# PROCEEDINGS TUESDAY EVENING, AUGUST 15, 1989

The 92nd annual session of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists met at Camp Beaverfork, Conway, Arkansas, on August 15, 1989. The convention theme was "Confirmation of the Gospel." The theme verse was Phillipians 1:7.

Doug Little served as song director, with Sue Patton as pianist, and Brenda Pursell as organist for the sessions.

The evening service was opened with prayer by Doug Little. Congregational song "Victory In Jesus". Clerk, Wendell Leckbee, called the Association into official session, and introduced the Moderator, Carl Cheshier.

Wayne Smothers, Hoover Lewis, Levan Hubbard, Loy Counts and Mike Mize were elected to the Committee on Committees.

The congregation sang "He Keeps Me Singing," followed by the choir of First Church, North Little Rock singing - "The Blood Medley", "Till the Storm Passes By", and "I Feel Like Traveling On".

The congregation sang "Breathe On Me". #### REPORT NO. 3: STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD

October 18, 1988 - Keith Johnson gave the report on the Christian Supply Store. Report was accepted as read.

David Joslin gave the report on the Arkansas State Promotional office. His report was received as read. The following items of information were discussed:

- . 1. A report was submitted on enrollment in the Minister's Benevolent Fund.
- 2. An update was offered on the status of church properties being administered by the State Home Missions Board.

The following Items were adopted:

- 1. A resolution was adopted authorizing David Joslin to purchase a new auto.
- 2. A resolution was adopted empowering David Joslin and Terry Forrest to act as agents for Arkansas Free Will Baptists to sell and convey title to property at West Memphis, Arkansas.
- 3. Levan Hubbard was selected to complete the vacancy on the Sunday School Board created when Roy Dale Smith moved from the state.

January 23, 1989 - Keith Johnson gave the report on the Christian Supply Store. Motion was made to raise the bookstore manager's salary \$35.00 per week.

David Joslin gave the report on the Promotional Director's office. He also supplied the following information:

- 1. The Minister's Benevolent Fund currently has 24 participants.
- 2. The Blue Cross/Blue Shield health insurance was cancelled by Blue Cross/Blue Shield. It was also noted that the General Fund budget would be adjusted to reflect the loss of premium income for insurance that was processed through the state offices.
- 3. Church properties: The West Monroe, Louisiana, property was under lease to be sold; West Memphis and Texarkana properties were sold (Arkansas Free Will Baptists financed) without the aid of a realtor. All monies from the note payments are to go into the A.P.P.L.E. Fund.

Motion was made to allocate the balance of \$1,607.45 from the sale of the West Memphis property in the following manner: (1) An honorarium of \$300.00 be given to Terry Forrest for his assistance in property disposal and request his assistance with future property needs and (2) The balance of \$1,307.45 to be used to establish a computer fund to enable the state office to purchase a system at a future date.

April 11, 1989 - Minutes of previous meeting were read and the following correction entered: The raise given the bookstore manager in January of 1989 is to be apportioned at the rate of \$20.00 salary and \$15.00 retirement per week. Minutes were accepted.

Keith Johnson gave the report on the Christian Supply Store followed by the report from the Promotional Director's office by David Joslin. Motion passed to receive the reports as read.

The Promotional Director shared the following information:

- 1. The computer fund balance was \$1,407.45.
- 2. Increase in Cooperative giving receipts for the first quarter of 1989 was \$1,453.34.

The following were adopted:

- 1. Recommended that a 5% salary increase for 1990 be incorporated into budgets presented for the State Association's approval.
- 2. After meeting with representatives of Brotherhood Mutual, it was recommended that the Promotional Director enter into an agreement with Brotherhood Mutual to form a voluntary group for the purpose of property insurance for those churches wishing to participate.
- 3. Raymond Chronister was elected secretary of the State Executive Board due to John Turner leaving the state.
- July 7, 1989 Keith Johnson gave the report of the Christian Supply Store and the budget for 1990 was presented. Motion passed to receive the report and adopt the proposed budget. David Joslin gave the report and the 1990 budgets for the Promotional Office. Motion passed to accept the report and to present the adopted budgets of General Fund, Operational Fund, THE VISION, and Sunday School Literature for recommendation to the State Association.

Promotional Director David Joslin presented miscellaneous business items which included:

- 1. Approved oil and gas lease for property in Conway.
- 2. Approved proposed constitutional change regarding State Missions as follows: Amend Article VII, Section 4, first sentence of first paragraph by deleting the words "within the state."

Amend Article VII, Section 4, first sentence of second paragraph by adding the words, "and neighboring states. Any work in neighboring states sponsored by the State Missions Board will be initiated only after seeking the cooperation of the neighboring state involved."

- 3. Disapproved the new Sunday school literature contract with Randall House Publications and voted to send a letter to Randall House asking that we continue with the original contract signed by Roger C. Reeds and Fred Warner in 1971.
- 4. Proposed that the money on hand which had been given toward the purchase of the computer with additional funds from THE VISION, General Fund, and Sunday School Literature be used to purchase a computer and a post-script laser printer.
- 5. The Cooperative Plan Budget for 1990 was approved for recommendation to the State Association as follows:

# REPORT NO. 4: REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL DIRECTOR David A. Joslin

During the calendar year of 1988, Arkansas Free Will Baptists receipted \$1,189,734.86 through state and national agencies or departments. This was \$50,081.17 more than the amount of \$1,139,653.69 receipted during the 1987 calendar year!!!

#### Other areas of concern are:

(1) Arkansas has 16 district associations with 221 churches affiliated with them. There are 81 city/town churches and 140 country/rural churches. Eighty-one of the pastors are listed as full-time, and 140 pastors are part-time. (Full-time denotes that the pastor does not rely upon secular work to support his family.) Two small associations, Big Springs with two churches, and Rich Mountain with three churches disbanded. These five churches are no longer affiliated with the State Association due to the fact that they do not have any district associational connections.

There were 213 churches who reported their statistics to their respective district association. These 213 churches reported 588 baptisms, 1,112 members added, and 658 members lost. Total membership in the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists is currently 21,226. There are 358 ordained ministers and 604 ordained deacons.

- (2) In April 1989, the State Executive Board approved a church property insurance program with Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company. You are encouraged to review a premium quotation from Brotherhood Mutual prior to your next insurance policy anniversary date. As of August 1, 1989, Brotherhood Mutual had inspected 60 of our churches, wrote 31 insurance policies, and quoted 24 others.
- (3) The undergirting support of the state and national programs continues to be the Cooperative Plan of Support. Without it, we could not enjoy the services and benefits of strong state and national programs. Your church is challenged to become more involved in the support of the total denominational program. Last year, 1988, Arkansas Free Will Baptists gave \$176,698.60 to the State and National Cooperative Plan of Support. This was an increase of \$10,431.83 over the year 1987. The challenge is to work together to accomplish our tasks and goals in a spirit of unity, brotherhood, and cooperation.
- (4) Last year, the State Association approved the Arkansas Minister's Benevolent Association. Through August 1, 1989, there have been 28 ministers who have become members of the association. It has been said that the best compliment that anyone can pay to you is to copy your actions. The states of Tennessee, Oklahoma, and Georgia are considering similar programs copied after the one that was implimented in Arkansas. All ordained ministers/pastors within the State Association are encouraged to become members. Churches should pay the fee for their pastor.

## REPORT NO. 7: MISSIONS BOARD

This has been an active and fruitful year for the State Missions Board with reference to the project at Wynne. The building is now complete, and the work is progressing well. Dedication services for the building were conducted at Wynne in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Social Band Association on July 8, 1989.

The project at Wynne is unique in that we have been able to reach this point without making a major financial push. This has been a deliberate change in approach as the board recognizes the tremendous array of needs that come before our churches. We felt that it would be good to try to give our churches who have been so good to help in the past, as little "breather." We foresee that we will probably need to make one major appeal toward the end of the project to assist in paying off the building loan. We appreciate very much those who have given and are giving regularly to assist in this work.

The church at Wynne is moving in the direction of self support. In addition to their Coop giving, they sent \$500 per month toward their own support January through June of this year, and began sending \$800 per month in July. We commend our missionary couple, Rev. and Mrs. O. D. Winfrey, for their leadership and service, and the church at Wynne for their efforts in this regard. Thus far, 22 salvation decisions have been made, as well as seven rededications. There has been 12 baptisms, and the yearly average attendance for Sunday morning has been 28.

At this session of the State Association, the State Missions Board is requesting a constitutional change as it relates to the activity of the Board. This change, if approved would allow the Board in future years to pursue the possibility of establishing churches in neighboring states.

## REPORT NO. 8: CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BOARD

The 1989 Trail Blazer's Retreat will be held September 8-9 at Camp Beaverfork. The cost will be \$5.00 per person. The speakers will be David Joslin, Burl Osborne, and Sidney Sawrie. Boyd Osborne will be minister of music.

The 1990 Minister's Retreat will be conducted February 19-21 at Lake DeGray State Park, Bismarck, Arkansas. Speakers will be Jim Shepherd, President of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College, and Loyd Locklear, pastor of Woodhaven Free Will Baptist Church, Woodhaven, Michigan. ## **REPORT NO. 13: STATISTICIAN**

The Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists reports 15 Associations comprised of 218 churches. The statistics for membership, baptism, etc., are based on the 218 churches who reported.

There are 91 churches located in a city/town, 127 churches in rural, 79 with full-time pastors, and 133 part-time pastors.

There are 355 ordained ministers, 33 licensed ministers, and 616 ordained deacons.

The churches reported 726 baptisms with 1,161 members added, 780 members lost, and a total membership of 19,567.

Sunday School enrollment is 13,045, CTS enrollment is 3,486, Woman's Auxiliary membership is 1,390 and Master's Men 295.

There are 4 churches with day-cares, 4 with kindergartens, and 3 with Christian day schools.

There are 70 churches with parsonages and a total value of all church property, including parsonages, of \$25,715,350.00.

## ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

### **PREAMBLE**

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us; to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us; to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association; and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in cooperation with the various districts of the Association, or that may be hereafter represented therein, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

## **ARTICLE I**

Name: This organization shall be known as the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

## **ARTICLE II**

Purpose: The purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association and to devise and executive measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various districts in the Association.

## **ARTICLE III**

Representation:

Section 1. This association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in a church belonging to a district association, the district associational clerk, and all members of State Boards.

Section 2. Each district association shall be entitled to five (5) lay delegates at large. Each local church which holds membership in a district association affiliated with this body shall be entitled to send one lay delegate.

Section 3. Associational Delegates:

A. In the event any of the elected delegates fail to report, said vacancy may be filled by appointment of the moderator of said district or by the delegates present from said district.

B. In the event the elected delegate from a local church is not present, the Pastor of that local church shall have the authority to appoint a delegate to serve in place of the absent delegate.

Section 4. New associations desiring membership in the state association shall send messengers bearing a petitionary letter. If found orthodox, upon examination by the credentials committee, they shall be received by the vote of the association and given the right hand of fellowship by the moderator.

Section 5. The State Convention shall convene annually on the Tuesday following the second Sunday in the month of August.

#### ARTICLE IV

### Finance:

Section 1. This association shall be supported by a percentage of the Cooperative receipts as designated by the State Association and by designated gifts. Said allocations to national and state work to be recommended to the association by the budget committee.

Section 2. Each district association shall send \$20.00 for each church belonging to the district association for the purpose of entertaining the State Association; \$10.00 for each church for National Association fees; and \$5.00 per each church for minutes, for a total of \$35.00.

Section 3. In the event any church within a local association does not pay its fee; the delegates, deacons, and ministers of that church shall not be seated.

## ARTICLE V

## Discipline:

Section 1. This State Association shall have the right to settle any questions of discipline, doctrine, or practice that may properly come before it from any of the districts composing said organization. If there be any question of discipline, doctrine, or practice on the part of a district body, delegates of that association shall be not seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the credentials committee.

Section 2. The decision of the credentials committee may be appealed to the State Association sitting in a committee as a whole.

## ARTICLE VI

#### Officers:

Section 1. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, promotional director, and statistician. Each of these, with exception of the promotional director should be elected annually.

Section 2. The Moderator shall be an ex-offico member of the Executive Board. The Promotional Director shall be an ex-officio member of all standing boards.

Section 3. A committee on committees shall be elected by the body on the opening night of the association. All other committees shall be appointed by the committee on committees.

Section 4. The moderator, assistant moderator, promotional director, clerk, and assistant clerk shall serve as the program committee for the State Association.

## ARTICLE VII

Duties and Rules of Standing Boards:

Section 1. All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, each of whom shall serve for five years. No board member shall immediately succeed himself after having served a full term on said board.

Section 2. All boards of this association shall organize immediately following the annual association meeting. They shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Each board shall give a written report at the annual association of meetings conducted, work accomplished, monies received and expended during the year.

Section 3. Executive Board: This board shall have the authority to fill irregular vacancies which may occur in its own body, and any irregular vacancies which may occur in any standing board between sessions of the state association. An office may be declared vacant for the following reason: if a member moves from the State; if a member fails to attend the board meetings for a period of one year without providential hindrance; or if for any reason he submits a statement of resignation.

A bookstore shall be operated from the state headquarters under the supervision and direction of the Executive Board.

This board shall have the authority to employ the state promotional director. In the event that none of the district associations request to entertain the State Association, it shall become the responsibility of the Executive Board to make the necessary arrangements when it is to be conducted at the camp at Conway.

The Executive Board shall keep a record of all work accomplished, money raised, meetings conducted, and make a full and complete report at the annual association of the State Association. The Executive Board shall receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey property entrusted to the State Association, except as stipulated elsewhere in the constitution.

The chairman and secretary of the Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds, notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible.

In case of an emergency situation, the Executive Board shall have the authority to call the State Association in conference by notifying each district association at least ten (10) days prior to the conference.

No board shall buy or sell real estate without the approval of the Executive Board, when such transactions are made between sessions of the State Association.

## Promotional Director

The promotional director shall assist in coordinating the work of the various boards of the State Association and shall serve as state treasurer. He shall promote both the state and national workers, missionaries, mission conferences, etc. It shall be his duty to edit and publish the state paper.

He shall receive, hold, and disburse money as is made available by the State Association to the various boards. Disbursements to the various boards will be made when requested.

He shall present a written report of his work at each annual session of this association, with a financial statement of all monies received and disbursed. These books shall be audited annually.

Section 4. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to promote an active missions program. It shall work in cooperation with the national home missions and foreign mission boards in the arranging of missionary conferences, of missionary intineraries, and shall assist in the raising of the State quota for the national missions program.

The board shall promote the establishing of new churches and missions within the State and neighboring States. Any work in neighboring States, sponsored by the State Missions board, will be initiated only after seeking the cooperation of the neighboring State involved and the National Home Missions board.

This board shall not participate in the organization of any church or mission in a town, city or community where there is an organized Free Will Baptist church without seeking the cooperation of said church. Neither shall this board assist in the organization of a group that is out of fellowship with an established church.

This board shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey State Mission Property.

Section 5. Church Training Service Board: It shall be the duty of the state Church Training Service Board to plan and assist the Church Training Service work throughout the state. It will be their responsibility to promote an active Church Training Service work in each association and to encourage Church Training Service rallies. They shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey the youth camp property. This board shall be responsible for the selection of the youth camp personnel. They will plan and promote the annual Church Training Service Conference and Youth Encampment.

Section 6. Sunday School Board: It will be the duty of this board to work in cooperation with the National Sunday School Department in arranging Sunday School conferences and workshops, teacher's training courses, and in recommending methods and materials for the Sunday schools of the State of Arkansas.

Section 7. Christian Education Board: It shall be the duty of this board to establish and promote a high standard of Christian Education within the framework of this association. This board shall be responsible for Bible Institutes, the teaching and training of the ministry and other interested laymen. The Treatise of the faith and practices of Free Will Baptists shall be the guide of theological positions for the institutes.

## **ARTICLE VIII**

## Amendments:

This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, providing proposed amendment is presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

## ARTICLE IX

## Parliamentary Procedure:

This meeting of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.
