PROCEEDINGS TUESDAY EVENING, AUGUST 14, 1990

The 93rd annual session of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists met at Camp Beaverfork, Conway, Arkansas, on August 14, 1990. The convention theme was "The Challenge Before Us - Confronting the 1990's." The theme verse was Numbers 13:30.

Mark Stripling served as song director, with Sue Patton as pianist, and Jayne Hannah as organist for the sessions.

The evening service was opened with the congregation singing "Stand Up For Jesus." Randy Scott led in prayer.

Wendell Leckbee, clerk, called the meeting to order and introduced the Moderator, Carl Cheshier. The Moderator welcomed all those present with a special note of welcome to those visiting.

Hoover Lewis, Darwin Kelton, Bo Coffman, Dwayne Goforth, and Dale Kester were elected to the Committee on Committees.

The congregation sang "He Keeps Me Singing." Loy Counts, chairman of the State Missions Board, challenged those present to take part in the missionary offering. The following missionaries were recognized - Ron and Elaine Parker, Shreveport, Louisiana; Jerry and Wanda McClary, Omaha, Nebraska; Patsy Vanhook, France; Steve Trail, Pineville, Louisiana; George and Linda Harvey, Phoeniz, Arizona; and O. D. and Estelene Winfrey, Wynne, Arkansas. After prayer by Brother Counts an offering of \$542.00 was received. The offering was split - 1/3 each to State Missions, Home Missions and Foreign Missions. All pastors were invited to a breakfast Wednesday morning, as guests of the state missions board.

The choir from the Tuckerman First Free Will Baptist Church sang - "Heaven Came Down and Glory Filled My Soul," "Let Me Touch Him," "Going Home," and "Happy Day."

The Moderator introduced Will Harmon, pastor of Oak Park Free Will Baptist, Pine Bluff, as the speaker for the evening. He spoke on the subject "Cooperation - Let Us," Numbers 13:25-33. After the reading of the scripture and before the message Mark Brawley sang "God of Worship," a song he had written especially for the service.

Report No. 1: Report of the Committee on Committees was given and adopted. After announcements the congregation was dismissed in prayer by Larry Hughes.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, AUGUST 15, 1990

The services opened with the congregation singing "At The Cross." Tim Landers led in prayer. Phil Whiteaker, pastor at Glenwood Free Will Baptist, brought the devotion from I Corinthians 9:15 - "The Gift of Salvation."

The standing delegates were recognized by the Moderator.

Report No. 2: Report of the Credentials Committee was given and accepted with the delegates seated.

The program was presented and adopted.

Report No. 3: Report of the Executive Board was given by Bobby Shepherd. The report was adopted, and the constitutional change was tabled.

Report No. 4: Report of the Promotional Director was presented by David Joslin. The report was accepted and the budgets adopted. David Joslin presented information regarding the attempt to establish a state lottery. The churches were asked to be sure and keep their people informed of the dangers of a lottery.

It was recommended that churches receive an offering on September 16 to help with the medical expenses of J. W. Blanks. Bro. Blanks, pastor at Blytheville, underwent by-pass heart surgery and was without insurance and is faced with paying a \$35,000 hospital bill.

Melvin Worthington, Executive Secretary of National Association, presented the 1990 Denominational Digest from the National Offices and encouraged the review of the reports. He thanked the people for their support and encouraged the support of the national ministries program in September by every Free Will Baptist giving a special offering of \$34.81. He also reported on the purchase of a new national office building.

Report No. 5: Report of the Christian Supply Store was given by Keith Johnson. The report was received and the budget adopted.

Report No. 6: Report of the CTS Board was given by Larry Montgomery. The report was accepted and the budget adopted. Jackie Brown presented information on the 1990 activities at Camp Beaverfork and the youth conference conducted on Tuesday. A standing vote of appreciation was given in support of the Camp Director.

Tom Malone, newly elected President of Free Will Baptist Bible College, thanked the people for their support in prayer, students, and finances. He emphasized the need for every parent to impress on their children the desire to do God's will.

Bill Fulcher, representing Southeastern College, brought words of greeting from the school. He spoke about the students and the need to continue to train more workers in every profession through training at a Free Will Baptist College.

Jim Shepherd, President of Hillsdale College, reported on the activities of the school and their scholarship program. He expressed thanks to the people of Arkansas for their financial support, students, and prayers for Hillsdale.

Report No. 7: The report of the State Missions Board was given by Terry Forrest. The report was received and the budget adopted.

Benediction by Doug Little.

WEDNESDAY MORNING WORSHIP SERVICE

The service opened with the congregation singing "Victory in Jesus." Prayer was by James Forlines.

Randy Scott, Assistant Moderator, introduced Melinda Lewis, First Free Will Baptist Church, North Little Rock, who sang "In Heaven's Eyes." Bobby Shepherd, pastor at First Free Will Baptist Church, Batesville, was introduced

as the morning speaker. He spoke from the subject "Commitment - Go Up At Once," Numbers 13:30 and II Timothy 1:12. Randy Scott led the congregation in prayer. After announcements, Jerry Smith dismissed the congregation for the lunch hour.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION

The session opened with the congregation singing "Wonderful Grace of Jesus." Prayer was by Billy Wilson. Doug Little sang "He Giveth More Grace." The devotion was given by Randy Ledbetter, Associate Pastor at First Free Will Baptist, Russellville. He spoke from II Corinthians 12:7-10 on "Difficult Circumstances."

Jimmy Aldridge, representing the Foreign Missions Department, brought words of greetings from the missionaries. He asked the people to continue to pray for special needs and the work of foreign missions and thanked the people for their contributions to foreign missions.

Richard Adams, representing the Home Missions Department, expressed the appreciation of the department for all the support from Arkansas. Those present were challenged to fill out a walk-a-thon card to support Ron Parker, who is going to Shreveport, Louisiana, as a missionary. He announced a retreat for pastors and their wives on April 1, 1991, at Branson, Missouri, if their church contributed \$1,000 to "Build My Church" campaign. Jerry McClary, missionary in Omaha, Nebraska, spoke concerning their need for money to pay on their land loan.

Report No. 9: Report of the Sunday School Board was given by Levan Hubbard. He encouraged every pastor to encourage their teachers and let them know they are appreciated. The report was received and the budget adopted.

Jim Lauthren brought greetings from the National Sunday School and CTS Department. He was very complimentary regarding Arkansas youth and the part they were playing in the national work.

Report No. 10: Report of the State Woman's Auxiliary was given and received as information.

Report No. 11: Report of the Resolution's Committee. No resolutions were submitted.

Report No. 12: Report of the Nominating Committee was given, received, and those nominated elected.

The following were elected as delegates to the National Association in 1991: Alene Coffman, Bob Carey, Vivian Jeffcoat, Randy Ledbetter and Doug Duvall.

David Winfrey gave a report on the land fund for Cheyenne, Wyoming. As of August 10 the loan balance is \$13,393.87. He challenged those present to send an offering and mark it "Land for Cheyenne." This is a project of the Polk Bayou Association.

WEDNESDAY EVENING WORSHIP SERVICE

The service opened with congregational song - "To God Be The Glory." Prayer by Paul Payne and congregational song - "How Great Thou Art."

A missions offering of \$458.08 was given bringing the total to \$1,000.08.

The choir from Cavanaugh Free Will Baptist, Fort Smith, presented the special music, singing "Angels Rolled The Stone Away," "It Is No Secret," "The Meeting In The Air," "Till The Storm Passes By," and "Oh, What A Friend."

REPORT NO. 3: STATE EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Arkansas State Executive Board met four times on a quarterly basis, had three special called meetings, and conducted two business sessions by phone conference call this past year.

Each quarter, the reports of the Promotional Director and the Christian Supply Store Manager were examined and approved.

The Executive Board met in executive session as counsel with the CTS Board and the Executive officers of the Arkansas State Association due to the misappropriation of funds by the CTS Director. The Board unanimously approved the actions of the CTS Board in the dismissal of the CTS Director and also approved the arrangements made by the CTS Board towards an equitable settlement of the issue. Sidney Sawrie was approved by both the CTS Board and the Executive Board as interim CTS Director.

The following constitutional change is recommended for adoption: Insert as the second paragraph to Article VII, Section 1, Duties and Rules of Standing Boards:

"Each board shall prepare a budget of its proposed financial expenditures at the beginning of each fiscal year and shall present same for approval by the Arkansas State Association along with an audit made by an independent certified public accountant, which audit shall lead to the expression of an unqualified opinion on the financial statements. The auditor's report shall include, where applicable, a balance sheet and income statement and other schedules as may be necessary for a proper presentation of the financial condition and results of operation."

Other business conducted:

The employment contracts for the Promotional Director and the Manager of the Christian Supply Store were considered, approved, and signed.

The deed of the Mansfield Free Will Baptist Church was deeded back to the trustees of the church. This property was given to the Arkansas State Association several years earlier. Raymond Chronister was elected to act as agent for the State Association in the transfer of the property deed.

Due to the vacancies created by moves to other states from Arkansas, the Executive Board made the following replacements: Terry Forrest to replace Bob Spencer for a two-year term on the State Mission Board; Hershel Parker to replace David Williford for a four-year term on the State Mission Board, and Wayne Newell to replace Frank Gregory as Trustee of Hillsdale Free Will Baptist Bible College to finish a three-year term.

At the request of John Turner, National Home Missionary to Oregon, the Executive Board agreed to act as mediator between John Turner and the National Home Missions Department in hopes of settlement of their differences.

Acting as the Budget Committee for the State Association, the Executive Board recommends for adoption the following Cooperative Plan budget:

REPORT NO. 4: REPORT OF THE PROMOTIONAL DIRECTOR David A. Joslin

During the calendar year of 1989, Arkansas Free Will Baptists receipted the amount of \$1,212,405.85 through State and National Associational agencies.

Cooperative Plan of Support receipts were \$189,632.96, an increase of \$12,934.36 over receipts in 1988. Approximately 60% of our churches support the Cooperative Plan. The Coop Plan continues to be the mainstay of the denominational support for the State Association. Without it, the effectiveness of the state agencies would diminish greatly.

In 1988, the State Association approved the Minister's Benevolent Association. Through August 1, 1990, there have been thirty-five (35) ministers who have become members of the Association. All ordained ministers/pastors within the State Association are eligible to become members. Churches are encouraged to pay the \$30.00 fee for their pastor.

In April 1989, the State Executive Board approved a church property insurance program with Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company. As of July 1, 1990, Brotherhood Mutual had inspected 131 of our churches, wrote 48 insurance policies, and quoted 83 others. Prior to your next insurance policy anniversary date, please consider reviewing a premium quotation from Brotherhood Mutual. With this program in effect, it is possible for an annual dividend to be paid direct to the State Association.

Your prayers and continued, consistent support of State and National ministries are appreciated.

#### REPORT NO. 6: STATE CTS BOARD REPORT

The State CTS Board met nine times during the year to transact its business.

Due to the misappropriation of funds by the CTS Director, his employment was terminated November 6, 1989. Sidney Sawrie was employed as interim director. David Joslin and Sidney Sawrie were appointed to act as agents for the CTS Board.

The successive board meetings of November 9, 1989, November 28, 1989, and January 4, 1990, dealt with the official audit and meetings with the former CTS Director, the State Executive Board, and the state executive officers. The decision was made to inform every pastor of the status of Camp Beaverfork.

On January 30, 1990, the Board revised the contractual agreement for the CTS Director. The dates for the State Woman's Auxiliary, Master's Men, and State CTS Rally were approved. The Board voted to obtain a federal identification number for the purpose of with-holding federal and social security taxes.

On January 23, 1990, the Board met in Conway, Arkansas, for the "All-Boards Meeting." The dates for the Trail-Blazer's Retreat was set for September 28-29, 1990. The dates for the youth camps were set at:

On February 6, 1990, the Board voted unaminously to employ Jackie Brown as the State CTS Director.

On March 22, 1990, the Board met with Jackie Brown in Conway and conducted the following business. The evangelist and musicians were approved for the youth camps. The CTS Rally registration was set at \$3.00 per person. The kitchen staff salary was set at \$350.00 per week. If necessary, a certified life guard would be paid. No other camp workers would be paid. Sidney Sawrie and David Joslin were released as agents for the CTS Board.

On July 24, 1990, the Board met and approved a budget of \$114,100.00 for the calendar year of 1991. The Board also approved the installation of a French drain around the director's house and new carpet when the drain is completed. Pending approval of the State Executive Board, the CTS Board voted unaminously to accept the offer of \$8,000.00 from the former CTS Director as final settlement of the amount due from him.

## **REPORT NO. 7: STATE MISSIONS BOARD**

The year of 1989-90 has been another good year for the State Missions Board. The mission work at Wynne, Arkansas, continues to make good progress as the work stablizes under the leadership of Missionary O. D. Winfrey.

However, there is an urgent need for consistent monthly support for the missionary account of Brother Winfrey. Due to the increase in the number of missionaries from The National Home and Foreign Missions Boards on itinerary in Arkansas, our own State Home missions giving has decreased in receipts. We are requesting each church to consider sending some amount on a regular monthly basis to assist us in this worthwhile effort.

The Wynne Mission continues to make steady progress towards self-support. Currently, they are sending \$800 per month towards their own support in addition to supporting the Cooperative Plan of Support. The Winfreys are to be commended for their faithfulness in their work.

The State Home Missions Board met four times during the year to take care of the state mission work. Two of our board members resigned due to their leaving the state. The State Executive Board replaced Bob Spencer with Terry Forrest, and David Williford with Hershel Parker. We commend Brother Spencer and Brother Williford for their faithful commitment to the cause of missions.

The A.P.P.L.E. fund continues to increase greatly. Currently, there is \$10,000 invested with C.E.L.F. of the National Home Missions Department and \$30,000 on deposit in C. D.'s. This money is loaned interest free to mission churches. The amount of \$22,000 has been loaned to the Shreveport, Louisiana mission work which is under the direction of Ron Parker.

Your prayers are solicited as plans are made for future mission work in the State of Arkansas.

#### **REPORT NO. 13: STATISTICIAN**

The Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists reports 15 associations comprised of 220 churches. The statistics for membership, baptism, etc., are based on the 217 churches who reported.

There are 93 churches located in a city/town, 127 churches in rural, 79 with full-time pastors, and 134 part-time pastors.

There are 361 ordained ministers, 46 licensed ministers, and 599 ordained deacons.

The churches reported 630 baptisms with 1,112 members added, 690 members lost, and a total membership of 20,525.

Sunday School enrollment is 13,674, CTS enrollment is 3,005, Woman's Auxiliary membership is 1,354 and Master's Men membership is 296.

There are 2 churches with day-cares, 3 with kindergartens, 2 with Christian day schools and 1 district Bible Institute.

The total income of all churches reporting is \$4,530,852.18, with 34 churches with budgets.

There are 71 churches with parsonages and a total value of all church property, including parsonages, of \$27,835,850.00.

# **REPORT NO. 14: MASTER'S MEN**

Our first fall retreat was held with Oklahoma Master's Men at 1st Church, Fort Smith, Arkansas, on October 27-28, 1989 with 33 in attendance. Speakers were Leland King, Fort Smith; Ken Hancock, Tulsa; and Mike Mize, Fort Smith. Wendell Leckbee, North Little Rock, gave a workshop on "Qualifications Of A Deacon." Everyone attending had a great time of fellowship playing volleyball, basketball, and listening to speakers on the Word of God.

Our annual spring retreat was held at Camp Beaverfork on April 20 & 21, 1990, with 30 in attendance with the theme "Faith In Action." Speakers were Doug Duvall, Jonesboro; Jim Martin, Atkins; Johnnie Fowlkes, Vilonia; and Leland King, Fort Smith.

Our annual 16th banquet was held at Bowen's Restaurant on August 15, 1990, with 97 in attendance. Ben Scott spoke on the theme "A Free Gift." He entitled his message "A Christmas In August." Brother Scott was presented a plaque, and a standing ovation, showing appreciation for his support of the Master's Men work.

On the National level, there are 465 life members, 39 life friends and 1 life friend church. In Arkansas we have 54 life members and 3 life friends. Master's Men - Master's Hand Project - has saved Free Will Baptist churches over \$800,000 in cost since its origin. The National office received \$3,000.00 from last year's National Ministries Day.

A total of \$914.01 was given to the youth camp for kitchen improvements, on last year's project. We also sent \$300.00 to the account of Dan Huddleston who spent the year in Ivory Coast as maintenance man.

Out project next year will be to purchase 400 chairs for the tabernacle at Camp. The cost per chair will be \$20.00.

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# ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

### **PREAMBLE**

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us; to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us; to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association; and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in cooperation with the various districts of the Association, or that may be hereafter represented therein, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

# **ARTICLE I**

Name: This organization shall be known as the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

### **ARTICLE II**

Purpose: The purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association and to devise and executive measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various districts in the Association.

### **ARTICLE III**

Representation:

Section 1. This association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in a church belonging to a district association, the district associational clerk, and all members of State Boards.

Section 2. Each district association shall be entitled to five (5) lay delegates at large. Each local church which holds membership in a district association affiliated with this body shall be entitled to send one lay delegate.

Section 3. Associational Delegates:

A. In the event any of the elected delegates fail to report, said vacancy may be filled by appointment of the moderator of said district or by the delegates present from said district.

B. In the event the elected delegate from a local church is not present, the Pastor of that local church shall have the authority to appoint a delegate to serve in place of the absent delegate.

Section 4. New associations desiring membership in the state association shall send messengers bearing a petitionary letter. If found orthodox, upon examination by the credentials committee, they shall be received by the vote of the association and given the right hand of fellowship by the moderator.

Section 5. The State Convention shall convene annually on the Tuesday following the second Sunday in the month of August.

#### **ARTICLE IV**

### Finance:

Section 1. This association shall be supported by a percentage of the Cooperative receipts as designated by the State Association and by designated gifts. Said allocations to national and state work to be recommended to the association by the budget committee.

Section 2. Each district association shall send \$20.00 for each church belonging to the district association for the purpose of entertaining the State Association; \$10.00 for each church for National Association fees; and \$5.00 per each church for minutes, for a total of \$35.00.

Section 3. In the event any church within a local association does not pay its fee; the delegates, deacons, and ministers of that church shall not be seated.

### ARTICLE V

# Discipline:

Section 1. This State Association shall have the right to settle any questions of discipline, doctrine, or practice that may properly come before it from any of the districts composing said organization. If there be any question of discipline, doctrine, or practice on the part of a district body, delegates of that association shall be not seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the credentials committee.

Section 2. The decision of the credentials committee may be appealed to the State Association sitting in a committee as a whole.

# ARTICLE VI

#### Officers:

Section 1. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, promotional director, and statistician. Each of these, with exception of the promotional director should be elected annually.

Section 2. The Moderator shall be an ex-offico member of the Executive Board. The Promotional Director shall be an ex-officio member of all standing boards.

Section 3. A committee on committees shall be elected by the body on the opening night of the association. All other committees shall be appointed by the committee on committees.

Section 4. The moderator, assistant moderator, promotional director, clerk, and assistant clerk shall serve as the program committee for the State Association.

# ARTICLE VII

Duties and Rules of Standing Boards:

Section 1. All standing boards shall be composed of five (5) members, each of whom shall serve for five years. No board member shall immediately succeed himself after having served a full term on said board.

Each board shall prepare a budget of its proposed financial expenditures at the beginning of each fiscal year and shall present same for approval by the Arkansas State Association along with an audit made by an independent certified public accountant, which audit shall lead to the expression of an unqualified opinion on the financial statements. The auditor's report shall include, where applicable, a balance sheet and income statement and other schedules as may be necessary for a proper presentation of the financial condition and results of operation.

Section 2. All boards of this association shall organize immediately following the annual association meeting. They shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Each board shall give a written report at the annual association of meetings conducted, work accomplished, monies received and expended during the year.

Section 3. Executive Board: This board shall have the authority to fill irregular vacancies which may occur in its own body, and any irregular vacancies which may occur in any standing board between sessions of the state association. An office may be declared vacant for the following reason: if a member moves from the State; if a member fails to attend the board meetings for a period of one year without providential hindrance; or if for any reason he submits a statement of resignation.

A bookstore shall be operated from the state headquarters under the supervision and direction of the Executive Board.

This board shall have the authority to employ the state promotional director. In the event that none of the district associations request to entertain the State Association, it shall become the responsibility of the Executive Board to make the necessary arrangements when it is to be conducted at the camp at Conway.

The Executive Board shall keep a record of all work accomplished, money raised, meetings conducted, and make a full and complete report at the annual association of the State Association. The Executive Board shall receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey property entrusted to the State Association, except as stipulated elsewhere in the constitution.

The chairman and secretary of the Executive Board shall sign all deeds, bonds, notes, etc., and any other papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible.

In case of an emergency situation, the Executive Board shall have the authority to call the State Association in conference by notifying each district association at least ten (10) days prior to the conference.

No board shall buy or sell real estate without the approval of the Executive Board, when such transactions are made between sessions of the State Association.

#### **Promotional Director**

The promotional director shall assist in coordinating the work of the various boards of the State Association and shall serve as state treasurer. He shall promote both the state and national workers, missionaries, mission conferences, etc. It shall be his duty to edit and publish the state paper.

He shall receive, hold, and disburse money as is made available by the State Association to the various boards. Disbursements to the various boards will be made when requested.

He shall present a written report of his work at each annual session of this association, with a financial statement of all monies received and disbursed. These books shall be audited annually.

Section 4. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to promote an active missions program. It shall work in cooperation with the national home missions and foreign mission boards in the arranging of missionary conferences, of missionary intineraries, and shall assist in the raising of the State quota for the national missions program.

The board shall promote the establishing of new churches and missions within the State and neighboring States. Any work in neighboring States, sponsored by the State Missions board, will be initiated only after seeking the cooperation of the neighboring State involved and the National Home Missions board.

This board shall not participate in the organization of any church or mission in a town, city or community where there is an organized Free Will Baptist church without seeking the cooperation of said church. Neither shall this board assist in the organization of a group that is out of fellowship with an established church.

This board shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey State Mission Property.

Section 5. Church Training Service Board: It shall be the duty of the state Church Training Service Board to plan and assist the Church Training Service work throughout the state. It will be their responsibility to promote an active Church Training Service work in each association and to encourage Church Training Service rallies. They shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey the youth camp property. This board shall be responsible for the selection of the youth camp personnel. They will plan and promote the annual Church Training Service Conference and Youth Encampment.

Section 6. Sunday School Board: It will be the duty of this board to work in cooperation with the National Sunday School Department in arranging Sunday School conferences and workshops, teacher's training courses, and in recommending methods and materials for the Sunday schools of the State of Arkansas.

Section 7. Christian Education Board: It shall be the duty of this board to establish and promote a high standard of Christian Education within the framework of this association. This board shall be responsible for Bible Institutes, the teaching and training of the ministry and other interested laymen. The Treatise of the faith and practices of Free Will Baptists shall be the guide of theological positions for the institutes.

# **ARTICLE VIII**

# Amendments:

This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, providing proposed amendment is presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

# **ARTICLE IX**

# Parliamentary Procedure:

This meeting of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.
