





gigantic explosion! That's what we want to see in São José, a section of Campinas, Brazil. But we can't deny the medium-sized explosion we are witnessing even today.

After about a year and a half of witnessing and working in the São José area we finally held our first Sunday night service on May 2 of this year with 54 people present. Two people who attended that service left with a copy of the evangelistic Bible study and expressed a desire to know more. Praise God!

Although we had been holding Bible studies in the area since September of 1997, our first official outreach in the community began on April 4, 1998. Some 35 young people and adults from the First Free Will Baptist Church of Campinas held an open-air meeting that night.

During that outdoor service the group handed out almost 200 Bible tracts along with an invitation to the first official preaching service on the following Thursday. Those weekly Thursday night preaching services in the home of Bill and Claudia, a couple from the First church, continued for the next two months with only one unsaved visitor attending.

Due to circumstances such as work schedules and schooling, we moved the evangelistic services to Saturday night. And God began to open doors! On Saturday night, June 20, 1998, we showed the JESUS film in an open soccer field. Although it was cold and wintry by Brazilian standards, 130 people braved the weather to view the story of Christ. We were thrilled that 28 people made professions of faith even though few of them have been discipled.

Gradually, God started working in hearts. Two people had been saved in December of 1997 and in May of 1998 four people from the area were baptized. Osmir, a young man who had been hired to help announce the film showing in June, was saved the Saturday following the event, even though he was unable to attend the showing. Osmir really grew in the Lord, and today he is studying at the local Baptist Bible college. He wants to be a Free Will Baptist pastor.

From June of 1998 until April of this year we have had prayer and Bible study on Tuesday and Thursday nights in addition to our Saturday

night evangelistic services. The Lord blessed those three weekly services, and those believers who could attended the regular Sunday night services at the First church.

As the people continued to witness, God used them to reach others for Christ. Consequently, in November of 1998 we rented a larger building across the street from Bill and Claudia. Sunday school attendance averaged 19 in December. We baptized four more people in February of this year and attendance grew to 38 by May with 43 in the night service.

Many of our people are having evangelistic Bible studies in their homes with the unsaved. Open-air evangelistic meetings, weekly food baskets for the needy and reading classes for the illiterate are just a few of the ministries conducted by our group from São José. And God is honoring these efforts.

The best way to describe this miniature explosion in São José is found in Nehemiah 4:6b: "For the people had a mind to work." Yes, our people do HAVE a mind to work!

# Six Graduate from Institute in Bouna

Six students graduated on May 22 from the Bible institute in Bouna, Côte d'Ivoire. According to Clint Morgan, the graduates have proven themselves well during their internships. Five of the men are already pastoring; the other is working with the decentralized leadership training program. Five of the graduates are married and one man remains single.

General Director James Forlines was present and spoke at the special event. A number of Ivory Coast dignitaries also were present to extend special greetings. The ceremony was held in the Bouna Free Will Baptist Church which was filled for the service. An offering was received and divided among the six graduates.

Mr. Forlines had just spent three days teaching a seminar on practical pastoral issues for the graduating students and former graduates. A total of 21 out of 24 graduates were present for the seminar.

# **Exploring Opportunities**

Several years ago I boarded a plane for a speaking engagement in another area of the country. As usual, I was hoping the plane would not be filled and I would have room to stretch out a little. A group of five cheerful people filed in to take the remaining two seats on my row and the complete row behind me. They were obviously excited about the trip they were taking as a group.

I found myself wondering what vacation destination they had chosen. Since I was traveling by myself, I listened in on their conversation. Quite frequently they would refer to the "mission." After several minutes I asked the young lady sitting beside me, "Where are all of you going? And, what is the 'mission' you are referring to?"

# **Donated Time**

They were all medical personnel from Little Rock, Ark. Two were radiologists, one was a technician. and the other two were physical therapists. They dedicated two

weeks of their vacation each year to go to Haiti and donate their time to a medical mission of their denomination. Several of them had been doing this for six years straight. They looked forward all year long to using their medical training to further the cause of Christ. Their excitement on that particular trip was enhanced by the fact that they were taking an X-ray machine which had been donated by the hospital where they all worked.

# **FWB** Opportunities

At that time I was not aware of all the people who have done similar things for Free Will Baptists. Medical, educational, agricultural, and building teams have all aided the cause of world evangelism through Free Will Baptists. Some have spent days and weeks overseas while others have given a year or two in special service.

When I was a teenager I felt that any serious-minded Christian needed to prayerfully consider whether or not God was calling him or her into full-time Christian service. For those who did not sense that call. I reasoned it really didn't matter to God what they did with their life as long as it was legal, moral, and ethical. Of course, I thought they needed to attend church regularly, tithe, and try to be a witness to their

friends. Otherwise, I believed they were free to chase the American dream.

That certainly is not the teaching of God's Word. Every Christian should find his or her place in God's service to reach the world for Christ. This is true whether a person is a teacher, doctor, plumber, accountant, or whatever. This is especially true of you retirees. More and more opportunities are becoming available overseas as missions personnel and creative individuals discern ways to use YOUR abilities and training around the world to advance the Kingdom.
