Bible Conference Will Be March 31 – April 4

The 14th annual Bible Conference will be held March 31-April 4, according to Dr. L. C. Johnson, president.

Following the usual pattern, the first session will begin on Sunday afternoon, March 31, at 3:30 o'clock. Services will be held mornings and nights Monday through Thursday morning. All services are scheduled in Memorial Auditorium. The afternoons will include open sessions on spiritual guidance, youth emphasis, and discussion periods.

Speakers this year are Rev. Joseph G. Ange, Durham, N. C., pastor; Rev. Ronald Creech, pastor of First Church, Florence, S. C.; and Dr. Tom Malone, pastor from Pontiac, Michigan.

Special music from the College Music Department will be furnished throughout the four-day conference. Ross Dowden, music director, will have the College Choir present "The White Pilgrim," a folk cantata based on Early American religious music. Several soloists appear in this program. In addition to the chorus singing, other groups will include the male quartet and girls' trio.

The Reverend Mr. Ange spoke at the Bible Conference in 1954 and will bring with him a wealth of pastoral experience and sound Bible preaching that has brought his church to be one of the denomination's best in support of foreign missions and Christian education. Mr. Ange is a much-sought-

for preacher in revivals. He is an alumnus of the Bible College.

This is the first appearance as a Bible Conference speaker for Rev. Ronald Creech. He has been a popular evangelist and pastor for the past five years since graduating from the Bible College in 1952. He has held pastorates in Ahoskie, N. C., Warwick City, Va., and Florence, S. C. He has held revival meetings in numerous Free Will Baptist churches.

The special guest speaker this year is Dr. Tom Malone, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, Pontiac, Michigan. During his approximately 16 years of pastoral work, Dr. Malone has carried on radio broadcasting. Within the past several years, he has founded a Christian day school and Western Baptist Seminary, of which he is president.

Dr. Malone will bring special Bible messages on evangelism and youth problems. He was speaker at the Bible College for a series of services in April, 1954.

During the course of the conference the Alumni Association will meet for its annual business session and banquet. The College Board of Trustees has rescheduled its annual meeting, usually held during the Bible Conference, until May.

The Bible College is looking forward to many new visitors this year as well (Continued on page 2)

\$50,000 by April 1 Is First Goal

A total of \$50,000 in gifts by April 1 is the first goal in the Improvement Program as set by the College Board of Trustees.

Up to this time some \$9,000 in gifts has been received. The income is expected to grow much heavier during February and March with the April 1 goal in view.

Many pastors and churches have planned to raise at least \$100 for the Improvement Program to be paid by April 1.

Rev. James F. Miller, promotional worker for the Improvement Program, has contacted local church leaders in several states, and almost without exception each pastor has indicated a keen interest in the success of the expansion program.

During January and February Mr. Miller completed an itinerary in Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas. He discussed the program in meetings with pastors and spoke directly to congregations in several pulpits.

"The reception in these states has been wonderful," Brother Miller said. "The pastors and people are interested in the Bible College and want a part in making possible a greater Bible College.

During his recent trip Brother Miller visited with 41 pastors. He plans to continue this contact with local pastors in the coming months.

STANDING AT THE FOOT OF THE BED

All of us at one time or another have the experience of standing at the foot of the bed of a dying loved one. I have just had that experience at the passing of my father on February 11.

While standing at the foot of the bed during those hours when life was slowly but definitely ebbing serious thoughts engaged my mind. First of all, there is the feeling of helplessness. You are conscious that the end is near. There is the rearrangement of the pillow and the adjusting of the bed

and the shifting of the body for a bit of comfort, but that is only a gesture of your interest and concern. As you stand o b s er v in g y o u wonder what your reactions will be when loved ones are standing at the foot of your bed.

Another thing you do at such an

hour is to evaluate the life of the passing loved one. I am sure the evaluation is somewhat subjective, but none the less you review the life of the passing loved one and its impact upon your own. You do not think in terms of this good habit or that bad habit, this particular weakness or this particular strong point; but rather in terms of the general impact of his life upon your own. If we set out to evaluate one's life by the good and bad points, we would have enough on the one hand to make him a saint with no faults and on the other a great sinner with no hope. If the loved one has inspired you to do your best and to live for God and has set a high standard of integrity, you feel that he is leaving you a great heritage.

So this is one of the things you do in those hours of waiting at the foot of the bed. Of course, there are thoughts of loneliness and how you will miss your loved one. But then you move on into another serious area of thinking as the end draws near. You begin wondering just what is going to take place in the spiritual realm when life leaves the body. All you will see will be that the breathing has stopped but you will feel that something has taken place between God and your loved one's spirit that you know nothing about. You wonder what it was like when the soul and spirit goes back to be with God. Of course, we shall never know just what it will be like until the experience becomes ours, but you cannot help wondering.

And then when it is over, there is the feeling of triumph in that you

Bible College Day Services Paying Off

Want a suggestion as to how you can lead your church into a whopping big gift for the Bible College Improvement Program?

Summer School Folders Available

An attractive folder giving information on the summer school June 3-21 is now ready for distribution.

The leaflet will be mailed to all ministers on the Bible College mailing list in the near future as well as to anyone requesting information about the school.

College officials are enthusiastic about a good attendance for the first summer session to be offered by Free Will Baptist Bible College.

Courses to be offered include a study of the book of Hebrews two hours daily, and two additional hours selected from the following courses: Pastoral Problems (1 hour), Free Will Baptist Doctrine (1 hour), and The Church and Its Auxiliaries (1 hour).

The maximum load is four semester hours. Full college credit will be allowed for all credits earned. Those desiring to attend without credit are encouraged to do so, and they will not be expected to achieve the same level of work as regular students.

Other courses may be offered according to the demand of the summer students.

President L. C. Johnson will direct the school, and teachers will be supplied from the College faculty.

The expenses for the entire session will be \$67, including tuition, fees, and room and board. The student's wife may register for a full load for a minimum charge of \$10 not including room and board. Books will be at extra charges.

Summer students will be housed in College dormitories, and meals will be served in the dining hall under the supervision of the College dietician.

School officials feel there is adequate room for single students in the dormitories. There will be accommodations for some couples, depending on circumstances.


Students bringing their families may obtain furnished apartments within the city.

The course is designed to give the student a short introduction to phonetics and linguistic analysis. Mr. Bascom will give informative lectures and actual practice drills in language learning.


Services in California are scheduled for June 30 through July 21, beginning in the northern part and continuing south to Bakersfield.

DUNBAR BUILDING PAID FOR

The final payment of \$5,000 was paid May 7 to pay in full for the purchase of the 13-room Dunbar Building last August at a cost of \$15,000.

The purchase was financed through a loan at a local bank, and the Bible College has paid for this in three payments of \$5,000 each.

The purchase of the Dunbar Building was one of the first objectives in the overall Improvement Program. This additional building has provided needed dormitory space for men this year. It has also supplied an apartment for a staff member.

An income of more than \$13,000 to the Improvement Program, with some money taken from the General Fund, has enabled the Bible College to entirely pay for this property within nine months of its purchase.

Not only does the Dunbar property give extra housing space, but it is also valuable in that it is bounded on the east and west by other Bible College property.

Summer Session To Begin June 3

Several applications are already on hand for the Bible College's first summer session to begin June 3 and to close June 21, according to a report from the Academic office.

Four hours credit may be earned in Bible, Bible Doctrine, Pastoral Problems, and Church Administration. President L. C. Johnson will direct the school and teachers will be supplied from the college faculty.

The school will begin Monday following the first Sunday in June and will close Friday before the fourth Sunday so pastors from out of state will be absent from their churches only two Sundays.

Registration will be held Monday morning, June 3, with classes beginning immediately following. Four classes will be held each morning from 7:30 through 11:40° including a daily chapel period.

The extra session will provide three weeks of intensive training for pastors, laymen, and Christian workers. -Credit toward any degree offered by the College, will be granted for courses taken.

Students may stay in the college dormitories and take their meals in the dining hall. The total cost of the three-week school will be \$67, including room and board, tuition, and registration fees.

It is suggested that churches may want to send their pastors to the summer session as a part of the pastor's vacation. He will enjoy the break as well as be a more profitable worker upon his return.

President L. C. Johnson and Music Director Ross Dowden both termed the tour a "great success."

Although the tour was not primarily a fund raising effort, the appreciation for the choir program was registered in offerings totaling \$844.46 and pledges amounting to \$4693.24, making a grand total of \$5537.70.

The group left Nashville by bus Monday night, April 22 and arrived in Detroit at noon, Tuesday. The Highland Park Church entertained the singers at lunch time, and the people of the church were hosts during the choir's entire stay in Detroit. The students stayed by couples in homes where they rested in the afternoons before traveling to each church for supper before the evening service.

The Highland Park Church pastor, Rev. Charles Thigpen, had arranged a daily tour to points of interest in the Detroit area.

The first service was held at West Wayne Church Tuesday night, and on Wednesday morning the choir members visited the River Rouge Ford Plant and the Ford Rotunda.

The Hazel Park Church service Wednesday night was well attended. Thursday morning a visit was made to Edison Park where homes of many famous people have been erected. Luncheon for the group was provided by a member of the Highland Park Church.

The Thursday night service was held at the River Rouge Church. Friday the group traveled into Canada and ate their noonday meal there. The Faith Church entertained the choir for supper Friday night before the choir service.

The students were free Saturday morning to do shopping uptown, to rest, or to catch up on visiting the people where they stayed. Another choir service was held at the Flint Church Saturday night.

Christian Workers Institute to Open in September

The Bible College will operate a Bible Institute along with its regular college course beginning in September of this year, as authorized by the Board of Trustees.

Satisfactory plans for the separation of the institute work from the regular B.A. work have been worked out this year by the Academic Council.

Previously felt an impossibility without an enlarged plant and faculty, this move will fit into the present college program, in the light of the proposed expansion program.

The major purpose of this move is to bring non-high-school graduates (and others who are not qualified for or do not desire regular college work) into classes that are separate from the regular college classes.

This will serve two advantages: (1) it will enable the Bible College to be of better service to these students by giving them special attention; and (2) it will remove one hurdle that has stood in the way of accreditation. (Previously, the percentage of non-high-school graduates in the regular college has been too high.)

The Christian Workers Institute will award the Christian Workers Bible Diploma at the end of two years of study in Bible and related subjects. Individuals who desire more than two years' preparation may then be admitted into the regular college as special students.

Except for this separation of classes, the student in the institute will in all other ways be the same as a regular student in the Bible College. Courses taught in the institute will be much the same in content and standards as those of the B. A. course.

By making this change, the Bible College hopes to be of better service to a large group of people in the denomination who would like to prepare for Christian service, but who are in some way not prepared for regular college work, or do not have time for more than two years of preparation. Those who do not have a high-school diploma or its equivalent are encouraged to register for the 1957-58 school term.

The regular college course of study will continue to offer the Bachelor of Arts Degree with a major in Bible and minors in either English, Christian education, or music.

Three services were held Sunday. The Highland Park Church received the choir program Sunday morning in a crowded house. The afternoon service was held at the Free Will Baptist Temple following the church's entertaining the group at luncheon.

The final service was held Sunday night at Philadelphia Church where again the choir program was given to a full house. Following this service the church furnished a meal for the group before the trip to Nashville was begun.

One of the choir members expressed the sentiment of the group when she said, 'We thoroughly enjoyed the whole tour'

President's Report to Board of Trustees

This report concerns the fifteenth year of the operation of Free Will Baptist Bible College. As the figures reveal, records have again been broken. Our enrollment is almost reaching the 200 mark. To be exact, 189.



From my personal experience of 12 years with the institution and from what seems to be the unanimous agreement of both faculty, staff, and students, this has been the most harmonious vear we have had. There has not been a single seri-0115 disciplinary

problem. Such an atmosphere makes it easy to perform at maximum.

The income to the general fund has been some better than in previous years. We have made a close analysis of the source of income and without doubt the major increase can be attributed to the itinerant work of the quartet. There has been some increase through the cooperative plan but in most instances this plan can be credited with lowering the income as often as raising it from particular areas. It is still a fact that personal appearances are necessary for support.

The Improvement Program launched last July has been a source of concern to all of us. By no means are we failing in the program, but on the other hand we are not moving as rapidly as we would like.

There are perhaps contributing factors to this lag. One could be that newly established state organizations have brought about a period of transition from direct to organizational support, making it difficult to present a special cause to our people. There is an understandable fear on the part of infant organizations that strong appeals from departments of work that are favorably received by the laity will take away from young organizations support necessary to their existence. The understanding on the part of many that their gifts through these organizations would take care of all needs is creating some confusion when the donor learns that special appeals are still necessary.

Another contributing cause to the lag is the tremendous building and expansion programs on the local level. All these are obstacles that must be overcome.

The administration of the Bible College under the particular guidance of the academic council has been carrying on a systematic program of selfevaluation. This evaluation is according to the standards of the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges. An evaluation is made of the administrative policies and teaching practices and policies, and the financial policies of the institution as a whole. Certain weaknesses became apparent and are being faced courageously and followed through by making necessary improvements. On the whole, however, the survey revealed a good rating for the institution.

An area of weakness was inadequate facilities for our enrollment. This is being corrected as we are able to provide buildings. The strong points of the institution, we feel, are in the area of its spiritual life and the effectiveness of the ministry of those who go out as graduates.

The University of Tennessee had promised an inspection this year, and we had looked forward to having the first two years of our credits approved by the University. Dr. Thomason, who is in charge of such investigations at the University, has had two serious operations this year and has not been able to carry through with the promise he made more than a year ago. Dr. Thomason is friendly toward our institution and expressed a desire to be with the committee when it comes. We do trust that the University will give an early inspection next year which will result in the University's approval.

The teachers of our institution have worked faithfully and congenially throughout the year. One of the responsibilities of this Board is to see that the faculty and those employed by the institution are relieved from menace of anxiety created by low salaries and an inflationary period unparalleled in history. I again bring to the attention of the Board the wisdom of inaugurating a retirement plan for the faculty. Some preliminary work has already been done in this direction.

I again express my appreciation to a loyal, dedicated faculty, staff, and administration who have worked with me in making another year of successful history for our institution.

Work Groups Report 2,000 Decisions for Christ

This has been an outstanding year for the Practical Work Department. From the very beginning of school our students were impressed with the importance of praying much for the department as a whole and praying particularly for their own group. This naturally resulted in our having many

decisions for Christ. This has also produced a better spirit among the students.



Board Approves Construction Of New Dining Hall

The Board of Trustees at its annual meeting in May voted to begin the immediate construction of a new dining hall. The new building will consist of a 27-foot extension to our auditorium and a wing which will include a sizable student lounge and a dining hall and kitchen to take care of 250 students. The cost of construction is expected to be from \$65,000 to \$75,000.

The architect's plans and contractors bids are scheduled to be ready by mid-July. If one of the bids is accepted, construction is to begin immediately. It is hoped that the building will be ready before Christmas.

The Board of Trustees and College officials hope that individuals and church groups throughout the denomination will join in a "giving campaign" that will enable the building to be debt free by the time it is completed.

Further plans of the Improvement Program call for a classroom-office building which will relieve a critical need in this area. The speed with which this first unit is paid for will determine the progress of the future plans.

Seven factulty members of Free Will Baptist Bible College are furthering their training in summer school.

Improvement Program Gifts Lag

Gifts to the Improvement Program are lagging after amounting to nearly \$22,000 received during the program's first year.

The Improvement Program officially began last October and has seen the purchase of Dunbar Hall, an 11-room brick home, as the first step in the program.

The long-range program covers the erection of two new buildings so that the College can accommodate up to 300 students or more.

The first new building is now under way. The contractor began August 1 to excavate for the basement area, and at the present time footings have been poured and block and brick work is going along handily on the basement walls. Weather permitting, the building should be ready for occupancy sometime in January.

The Board of Trustees and College officials felt the acute need for additional space at the College called for a launching out into the building program even though gifts will have to come in to pay for the building as it goes up, or a loan will have to be secured to finance the remaining cost.

169 Register For Fall Semester

Dean Charles A. Thigpen reported a registration of 169 students at the beginning of the fall semester.

Including the summer school enrollment, the registration so far this year totals 178. The yearly registration should surpass all previous years.

A convocation service on Wednesday morning, September 4, opened the new school year. This was followed by registration of returning students that day and orientation procedure for freshmen. Freshmen students registered September 5 and classes began September 6.

Worship services were held each evening of opening week, Tuesday through Thursday, and a faculty reception was held on the lawn near Memorial Auditorium Friday evening.

The student body of 169 is made up of 56 new students and 113 returnees. This year the Bible College houses 53 men and 40 women students as compared to 76 outside students.

The students represent 19 states and two foreign countries. North Carolina again leads with 44 students registered. The breakdown is as follows:

land Park Church, Highland Park, Michigan. The opening service will be Tuesday night. October 8, and other services will continue throughout Wednesday, October 9. A feature of the conference will be the commissioning of Rev. Dave Franks to Brazil and Rev. and Mrs. Lee Whaley to Alaska.

The College Music and Speech departments will present a Missionary Cantata at 2:15 p.m. Tuesday, October 8, based on the life of David Livingstone. The music for this program will be furnished by the freshman choir.

The annual conference is sponsored by the Foreign and Home Mission Departments of the National Association under the leadership of Rev. Raymond Riggs and Rev. Homer Willis.

We should examine ourselves to see just how much we have been influenced by worldliness and been made to drift along with the course of this world system. Every one of us ought to be dead sure that we are fully surrendered to God and are living separated lives.

Another thing we ought to do is to concentrate on the important tasks of the church. There are so many things that we could do that if we are not careful we will overlook the most important task of the church, and that is to get the gospel to men and get them saved. All of our time and money and effort should be spent with one thing in mind, and that is to win people to Jesus Christ.

The College administration deeply appreciates any goods given to the school. In fact food expense is reduced considerably when our people share their surplus foods. Thanks to the College friends for manifesting such an interest.

PRESIDENT URGES SUPPORT OF IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

President L. C. Johnson has written pastors of approximately 2000 churches to lead their churches in raising \$100 or more for the construction of the new dining hall building at the Bible College.

These letters were mailed during the past month, and pastors are already responding with gifts from their churches. Dr. Johnson has asked that these gifts be sent in by January 1 before final settlement is made with the contractor.

This is the largest construction program the Bible College has undertaken with building costs to be in the area of \$70,000. The building is being erected as rapidly as possible with the concrete and masonry work almost fifty per cent complete. Most of the walls are up to the roof line, and some roof beams have been placed.

Each month the contractor submits an invoice for the work completed up to date, and the school must pay this by the 10th of the following month.

The Bible College needs \$15,000 at once if it is to pay the contractor for construction costs up to date. The contractor's estimates of work completed through October 31 amount to \$19.-814.75. Improvement Program receipts have paid some \$5,000 on this total amount, leaving some \$15,000 needed if the construction through October 31 is paid for in cash.

During August and September gifts to the Improvement Program were slow, amounting to about \$1,000; however, since then the gifts have accelerated with some \$2,700 coming in during October.

The president said that as the pastors and churches line up their gifts the income is expected to pick up sharply. "Free Will Baptists can pay for this building by January 1," he said. "We hope they will."

If each pastor or church that has not already made an offering will give worthy consideration to the Improvement Program needs, many good gifts can be received between now and January 1. This could pay for the entire cost of the new building if participation is made by every church.


CHRISTMAS PLAY TO BE PRESENTED

Church membership in this country is at an all-time high. Church building and improvement is also at an all-time high. Church activity on the local level as well as on the denominational level has never been equaled in the history of the American church.

On the surface these records seem to indicate progress that should cause all to rejoice. However, there has never



been a time when the church was plagued with worldliness like it is today. In recent years I have found the spirit of evangelism and revival at an alltime low in my evangelistic experiences. I believe we are standing dangerously near to substitut.

ing work and organization for the true mission of the church.

In our own Free Will Baptist denomination we have never experienced growth like we have seen in the last 20 years. It is becoming rare to find a quarter-time church. Even 15 years ago it was an exception to find a fulltime church. We have switched from quarter-time to full-time church programs in a decade and a half. We have increased our missionary program from practically nothing to a sizeable present-day program. Our educational enterprise has grown from nothing to a well-established Bible College as well as other recent educational endeavors. All of us are grateful for the progress.

But to be realistic, a disturbing factor in all this is that it has been growth that did not issue from revival, but from organization and plans of work. The organization and plans of work are not at fault, but it is a serious mistake for us to accept growth from this source and neglect the revival spirit that gives growth real vitality and consecrated energy. One of the most serious handicaps that any church can inherit from its forefathers is a successful church program that is minus spiritual vitality and the warmth of real Christian love. God forbid that those who inherit denominational responsibility from us shall inherit it built upon the foundation of good organization and works but minus evangelistic flames and Christian zeal.

Perhaps the most important thing in our denominational program at this moment is for each one of us to give himself to seeking the Lord and asking Him for revival in our own hearts as well as in our denomination at large.

BUILDING NEARS COMPLETION



The final phase of excavation and grading is being completed as the bulldozer operator smooths the entrance way to the south side of the new Dining Hall and Student Center. Beyond the bulldozer can be seen the addition to the auditorium. Under this section is a basement approximately 30 x 40 feet which will accommodate a large storage room, heating plant, and rest rooms.

Work on the Dining Hall and Student Center is nearly two-thirds complete, according to the contractor's estimate at the end of December.

The walls, roofing, heating, and plumbing are 90% complete. The contractor at present is tying in the new structure to the auditorium, which includes the moving of the stage back approximately 18 feet. This will provide space for 100 additional seats in the auditorium.

Inside the new structure work yet to be done includes electrical wiring, concrete floors for resilient tile, concrete stairways, plastering, quarry tile, glass, and painting. It is estimated that two more months will be needed to ready the building for full occupancy. The completion date, first set for January 1, has been rescheduled because of extra excavation and weather conditions.

Churches and individuals are urged to send donations to pay for this building within the next two months. Some churches have written, stating they are preparing to make donations for the Improvement Program. The amount needed will be in the neighborhood of \$60,000 since the contractor's bid was \$66,000 to which will be added the architect's fee and extras that have been necessitated by changes. Approximately \$9,000 has been paid from Improvement Program funds on this contruction work.

The construction has been financed by a loan from a local bank until the building is completed. It was hoped by College officials and Board of Trustee members that gifts to the Improvement Program would enable the cost of construction to be paid by the time the building is completed.

Keep the Mail Green

Thigpen Visits Oklahoma Church

Rev. Charles A. Thigpen, College dean, was guest speaker January 5-8 at Lewis Avenue Free Will Baptist Church, Tulsa, Okla., where Rev. Willard Day is pastor.

"Seldom have I found a group more sincerely interested in the work of Free Will Baptist Bible College than the members of Lewis Avenue Church," Mr. Thigpen said. Speaking each evening on some phase of the College, he explained the needs of the Bible College and brought a message from God's Word.

Other Free Will Baptist churches in the Tulsa area were represented at the meeting by pastors and members. An offering of \$167 was received for the Bible College, and many responded with pledges to be paid over a twelvemonth period.

"We had a glorious time as we fellowshipped around God's Word," Mr. Thigpen stated.

President Outlines School Needs

President L. C. Johnson has outlined the basic needs of the Bible College following the close of December, the seventh month of the present school fiscal year.

"Primarily, we must urge the financial support of the school's operating fund. We should receive \$7,000 in general fund gifts each month to operate the Bible College properly. This would permit us to develop in several areas in the general program of the school." General fund gifts are averaging about \$5000 each month, he reported.

"Another very urgent need this year is a denominational-wide support of our Improvement Program to increase the school's facilities for the present student body of approximately 200 and to provide a 50% increase in students within the next few years," Dr. Johnson stated.

"The present phase of this program is the Student Center and Dining Room building being erected at present at a cost of \$70,000. Since the Improvement Program was officially approved by the National Association in 1956, a total of \$28,254.68 has been received. Out of this amount a \$15,000 building was purchased along with financing the costs of the campaign for the first year, and approximately \$9,000 has been paid on the new Student Center building.

"This means the Bible College must receive as much as \$60,000 by the completion date of the building if the costs of construction are to be paid." Gifts to the Improvement Program are averaging about \$2000 monthly, and at this rate it will take some time to raise the money for this building.

Dr. Johnson urges every church or individual who has not done his best to support the present Improvement Program to send the best gift he can as soon as possible.

93 Ministerial Students

Out of a student body of 169 those registering as ministerial students this year number 93, according to registrar's records.

Before the year is over some of the freshmen students will probably announce their call to the ministry, if this year follows the usual pattern. Yo be sure, this group is a vast potential, and to the end of training them for the gospel ministry Free Will Baptist Bible College was organized and is dedicated.

Surely a denomination that has approximately 100 ministers in training each year will be receiving manifold returns as these young men take their places in the pastorate and in evangelistic work.

\$100 Gifts Climb to 100

During the past two months 22 additional gifts of \$100 or more were received, bringing the total number of such gifts to an even 100.

This is one-fifth of the goal set in the fall of 1956 to challenge Free Will Baptists to raise five hundred \$100 gifts for the Improvement Program.
