PROCEEDINGS TUESDAY EVENING, AUGUST 16, 1983

Note: Boyd Osborne served as Song Director for the entire session. Sue Patton served as Pianist, and Brenda Pursell as Organist.

The 86th annual session of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists met at Camp Beaverford, Conway, AR August 16, 1983. The convention theme was "Christian Unity". Theme verses. Psalms 133:1, and Acts 2:42.

The evening service was opened by singing "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms", prayer by Bob Isbell. Congregation sang "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart".

The Clerk, Wendell Leckbee, called the convention into official session, and introduced the Moderator, Carl Cheshier. Bro. Cheshier gave a warm welcome to everyone and spoke concerning the Theme.

The following were elected to the Committee on Committees: Floyd Wolfenbarger, David Winfrey, Lawnie Coffman, Bobby Shepherd, and Bill Johnson.

The congregation sang "Brethren, We Have Met To Worship". Special number in song by Deanna Greenwood.. "Love Grew Where The Blood Fell". Dawn Davis sang. "My House Is Full". Prayer by Rupert Pixley.

Bro. Cheshier introduced, Jack Williams, Editor of Contact, Nashville, TN as the evening speaker. Bro. Williams spoke on the Subject "The Basis of Unity in the Apostles' Doctrine" using Acts 2:41-43.

A partial report of the Committee on Committees was given and adopted. Announcements were made by Carl Cheshier, and the services were dismissed with prayer, led by Rue Dell Smith.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, AUGUST 17, 1983

Services were opened by the congregation singing "He Brought Me Out", prayer by Burl Osborne. Special Music was presented by Jan Johnson and Yvonne Neal singing. "Surely The Presence of the Lord Is In This Place".

The Moderator called the meeting into session and introduced Roy Wilson, Pastor at South Heights, Searcy, who brought the morning devotional from Mark 9:28. Prayer by Bill Johnson.

The standing delegates were seated by the Moderator. The program was adopted.

Report No. 1: Final report of the Committee on Committees was given and adopted.

Report No. 2: Report of the Credentials Committee was given and adopted. The delegates were seated.

Report No. 3: Report of the Executive Board was given by Rupert Pixley.

The report of the Executive Board was adopted. A recommended constitutional change was laid on the table.

Herman Hersey, National Director of Retirement and Insurance, reported on the program and the work of the department.

Melvin Worthington, National Executive Secretary, brought greetings and commended Arkansas for contributing \$42,675.02 through the Co-op plan, and giving a total of \$201,698.25 to National causes.

It was pointed out that the financial reports and budgets of the various boards could coincide with the calendar year, but that the reports on the activities of the various boards, according to the constitution, must be on a current basis.

Report No. 1: Report of the Promotional Director was given. A motion carried to receive the report and adopt the budgets.

Report No. 5: Report of the Christian Supply Book Store was given and adopted. Keith Johnson, Manager, mentioned the phenomenal growth of the book store over the last ten years, from sales of \$33,000 to \$200,000 scheduled for 1983.

Report No. 6: Report of the CTS Board was given by Sidney Sawrie. Report adopted.

Dismissed in prayer by Loy Counts.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE AUGUST 17, 1983

Opened with congregation singing "There Shall Be Showers of Blessings", and "We're Marching to Zion". Prayer by David Bishop.

Special music was presented by the South Heights Chorale, singing. . "It Was His Love", and David and Sharon Stein playing a violin and flute duet. . "How Great Thou Art".

Rue Dell Smith, assistant Moderator, introduced Kevin Francis, Pastor at Jacksonville, as the morning speaker. He read Acts 2:42, and delivered the message. . "The Blessing of Unity in Fellowship".

After announcements by Bro. Smith the services were dismissed for the lunch hour by Wayne Douthit.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION AUGUST 17, 1983

Service opened with congregation singing "Look and Live". Prayer by Toby Jenkins. Special music was presented by Lori Norris singing. . "The Old Rugged Cross Made the Difference", and the Phillip's Chapel Trio singing. . "Step Along".

The afternoon devotional was given by A. E. Coffman, Pastor at Welcome Home. Bro. Coffman gave some interesting information

concerning the State Meeting 50 years ago.

Report No. 9: Report of the Christian Education Board was given by Ron Parker. Report adopted.

Report No. 10: Report of the Sunday School Board was given by Jerry Smith. Report adopted.

Report No. 11: Report of the Woman's Auxiliary was given by

Linda Harvey. Report adopted.

John Gibbs, Director of Development for the National Home Missions, gave words of greetings, and reported on the work of his department.

Frank Breeden, Free Will Baptist Bible College, brought greetings from the college administration and announced the plans for "ARKANSAS VENTURE 83", a week-end of activities planned by the college, to be held at Camp Beaverfork September 30-October 1.

Fred Warner, member of Foreign Missions Board, brought greetings from the department and reported on the work of the Missions Department.

Report No. 12: Report of the Nominating committee was given and adopted.

A motion was made to rescind the action of the Executive Board, which declared the position of Steve Trail, vacant. Motion carried. Bro. Trail will complete a 4 year term on the Executive Board.

The following delegates were elected to the 1984 National Association: Charlie Baggett, Richard Myhand, Gerald Greenwood, Dwight Kirkpatrick and John Lau.

A motion was made and passed that half of the evening missionary offering go to the "Fowlkes Brothers", who are going to Brazil to construct a building.

Jim Lauthern, representing the National Sunday School and CTS department, reported on the literature for these departments, as well as other educational materials. He encouraged the use of our young people in the Youth Conference in 1984.

Jim Vallance, General Director for Master's Men, gave greetings

and reported some of his plans and goals as the new Director.

The session was dismissed in prayer by Floyd Wolfenbarger.

WEDNESDAY EVENING WORSHIP SERVICE AUGUST 17, 1983

The service opened with the singing of "The Banner of the Cross". Zane Kirkland led in prayer.

A choir that had been organized during Youth Camp, led by

Steven Messer, sang a Medley of songs. The North Little Rock Quartet sang. . "Beulah Land", and "Casting Our Crowns at His Feet".

Congregational number. . "Who Is On the Lord's Side". The Moderator challenged the congregation to give a \$1,000 offering to be divided. . 50% going to the Fowlkes brothers; 25% to Ron Parker account; 25% to Siloam Springs special account.

A trio from the First church, Conway, sang. . "Step Into the

Water", and "It Is Finished".

The Moderator introduced Larry Cook, former Pastor at Greenwood, as the evening speaker. His message was "The Beginning of Unity in the Breaking of Bread". David Joslin made the final announcements, including the total offering was \$627.05. Clifford Sykes led the prayer of dismissal.

THURSDAY MORNING BUSINESS SESSION AUGUST 18, 1983

Motion to remove from the table the recommendation from the Executive Board concerning the constitutional change. Motion carried. (See Executive Board report for change.)

Jimmy Pursell mentioned that Danny Loveless had painted the big sign for the Camp at no charge for his labor. Mr. Loveless is in the hospital. Motion carried to send letter of appreciation to Mr. Loveless thanking him for this labor of love.

Report No. 14: The report of the Master's Men was given and received.

Report No. 15: The report of the Registration Committee was given and adopted.

Report No. 16: The report of the Resolutions Committee was given and adopted.

Report No. 17: The report of the Obituary Committee was given, names of deceased read, and the report received.

Opie Hargraves expressed his concern about fellowship and information regarding the work in India.

Motion passed to authorize Henry Brown to tape the State Association proceedings, and make tapes available for those who want to purchase them.

David Joslin requested that the program committee be authorized to plan the Thursday morning program with the business

to be held from 9 to 10, and the worship service to start at 10. Dismissed in prayer by John Gilliland.

REPORT NO.3: EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Executive Board met September 20, 1982, at the Western Sizzler in Russelville, Arkansas. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Rupert Pixley was elected as Chairman and Richard Bowers was elected as Secretary of the Board.

David Joslin gave a report of the State Association expenses for

1982. Two motions were presented for consideration.

- 1. That the State Executive Board request that the district associations and the local churches pay the \$30.00 per church fee for the purpose of hosting the 1984 session of the National Association in Little Rock by August of 1983.
- 2. That the Executive Board recommend to the State Association that the constitution of the State Association be amended as follows:

"That the words, 'the promotional director' be deleted from Article VII, Section 3, fourth paragraph under the title, Promotional Director, and that the paragraph be inserted as the second paragraph under Article VII, Section 3, Executive Board."

The paragraph would then read:

"A book store shall be operated from the State Headquarters under the supervision and direction of the Executive Board." (Motion passed.)

Motion passed to grant David Joslin the authority to puchase a new 1982 Buick Station Wagon. Keith Johnson gave a partial report of the Christian Supply Store. Motion passed to receive his report. Due to the time of this meeting, the quarterly reports of the Promotional Director and the Bookstore Manager were mailed to the members of the Executive Board following the completion of the quarter.

The Executive Board (acting as the Credentials Committee of th Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists) met September 20, 1982, at the Woodlawn Free Will Baptist Church, Russellville, Arkansas, with the Executive Board of the Antioch Association and the newly-organized River Valley Association. The purpose of the meeting was the examination of the River Valley Association for membership into the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists.

The Board met privately with both groups and then collectively with all the parties involved.

The major contention was the interpretation of Paul's statement in 1 Timothy 3:2 (i.e. the husband of one wife) and its relationship to the ordination of divorced persons who had remarried into either the ministry or deaconship of the local church.

Subsequently, the River Valley Association agreed to take into consideration the resolution previously adopted by the Arkansas State Association pertaining to this matter. (Resolution was adopted at the 75th Annual Session, August 16-18, 1972; and amended and re-affirmed at the 82nd Annual Session, August 14-16, 1979.) (Resolution was adopted by the National Association in 1976 at the 40th Annual Session in Tulsa, Oklahoma.)

On November 29, 1983, a resolution adopted by the River Valley Association, and signed by the clerk, E.O. Chronister, was received by the State Executive Board.

The resolution is as follows:

To the State Association Executive Board:

It is our belief that the husband of one wife simply applies to the fact that in those days and prior Bible times that men had more than one wife and it often caused problems.

Paul stressed the fact of one wife, and it doesn't bring into consideration of divorced personnel. This is our belief. (Our State laws forbid of being married to two women at the same time.)

We, as the River Valley Association, are willing to abide by the Treatise of the Original Free Will Baptists, as the local churches are a self-governing body.

We also believe that not to promote such actions as suggested by the National and State Associations, but at the same time to let God be the judge.

Upon receipt of the above resolution, the State Executive Board passed unanimously the following resolution:

Whereas,

The River Valley Association rejected the guidelines as suggested by the State Executive Board and the State Association,

Be it therefore resolved:

That the State Executive Board recommend to the Arkansas State Association, while in session August 16-18, 1983, that the River Valley Association not be received into the fellowship of the

Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists.

REPORT NO. 8: STATE MISSIONS BOARD

In mid-1982, the State Mission Board underwent a time of critical self-evaluation. We tried to assess the total approach which had been taken to mission work in the past with the purpose being to retain the workable aspects of past programs while developing some new approaches for the future. The basic substance of the new approach which emerged was:

- 1. Obtain the best qualified person possible to serve as missionary.
- 2. Pay an adequate salary.
- 3. Purchase land and erect a building at the outset of the work.
- 4. Commit the board to the work on a long term (5 year) basis.

In August of 1982, Fred Warner began his work at Siloam Springs. By the time he arrived on the field, seven acres of property located on the major highway had been purchased. With the generous help of Chuck Webb of Webb Construction Co., a 6,400 sq. ft. building was erected. It was completed on the outside and half-finished on the inside at a cost of \$60,000.00.

The money to pay for the building was borrowed for the Board of Retirement and Insurance. The State Mission Board expresses its appreciation to the Board of Retirement and Herman Hersey who loaned the money when conventional loans were impossible to get.

The work at Siloam Springs has progressed to the point that the Board feels that it is advisable to complete the rest of the building. We have recently initiated Project Progress, Phase I which is designed to raise money to get the duct-work for the auditorium. A goal of \$3,500.00 has been set for this project. We have called 35 churches or individuals to help with gifts of \$100.00 to complete this project.

The most rewarding aspect in mission work is to hear of the souls and lives that are changed. The second most exciting thing to a mission board member is to see a new work move toward self-supporting status. The work at Siloam Springs is to be commended in this regard. Beginning in July of 1983, the church has assumed one week of their pastor's salary (\$225.00) per month.

The church has adopted a projected budget which, in the next four years, will see them gradually assume not only the pastor's salary but his housing and benefits also. In addition, the church is already paying all it local expenses.

What is needed at this point in State Mission work is support. We need your regular, systematic financial support. Will you consider including State Missions in your church budget or receiving a monthly offering for State Missions? Become a part of the exciting things God is doing in Siloam Springs this year.

REPORT NO. 13: STATISTICIAN REPORT

Sometimes it is needful for us to look back a few years so that we may get a true picture of the progress that has been made in our State Association.

"Our records show that in 1915 only six district associations reported with a total membership of 3,101 and only four districts sent representatives. In 1932 we had eight district associations and our membership had grown to 5,799. Then, 13 years later in 1945 only seven district associations reported and we had reached 6,326 in membership.

In this session we voted to unite with the National Association of Free Will Baptists. The National Association had been organized 10 years at that time. Two years later in 1947 the State Home Mission Board was organized which has been an important factor in the growth of our state association. For a comparison let's look at the association from 1950-1962-1982.

ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us; to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us; to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association; and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in cooperation with the various districts of the Association, or that may be hereafter represented therein, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

ARTICLE I

Name: This organization shall be known as the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

ARTICLE II

Purpose: The purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association and to devise and executive measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various districts in the Association.

ARTICLE III

Representation:

Section 1. This association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in a church belonging to a district association, the district associational clerk, and all members of State Boards.

Section 2. Each district association shall be entitled to five (5) lay delegtes at large. Each local church which holds membership in a district association affiliated with this body shall be entitled to send one lay delegate.

Section 3. Associational Delegates:

A. In the event any of the elected delegates fail to report, said vacancy may be filled by appointment of the moderator of said district or by the delegates present from said district.

B. In the event the elected delegate from a local church is not present, the Pastor of that local church shall have the authority to appoint a delegate to

serve in place of the absent delegate.

Section 4. New associations desiring membership in the state association shall send messengers bearing a petitionary letter. If found orthodox, upon examination by the credentials committee, they shall be received by the vote of the association and given the right hand of fellowship by the moderator.

Section 5. The State Convention shall convene annually on the Tuesday

following the second Sunday in the month of August.

ARTICLE IV

Finance:

Section 1. This association shall be supported by a percentage of the Cooperative receipts as designated by the State Association and by designated gifts. Said allocations to national and state work to be recommended to the association by the budget committee.

Section 2. Each district association shall send \$20.00 for each church belonging to the district association for the purpose of entertaining the State Association; \$10.00 for each church for National Association fees; and \$5.00 for each church for minutes, for a total of \$35.00.

Section 3. In the event any church within a local association does not pay its fee; the delegates, deacons, and ministers of that church shall not be seated.

ARTICLE V

Discipline:

Section 1. This State Association shall have the right to settle any question of discipline, doctrine, or practice that may properly come before it from any of the districts composing said organization. If there be any question of discipline, doctrine, or practice on the part of a district body, delegates of that association shall be not seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the credentials committee.

Section 2. The decision of the credentials committee may be appealed to the State Association sitting in a committee as a whole.

ARTICLE VI

Officers:

Section 1. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, promotional-director and statistician. Each of these, with exception of the promotional-director

should be elected annually.

Section 2. The Moderator shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Board. The Promotional-Director shall be an ex-officio member of all standing boards.

Section 3. A committee on committees shall be elected by the body on the opening night of the association. All other committees shall be appointed by the committee on committees.

Section 4. The moderator, assistant moderator, promotional director and clerk shall serve as the program committee for the State Association.

ARTICLE VII

Duties and Rules of Standing Boards:

Section 1. All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, each of whom shall serve for five years. No board member shall immediately

succeed himself after having served a full term on said board.

Section 2. All boards of this association shall organize immediately following the annual association meeting. They shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Each board shall give a written report at the annual association of meetings conducted, work accomplished, monies received and

expended during the year.

Section 3. Executive Board: This board shall have the authority to fill irregular vacancies which may occur in its own body, and any irregular vacancies which may occur in any standing board between sessions of the state association. An office may be declared vacant for the following reason: if a member moves from the State; if a member fails to attend the board meetings for a period of one year without providential hindrance; or if for any reason he submits a statement of resignation.

A bookstore shall be operated from the state headquarters under the

supervision and direction of the Executive Board.

This board shall have the authority to employ the state promotional-director.

In the event that none of the district associations request to entertain the State Association, it shall become the responsibility of the Executive Board to make the necessary arrangements when it is to be conducted at the camp at

Conway.

The Executive Board shall keep a record of all work accomplished, money raised, meetings conducted, and make a full and complete report at the annual association of the State Association. The Executive Board shall receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey property entrusted to the State Association, except as stipulated elsewhere in the constitution.

The chairman and secretary of the Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds, notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to

become legally responsible.

In case of an emergency situation, the Executive Board shall have the authority to call the State Association in conference by notifying each district association at least ten (10) days prior to the conference.

No board shall buy or sell real estate without the approval of the Executive Board, when such transactions are made between sessions of the State Association.

Promotional-Director

The promotional director shall assist in coordinating the work of the various boards of the State Association and shall serve as state treasurer. He shall promote both the state and national workers, missionaries, mission conferences, etc. It shall be his duty to edit and publish the state paper.

He shall receive, hold, and disburse money as is made available by the State Association to the various boards. Disbursements to the various boards

will be made when requested.

He shall present a written report of his work at each annual session of this association, with a financial statement of all monies received and disbursed. These books shall be audited annually.

Section 4. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to promote an active missions program within the state. It shall work in cooperation with the national home missions and foreign mission boards in the arranging of missionary conferences, missionary intineraries, and shall assist in the raising of the state quota for the national missions programs.

This board shall promote the establishing of new churches and missions

within the state.

This board shall not participate in the organization of any church or mission in a town, city or community where there is an organized Free Will Baptist church without seeking the cooperation of said church. Neither shall this board assist in the organization of a group that is out of fellowship with an established church.

This board shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or

convey State Mission Property.

Section 5. Church Training Service Board: It shall be the duty of the state Church Training Service Board to plan and assist the Church Training Service work throughout the state. It will be their responsibility to promote an active Church Training Service work in each association and to encourage Church Training Service rallies. They shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey the youth camp property. This board shall be responsible for the selection of the youth camp personnel. They will plan and promote the annual Church Training Service Conference and Youth Encampment.

Section 6. Sunday School Board: It will be the duty of this board to work in cooperation with the National Sunday School Department in arranging Sunday school conferences and workshops, teacher's training courses, and in recommending methods and materials for the Sunday schools of the State of Arkansas.

Section 7. Christian Education Board: It shall be the duty of this board to establish and promote a high standard of Christian Education within the framework of this association. This board shall be responsible for Bible Institutes, the teaching and training of the ministry and other interested laymen. The Treatise of the faith and practices of Free Will Baptists shall be the guide of theological positions for the institutes.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments:

This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, providing proposed amendment is presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

ARTICLE IX

Parliamentary Procedure:

This meeting of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.
