BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS OF QUARTERLY MEETINGS October 28, 1961 — Canton Church

The Ordination Council recommended that a letter be sent to Rev. Massie concerning matters which the Council had discussed with him several times. A Motion was made, seconded and the body voted for the Clerk to send the letter.

The Council recommended that Rev. Steve Lawing be licensed to preach. The body approved the recommendation.

A correction was made of the meeting time, making it the first Saturday of each quarter, or every three months according to our fiscal year which begins August 1. The body approved amending the By-Laws to read as above.

The body voted to meet at Rocky Pass for the Quarterly meeting on February 3.

The moderator announced Minister's Fellowship Meetings to be discontinued.

Rev. Homer Arrowood resigned as Field Superintendent as he had accepted a church. Rev. Winfred Roland was voted to replace him.

Motion was made to pay Mrs. Josephine Stevens, Missionary to Africa, two months in advance, or \$70, towards her transportation back to Africa. Also, an offering of \$33.69 was taken to be applied to her account. The body approved the motion.

Two discussions were given as follows: Rev. Hollifield concerning the Conservative Fellowship of Free Will Baptists (National group in N.C) and Literature for Sunday School and League, By Rev. Pitts.

A motion was made to recommend to churches in our Association cooperate with the literature program of the National body, and to reaffirm our stand with the National Association.

The motion was amended, adding that this fact would be published in both Free Will Baptist publications, CONTACT and FREE WILL BAPTIST. The body approved.

The clerk was instructed by the body to write National Press in Oklahoma and ask that samples of Sunday School and League be sent to each church.

The body instructed the clerk to write Rev. Osborne informing him that the \$20 borrowed by him to attend the State Convention was to be considered a gift.

February 3, 1962 — Rocky Pass Church

A committee of three, Rev. Kell, Rev. Roland, and Rev. Pitts, were instructed by the body to investigate and encourage churches of the association who failed to represent with delegates at the meetings. This Promotion Committee to report each Quarterly meeting.

Invitations for next Quarterly meeting were given. The body voted to meet with Caroleen church.

Rev. Hollifield was appointed chairman of a Free Will Baptist Rally in Buncombe County; Rev. Reynolds, McDowell and Burke Counties; Rev. Condrey, Mitchell County, and Rev. Pitts, Haywood County. The Rallies were intended to rotate weeks of services throughout all of above counties.

It was recommended that each church give a donation to building program of the New Macedonia Church. The body voted to give \$50 from the general treasury of the Association.

May 5, 1962 — Caroleen Church

The motion was made and approved that the Mt. Zion Church be accepted in full fellowship into the Blue Ridge Association.

Marion (First) Church invited the Annual Meeting to be held there, the body approved.

A motion was made that the Thursday night service be given for the Womans Auxiliary Annual meeting. The body approved.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Ninth Annual Session of the Blue Ridge Association was called to order by Rev. H. A. Pitts Moderator.

The speaker of the morning was Rev. Herman Hersey of Raleigh, N. C., who spoke from the 3rd Chapter of Joshua.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON BUSINESS SESSION

The Resolutions Committees reports were as follows:

"We, the Resolutions Committee, make the following recommendations:

"BE IT RESOLVED, That we express sincere appreciation to the First Free Will Baptist Church in Marion for their kindness, and hospitality during this 9th Annual Session of the Blue Ridge Association."

In as much as our Blue Ridge Association is in harmony with the National Association of Free Will Baptists and desires to remain in keeping with our National Body;

BE IT RESOLVED, That our Clerk be paid an amount of \$50 annually for services rendered. As this is the amount of the salary of our National Clerk as well as many of the local district bodies.

BE IT RESOLVED, We recommend that \$100 be paid to promote our monthly paper being published by our State Association, providing the funds are available.

In as much as our Association is maintaining its relations with the National Association in cooperation with the North Carolina Association of Free Will Baptists, and,

In as much as the men from N. C. State Convention have caused some conflict by some things they have said in other churches and conferences, therefore to avoid this happening in our association;

BE IT RESOLVED, That no member of the N. C. State Convention be allowed to speak at any of our meetings until their attitude has changed toward the National Association.

RESOLVED, That due to N. C. State Convention of F. W. B., acts in withdrawing from the National Body and to the recently organized N. C. Association of F. W. B., which is now a member of the National Body, it is recommended that all reference to State Convention-owned enterprises be stricken from our report forms and the proper references made.

This motion was accepted by a 100 per cent vote in favor. An amendment to the motion was that the Clerk write a news article release stating the above, to Associated Press.

The moderator called for reports to be made by various committees who were appointed at annual meeting last year. Those reports were all voted upon and approved individually. They are as follows:

Good religious books are helpful, if not read at the neglect of the Word of God.
- 3. The School This creates a very serious problem for parents today and must be a matter of serious thought and sincere prayer. In view of the recent decision of the Supreme Court of the United States to ban prayer from our Public School system our problems are greatly intensified. Let us be very cautious and earnestly strive to make our schools better for our Children. On the brighter side of the picture, in the field of higher education we have Free Will Baptist Bible College located at Nashville, Tennessee, rendering a great service in giving our children a Christian education of the highest value. Let each Christian earnestly pray for this wonderful institution, support it with regular offerings from our churches, and send our children there for the fine training offered by the college

Suddenly they are faced with a belief of friends and teachers that Mom and Dad and even the Church was wrong to teach them the sins of dancing and other such things. Today, in schools one must dance or be ridiculed, and even now prayers are no longer sacred, but some unpopular ritual that is taboo. Today Christian Colleges are sometimes too late to help our young Christians.

I challenge the Free Will Baptists to consider a school where our children can be taught secular things, coordinating with spiritual rights. A school where they will be associating with other Christian Youth. A School where Christian truths are upheld and honored rather than scorned.

I challenge you to reap this harvest which is ripe and fastly going to seed. It is up to us as wide-awake Christians to realize this and to provide a schooling atmosphere to live up to our heritage of Christ-loving people. If we sit by and allow our youth to be swallowed up by the heirarchy of public school principals of life, we'll have millions of bloody fingers, fingers of Free Will Baptist taught youth pointing at us at the judgement, saying: "you didn't provide a way for me to remain true without persecution, you allowed me to be brain-washed by Satan in public school."

I recommend concentration be placed upon our Youth Work, remember that true teen-age Christians today, means firm Christian adults in the future.

- 2. We further recommend that one of the members of this committee be appointed treasurer.
- 3. We also recommend that each church receive an offering once a month for the support of said project.
- 4. We further recommend that until definite plans of this nature are completed, that each church be responsible for the welfare of its own individual ministers and workers.

CONSTITUTION, MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

- 1. This body shall be known as the Ministers' Conference of the Blue Ridge Association of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina.
- 2. This conference is formed under and by the authority of the Blue Ridge Association and shall be composed of its ordained and licensed ministers.. .
- 3. It shall have entire jurisdiction over the ministry in said association, issuing license, and prescribing qualifications for the ministry, conducting examinations and ordaining ministers, and at all times working for the most harmonious and effective ministry. Each licensed minister shall work under a license for a period of not less than one year; then he may be ordained if the ordaining council deems it necessary.
- 4. We deem it necessary for the protection of the gospel, not to accept anyone as a minister who has two living wives.
- 5. Each minister will be required to practice, preach and teach tithing as the means of church support.
 - 6. Following the union meeting held on Saturday before each fifth

Sunday, the Ministers' Conference will be held. Each minister will be required to attend and report on his work at each conference unless providentially hindered; then he shall report by letter.

- 7. The officers of this conference shall be a moderator and a secretary-treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of two years, and shall perform the duties usually performed by such officers. They shall enter upon the duties of said office at the close of the current session. The moderator may not succeed himself.
- 8. This conference shall have power to make such bylaws and other regulations as may be necessary for the performance of its duties.
- 9. This constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a vote of two thirds.

BYLAWS, MINISTERS' CONFERENCE

- 1. The regular meeting of this conference shall be held annually immediately following the association. The conference shall meet each fifth Sunday in connection with the union meeting.
- 2. Each member shall report at each annual and fifth Sunday meeting either in person or by letter.
- 3. Five (5) members shall constitute a quorum at all regular or legally called meetings.
- 4. The moderator may call a special meeting of the conference at any time upon the request of three members.
- 5. At each annual meeting there shall be elected an ordaining council of three members whose duty shall be to examine candidates and grant license, conduct ordinations, etc., and report each annual meeting.
- 6. Licentiates shall pursue a definite course of study under the direction of the ordaining council.
- 7. At each annual meeting there shall be elected an investigating committee of three members, whose duty shall be to investigate applicants for membership, and license and other investigations they may be called on to make.
- 8. Necessary expenses of this organization shall be met by voluntary contributions or by assessment of its members.
- 9. No member shall serve as pastor of a church which does not enforce discipline, and care for their pastor, and contribute to the united program of our state, according to their ability, and desire to go forward in spiritual progress and the upbuilding of God's Kingdom.
- 10. No member shall meddle with the work of another or injure his reputation for usefulness, but watch over each other and thus promote harmony among the membership.
- 11. Each member, not excused of age or infimities, is expected to do some work to advance the cause of Christ and make a full report at each annual meeting.
- 12. Membership in this body shall be proof of good standing in the ministry. A membership card shall be issued to each member at the annual meeting upon payment of \$1.00. This fee to be placed in the conference treasury to pay necessary expenses, and for the promotion of the cause of Christ
- 13. These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds majority at any annual meeting.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS of the BLUE RIDGE ASSOCIATION

of NORTH CAROLINA Affiliated with

National Association of Free Will Baptists

Article 1

This association shall be known as the Blue Ridge Association of the Original Free Will Baptists of North Carolina.

Article 2

The objects of this association shall be: To promote unity, fraternity, fellowship and co-operation; and to encourage and engage in larger Christian enterprises that cannot be carried on by a single church. To combine and direct the energies of the Free Will Baptists within its bounds in one sacred effort to encourage and promote the general spread of the gospel; and the causes of the united program.

Article 3

- 1. This Association shall be composed of all ordained and licensed ministers and deacons and of delegates chosen and sent by each church in its bounds, who shall be duly recommended by the church to which they belong.
- 2. The following auxiliaries of each church are entitled to one delegate each: The Sunday School, Ladies Auxiliary and Free Will Baptist League. No church shall be entitled to more than six (6) delegates.
- 3. Each church and its auxiliaries may represent by letter and a donation for the expenses of the association and the causes it fosters.
- 4. This association disclaims the right to exercise lordship ove the churches, or to have any power which entitles it to infringe upon the internal affairs or rights of any of the churches composing it. Each church shall consider its internal affairs to be its own business; but it shall not disrespect the association and those who are placed in authority by the proper process.

Article 4

An accused church has the same right as an individual in the church: to have specific charges presented in writing, a fair opportunity for defense, and to be considered innocent until proved guilty.

Article 5

This association may withdraw from any church that becomes disorderly or refuses to be represented by letter or delegates.

Article 6

Churches coming from another denomination will be carefully and satisfactorily examined as to doctrine before being received as members.

Article 7

- 1. The officers of this association shall be moderator and assistant moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian and field superintendent, who shall be elected for a term of two years, entering upon their said duties of said offices at the close of the current session.
- 2. The moderator and assistant moderator shall not succeed themselves in election. However, the assistant moderator may be elected moderator.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the moderator to preside over all the meetings of the association.
- 4. It shall be the duty of the assistant moderator to preside in the absence of the moderator.

- 5. It shall be the duty of the clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the association in a business-like manner, and to superintend the printing of the minutes, and the distribution of said minutes, and to give over all properties belonging to his or her office to his or her duly successor. The clerk shall be paid a fee of \$50.00 for services—amount fixed by the association. Minutes of the association shall be sent to all visiting Free Will Baptist ministers.
- 6. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive all funds belonging to the association and to disburse same as directed by the association. The treasurer shall be bonded for an amount sufficient to cover all money coming into their hands.
- 7. It shall be the duty of the historian to keep a record of such items of interest as may be useful in the future; to preserve the same in a book. He or she shall also keep a file of the minutes. He or she shall give over all materials and property to his or her successor in office.
- 8. It shall be the duty of the field superintendent to encourage the work in general in this association, and in every way possible assist them in doing greater things for God's glory. He shall promote unity and fellowship among the ministers and their churches. He shall supply for any pastor who shall be providentially kept from his work. He shall be paid a salary agreed upon by the association. He shall receive an offering at all churches, the same to be turned over to the association to help maintain this work.

Article 8

At each annual session the moderator shall appoint such committees as the association may direct. It shall be the duty of these committees to report at the next annual meeting.

Article 9

The following directors shall be elected annually: Director for young peoples' work; director for the woman's auxiliary work—who shall be responsible to do all the work they can to promote the work in these departments in each church in this association. They shall encourage cooperation with the state league and ladies' auxiliary organization.

Article 10

The executive board shall consist of the moderator, assistant moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, field superintendent, and three members elected from the floor. It shall be the duty of the executive board to have the supervision of the work of the association between sessions. The moderator and clerk, by virtue of their office, shall be chairman and secretary, respectively, of the board. Five members of the executive board shall constitute a quorum.

Article 11

It shall be the duty of the assocation to encourage a sound ministry, such as present Christ as an all-sufficient Savior, having made salvation possible to every human being on the terms of the gospel, which is freely offered to all.

Article 12

Any church seeking membership in this association shall furnish evidence that there is a deed or record made to the trustees of said Free Will Baptist church and their successors in office, and after a satisfactory examination as to their doctrine and fellowship and disposition toward the united program, may be received as members.

Article 13

We will have a quarterly meeting on first Saturday of each quarter

after annual meeting for the furtherance of every phase of the work of this association. The meeting shall be composed of all members and two delegates from each church.

Article 14

This association shall adopt the Treatise of the Faith and Government of the National Treatise of the Free Will Baptists.

Article 15

A church may become a member of this association by petition, or by letter, or by delegates, and by adopting the Treatise and Articles of Faith and Government, and the Constitution and By-laws of this association.

Article 16

This association shall be governed by the rules laid down in Roberts' or Hastings' Rules of Order.

Article 17

This association shall meet annually on Thursday before the first Sunday in August.

Article 18

The minutes of each meeting of this association shall be printed, the Constitution and By-laws of the association, and Constitution and By-laws of the Ministers' Conference; also the Church Covenant.

Article 19

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote at any annual meeting of the association.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1—A session of this association shall meet annually.
ARTICLE 2—This association shall be opened and closed with suitable devotions.

ARTICLE 3-There shall be no conversation by members, on with another, so as to interrupt business while in session.

ARTICLE 4—Every person wishing to speak, shall first arise and address the moderator, and be recognized before speaking.

ARTICLE 5-No member shall interrupt another while speaking.

ARTICLE 6—Every member speaking shall attend to the subject under consideration.

ARTICLE 7—No member shall speak on any one subject more than twice, except by permission of the moderator.

ARTICLE 8—Every motion made and seconded shall be acted upon unless withdrawn by the person who made it.

ARTICLE 9—A motion before the house must be acted upon before another motion can be made.

ARTICLE 19—On all motions acted upon, the majority vote shall prevail.

ARTICLE 11—The moderator shall have the privilege to speak on any subject as any other member, provided the chair is filled.

ARTICLE 12—We shall admit no other title while in session but that of Brother or Sister.

ARTICLE 13—No member shall absent himself from the body without permission of the moderator.

ARTICLE 14—Any person transgressing these by-laws shall be admonished by the moderator.

ARTICLE 15—No less than nine (9) members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICL 16—An offering shall be received at the annual meeting as is necessary. The necessity will be determined by the moderator.

ARTICLE 17—These by-laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by two-thirds vote.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. GOD: We believe that there is only one true and living God who is personally the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, equal and harmonious in every divine perfection. There is one God and one mediator between God and man, the man Christ Jesus who gave Himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time. 1 Timothy 2:5.
- 2. THE HOLY SCRIPTURE: We believe that God is the author of the Holy Bible, and its teachings constitute the only infallible doctrine for the government of His church. All scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction and instruction in righteousness.
- 3. ORIGINAL APOSTASY: We believe that Adam was created holy but by voluntary transgression fell into repravity and consequently involved his posterity in sin. "And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took the fruit thereof and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat." (Genesis 3:6).
- 4. FREE GRACE: We believe that the grace of God comprehends all spiritual blessings, that the gospel is the power of God unto salvation, that the Holy Spirit not only reproves the world of sin but is the means whereby sinners are converted and made wise unto salvation. "For there is no difference between Jews and Greeks: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon Him." (Romans 10:12).
- 5. CHRISTIAN FAITH: We believe that Christian faith is the belief in the Lord Jesus Christ as the Son of God and redeemer of the world and in the divinity of the Holy Scripture, that faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God. "He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: and he that believeth not on the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth in him." (John 3:36).
- 6. REPENTANCE: We believe that repentance is sorrow for sin and the kind of sorrow which produces Godly repentance must be preceded by effectual conviction of sin. "Now I rejoice, not that ye were made sorry, but ye sorrowed to repentance: for ye were made sorry after a Godly manner, that ye might receive damage by us in nothing. For Godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death." (2 Corinthians 7:9-10).
- 7. FREE GRACE: We believe that the human will is free and that men have ability to reject the conditions of salvation as they are revealed in the Holy Scripture. "He that shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God?" (Micah 6:8).
 - 8. PERSEVERENCE: We do not believe, under gospel dispensation,

any soul is elected to eternal life unconditionally, but that those who by faith persevere to the end will be saved; that it is possible for men who have been converted to make shipwreck of their faith and turn again to sin and finally be lost. "And Jesus said unto him, No man, having put his hand to the plough and looking back, is fit for the Kingdom of God." (Luke 9:62).

- 9. GOOD WORKS: We believe that good works are the results of faith and not necessity; that those who have faith will do works of righteousness while those who have not faith cannot do anything pleasant or acceptable to God. "Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them." (Matthew 7:19-20).
- 10. CHRISTIAN BAPTISM: We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; that baptism cannot be Scripturally administered without faith in the Subject who receives it. "Therefore we are buried with Him by baptism into death: that like Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4).
- 11. THE LORD'S SUPPER: We believe the supper was instituted by our Savior as a commemorative ordinance, that it was instituted regardless of name or denomination. "But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body." (1 Corinthians 11:28-29).
- 12. FEET WASHING: We believe that washing the saint's feet was a command of our Savior and that His followers ought to practice the same. We urge the pastors of all churches to encourage the practical obedience of this command, especially among the members of our churches. "If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; ye also ought to wash one another's feet." (John 13:14).
- 13. THE GOSPEL: We believe it to be the duty of all churches to support the gospel. "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel live of the gospel." (1 Corinthians 9:14).

CHURCH COVENANT

Having given ourselves to God, by faith in Christ, and adopted the Word of God as our rule of faith and practice, we now give ourselves to one another by the will of God in the solemn covenant.

We promise by His grace to love and obey Him in all things, to avoid all appearance of evil, to abstain from all sinful amusements and unholy conformity to the world, from all sanction of the use and sale of intoxicating beverages, and to "provide things honest in the sight of all men."

We agree faithfully to discharge our obligations in reference to the study of the Scripture, secret prayer, family devotions, and social worship; and by self-denial, faith and good works endeaver to "grow in grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ."

We will not forsake the assembling of ourselves together for church conferences; public worship, and the observance of the ordinances of the gospel, nor fail to pay according to our ability for the support of the church, of its poor, and all its benevolent work.

We agree to accept Christian admonition and reproof with meekness, and to watch over one another in love, endeavoring to "keep the unity of the Spirit" in the bonds of peace, to be careful of one another's happiness and reputation, and to seek to strengthen the weak, encourage the afflicted, admonish the erring, and as far as we are able promote the success of the church and of the gospel.

We will everywhere hold Christian principles sacred and Christian obligations and enterprises supreme; counting it our chief business in life to extend the influence of Christ in society; constantly praying and toiling that the Kingdom of God may come, and His will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

To this end we agree to labor for the promotion of educational and denominational enterprises, the support of missions, the success of Sunday schools, and evangelistic efforts for the salvation of the world. And may the God of peace sanctify us wholly, and preserve us blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.
