#### **PROCEEDINGS**

#### Tuesday Evening, August 6, 2002

The 105th annual session of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists met at the Conway Public School Auditorium in Conway Arkansas on August 6-7, 2002. The convention theme was "The Door of Opportunity." The theme verse was 1 Corinthians 16:9a.

Pre-service music was provided by a Minister's Quartet. The Tuesday evening service opened with the North Little Rock Choir singing "Let There Be Glory and Honor."

Randy Ledbetter, Clerk, led in prayer, called the session to order, and introduced the Moderator, Brother David Bishop, pastor of the Union Grove Free Will Baptist Church in Atkins, Arkansas. Brother David brought a devotional challenge from Philippians 4.

The Committee on Committees was elected as follows: Hoover Lewis, Bobby Shepherd, Elmer Holiman, Terry Latham and Tim Landers. Motion passed. A proposed Constitutional amendment to Article IV, Section 2 was read and tabled. (page 5).

Offertory prayer was led by David Bishop. Offertory music was provided by the Minister's Quartet who sang "I Have a Home." The offering was divided 1/3 to National Home Missionaries present: 1/3 to Foreign Missionaries present: and 1/3 to State Missionaries present.

The North Little Rock Choir sang a medley "Come Celebrate Jesus" and "Name Above All Names." Mike Phillips led the congregation in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" and "I Exalt Thee." The pianist was Jimmy Reed and the Organist was Tena Stahl. "Beyond the Open Door" was sung by the North Little Rock Choir. The congregation sang the chorus to "Beyond the Open Door" and "God Leads Us Along." Dwayne Roper introduced the speaker for the evening, John Reed IV,

Home Missionary to Green Bay, Wisconsin. Special music was brought by Lindsey Barrow who sang "Each One, Reach One." Following the special music, John Reed brought the evening message on the subject "The Scope of the Opportunity" from Ephesians 1:15-23. "My Jesus I Love Thee" was sung as a hymn of invitation.

Report of the Committee on Committees was given and accepted (page 9). After announcements, Bro. Coffman dismissed in prayer.

#### Wednesday Morning August 7, 2002

The service opened with the congregation singing "To God Be the Glory" led by Mike Phillips. Dale Blackwell led in prayer. Brother Leo Martin read from Psalms 113, brought the morning devotion and led in prayer. Moderator David Bishop brought a brief message reminding us to take advantage of the opportunities God has for us personally.

The Credentials Committee Report was read by the Clerk, Randy Ledbetter. (page 10). Motion passed to receive the report. Delegates to the Association were recognized and motion passed to seat the delegates. Visitors were welcomed.

Report of the Arkansas Women Active For Christ was given by President Lisa Bowden (page 10-11). Motion passed to receive this report.

Report of the Women Nationally Active for Christ was given by Executive Secretary Marjorie Workman.

Keith Burden, Incoming Executive Secretary, brought a report from The National Executive Office.

The National Home Missions Board Report was given by Director Larry Powell.

Report of the State Executive Board was given by Randell Williams (pages 16-21). In addition to the printed report, a conference call was made on July 28, 2002 (after the minutes were printed). A motion passed to revise the Christian Supply Store budget.

The board brought the following recommendations:

- 1. That: Article IV, Section 2 of the Arkansas State Association constitution be amended to read: "Each district association shall send \$25.00 for each church belonging to the district association for the purpose of entertaining the state association; \$100.00 for each church for national association fees; and \$5.00 for each church for minutes for a total of \$130.00."
- 2. Be it resolved that a stewardship committee of three be appointed by the moderator to study and devise a program of financial stewardship designed specifically for Arkansas churches. The executive director shall

serve as chair. The executive board shall finance the committee. The committee shall submit its findings and recommendations to the Executive Board by June 30, 2003.

The Executive Board also stated that they are closely monitoring the status of the Christian Supply Store. Motion made and passed to accept the report. After discussion, a motion passed to adopt the budget.

Motion passed to remove the Constitutional change from the table. After discussion, a motion passed to adopt this Constitution change (Recommendation 1).

Motion passed to appoint a Stewardship Committee (Recommendation 2) consisting of State Executive Director Tim Campbell, Paul Hammons, and Kerry Gandy.

Report of the Executive Director was given by David Joslin (pages 22-36). Motion passed to accept the report. Brother Joslin gave a special charge to incoming Executive Director Tim Campbell encouraging him to lead us forward to inherit what God has for us as Arkansas Free Will Baptists. He also charged us and Arkansas Free Will Baptists to stand behind and support him. The Executive Committee layed hands on Brother Tim and Brother David Joslin prayed a prayer of blessing and commitment. Brother Tim Campbell thanked those who have brought us this far, and accepted the challenge to led us forward. He presented the budgets under his responsibility. Motion passed to adopt the budgets. Ed Cook was elected to the Executive Board to replace Andy Pearcy, and David Watson was elected to replace Doug Little.

Report of the Christian Supply Store was given by Keith Johnson (pages 37-44). Motion passed to receive this report and adopt the budget. Another motion was made to amend the motion on the floor, and that the Executive Board bring back a revised budget for the afternoon session. This second motion did not pass. The original motion to adopt the original budget passed.

James Kilgore brought a report from Free Will Baptist Ministries in Greeneville, Tennessee.

#### Wednesday Morning Worship Service August 7, 2002

The service opened with the congregation singing "I'll Fly Away" led by worship leader Mike Phillips. Moderator David Bishop introduced the morning speaker Mark Elliott, pastor of Mt. Pleasant Free Will Baptist Church in Hamburg, Arkansas who spoke on the subject "The Urgency of the Opportunity." He encouraged us to realize the reality and urgency of the spiritual needs of lost people around us, and to consider their fate. This realization will motivate us to reach them for Christ. After announcements, Kerry Gandy dismissed in prayer.

#### Wednesday Afternoon Business Session August 7, 2002

The session opened with the congregation singing "I'm So Glad Jesus Lifted Me" led by Mike Phillips. Bob Isbell led in prayer. Phillip Payne gave the afternoon devotion from Mark 6:45-48.

Kyle Hood, Campus Ministries Director of OASIS, brought the **OA-SIS Campus Ministries** report (page 45). Motion passed to receive the report and adopt the budget.

Mark Stripling gave the report of the **State Youth Board** (pages 46-47). Patrick Baze gave the Youth Directors report on Camp Beaverfork. (pages 48-55) Motion passed to receive these reports and adopt the budget. Dick Terry was elected to the State Youth Board, replacing John Reed. Mike King was re-elected to the board.

Report of the State Christian Education Board was given by Nelson Henderson (pages 56-58). Motion passed to receive the report and adopt the budget. Christian Education Board presented a plaque to Nelson in appreciation for his years of service. Vince Daniels (replacing Nelson Henderson) and Kendall Ross (succeeding himself) were elected to the Christian Education Board.

Report of the State Home Mission Board was given by Dwayne Roper. (pages 59-69). Motion passed to receive the report and adopt the budget. Brother Dwayne presented a plaque to Hursel Parker in appreciation for his years of service. Kerry Gandy (replacing Hursel Parker) and Dwayne Roper (succeeding himself) were elected to the State Home Missions Board.

James Forlines, National Foreign Mission General Director recognized the foreign missionaries present (Stan Bunch and Patsy Vanhook) and gave a report from the National Foreign Mission Department.

The Acts 1:8 Task Force Report was given by Nelson Henderson (pages 70-72). The Task Force recommended that National and State Home Missions be incorporated into the Acts 1:8 Plan. The recommendation read as follows:

- 1. That the criteria of support for national home and state home missionaries be a minimum of five year residency in the State of Arkansas and/or approval by the State Home Mission Board.
- 2. That National Home Missionary John Reed, and State Home Mission Project at Cabot begin receiving support from the A.C.T.S 1:8 Plan in 2003.
- 3. That we review that continued support of the National Home and State Home missionaries at the end of their contract.
- 4. That we give \$10,000 to Home Missionary John Reed's account, and \$10,000 to the State Home Mission Project at Cabot, to be taken from the A.C.T.S. 1:8 New Missionary account.

Motion passed to receive the report. Motion was made to adopt the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Resolution submitted by the Central Association (page 13). The motion was defeated. A motion then passed to adopt the recommendation of the Task Force (previous page). Motion passed to reimburse Stan Bunch for medical insurance costs during his one year leave of absence. Motion passed to adopt the 2003 A.C.T.S 1:8 Missionary Budget (page 72).

The Randall House Publications report was given by Alton Loveless, former General Director and current Director Ron Hunter

Matt Pinson, President of Free Will Baptist Bible College, gave the report from the college. Report from Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College was given by Carl Cheslier, President of the college. Nelson Henderson was re-elected as Hillsdale Trustee.

Bill Evans gave the report of the Board of Retirement, and David Brown gave the report of the Free Will Baptist Foundation.

Report from the Arkansas Master's Men was submitted by Jerry Lewis (pages 11-12).

Ken Akers gave the National Master's Men Report. The Alabama Free Will Baptist Children's Home report was given by Roger Bennett. The Harvest Free Will Baptist Children's Home report was given by Richard Green.

Report of the Resolution Committee was read (pages 12-13).

A motion was made to substitute Resolution 2 for Resolution 1. Motion passed to adopt Resolution 3. Motion passed to adopt Resolution 4. Resolution 5 was defeated in conjunction with the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Task Force Report.

The Nominating Committee was selected for 2003 State Meeting: Tim Landers, Jim Walker, Fred Warner, Kerry Gandy, Hoover Lewis. Motion passed to dismiss the Resolution Committee.

Report of the Obituary Committee was read by Assistant Clerk Paul Hammons (pages 74-75) David Winfrey led prayer of thanksgiving for these lives. Motion passed to dismiss the Obituary Committee.

The Statistics Report was read. (page 14) Motion passed to receive the report and dismiss the Committee.

The Registration Report was read (page 14) Motion passed to receive and dismiss the committee.

Delegates to the 2003 National Association in Tampa, Florida were elected as follows: Ron Puckett, Mary Kay Joslin, Robin Phillips, Brenda Housley, and Patsy Bishop.

State Officers elected for the next year were as follows: (State Election Schedule, page 73). Motion passed to adjourn. Andy Pearcy dismissed in prayer.

#### Wednesday Evening Worship Service August 7, 2002

Pre-service music was presented by the River Valley Messengers. The service opened with the congregation singing "Brethren We Have Met to Worship." and "O Come Let Us Adore Him." David Copeland led in prayer for the offering.

The service continued with the congregation singing "He Keeps Me Singing" and "Dwelling in Beulah Land." The Cavanaugh Church Choir from Fort Smith brought a patriotic program singing portions of "Land of the Free," "Star Spangled Banner," "O God Our Help in Ages Past," "It is Well With My Soul," "God of Our Fathers," "Great is Thy Faithfulness," "America the Beautiful," "America, Bless God," concluding with the congregation joining in singing our National Anthem. The flags were presented by Private First Class Kevin Marr, US Marines; Chief Master Sargent Mack Landers, Retired US Air Force, and Staff Sargent Jon Landers, Arkansas National Guard. The Pledge of Allegiance and Pledge to the Christian Flag were recited, followed by Tim Landers leading in prayer. The congregation sang "How Great Thou Art."

Assistant Moderator David Winfrey introduced the evening speaker Tim Campbell, recently appointed Executive Director of Arkansas Free Will Baptists who spoke on the theme "The Potential of the Opportunity" from Ephesians 3:14-21. He challenged us that with God's power working in us, there are great opportunities for us to take advantage of. After a hymn of invitation "Give Me a Vision," a final revised Registration Report was given (page 14). A total of \$1000.00 was received in the two missions offerings. Moderator David Bishop dismissed the meeting in prayer.

#### REPORT OF ARKANSAS WOMEN ACTIVE FOR CHRIST

The 48th Annual session of the Arkansas Women Active for Christ met August 6, 2002, at Conway Public School Auditorium. The theme for the day was "Our Anchor" taken from Hebrews 6:18-19. The singing was directed by Jayne Hannah with Sue Patton as the pianist.

Ken and Bonnie Doggett, Home Missionaries to Springfield, Illinois, gave the morning and afternoon devotions. Greetings were given by the missionaries present in the morning session.

Special music was given by Regina Stowers of the New Hope Association. James Forlines, Foreign Missions General Director, was the 11:00 speaker.

All 11 districts reported with 66 locals and membership of 727. A total of 174 registered, including 1 foreign missionary and 9 home missionaries. Total receipts were \$73,264.67. Our cash, non-cash and gifts sent directly were \$27,696.78, making a total giving of \$100,961.45. Our giving to Foreign Missions was \$25,571.41 (A.C.T.S. 1:8 receiving \$20,716.87 of this amount), National Home Missions \$10,711.67, Children's Home \$2,558.10, and our 2001 State Project The Zuniga's of Springdale and the Gandy's of Maumelle \$12,705.99.

WHEREAS the current A.C.T.S. 1:8 Task Force has given consideration to adding home missionaries to the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Plan.

WHEREAS it is anticipated that the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Task Force will present to the State Association at its annual meeting a recommendation to currently add certain home missionaries to the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Plan.

We, the Central Association of Arkansas Free Will Baptists adopt this resolution:

- 2. We resolve and request that the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Task Force will take the following action by the annual meeting of Arkansas Free Will Baptist in 2003:
- a.Develop a new "Mission Statement" for the A.C.T.S. Plan setting forth the goal of the new plan for both foreign and home missionaries.
- **b.Determine** eligibility criteria for participation in the Plan for both foreign and home missionaries consistent with the above "Mission Statement."
- **c.Describe** a funding formula for the new Plan allowing for adequate provision for each missionary meeting the criteria for eligibility above and providing equitability between both foreign and home missionaries.
- 3. We further resolve and request that any implementation of the A.C.T.S. 1:8 Plan as it pertains to adding home missionaries be delayed until after the annual meeting of the Arkansas Free Will Baptists in 2003 and take affect in the fiscal year 2004.

#### STATISTICS REPORT FROM CHURCH LETTERS

The Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists reports 15 associations comprised of 215 churches. The statistics for membership, baptism, etc., are based on the 199 churches who reported.

There are 96 churches located in a city/town, 118 churches in rural, 93 with full-time pastors, and 91 part-time pastors.

There are 327 ordained ministers, 51 licensed ministers, and 479 ordained deacons.

The churches reported 758 baptisms with 1,229 members added, 620 members lost, and a total membership of 19,144.

Sunday School enrollment was 11,620 CTS enrollment was 2,237; Women Active for Christ membership was 955; and Master's Men membership was 146.

There were three churches with day care, six churches with kindergartens, five with Christian day schools, and one Bible Institute.

The total income of all churches reporting was \$11,850,037.61 and 50 churches with budgets.

There were 63 churches with parsonages, and a total value of all church property, including parsonages, of \$54,740,477.00.

David Joslin clarified that Raymond Chronister and Hoover Lewis have both served their allowed terms and cannot be re-elected to the Executive Board. The board will need to meet as soon as possible following the election of new members.

#### August 8, 2001

The Executive Board of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists met prior to the evening service during the State Association meeting on August 8, 2001, at Conway High School Public Auditorium in Conway, Arkansas. Motion passed to transfer \$300 from the General Fund and \$305.92 from the Operational Fund to erase the deficit in the Minister's Benevolent Fund. Motion passed that the enrollment fee for the Minister's Benevolent Fund be increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00 and the \$25.00 membership fee be increased to \$50.00. Motion passed to rescind the previous motion on October 25, 2001, that referred to an optional membership fee.

Motion passed to approve the Christmas bonus of \$300.00 for OASIS Campus Director Kyle Hood.

Motion passed that the 2001 contract be extended for the Executive Director through June 2002.

Motion passed to authorize to transfer the line of credit of \$100,000.00 for Camp Beaverfork to a regular loan to be signed by Executive Board Chairman Randell Williams and Secretary Doug Little. The loan will be in the name of Arkansas Free Will Baptists and was used for building and improvements for Camp Beaverfork.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. These standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

The Organization has elected to record the values of land and buildings, specifically the state offices at Conway, Arkansas, at the current appraised values. Generally accepted accounting principles require that operational assets be valued at actual cost less appropriate adjustments for depreciation and substantial decreases for obsolescence. Due to limited records and the extensive use of donations relating to the establishment of the above mentioned property, it was not practical for me to extend my examination of such records beyond the amounts recorded.

In my opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had the actual cash and donations records referred to in the preceding paragraph been susceptible to satisfactory audit tests, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. as of December 31, 2001 and 2000 and its results of operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

# ARKANSAS STATE ASSOCIATION OF FREE WILL BAPTISTS, INC. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2001 AND 2000

### NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. is a nonprofit corporation organized to provide central leadership and representation for Free Will Baptists of Arkansas and to handle certain receipts and disbursements of Free Will Baptist Churches. The corporation's support comes primarily from COOP receipts and Sunday School literature sales.

The Corporation is exempt from federal income tax under section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The following significant accounting policies have been followed in the preparation of the financial statements:

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Corporation prepares its financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting, which involves the application of generally accepted accounting principles; consequently, revenues and gains are recognized when earned, and expenses and losses are recognized when incurred.

#### Basis of Presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

#### <u>Use of Estimates</u>

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles includes the use of estimates that affect the financial statements. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Contributions**

The Corporation accounts for contributions in accordance with the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in SFAS No. 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

All donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. The Corporation has no temporarily restricted net assets.

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#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - (CONTINUED)

DECEMBER 31, 2001 AND 2000

#### Property and Equipment and Depreciation

Auto, office furniture and equipment and building improvements are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred, while major betterments and renewals are capitalized. The following useful lives were used to calculate depreciation:

#### Cash Equivalents

The Corporation considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of nine months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

#### Inventory

Inventory is stated at the lower of cost (first in, first out method) or market.

# NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **ORGANIZATION**

The Christian Supply Store, Inc., is a nonprofit corporation in Conway, Arkansas, organized to provide Christian material for Arkansas Free Will Baptists. The Bookstore also services many other denominations and organizations within Arkansas and other surrounding states. The inventory consists primarily of bibles, music, literature, clothing, reference and training materials as well as cards and gift items.

#### METHOD OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements of the Bookstore have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, where income and expenses are recorded as they are earned or incurred.

#### PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the related assets. Estimated useful life of the property, equipment and leasehold improvements range from 3 to 10 years. Depreciation expense for the years ending December 31, 2001 and 2000 are \$5,527 and \$5,668, respectively.

#### INVENTORY

Inventory is recorded at lower of cost or market using first-in, first-out method for cost of sales.

#### STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the company considers all investment instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. Cash available per operating accounts are \$11,108 and cash in the contingency fund is \$668.

#### NCOME TAXES

The Bookstore is exempt from federal and state income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code.

# NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES GENERAL

Camp Beaverfork, Arkansas Free Will Baptists Youth Camp, Inc. is a nonprofit corporation established to serve the Arkansas Free Will Baptists Youth by providing summer camp and retreat facilities.

Depreciation expenses for the years ended are \$21,583 and \$20,482 respectively.

#### STATE HOME MISSIONS BOARD REPORT

#### October 9, 2001

The State Home Mission Board met October 9, 2001, at the state office in Conway, Arkansas, with all board members present and Executive Director David Joslin. The following officers were elected: Chairman Dwayne Roper; Vice-Chairman Bobby Shepherd; and Secretary John Fowlkes.

The financial report was given by David Joslin and approved by the Board.

Motion passed that all monies received from the Don Guthrie Memorial offering on the first Sunday of June, 2002, be designated to go to the new mission account.

Motion passed to apply for rezoning of the property at 310 Salem Road in Conway, Arkansas, to change from residential to quiet office which would include a church and would save time if a buyer wanted to use the building for office space. Motion passed to give the Board officers the authority to sell the Salem Road property if an offer is presented and the whole board is not able to meet.

Missionary Ramon Zuniga reported on the Hispanic ministry in Springdale.

After discussion in reference to the missionary pastor for Cabot, motion passed to give an invitation to Cliff Donoho for the Cabot work.

#### February 20, 2002

Motion passed to approve a refinancing agreement with Lake Hills which would result in a new loan in the name of Lake Hills Free Will Baptist, assuming all debt and closing costs for the building in Hot Springs. The projected loan payment would be approximately \$1,000 less from the amount the church was currently paying on their payback to APPLE. The State Home Mission Board would pay from the General Fund the portion of the new payment over \$1,000 (approximately \$422 monthly) for a total of six months. The projected loan amount would be \$192,000 at 6.5% interest at approximately \$1,422 per month.

Motion passed to enter into a new lease on the 310 Salem Road property in Conway with Four Winds Church at \$1500 monthly for two years.

Motion passed to accept the offer of \$60,000 on the Blytheville church building. Motion passed to list the parsonage in Blytheville for sale with a local realtor after cleaning and painting to give a better appearance.

The board met with missionaries Kerry Gandy and Ramon Zuniga and received their reports.

Motion passed to give missionaries Kerry Gandy and Ramon Zuniga \$1,000 each for expenses to the national association.

Bobby Moore presented to the Board about a work he would like to do in the Little Rock area. Motion passed that Bobby Moore submit an application and the scope of the proposed outreach. The Board further authorized Chairman Dwayne Roper to approve the new work. If approved, Bobby Moore could begin itinerant to raise support for the new work.

#### June 18, 2002

The State Mission Board met by conference call on June 18, 2002, with all members present as well as Executive Director David Joslin.

John Fowlkes presented two offers to buy for the property on 310 Salem Road, Conway, Arkansas.

Offer #1 Annointed and Appointed Disciples Through Jesus Christ offered \$200,000 for the property, and there would not be any rezoning involved for them to have a church in this location.

Offer #2 L. A. McMaster offered \$200,000 for the property contingent on the property being rezoned for quiet office.

Motion passed to accept Offer #1 on the property.

Information was presented to the Board that the pipeline on the Cabot property was being relocated, and that in consideration of the moving of the pipeline, the Board would receive \$1,025. Motion passed to authorize Executive Director David Joslin and/or Secretary John Fowlkes to sign any legal documents relating to the right of way easement for the relocation of the pipeline for the property purchased in Cabot, Arkansas.

#### June 25, 2002

The State Mission Board met June 25, 2002, at the state office in Conway, Arkansas, with all members present. The Board approved the minutes of May 9 as presented by John Fowlkes.

Report from John Fowlkes that the Blytheville property is back on the market since the buyer did not close on the accepted offer. The 310 Salem Road property in Conway does not have a lease or an offer and is also back on the market.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To The Board of Directors

Arkansas State Mission Board of the Arkansas State

Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc.

I have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of Arkansas State Mission Board of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. (a nonprofit Corporation) as of December 31, 2001 and 2000, and the related statements of activities, and cash flows for the years then ended. The financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. These standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

The Organization has elected to record the values of land and buildings, specifically the state mission church at Wynne, Arkansas, at the appraised values. Generally accepted accounting principles require that operational assets be valued at actual cost less appropriate adjustments for depreciation and substantial decreases for obsolescence. Due to limited records and the extensive use of donations relating to the establishment of the above mentioned property, it was not practical for me to extend my examination of such records beyond the amounts recorded.

In my opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had the actual cash and donations records referred to in the preceding paragraph been susceptible to satisfactory audit tests, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Arkansas State Mission Board of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. as of December 31, 2001 and 2000 and its results of operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

# NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Arkansas State Mission Board of the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, Inc. is a nonprofit Corporation incorporated under the law of the State of Arkansas. The purpose of the corporation is to establish and support Free Will Baptists Mission Churches in the state of Arkansas. The corporation's support comes primarily from donor contributions and COOP receipts.

The Corporation is exempt from federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The following significant accounting policies have been followed in the preparation of the financial statements:

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Corporation prepares its financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting, which involves the application of generally accepted accounting principles; consequently, revenues and gains are recognized when earned, and expenses and losses are recognized when incurred.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in its Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations. Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles includes the use of estimates that affect the financial statements. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Contributions**

The Organization accounts for contributions in accordance with the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board in SFAS No. 116, Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence or nature of any donor restrictions.

All donor-restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets.

#### **Property**

As mentioned in the audit report, the property located in Wynne, Arkansas is carried at the appraised values. The property at Maumelle, Arkansas and Hot Springs, Arkansas is carried at cost plus donated labor and material. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance are charged to operations when incurred, while major betterments and renewals are capitalized.

#### Cash Equivalents

The Corporation considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of six months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

### **Preamble**

From experience we, the members of the Free Will Baptist denomination, being regularly baptized upon a profession of our faith in Jesus Christ and realizing the necessity of a bond of union and fellowship among us; to preserve and maintain correspondence and coordination with us; to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association; and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in cooperation with the various districts of the Association, for that may be hereafter represented therein, do therefore ordain this Constitution for our better denomination government.

#### Article I.

#### Name:

This organization shall be known as the Arkansas State Association of Free Will Baptists, affiliated with the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

#### Article II.

# Purpose:

The purpose of this organization shall be to unify the work of the various districts composing the State Association and to devise and execute measures for the extension of the Kingdom of God in connection with the various districts in the Association.

# Article III.

# Representation:

Section 1. This association shall be composed of all ordained ministers and deacons with membership in a church belonging to a district association, the district associational clerk, all members of state boards, and standing officers of the state association.

Section 2. Each district association shall be entitled to five (5) lay delegates at large. Each local church which holds membership in a district association affiliated with this body shall be entitled to send one lay delegate.

# Section 3. Associational Delegates:

A. In the event any of the elected delegates fail to report, said vacancy may be filled by appointment of the moderator of said district or by the delegates present from said district.

B. In the event the elected delegate from a local church is not present, the Pastor of that local church shall have the authority to appoint a delegate to serve in place of the absent delegate.

Section 4. New associations desiring membership in the state association shall send messengers bearing a petitionary letter. If found orthodox, upon examination by the credentials committee, they shall be received by the vote of the association and given the right hand of fellowship by moderator.

Section 5. The State Convention shall convene annually on the Tuesday following the first Sunday in the month of August unless another time is recommended by the Executive Committee.

## Article IV.

#### Finance:

Section 1. This association shall be supported by a percentage of the Cooperative receipts as designated by the State Association and by designated gifts. Said allocations to national and state work to be recommended to the association by the budget committee.

Section 2. Each district association shall send \$25.00 for each church belonging to the district association for the purpose of entertaining the State Association; \$50.00 for each church for National Association fees; and \$5.00 per each church for minutes, for a total of \$80.00.

Section 3. In the event any church within a local association does not pay its fee; the delegates, deacons, and ministers of that church shall not be seated.

# Article V.

# Discipline:

Section 1. This State Association shall have the right to settle any questions of discipline, doctrine, or practice that may properly come before it from any of the districts composing said organization. If there be any question of discipline, doctrine, or practice on the part of a district body, delegates of that association shall be not seated until these questions have been settled to the satisfaction of the credentials committee.

Section 2. The decision of the credentials committee may be appealed to the State Association sitting in a committee as a whole.

# Article VI.

#### Officers:

Section 1. The officers of the State Association shall consist of a moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and executive director. Each of these, with exception of the executive director shall be elected annually. These shall constitute a standing Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall plan the State Association. A district association desiring to host the state association shall extend an invitation at least one year in advance. If an invitation is not received, the State Association will convene in the Conway area unless another site is recommended by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall employ the auditor for all standing boards. The auditor shall be responsible to report directly to the committee, and then to the directors and boards. The audits shall be paid for by each respective board.

Section 4. The Moderator shall be an ex-officio member of the Executive Board. The Executive Director shall be an ex-officio member of all standing boards and committees.

Section 5. A committee on committees shall be elected by the body on the opening night of the association. All other committees shall be appointed by the committee on committees.

Section 6. The moderator, assistant moderator, executive director, clerk, and assistant clerk shall serve as the program committee for the State Association.

#### Article VII.

Duties and Rules of Standing Boards:

Section 1. All standing boards shall be composed of six (6) members, each of whom shall serve for three years. A member may be re-elected for an additional term of three years. No board member shall immediately succeed himself after having served two full three-year terms on said board.

Each board shall prepare a budget of its proposed financial expenditures at the beginning of each fiscal year and shall present same for approval by the Arkansas State Association along with an audit made by an independent certified public accountant, which audit shall lead to the expression of an unqualified opinion on the financial statements. The auditor's report shall include, where applicable, a balance sheet and income statement and other schedules as may be necessary for a proper presentation of the financial condition and results of operation.

Section 2. All boards of this association shall organize immediately following the annual association meeting. They shall elect a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Each board shall give a written report at the annual association of meetings conducted, work accomplished, monies received and expended during the year

Section 3. Executive Board: This board shall have the authority to fill irregular vacancies which may occur in its own body, and any irregular vacancies which may occur in any standing board between sessions of the state association. An office may be declared vacant for any of the following reasons: if a member moves from the State; if a member fails to attend the board meetings for a period of one year without providential hindrance; or if for any reason he submits a statement of resignation.

The Executive Board shall keep a record of all work accomplished, money raised, meetings conducted, and make a full and complete report at the annual association of the State Association. The Executive Board shall receive, hold, manage, use, control, and convey property entrusted to the State Association, except as stipulated elsewhere in the constitution.

No board shall buy or sell real estate, encumber the State Association beyond their current fiscal year and budget, or enter into litigation when the State Association is not in conference without the approval of the Executive Board. The chairman and secretary of the Executive Board shall sign all papers by which the State Association is to become legally responsible.

In case of an emergency situation, the Executive Board shall have the authority to call the State Association in conference by notifying each district association at least ten (10) days prior to the conference.

A bookstore shall be operated under the supervision and direction of the Executive Board who shall have the authority to employ a bookstore manager. A contractual agreement shall be signed annually by the manager of the bookstore and the Executive Board. The manager shall present a financial statement of the bookstore operation at each annual session of the association.

This board shall have the authority to employ the state executive director. A contractual agreement shall be signed annually by the executive director and the Executive Board. The executive director shall assist in coordinating the work of the various boards of the State Association and shall serve as state treasurer. He shall promote both the state and national works, missionaries, mission conferences, etc. It shall be his duty to edit and publish the state paper.

He shall receive, hold, and disburse money as is made available by the State Association to the various boards. Disbursements to the various boards will be made when requested.

He shall present a written report of his work at each annual session of this association, with a financial statement of all monies received and disbursed. Section 4. Mission Board: It shall be the duty of this board to promote an active missions program. It shall work in cooperation with the national home mission and foreign missions boards in the arranging of missionary conferences, of missionary itineraries, and shall assist in the raising of the State quota for the national missions program.

The board shall not participate in the organization of any church or mission in a town, city, or community where there is an organized Free Will Baptist Church without seeking the cooperation of said church. Neither shall this board assist in the organization of a group that is out of fellowship with an established church.

This board shall be entrusted to receive, hold, manage, use, control, or convey State Mission Property.

Section 5. State Youth Board: It shall be the duty of the State Youth Board to sponsor activities for the youth of the state that will encourage, enlighten, and educate them in a manner which will be uplifting to Christ. This board shall sponsor retreats, conferences, activities, camps, and service oriented projects for the youth. This board shall be trustees of the camp facilities owned by the state. It shall be the responsibility of this board to employ a State Youth Director to manage the camp facilities, organize and coordinate youth activities, and receive and disburse designated funds as directed by this board. The State Youth Director shall promote district, state, and national programs involving the youth. The Youth Director shall be responsible for the hiring and dismissing of camp personnel under the direction of the State Youth Board.

Section 6. Christian Education Board: It shall be the duty of this board to promote Christian education throughout the state. They shall arrange activities which may include conferences, workshops, teacher training courses, and retreats to promote instruction and fellowship.

# Article VIII.

#### Amendments:

This constitution may be amended at any regular session of the State Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, providing proposed amendment is presented in writing to the body one day in advance.

## Article IX.

### Hillsdale Trustees:

The State Association shall have two trustees to Hillsdale Free Will Baptist College. They shall give an annual report to the State Association on the progress of the college. One board member shall be elected annually to serve a two-year term.

#### Article X.

## Parliamentary Procedure:

This meeting of the State Association shall be governed by the rules of parliamentary law as set forth in Robert's Rules of Order.
