a free will baptist challenge!

God gave us a vision, a plan," says Dr. John (Young Chool) Chang of Seoul, Korea.

Dr. Chang and his wife, Esther (Eun Sook) Chang, say their priority for Korea is to "plant a strong, Bible-teaching church with an emphasis on training young people. I want to develop a Bible-training institute and I believe we can send Free Will Baptist missionaries from Korea to Asia and other parts of the world in the twenty-first century."

In December the Changs were commissioned by the Board of Foreign Missions to do just that. Their appointment was a step toward reaching South Korea, North Korea and the Asian Pacific Rim with the gospel. Dr. John, an experienced South Korean pastor and well-known international evangelist, is confident he can plant at least five churches in 1999. His goal includes 10 more churches by the end of 2000 and he expects to have a total of 30 by the end of 2001.

Dr. John came from a Buddhist background. He was actually converted through the Navigators while he was in the Korean Air Force.

Dr. Chang and his wife officially joined Free Will Baptists in October of last year when they became members of Heritage FWB Church in Gilbert, Ariz., pastored by Paul Thompson. Although he has pastored for 12 years in Korea and served as an evangelist for another 20 years, Dr. Chang has been "looking for a strong group to work with." His acquaintance

with Dr. Paul Park, Korean missionary in California under FWB Home Missions, caused him to consider working with this "Bible believing people with a warm heart and a mission mindedness."

When Dr. Melvin Worthington, executive secretary, Trymon Messer, Paul Park, Jimmy Aldridge, Earl Hendrix, Jim McAllister and several others went to Korea in September of last year, they met with Dr. Chang and other South Korean leaders.

"At that time God really challenged my heart with the desire to work with Free Will Baptists," Chang declared. "Since then I have met Free Will Baptists in the National Offices and have preached in several churches in Arizona, California, Tennessee and North Carolina. I spoke at the Bible colleges in Nashville and North Carolina and I'm so encouraged over how they love the Lord Jesus Christ. I never met one single person who gave me a bad impression!"

Although Korea has many churches and denominations, Dr. Chang says "we need strong, fundamental, evangelical, conservative, Bible-teaching churches in Korea."

Dr. John came from a Buddhist background but began attending church when he was 16 years of age. He was actually converted through the Navigators while he was in the Korean Air Force. He began preaching when 21 years of age and was ordained in 1970.

John met his wife at church while a second lieutenant in the air force. She was a choir member who caught his eye and heart. They have three grown children—two daughters and a son—all living in the area of Phoenix, Ariz. Two children are married and one daughter is still single.

The Changs are well qualified for the task they assume. Both John and Esther hold several college degrees from reputable institutions. They have

earned doctorates from Southern California Seminary, John a Ph.D. in theology and Esther a D.R.E. Esther taught Christian education approximately 20 years in an independent seminary in Korea.

"I believe KOREA IS THE GATEWAY TO EVANGELIZE ALL OF ASIA. The world is our mission field."

From 1970 to 1980 Dr. Chang served as a chaplain in the Korean Air Force, and in 1981 he became Chief of Chaplains with the rank of Lt. Colonel. In addition to this, he has enjoyed a worldwide evangelistic ministry.

Dr. Chang says he and his wife have a list of acquaintances and potential collaborators in Korea waiting to help them reach their lofty goals of starting new Free Will Baptist churches in the cities of Seoul and Pusan. Seoul has a population of more than 11 million people and Pusan has over four million.

Broken over the fact that his coun-

try is divided into North and South Korea, Dr. Chang wants to do something to reach those in North Korea with the gospel. He also says, ***"I believe Korea is the gateway to evangelize all of Asia. The world is our mission field."***

James Forlines, general director for Foreign Missions, says, "Free Will Baptists in the United States will play a key role in this effort. We will need prayer warriors to uphold this strategic new ministry to reach the Pacific Rim of Asia with the gospel. We will need immediate monthly financial support for the Changs to continue at least three years. And we will need personnel to help in specific areas such as training seminars, etc."

Yes, the Changs have a vision! Thirty Korean Free Will Baptist churches by the end of the year 2001 might seem nearly impossible to most missionaries, but the Changs know Korea and Koreans. They have many prayer and personnel resources as well as a determination that would make even skeptics believe. After all, it is a Korean's vision, but it is our challenge!



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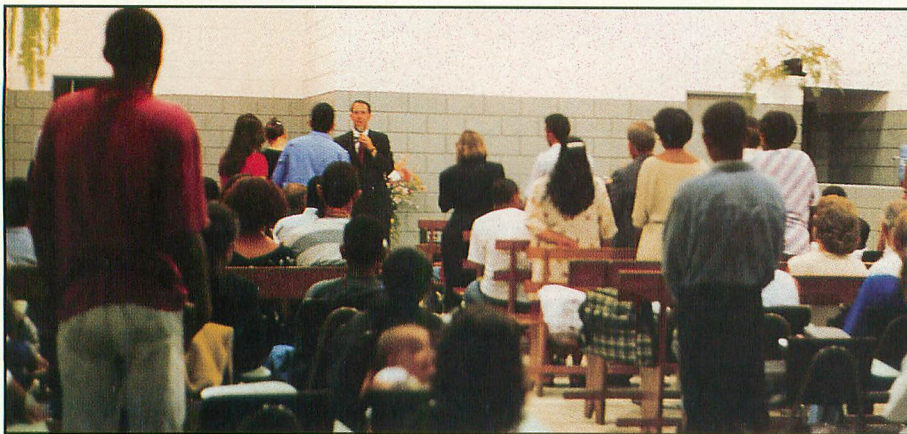

Forlines Visit Japan, View Ministries

General Director James Forlines and his wife, Anita, traveled to Japan on January 21 to meet with missionaries and view the Free Will Baptist ministries on the islands. They met with the field council and shared one another's concerns and visions, followed by a time of prayer. Mr. Forlines preached in several churches during their stay.

The Japanese pastors also met with James and the male missionaries to share their burdens and concerns. The Forlines indicated they were especially impressed by the commitment and involvement of lay people in the churches.

On February 4 James and Anita flew to Korea to meet with Dr. John Chang and church leaders prior to their return to the United States.

Cousineau Injured in Motorcycle Accident

A motorcycle accident near Bouna in Côte d'Ivoire has caused serious injuries to missionary Mike Cousineau. The accident occurred at about 6:00 p.m. on February 26 as Mike and two students from International Christian Academy in Bouaké were approaching Bouna.

Mike's bike hit a rut in the road and flipped. He was taken to Bouna and then transported to Abidjan by Clint and Lynette Morgan. Cousineau's collarbone was broken in three places, four ribs were broken,

and his shoulder blade was broken. Although Mike was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident, he sustained some injury to the head but CT scans indicated no internal damage.

Deleen Cousineau urged people to pray that Mike would get some relief from the intense pain, and that Brooke and Kristina, their daughters, would sense God's peace through everything.

Waddells Attend Cuban National Convention

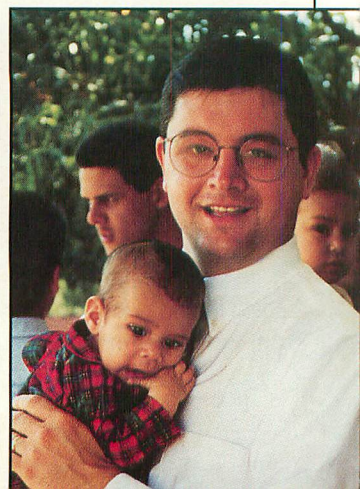
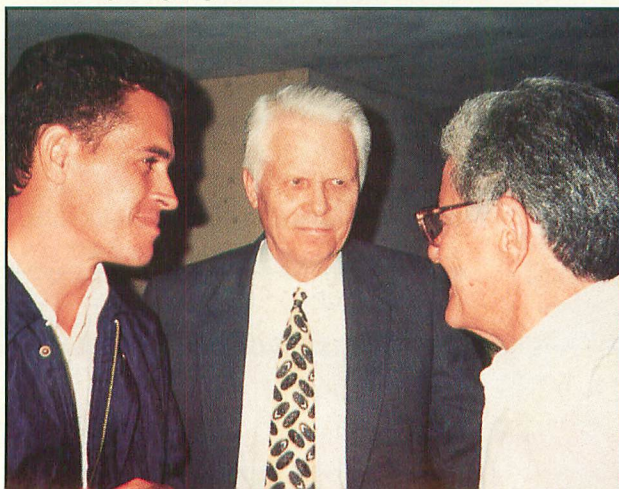

Lancasters, Corleys Depart for Fields

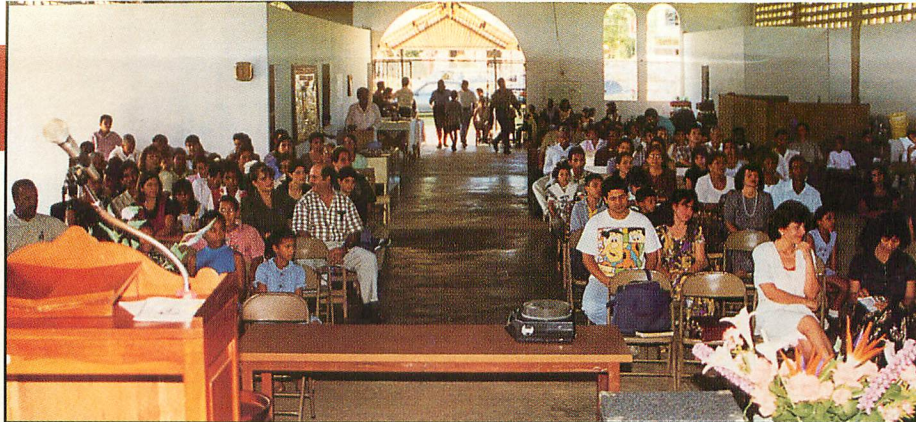

Korean Pastor Ordained, Two Given License

One Korean pastor was ordained on February 4 in Seoul, Korea. Foreign Mission Board Chairman Bill Jones, Vice-chairman Milton Worthington, and Overseas Secretary Jimmy Aldridge rendezvoused with General Director James Forlines that day to look over the work in Korea. The four acted as examining council and questioned Chang Suk Kim on Wednesday after their arrival. They also participated in his ordination service.

Two other men were examined and licensed to preach.

Kim is a seminary graduate. The ordination service was held in Sung Ji (Holy Land) Free Will Baptist Church which he started about six to eight months earlier in Seoul (see the article on pages 2 and 3).

Bailey Says Funerals Reap Other Converts

Mr. Takaso, an 86-year-old man, became a believer on February 2 at the Iriso church in a suburb of Tokyo, Japan. He was saved as a result of a chain of events and conversions and through the witness of Christian funerals.

Mrs. Sagara, who found the Iriso church name in a phone book, was saved on February 16. She had attended Sunday school as a child.

Belgium—Missionary Ginger Harrison left Quebec, Canada, on February 23 for Antwerp, Belgium, where she is enrolled in a course in tropical medicine before proceeding to Côte d'Ivoire.

Forlines' Focus

The Maintenance Mentality Will Not Work!

The maintenance mentality will never do the job of world evangelism. You might ask, "What is the maintenance mentality?" This is the attitude which is manifested by those who are only willing to pay the price to keep up what we presently have.

Great Faith and Courage

We as Free Will Baptists can be proud of our missionary heritage. From Laura Belle Barnard, who went to India as a single missionary in the '30s, to those who continue to answer the call today, our missionaries have exhibited great faith and courage in their efforts to take the gospel to the ends of the earth. But it is time for a quantum leap in our efforts at world evangelism. A new vision and greater levels of sacrifice than we have ever seen are needed for the immensity of the task.

Before world evangelism is a

program, it must become a driving passion. There should be something in our hearts which propels us toward those who have never heard the gospel which can save their eternal souls.

The Moravian Challenge

The history of Christian missions provides a challenging illustration of a people who took the Great Commission seriously. Sixty years before William Carey set out for India and 150 years before Hudson Taylor set his foot in China, the Moravian Brethren sent out their first missionaries in 1732. This small Christian community of around 300 settled in the mountains of Saxony in Central Europe. This group grew and sent out 2,158 of its members overseas as missionaries during the next 150 years.

Counting the Cost

Dr. A. C. Thompson, a nineteenth century missionary historian, wrote: "So fully is the duty of evangelizing the heathen lodged in current thought that the fact of anyone entering personally upon that work never creates surprise . . . It is not regarded as a thing that calls for widespread heralding, as if something marvelous or even unusual were in hand."

Many of the places the Moravians went meant almost certain disease and possibly even death. Of the first 160 missionaries to go to Guyana, 75 died from tropical disease or poisoning. Men like Andrew Rittsmansberger died within six months of landing. One of their first missionaries to Greenland wrote the words to a hymn: "Lo through ice and snow, one poor lost soul for Christ to gain; Glad, we bear want and distress to set forth the Lamb once slain."

A Willingness to Sacrifice

Can we not learn something from their sacrifice? Should we not have literally hundreds of people answering the call to take the gospel to the ends of the earth (perhaps someone reading this article right now)? If so, how will they be able to go unless they are sent (Romans 10:15)? What measure of true sacrifice should we be willing to assume so the cause of Christ might be spread to the nearly 7,000 people groups who have never heard the gospel?
