?"

That was a beautiful way to

receive an answer to prayer.

The community had sponsored a benefit dinner and had money ready for beds and mattresses. Within 24 hours, the house was furnished with donated items and we moved in on August 10, 1991.

But since red tape delayed the registration of the NEW LIFE HOME (Lar Nova Vida) for children, the city could not legally give us rent money or a cook. For the first two months' rent, 50 church friends pledged \$4.00 a month to cover the costs.

Next, the Christian widow who had asked to work as a governess of the home was declared physically unable to work. Seven volunteers had been waiting three weeks for her to arrive. I had been staying in the home 24 hours a day for those weeks.

One night after all the children were asleep I stretched out exhausted across the bed and broke down in tears, "Dear God, this is not how I understood it. You confirmed. We began. The children are here. What is it You intend to do?"

He placed His holy arms around me as I had my cry. I picked up my Portuguese Bible and from His Word He showed me, "Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the Lord keep the city . . . ."

In two days, I was taken completely out of the picture and out of the country for three weeks due to family illness. During that time, the legal registration was granted and the city sent a cook and rent money. Two more children, ages one and two, were sent.

Volunteers signed up to spend nights and work days.

Currently, LAR NOVA VIDA is in a larger house with 15 children sent to us by the juvenile judge. A young couple from the church and their three children also live there along with four adult workers. That makes 24 people in a three-bedroom home.

Let me tell you about some of our children.

Kleverton, nine years old, was beaten almost unconscious several times by his step-father. At six he was raped by a stranger.

Maria, nine years old, escaped from an alcoholic mother who ran after her with a knife.

Elaine, 12, was sniffing glue and begging in the streets for her alcoholic mother and little brother.

Jose Carlos, six, brother to Elaine, arrived suffering from Continued on page 6

João Paulo, almost three, was taken from his mother after she had tried to commit suicide by jumping in front of a car with him in her arms. Since then she has died from an overdose of pills.

Milton, almost two, could not walk when we received him at one year and eight months. He was full of skin sores. His mother did not want him.

Alessandro, five, was abandoned by his mother and had been shifted from place to place.

Alex, seven, and Reginaldo, 14. were abandoned by their mother.

Marcia, ten, was sleeping under a bridge to escape an alcoholic mother.

Thiago, eleven, Paulo, eight, Camila, six, and Caroline, two, came to us so that their alcoholic mother could be admitted into the hospital.

Ivani, seven, and Ana Paula, six, were in the streets, full of sores, with no food or shelter. They had been living with their mother in a house of prostitution.

Even with Lar Nova Vida, children continue to be exterminated. Statistics indicate 4,611 children were assassinated last year in Brazil. Ten thousand died of abuse. Another 100 thousand were abused and beaten but survived. All over Brazil thousands live in the streets.

Statistics like these hurt. But not as much as they used to because now our little church is doing something about it through LAR NOVA VIDA.


projects will be channeled through our new VISION fund.

Liberal, Mo.—Missionary appointees Curt and Mary Holland (see cover story) were officially commissioned on June 14 for missionary service in Brazil. The special service was held at Verdella Free Will Baptist Church in Liberal, Mo., where Curt answered the call to preach and later pastored. This was also Mary's home church.

R. Eugene Waddell, general director of foreign missions, was on hand to give the commissioning charge following the message and challenge by Dan Farmer, pastor in Moore, Okla. Don Anderson is pastor of the Verdella church. The Hollands hope to leave for Brazil in August if their visas are approved.

## Dale Bishop Ordained Via Satellite Phone

Japan—Dale Bishop, missionary to Nopporo, Japan, was officially ordained to the gospel ministry on Saturday, April 18, via satellite telephone hook-up.

The Little River District Association of Georgia conducted the ordination service during a quarterly meeting at Homerville, Ga.

Reverend Rowan Sirmans, chairman of the Little River Ordaining Council, gave Dale a short admonition to continue serving the Lord in Japan and winning souls to the Lord. Then he prayed the prayer of dedication while the other members of

the ordaining council laid hands on him. In Japan, missionaries Jim McLain and Don McDonald laid hands on Dale with Sandra at his side.

The phone hook-up was transmitted through the church sound systems on both ends so that all could be included in the service.

Nichols requested prayer for Tewia, a young man who apparently has professed faith in Christ. His grandmother is a witchdoctor, and she has been counting on him to help her in her witchcraft. She has put a tremendous amount of pressure on him to return to the traditional worship of spirits.

Japan—The Hokkaido Association of Free Will Baptist churches met at the Higashi Tsukisamu church April 11-12 with approximately 60 people on hand. All of the Hokkaido Free Will Baptist churches were involved. According to missionary Jim McLain, "This was one of the best meetings we have had."

The theme for the session was "Revival" and featured Dale Bishop, Don McDonald and Jim McLain as speakers. The general board, the woman's auxiliary and the youth groups met in separate sessions on Saturday night after a Bible message.

Board Sets 1993 Budget, Approves New Affiliate

Antioch, Tenn.—The Board of Foreign Missions met at the new National Offices building in Antioch, Tenn., April 27-29 for its annual session. A proposed 1993 budget of \$4,379,332 was adopted, and Miss Sarah Malone was approved as an affiliate for one year in China. She will be serving as a teacher in Beijing.

Among other action was the adoption of a new Fellow Helper's Fund, designed to help missionaries who approach the \$8,000 deficit which could cause them to be brought home. A medicare supplemental insurance program was also

adopted.

Dr. Kenneth Eagleton wrote, "After talking to them to make sure they understood their decision, we proceeded to tear down the idols
