

PROCEEDINGS

Of the Forty-sixth Annual Session of the Arkansas State Association and League of Freewill Baptist Meeting.

The Ministers, Deacons, Delegates, Associational Clerks, and League Delegates, composing that part of the Church of GOD or CHRIST, commonly known as Freewill Baptist, of the Arkansas State Association, met in annual session with Macedonia Church. near New Edinburg, Cleveland County, October 1 to 4, 1943.

The inception recorded a large representation from all parts of the State. Everyone seemed to understand his mission, and business was carried on in an orderly manner. The whole atmosphere of the working body was perfectly harmonious throughout the session.

Service was opened with a special number as a quartette, "When I Am Gone," by Lonnie Brown, Mrs. Lewis Hoffman, Leonard Doggett, and Earl Clark. Class song, "When the Roll Is Called Up Yonder."

At this time Eld. W. F. McGee, of Russellville, Ark., brought the message in memory of those who have departed this life since last Association, using as a Scripture lesson Prov. 31:16 to 31, and for a subject Solomon's song, 6:2, "My beloved is gone down into his garden, to beds of spices, to feed in the gardens, and to gather lilies." Representing the earth or people as his garden, and the different churches as the gardens in which he fed, and gathered lillies. The lillies being the most fairest of flowers. Resolution No. 3 (Thanks) adopted and committee discharged. Talks were made by Eld. W. P. White, J. J. West, and W. F. McGee. Quartette, "I'm Waiting for the Boatman," dedicated to the aged ministers of Arkansas. Class songs, "When I Am Gone" and "Some Day."

Motion that the clerk write clerks of Associations not represent-

ed and have them represent by letter through the Minutes.

Motion carried to adjourn the business session, to meet with Ballews Chapel, Grubbs, Ark., Wednesday night before the first Sunday in October, 1944. The parting hand was taken and song, "I'll Meet You in the Morning." Closing prayer of the business session by Eld. W. A. Hearron.

SATURDAY NIGHT SESSION

Opening song, "Just Over in the Glory Land," and "It Won't Be Very Long," by Stanton White. A special, "The Crusification of Christ," by Mattie Sue and Martha Lou Barnett. Prayer by Eld. M. G. King. Song No. 82, "I'm Not Ashamed," by Leonard Doggett. Eld. W. S. Isbell read the fourth chapter of Matthew, and conducted the devotional service. Song, "The Glory Land Way," by

R. M. Moore. Song, "The Unseen Hand," by L. C. Doyle.

At this time Eld. L. C. Doyle, who was to bring the message of the hour, read the fifth chapter of Romans and used as a text Mark 16:15, 16, "And He said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Theme, "Justified By Faith." Two numbers were directed by R. M. Moore and again the congregation greeted each other with that lovely Christian handshake. Dismissed with prayer.

SUNDAY MORNING SESSION.

Though many of the delegates had left for their homes, a large crowd gathered back Sunday morning for another real enjoyable service. A number of selections were rendered by the class. REPORT OF COMMITTEES.

TEMPERANCE—We, the Committee on Temperance, submit the following: That we, the Free Will Baptist State Association, in annual session, being against strong drink in all its phases and demoralization to our people. Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging, and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise. The sin of intemperance is a shameful reproach to our nation. We hereby pledge ourselves to total abstinance, that every means and opportunity be used to educate our people to the evils of strong drink. That we pledge our cooperation to every movement designed to destroy the liquor traffic; that we support men to office who are opposed to strong drink in any form. We endorse the action of the counties that have voted the sale of strong drink out, and sincerely urge all others to call elections and vote out this evil as fast as possible.—C. E. Wilson, M. G. STATISTICAL—We, Your Committee, submit the following: From the Association represented: We have received 373, by baptism 310, dismissed 22, died 33; number of churches 88, with a membership of 5,560.—Mrs. Ralph Staten, Mrs. C. E. Wilson, Mrs. Ralph Whitenburg, Committee.

AUDITING—We have audited the Corresponding Clerk's records and find them well kept, with all moneys accounted for. They show the amount on hand, \$105.00, and the money of Saline Association not turned in at this time. Said moneys to be used for printing of Minutes, clerk hire and other expenses.—E. O. Wright, J. M. Holleman, J. M. Crouch, Committee.

OBITUARY—We, your Committee, find that the all-wise God has seen best to call from our midst 33 of our members to their rewards. Some of our aged ministers were in this number. Their places are vacant here with us, but filled in the place that has been prepared for them. Their lives will live in our memories. We are submissive.—Eld. J. E. White, T. J. Robertson, Earl Clark, Com.

ASSOCIATIONS NOT REPRESENTED—We find the following Associations not represented: Old Mt. Zion, Rich Mountain, and Tyronza.—Lorton Calvert, A. D. Ferguson, Mrs. T.L. Tackett, Com.

REQUEST—We recommend that if no Association ask for the next state meeting by letter, that we abolish the old rule and bring the matter to the house for a ruling by that body.—Stanton Whie, Hazel McCoy, Frank, Francis, Committee.

SABBATH SCHOOL—We find that our Associations have reported Sunday Schools in most all Churches, and the majority are using Free Will Baptist Literature. We recommend that in selecting teachers for the different classes that Christians be selected as far as possible, and parents urged to be faithful in attendance, setting the right example before their children. A careful study and prep-

aration of the lessons will create a greater interest in the schools, and much more can be accomplished by this.—G. G. Dipboye, Julie Gideon, Ollie Sweeney, Committee.

RESOLUTION No. 1—We recommend that this body elect two members to serve on the Executive Board; the Board to be composed of five members. That this committee be empowered to act on any emergency that might occur between the annual meetings of the Association. This committee will have the right to elect its own officers, and can legally transact business upon regular stated meetings when a majority is present.—L. C. Doyle, W. A. Hearron, W. S. Isbell, Committee.

RESOLUTION No. 2—Inasmuch as there as so many different theories presented the people today as Bible taught doctrines and amid the confusion it has brought, there are earnest inquiring subjects that have a right to know what we as Free Will Baptists teach. Feeling that this has been neglected to a great extent, Be It Resolved by this Assembly, that all subordinate Associations request of their churches, to have pastors or evangelists preach at least one sermon to their churches each year on the principals, treaties and doctrine set forth by the Free Will Baptists.—L. C. Doyle, W. A. Hearron, W. S. Isbell, Committee.

ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION ARTICLES OF FAITH

(Reported by Committee and Adopted by Convention)
(See Report of Committee)

- 1. GOD—We believe in one true and living Triune God; composed of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, equal in divine essence, Purpose, Power and Glory. St. John 1:1; I Cor. 8:6; I John 5:7; St. John 10:30.
- 2. CHRIST—We believe that Jesus Christ is the divine son of God. With the Father and the Holy Spirit at the time of the Creation, left the Courts of Heaven and came to this earth. Took upon himself the form of humanity, sin accepted, by being born to the Virgin Mary, manifested his power, was crucified, placed in Joseph's new tomb, arose from the dead the third day, completing the great plan of salvation, walked and talked with his disciples, publicly ascended up to heaven, and that he will descend again to gather his jewels home. Isaiah 9:6; St. John 1:14; Luke 1:26-28; Math. 14:13-21; Mark 16:9-19; Luke 24:50-53; Acts 1:9-12; Mark 15:22-41.
- 3. HOLY SPRIT—We believe that the Holy Spirit has visited true believers in all ages and especially since the ascension of the SON back to the Father, and its coming on the day of Penticost. Has taken up its office work among all nations of people as a Divine Reprover, Comforter and Guide. Judges 6:34; 11-29; St. John 16:8-14; Isaiah 63:10-12; Eph. 4:30; Acts 8:17-20.
- 4. THE BIBLE—We believe the Bible which is composed of the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments was given by Inspiration of GOD, is our waybill from earth to heaven, and only infallible rule of faith and practice. II Peter 1:19-21; II Tim. 3:14-17; Daniel 10:21; Acts 1:16-17; Math. 21:42.
- 5. THE FALL OF MAN—We believe that GOD created man good, gave him a just law by which he should be governed, with promises of reward for faithfulness and with penalties of punishment for disobedience. Gave man power of free moral agency to choose the right and reject the wrong. But our first parents heeded the voice of the great enemy of Souls, voluntarily transgressed the law of GOD, fell with all their posterity, under the just penalty of the same, and were unable of their own power to extricate or save themselves from the great dilemma into which they had fallen. God gave to them 'the hope of salvation through the coming CHRIST. Gen. 1:27; Gen. 2:16-17; Rom. 11:11-35; Psalms 37:23-24; Rom 5:18.
- 6. REDEMPTION, SALVATION, ADOPTION—We believe that Jesus Christ by his birth, death, burial and resurrection and ascension, paid the purchase price of the redemption of the whole human race, arranged a pardon for all who come to Him upon Gospel terms; and a law of adoption into the Kingdom of Heaven, and an eternal inheritance into the glorified Kingdom above. Heb. 9:12; Gal. 3:13; 4:4-5; Titus 2:14; Heb. 1:4; St. John 3:16; Isa. 45:22.
- 7. CONDITION OF SALVATION—We believe that all persons dying in infancy and all idiots are saved by the atoning merits of the Son of GOD without any act upon their part; that persons coming to the years of accountability, transgressing the law of God, must upon their part exercise faith in Jesus Christ through repentance toward God, at the completion of which pardon takes place in the mind of the Father and by the Holy Spirit they pass through the ordeal of regeneration, are washed in the blood of the lamb and are planted in the Kingdom of Christ. John 3rd chapter; Math. 19:13-22; II Cor. 7:10; Luke 18:16-17; St. John 4:11-16; Psalms 98:3.
- 8. SALVATION FREE—We believe that God desires the salvation of all; Christ died for all; the gospel invites all; the Holy Spirit

strives with all, and whomsoever will may come and be saved upon the terms of the gospel. I Peter 1:9-13,25; 2:9-24-25; Rev. 22:17.

- 9. BAPTISM—We believe that christian baptism is the immersion of believers in water, in the name of the Father, the Son and Holy Spirit, in which is represented the burial and resurrection of Christ; also represents our death to sin, and only those who have come under the presbytery of elders are qualified to administer the same. Math. 3:14-15-16; I Peter 3:21; St. John 3:23; Acts 10:47; Math. 28:19.
- 10. COMMUNION AND FEET WASHING—We believe that the Lord's Supper and the washing of feet are ordinances of the gospel of Christ; the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Saviour to commemorate his broken body and shed blood for the sins of the world, and to show our remembrance of him till he comes. All Christians have a right to the Lord's supper and should be invited; "let a man examine himself and so let him eat."

The washing of feet was instituted by our Lord at the same time that the supper was instituted as an act of humility to show our love for each other and both ordinances should be perpetuated by all christians until His second coming. Luke 22:19-20; I Cor. 11:20-29; St. John 13:1-18; Math. 26:27, 28, 29.

- 11. THE SABBATH—We believe that the Christian Sabbath should be observed as a day of rest and for the worship of God; that we should abstain from all sinful amusements and secular employments, works of mercy and piety excepted. Exodus 20:11; Exodus 31:12-18; Deut. 5:12-15; Ezek. 20:12; Math. 28-1; Luke 23:56; Acts 13-42-48; Mark 2-27.
- 12. CALL TO THE MINISTRY—We believe in a divine call of the ministry; that God in his goodness and power of grace, impresses His ministers with the burden of lost souls, to the extent that the call becomes irresistible with personal contentment; that when they yield to the call and exercise their native gifts according to the scriptures with a full reliance upon him; he accompanies them in the person of the Holy Spirit to guide them in the way of truth and to bless their labors according to his purpose. Jonah 1:1; Jer. 1:5; Mark 3:14; Acts 1:22-26; Math. 28:19.
- 13. THE INVISIBLE CHURCH—We believe that the Invisible or Spiritual Church is the redeemed in the aggregate, is the family of God, is composed of all true christians of every congregation from righteous able to the restitution of all things, from every kindred, nation, tongue and people. Ephes. 3:16-21; Heb. 12:22-23; I Peter 2:5; Epes. 2:20-22; Acts 2:47; Math. 16-18.
- 14. THE VISIBLE CHURCH—We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful men and women, having obtained fellowship with the Lord and with each other, agreeing to keep up a good discipline and doctrine according to the rules of the gospel. II Thes. 1:1; Acts 16:5; Third John 1:10; Math. 18:17; Acts 20:28; Rev. 1:4-11-20.
- 15. PERSEVERANCE—We believe that all true believers in Christ should preserve in divine grace, and in the knowledge of the truth and that God's grace is sufficient to help them to overcome all the obstacles of life and that all the combined forces of the great enemy of souls on earth and in Hell (or in his eternal abode) are not able to pluck them from his hand so long as they walk in the path of duty; but those who sidestep and wilfully refuse or neglect to perform their duty they would backslide and if persistenly continued would be eternally lost. Second Cor. 9:10; Second Peter 1:4-8; I Peter 2:2; Rom. 8:35-39; Apostasy: Second Peter 1:8-9;

First Cor. 10:1-13; Heb. 12:15-17; First John 5-16; Heb. 6:16; First Tim. 4:1-2; Heb. 3:12; St. John 15:1-7; Math. 12:31-32.

- 16. CHRIST THE HEAD OF THE CHURCH—We believe that Christ is the great head of the Church, and that the government of the local church is with the body. Col. 1:18-19; Math. 16:18; Heb. 12:23; Math. 21:42; Ephes. 1:22; Acts 16:4-5.
- 17. SANCTIFICATION—Sanctification is a work of God's grace, by which the soul is cleansed from all sin and wholly consecrated to Christ. It takes place in regeneration, and the christian can and should abide in this state to the end of life, constantly growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ Christ. I Cor. 6:11; II Thes. 2:13; Heb. 12:14; Phil. 3:21; Sec. Thes. 5-19-23; St. John 17:17-19; Sec. Tim. 2:20-21.

18. THE SOUL—The soul is endless, hence does not die with the body, but immediately after death enters into conscious state of happiness or misery according to the spiritual character here possessed. Phil. 1:23; Luke 23-43; Rev. 6-9; Luke 16:19-25; Math. 10:28.

19. THE RESURRECTION—We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of righteous and wicked. When the resurrection shall take place, the soul and body shall be reunited, the righteous shall be received into everlasting happiness to reign with God forever; but the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment. Math. 28:6; St. John 5:28-29; I Cor. 15:51-58.

JUDGMENT—We believe that there will be a general, universal judgment, when all men shall be judged according to their works whether they be good or bad, and that immediately thereafter the wicked shall enter into everlasting punishment and the righteous into eternal happiness. II Thes. 1:4-9; Rev. 14:9-13; Luke 16:23; Rev. 21:8; II Cor. 5:10; Math. 12:36-37; Rev. 20:12-13; Acts 17:31.

ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION

CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we, the Association of Jesus Christ, being regularly baptized upon the profession of faith in Christ, are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Associations to perpetuate a union and communion among us, and to preserve and maintain a correspondence with each other, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of our Association according to the following plan of government:

1. The State Association shall be composed of five Messengers chosen by each District Association of this union and all regularly ordained ministers, deacons, and the district associational clerks.

2. Letters from different Associations shall express their number in fellowship, the number received by experience, letter or recommendation, dismissed, restored, and that have died since our last Association; and the name of the clerk, moderator, county postoffice, Sabbath of meeting, and the amount paid for Minute Fund.

3. The members thus chosen and convened, to be denominated the State Association of Freewill Baptists, being composed of the subordinate Associations of the State of Arkansas, and the Association to have no power to Lord it over God's heritage, nor to have any ecclestiacal power of the Association, reserving the right of withdrawing from any Association becoming disorderly.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk, and a Corresponding Clerk, who are to be chosen by the suffrage of the mem-

bers present.

5. New Associations may be admitted into the Association by letter and delegates, if found orthodox in the faith of the Freewill Baptists, the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

- 6. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association unless it be withdrawn by the members making it.
- 7. The Association is to endeavor to furnish the subordinate Associations with the minutes of this Association, in proportion to the number of members in each Association, the distribution being at the discretion of the Association.

8. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular file of the Minutes.

- 9. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needed, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association closes.
- 10. The Association shall have a fund for her support, which shall be supplied by the voluntary contribution of the Associations, whose duty it shall be to send it by the hands of messengers, which money so sent shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer for that purpose, and he shall be held accountable to the Association for all money received by him until paid out as they may direct.

11. The Association, in case of failure of any Association to

attend, may inquire into the cause.

12. It is the duty of the Association to see after the union of the Associations.

13. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any sitting of the annual State meeting of Freewill Baptists in

Arkansas by a two-thirds vote of the members of said body.

14. First—In the absence of the pastor, the deacons of any Freewill Baptist Church in the State of Arkansas are authorized to preside at any Conference, any business transcated during the conference wil be legal, if the majority of its active church members are present and the church is in good standing in its association.

Second: The Baptism will not be accepted unless administered

by an ordained individual.

FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

RULES OF ORDER

1. At every sitting of the Association, business shall be opened and concluded with a prayer.

2. Those who speak shall rise, address the Moderator, and per-

sonal reflections shall be avoided.

- 3. All motions made and seconded shall be open for discussion, but debate may be shut off at any time by a majority of the members of the Association.
- 4. If any proposition or motion under debate contains two or more points, it shall be divided at the request of any member and the vote taken separately.

5. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes,

unless so ordered at the time.

6. No one shall speak more than once on the same subject without speacial leave from the body.

7. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the members

present.

- 8. No member shall absent himself without leave of the Moderator.
- 8. Arrangements shall be made so as to insure two sermons or other devotional exercises equivalent thereto in addition to the business session each day, and the Moderator announce at the adjournment of each business session who is to have charge of said service.
- 10. Alterations may be made in these rules at any regular meeting of the Association.
