The College Board of Trustees will meet during the conference, and the Alumni Association will hold its annual business meeting on Tuesday afternoon.


A record attendance is expected again this year. The College will be glad to arrange reservations for out-oftown guests.

Free Will Baptist Bible College has had a clear-cut objective since the first day of its operation. However, it takes a number of years for an institution to translate its objective into history before the public at large is able to see just what the major emphasis is. I believe everyone who knows anything



about Free Will Baptist Bible College knows its major emphasis. In other words. what does one think of first when he thinks of Free Will Baptist Bible College?

One does not think first of our physical plant with a beautiful

campus, beautiful buildings, long corridors, and marble walls. We are thankful that we are located in one of the nicest sections of Nashville on a quiet, beautifully shaded street; but we have had to take the buildings we have been able to acquire with the money given by Free Will Baptists and adapt them to school purposes. This has been done rather successfully.

One does not think first of intellectual excellences when he thinks of Free Will Baptist Bible College. Our major emphasis has never been on the intellect. We thank God for good minds and believe they should be trained to their fullest capacities, but we at all times bear in mind Paul's words to the Corinthians: "For ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called. But God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty; and base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen, yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are: That no flesh should glory in his presence." I Corinthians 1:26-29.

The one thing I believe you think of concerning Free Will Baptist Bible College is its emphasis on exalting our Lord Jesus Christ. Some might question whether an institution that actually puts Jesus Christ before everything else and the spiritual above every other consideration, can meet modern-day educational standards. There are those who would prefer to be known by their academic and scholastic standards. When any Christian institution comes to be known better for its academic rating than its Christian testimony, it has lost its basic distinctive character. The thing that makes an institution basically Christian is not the kind of

The tragic mistake that has been made by many institutions is that Jesus Christ was put in the creed and left there. Jesus Christ must not only be put in the creed but put in the classrooms, the dean's office, the science



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

"Preach the word . . ." (II Tim. 4:2).

Have you ever tried to imagine having the responsibility of training one hundred and two young men to "preach the word" (that many have enrolled this year at Free Will Baptist Bible College). More than that, try to imagine training the ministry for an entire denomination.



What would you tell them? How would you direct them? Whom would you hold up to them as models? You say Jesus. He was a misfit of His day, rejected and crucified. If you told them to model after John Baptist, you then re-

member he had his head cut off. Paul stayed in prison during much of his ministry. The Apostle did not meet with popular acclaim in his day. He said "at my first answer no man stood with me, but all men forsook me" It might be awfully embarrassing if we modeled Paul and received the same consequences.

Have we been guilty here at the Bible College of telling these young men to be like Jesus, or Paul, without counting the possible cost? Paul said "... all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution" (II Tim. 3:12).

Following the charge to "preach the word" Paul tells what to expect. "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lust shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears; and they shall turn away their ears from the truth, and shall be turned unto fables" (II Tim. 4:3, 4). I am certain we are approaching the day when sound doctrine is not as popular as it once was. Could it be that there is a "lightening up" in our own Free Will Baptist churches? Could it be that in our eagerness to attract more people to us that we endeavor to take the "offense" out of the gospel? Perhaps we are not yet guilty. Let's hope we shall not be.

So you see, the task and responsibility we have of training your and my future pastors is not simple or easy. We want to do a good job. We want to please you with the product sent out from Free Will Baptist Bible College. But, we must please God.

Pray for us. We count it a privilege to serve you in this capacity.

National Approves 'Greater Bible College'

The National Association of Free Will Baptists at the Huntington, West Virginia session, July 10-12, approved the Board of Trustees' recommendation for a "Greater Bible College" by the erection of two new buildings.

An architect's sketch of the proposed buildings was placed at the College display booth so everyone might see the proposed addition to the present auditorium and the additional structure to be erected on the school campus.

The first building will be one story and will house a dining hall and kitchen, and a students' lounge.

The other building will be two stories and will house the administrative offices, the library, classrooms, and teachers' offices.

The space occupied at present by offices, library, and classrooms will be used for dormitory purposes. Construction will begin just as soon

Construction will begin just as soon as funds are available, the Board explained.

A meeting of the Board building committee is planned right away to work out plans to raise the funds. This committee is composed of Rev. James Miller, Kinston, Rev, F. B. Cherry, Greenville; and Rev. L. R. Ennis, Goldsboro, North Carolina. Mr. Ennis is serving as proxy for Rev. J. R. Davidson.

Dunbar Property Purchased

An additional building has just been purchased for the Bible College, according to the College administration and Board officials.

The two-story brick home at 3611 Richland Avenue was purchased from Mrs. James S. Dunbar at the price of \$15,000. The 11-room structure will give the College needed expansion for the coming year and will fit into the long-range plans of the Board of Trustees for a "Greater Bible College."

Payment will be due upon delivery of deed, and the house is to be ready for occupancy by August 15.

This purchase will make possible the arrangement for extra classroom space for the coming year as well as alleviate the crowded dormitory conditions among the men students.

YEAR'S OPERATION SHOWS INCOME OVER EXPENSES

Total income to the Bible College this year was \$115,458.69. Of this amount \$43,585.69 was received as gifts to the general fund, building fund, and library fund.

Operating expenses amounted to \$109,640.63, leaving a net income over expenses of \$5,818.06. Of this amount \$4.572.68 was invested in fixed assets, leaving \$1.245.38 income over total expenditures.

Gift income was \$15,000 less than the proposed budget for the year; also expenditures were \$40,000 less than proposed. This means the Bible College had to operate on \$15,000 less than anticipated for the year, and that the over-all operation had to be curtailed \$40,000.

A close analysis of gifts from states reveals the states that held their own in giving to the Bible College were states in which itineraries were made by representatives from the school.

In spite of some phases of the financial report that are not as bright as hoped for, College officials were pleased that the College operated with all bills paid.

Dunbar Property Gives Dormitory Space

The recent purchase of the Dunbar building at 3611 Richland Ave. has provided needed dormitory room for men, an apartment for a staff member. and a students' lounge.

By using the entire second floor for men, the crowded condition among men students for the past two years has been alleviated. Now no more than four students are assigned to one room, whereas formerly some rooms held six students.

Kenneth Eagleton is household supervisor at the Dunbar dormitory and lives with his family in a first-floor apartment.

Two large front rooms on the first floor are being furnished for a men's lounge, a long-felt need among students.

In order to purchase this property a \$15,000 note was executed with a local bank which is due November 10. Your gift by that date to pay off the note is urgently needed.

The Bible College now owns six buildings on Richland Ave. including one 100 x 200' vacant lot.

170 Register for Fall Semester

The fifteenth year of the Bible College opened with the registration of 170 students, a new record, according to Mrs. J. B. Hall from the registrar's office.

Upper classmen registered Wednesday, September 5, and freshmen registered Thursday, September 6. Classes began on Friday.

Making up this record enrollment are 70 new students and 100 returnees. Men students number 111 and women 59. Housed in school dormitories are 103 as compared to 67 outside students.

The students come from 25 states and one foreign country. North Carolina leads with most students registered. Massachusetts, New Mexico, Oregon, and Pennsylvania are new states to be represented in the student body.

For a long time Free Will Baptist Bible College has been planning an improvement program that will meet some of the critical needs of the institution.

The Board of Trustees and the National Association have officially approved the program, the details of which are now being worked out. The architect's drawings have been officially approved by the executive committee of the Board of Trustees. These plans are now almost ready for blueprinting, which will prepare the way for contractor bids.

At a recent meeting of the executive committee of the Board of Trustees and College officials, goals were set that if reached will get us into the actual building program by early spring. The executive committee felt that when as much as \$50,000 was in hand the contract for the first building should be let.

The progress of these plans will depend upon the response of the pastors and leaders of our entire denomination. Every interested Free Will Baptist is being asked to participate personally in this program and to influence and lead his church and interested individuals to participate. Some gifts have already started coming in.

This is the longest range program the College has ever undertaken. The buildings now planned with furnishings will cost at least \$200,000.

This need, coupled with a need for increased operational funds, can only be met by every pastor and interested individual seeing that the needs of the College are thoroughly made known to his people and plans laid in the local church to meet them.

In order to get started at the earliest time possible, Brother James F. Miller has been employed to devote his full time to working with the pastors and churches of our denomination in making this Improvement Program a success. Brother Miller will begin his duties on October 1.

STATEMENT OF REAFFIRMATION

The Board of Trustees of Free Will Baptist Bible College having recently completed a thorough analysis of the policies, curriculum, administrative and teaching emphasis, and general educational philosophy of Free Will Baptist Bible College, makes the follow



ing statement of reaffirmation of the policies and objectives of the institution.

Realizing t h a t we live in a day when the philosophy of general education is leading the nation and the world toward materialism and humanism; and that the general emphasis

of education has thrust upon the church, and the ministry in particular, the necessity for an intensified emphasis on the fundamental Christian doctrines; and also for Christians in general the importance of separated Christian living, we the Board of Trustees of Free Will Baptist Bible College are happy that our investigation of the institution clearly reveals that its policies and emphases have been and are now devoted to a Christcentered philosophy of education consistent with the needs of our denomination.

Surveying the 14 years of service of our Bible College to our denomination this Board is more convinced than ever that this institution should remain dedicated to the task of our primary denominational needs-the training of Christian youth for Christian service. Not only are we sure that this is our primary denominational need, but a conviction of more impelling motive is that this system of Bible College education is more consistent with definite Christian service and thereby more scriptural. The field of education is so broad that it would be unwise and out of keeping with our acute denominational needs to enter into the general educational field beyond the point commensurate with a well-balanced

Biblical education. The Board of Trustees therefore wishes to reaffirm the objective of Free Will Baptist Bible College as set forth in its charter and recommit it to the continued Christ-exalting, Bible-centered type of education which is consistent with our denominational needs
