


INDEBTEDNESS CAMPAIGN BRINGS EARLY RESPONSE



President L. C. Johnson shows a \$500 check for the Indebtedness Campaign Fund⁺ to the College treasurer, E. B. McDonald. The gift was received in the day's mail from J. A. Blackburn, Mount Hope, West Virginia, a loyal friend to the College.

Early indications of a widespread interest in the \$40,000 Campaign are being received at the College office daily, according to L. C. Johnson, College president.

"From personal contacts on the field and from letters sent in by pastors we believe the response is becoming denominational wide," he stated. "Leaders in several states are co-operating in a most unusual way in leading the pastors and churches in raising \$100 each, or more."

"Each day some church or pastor writes to let us know we can depend upon them for a special gift by April 1," he added.

The campaign was first begun in October, 1952, upon purchasing the Richland Apartments building for \$65,000. Since then more than \$23,000 has been received on this goal; and \$31,000 has been paid, leaving a balance of \$34,000. An indebtedness of \$5,000 is owed on the 3612 Richland Avenue property, making a total indebtedness of \$39,000 as of December 31, 1953. Dr. Johnson believes as many as 300 Free Will Baptist churches can give \$100 each to raise \$30,000 on this debt-clearing drive. Offerings from churches other than the 300 and gifts from individuals will finish out the \$40,000 goal.

\$40,000 Day will be April 1, 1954 at the 11:00 o'clock service on the closing day of the Bible Conference. Representatives from each church are to present the churches' gifts at this service. The combined gifts are expected to enable the College to liquidate every dollar of indebtedness against all College properties. Churches not able to send a representative should mail their special campaign offering to the College office before April 1, and the College will have someone to present the gift for the church.

The churches in the following states should raise these amounts, which are based on the average income from the state gifts.

From My Desk

400,000 People! !

That is the approximate number of Free Will Baptists affiliated with the National Association according to our latest statistical report. In this number of people we have much talent, almost unlimited financial resource, a life power which, if activated and consecrated to God, could do unbelievable things in the kingdom work of our Saviour.



Let us dream tor a moment of some of the possibilities that belong to us Free Will Baptists. To keep the figure from seeming unbelievably huge, and in order to be safe in our estimation, let us say there are 300,-000 Free Will

Baptists and 3,000 local churches. Let us estimate there are 75,000 homes represented in this number and that each home has an average of 11/2 wage earners. This would give a total of 112,500 Free Will Baptists who earn a salary. Let us say the average salary is \$40 weekly. This gives us a total Free Will Baptist weekly income of \$4,500,000. Suppose each of these tithed, it would give a weekly income to the churches of \$450,000. This would mean each of the 3,000 local churches would receive an average of \$150 weekly. If each of the 3,000 churches gave the small amount of 1/10 to denominational causes, it would be \$15 weekly from each of the 3,000 local churches, which would amount to \$45,-000 weekly income for denominational purposes. This would mean the Bible College, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, and every other department of our work would receive a monthly income of \$180,000.

Such huge sums are hard for us to imagine, but we can see what would happen if we were all scriptural in our giving. In other words, this is what would happen if we would do things in God's way. I will admit I have been shocked as I have seen the possibilities and then looked at the realities within our church. The surface has barely been scratched. The challenge is before us. The way to begin is for each individual to promise God now that he will be scriptural in his giving.

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The College is depending on each pastor to lead his people in subscribing a gift for this \$40,000 campaign or receiving a special offering. Begin to raise your amount at once and let the College knows as soon as possible what your church will do.

One church in Texas of 26 members has already set a goal of \$500. A new congregation in Missouri of 34 members is planning to be one of the 300 \$100 donors. Many churches have set at least \$100 as their minimum and the sky as the limit.

New Semester Begins January 27

Extra typists have been added to the normal force to push the campaign work forward. Many students who can type give the office a much-needed lift by typing during off hours. On several occasions the office lights have burned into the night to see the accomplishment of a daily objective. Each person works with the incentive that a successful campaign will be worth every effort expended.

St. Louis Student Ordained in Home Church


Clarence Burton, Jr., was ordained December 22 in a special service in his home church, Third Free Will Baptist Church, St. Louis, Missouri.

LAITY ASKED TO SUPPORT PASTORS IN_s CAMPAIGN

The following personal letter was recently mailed to 1550 pastors. Their response to the appeal to retire the indebtedness has been great. The college officials are expecting the laity to join hands with their pastors in assuring their church's participation.

Dear Brother:

You no doubt are busy with your church plans for 1954. Having spent several years in the pastorate, I know I always had more things planned for the new year than I was ever able to get done. I do hope that you have another successful year in the greatest of all work—the Gospel ministry.

After much prayer I have asked the Board of Trustees of our Bible College to give me the go-ahead on raising the money and paying off the College indebtedness. Unanimously and enthusiastically they approved the plan.

So the date and the hour has been set when we hope this dream will become real. April 1, 11 o'clock, is the time. This is on Thursday of our Bible Conference.

The plan is this: We are asking 300 churches to have a gift on hand to be presented at the 11 o'clock service on the above-mentioned date. That would give us \$30,000. We would then need \$8,000 more to make a total of \$38,000 which would put Free Will Baptist Bible College completely debt free.

We know there are some churches planning to give much more than one hundred dollars. There are a number of churches that have always been loyal to the Bible College that cannot give a hundred dollars. We hope the larger and smaller gifts will make up the \$8,000 needed after 300 churches have given one hundred dollars each.

l know you keep your people pretty well loaded, and I even hesitate to ask you for this special help, but I would personally be very grateful to you and the Lord if you would write me and tell me you are asking your people for a special gift for our Bible College to be given April 1 at the 11 o'clock service of our Bible Conference.

I shall be expecting to hear from you soon. You can imagine how I feel with this responsibility. Your help will mean so very much. Pray for us.

From My Desk

"Pray ye therefore the Lord of harvest . . ." Matthew 9:38.

In my last article I pointed out the financial income if 300,000 Free Will Baptists followed God's order in giving. Let us now think of something far more important than material things; namely, workmen.



I am again basing these calculations on the assumption that we have 3000 Free Will B aptist churches. (This is 1000 below the a ctual figure.) Suppose that one out of every ten of these churches produced a preacher or a missionary

every year. That would give us three hundred preachers and missionaries every year. Let us further imagine that one hundred of these became missionaries and two hundred went into the pastorate and other types of service on the home field.

Fantastic, you say! Is it not reasonable that out of every ten congregations God wishes to call some young man or woman into full-time service for Him? For a long time I have felt that every church that has been in existence for five or at the most ten years should have sons and daughters on the harvest field for the Master. If your church has not produced a preacher or a missionary lately, perhaps you should call it to the attention of the congregation and seek out the reason.

Can you imagine what would happen in our denomination if we had three hundred young people every year entering into full-time Christian service. In the next ten years we would have a thousand missionaries on the field. We would have two thousand more preachers of the gospel in our churches here at home.

The many churches that are now desperately searching for pastors could have them. Hundreds of new churches could be organized, and the hundreds of communities in our own homeland without any religious services could be cared for. Does the thought not thrill you?

But how are we to go about getting people into the ministry and missionary work? The answer will be found in the scripture verse at the head of this article.

Perhaps a much greater need is a large safe to protect the important College records, journals, and other valuables. The hazard of fire destroying present unprotected records makes a large safe imperative. Present plans will bring this about soon.

You will read this about the time we will know the results of the campaign to clear the Bible College indebtedness. Of course none of us yet knows what the results will be. Whatever the outcome, my heart has been made to rejoice at the wonderful response you have made to this appeal.



I have tried to analyze this response and I believe there are two good reasons why the Free Will Baptist denomination is behind the Bible College. First, with few exceptions we are all aware of the importance of trained leadership.

Missionary Speaker Delights College Students

W. G. Lewis, of Lincoln, Nebraska, specialist in missionary dental training, engendered in the student body an additional fervor for missions in a special chapel program Thursday, March 18.

Mr. Lewis challenged the missionary students to a greater missionary ministry by taking dental training before leaving for the mission field. He related the story of his life as a farm boy in Michigan, his struggle in working his way through college, his later success in the commercial chicken-hatching business, and finally his being able to fulfill his lifelong desire of helping missionaries on the mission field. This he did after seeing the lack of dental care was impairing the health of many missionaries. A great burden to supply this need caused him to take hundreds of hours of priviate instruction from cooperative dentists before he took a dental chair to the mission field where he has ministered to the dental needs of nearly a thousand missionaries in several foreign countries. Not only were the missionaries kept in better health, but this ministry afforded many entrances among the natives as well.

The great success of this venture led Mr. Lewis to found a dental training school for missionary candidates. His school offers a seven-months' course in intensified dental training including 1600 hours of work. Requirements for completion of the course are 100 teech extracted, 300 fillings, 25 dentures made, and 15 wisdom teeth extracted. No charge is made for the training except room and board of approximately \$500 for the course. Tools to propedy equip a missionary to do dental work on the mission field will cost \$1500, he stated.

Mr. Lewis pointed out that although his school furnished training free and sometimes the students would receive help even to pay their room and board, yet the students must meet the personal requirements of consecrated lives, hearts, eyes, and hands.

The student body was thrilled over this unique Christian ministry, and many of the missionary candidates consulted with Mr. Lewis for further information about his training program as well as news from the mission fields. He later spoke at the Missionary Prayer Band.

Indebtedness Campaign Gifts Total \$30,000

The campaign for retirement of the Free Will Baptist Bible College debt was climaxed on April 1 at the 11 a.m. service with gifts totalling approximately \$30,000. A capacity crowd gathered in Memorial Auditorium to watch with anticipation the presentation of gifts from churches in twenty states, denominational organizations, and individuals. Dr. L. C. Johnson, president of the College, expressed the prevailing sentiment in these words, "Nothing like this has happened before."

All donations were tabulated on a blackboard in view of the audience. The student body president, Ray Turnage, led the parade of givers with \$1030 from the students, followed by LaVerne D. Miley, dean, with \$600 from the faculty. States were called forth alphabetically, and the total for each state was posted on the blackboard.

Included in these totals were many notable gifts. J. A. Blackburn from West Virginia, Clarence Crow from Tennessee, and R. D. Norwood from Oklahoma, made personal gifts of \$500 each. Cofer's Chapel Church, Nashville, gave \$1000. Other gifts ranged up to \$650.

Gifts from the College Alumni and Woman's National Auxiliary Convention were classed along with the student and faculty gifts as miscellaneous gifts.

Such a response was the result of a campaign throughout the denomination. The spirit of cooperation shown all during the campaign was outstanding; all gave in the spirit of willingness. Everyone has acclaimed this to be the greatest victory in the history of the Bible College.

to pay the \$34,000 mortgage against Richland Apartment. An interest payment of \$850 was due at the same time.

Acclaiming the \$30,000 as a great victory, College leaders felt the wisdom of taking enough out of the operating fund to make possible the objective of clearing the College's newest property of debt. The remaining indebtedness of \$4,000 will be paid in semi-annual payments of \$1000 out of the General Fund budget. Interest on this smallerloan will not run very much each year.

All gifts to the Campaign Fund havenot been received in the College office,. and it is hoped these late gifts will furnish the \$5000 to repay the General Fund. This will have to be replaced shortly. If General Fund gifts are unusually good within the next two months, the operating fund will be able to absorb the \$5000 transfer without borrowing, College officials believe.

From My Desk

L. C. Johnson, L. H. D.

"If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God . . . and it shall be given him." (James 1:5).

Wisdom has been described as the proper use of knowledge. We shall accept this definition even though I feel the wisdom of God goes beyond our ability to properly use knowledge. A study of the words "if any of you lack



If any of you tack wisdom" reveals that James was not implying that there would be some of us who would have sufficient wisdom of our own and therefore would not need the wisdom of God, but rather the purpose of the statement is to direct us who need

wisdom to the proper source.

The need for the wisdom of God is strongly stressed by the Apostle Paul in his first letter to the Corinthian church. He distinguishes between "the wisdom of this world" (1 Corinthians 1:20) and the "wisdom which God ordained." There are many reasons why we need the wisdom of God. First of all we need God's wisdom in order to understand our need of a Saviour. The natural man's wisdom tells him that by being good and practicing the Golden Rule he can save himself. "But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God. . ." (I Corinthians 2:14).

We also need God's wisdom in order to understand our position in Christ Jesus and the things which God has prepared for them that love Him. In the more practical things we need the wisdom of God in making our daily decisions that in all things we might please Him. Proverbs 3:6 teaches us: "In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths."

In our text we are directed to the source of all wisdom, God. "If any of you lack . . . let him ask of God." In comparing human and divine wisdom Paul says ". . . the foolishness of God is wiser than men. . ." (I Corinthians

The narrative proceeded on to the merger with Northern Baptists and the consequent loss of Free Will Baptist colleges and mission work.



L. C. JOHNSON, L. H. D. "And there were some that had indignation within themselves, and said, Why was this waste of the ointment made?" (Mark 14:4).

The enemies of our Lord are often misjudged by us who are His friends. We as-

sume they were always insincere when they opposed our Saviour. No doubt at times they were, but many times they spoke exactly what was in their hearts. On the occasion our Scripture verse refers us to, they were indignant at what they considered the waste of precious ointment. They saw no point in this act of worship. To them it was not worship but reckless abandonment of a foolish woman's emotions that led her to an extravagance for which she should be reprimanded.

It is interesting to study the motive which prompted this woman to such an act. She was giving to the Saviour that which was her most precious possession. It meant the same to her that a prospective bride's hope chest would mean to her. The emotions which led her to pour this very precious ointment upon her Saviour were provoked by her deep love for the Master. Nothing given to Him was wasted, in her opinion. She was convinced her precious possession was being put to its highest use.

Should not that be the attitude every servant of the Lord has toward His Saviour? What greater thing can we do with our lives than give them to Him?

I would say to any young person who wants to make his life count for the most to give himself as completely to the Lord Jesus Christ as this woman gave her ointment. To be sure there will be some who will think it a waste. They will not understand why you should take your young life with its talents and possibilities and invest them in Christian service; but He whom we worship, love, and serve will understand and place His blessings upon you as He did this woman.



NEW BUDGET CALLS FOR \$50,000. EXPANSION FUND

The inevitable task of an Expansion Program was realized by the Board of Trustees and Administration of the Bible College a year ago. The objectives in this program as outlined then were stated to be:

1. A dormitory to accommodate one hundred men.

2. Dining hall and kitchen for three hundred people.

3. Classroom building with adequate room for teachers' offices.

4. A library building.

5. A gymnasium where students can have supervised recreation.

Blocking any action on these objectives was an indebtedness of \$44,000 which has been erased during the past twelve months.

College officials have included a \$50,000 Expansion Fund as part of the income on the 1954-55 budget. Outside gifts must be sustained at the present rate and even increased during the coming year to provide the fund for definite steps to be taken on the above objectives.

The amount needed from gifts for the operating fund is \$51,500. Adding to this the proposed Expansion Fund income of \$50,000, the total proposed income from gifts for the 1954-55 year has been set at \$101,500.

Indecision

By LAVERNE D. MILEY "How long halt ye between two opinions? if the LORD be God, follow him."—I Kings 18:21b

One of the most difficult tasks that we face in life is the task of making decisions. Right decisions mean success; wrong decisions mean failure whether in business, in marriage, or in some other area of life. Quite often we hestitate or refuse to make a decision and remain in indecision.

There are many Christians who fail to come to a clear decision in the matter of following the Lord. Conversion marks the beginning of the Christian life, but that life is perfected by a day by day following of the Lord. As we follow Him, many of us must decide the issues: Does the Lord want my life for full-time service? and should I prepare myself for such service? When Christ came and found them still remaining in indecision and failing to follow the Lord, He denounced them and said: "The kingdom of God shall be taken from you and given to a nation bringing forth the fruits thereof" (Matt, 21:43b).

Perhaps some of you are at this moment abiding in indecision. You may be undecided as to whether or not you should enter full-time Christian service or whether you should come to Free Will Baptist Bible College. The Lord is willing to give you wisdom to make the right decision if you will but ask Him for it.

May I ask you: "How long halt ye between two opinions?" And may I urge that "if the LORD be God, *follow Him.*"

In addition to these, students are expected from two foreign countries.
