## **Business Graduates Serve Denomination**

Several of the young ladies who have completed the program of business education at the Bible College are now serving as secretaries in various Free Will Baptist churches and in denominational offices, Miss Phyllis Rivers of the department reports. The two-year program gives practical training in business subjects as well as adds 33 hours in Bible, evangelism, English, and speech.

Miss Rivers suggests that churches planning to employ church secretaries inquire at the school as to the availability of students who are already graduated or of present students who may be ready soon to consider this type of Christian work.

Of practical value in the business department to ministerial students are courses in business mathematics, typing, and efficiency filing.

## Debt Free Campaign To Be Extended

Gifts toward the retirement of the indebtedness on Free Will Baptist Bible College are still being received from both individuals and churches. Since the total goal of \$30,000 was not received by the end of 1963, college officials are extending the opportunity for still others to share in this effort.

An additional number of gifts at this time would help to liquidate the indebtedness and serve as an indicator by which enthusiasm toward the future expansion of facilities for the institution could be measured by the Board of Trustees.

The Debt Free Campaign was launched in August of last year to raise funds to clear approximately \$30,000 in indebtedness. An appeal was made for 300 churches to share in helping to clear the indebtedness.

## Nashville Couple Establishes Educational Fund

Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Ennis of Nashville have recently established an audio-visual aid fund at the Bible College.

In setting up the fund, the Ennises wrote the school, "Realizing the importance of Christian education for our youth, we would like to have a part in the educational program. We feel that we would like to show our appreciation to our parents for the Christian training they have given us by having this fund known as the Gower-Ennis Educational Fund." The parents are the late Mr. and Mrs. Dave H. Ennis and Mr. and Mrs. Miles Gower of Cedar Hill, Tenn.

Selecting the project of improving the audio-visual aids program, the Nashville couple has already made a substantial gift for the 1963-64 year and will send a gift each year to the fund.

Mrs. Ennis is a public school teacher while he is employed as a cabinet maker in Nashville. They are members of the East Nashville Free Will Baptist Church.

This couple has been respected far and wide for their earnest devotion to Christ and to their denomination. Born April 29, 1909, Brother Jones attended school in Missouri and graduated from the Houston High School in 1929 and later married the former Myrtle May.

Ordained in 1943, Brother Jones began full-time pastoral work with the Rock Springs Church in Bendavis, Mo. In 1948 he moved his family to Nashville after selling his home in Missouri and giving up his business connections. He graduated in 1950 from the two-year program at the Bible College where Mrs. Jones also was a student for one year.

The Joneses claim they are the first students to become grandparents while at FWBBC and that their children were the first of second generation students here.

## **BANDY AND RICE TO BE GUEST SPEAKERS**



#### BANDY

Biblical preaching by outstanding speakers will again form the central emphasis at the 21st annual Bible Conference to be held April 5-9 in Memorial Auditorium of the Bible College, President L. C. Johnson has announced.

Speakers for the five-day inspirational meeting will be Dr. Julian A. Bandy, noted Bible preacher and president of Toccoa Falls Bible Institute, Toccoa Falls, Ga.; Dr. Bill Rice, evangelist of Murfreesboro, Tenn.; Bible College President L. C. Johnson; and Dr. R. E. Picirilli, instructor of Bible and Greek at the Bible College.

In addition to the preaching ministry, the conference program will include selections of Christian music by various singing groups from the College music department as arranged by Donald E. Clark, director.

The first service of the conference will begin at 7:30 o'clock Sunday evening, April 5. Three speakers are scheduled

each morning Monday through Thursday and one speaker each evening with the meeting to close at noon Thursday, April 9.

Dr. Bandy and Dr. Rice, special guest speakers this year, have had a wealth of experience as speakers in Bible conferences and evangelistic meetings. A Christian and Missionary Alliance minister, Dr. Bandy has served as pastor of the Gospel Tabernacle, Asheville, N. C., and of the Tabernacie Church in Times Square, New York City. He has preached from coast to coast and on the mission fields of South America and Africa and is in demand as a speaker at the larger summer Bible conferences in the United States and Canada. He was unanimously elected to the presidency of Toccoa Falls schools in 1957 to succeed the beloved Dr. R. A. Forrest, founder and then president.

Evangelist Bill Rice is known through-

out the United States for his revival campaigns. Although a full-time evangelist, the colorful Texas-born, former cowboy serves on several mission boards, edits a Christian paper called *The Branding Iron*, manages a summer conference ground, and conducts a weekly radio broadcast. His conference work includes a unique ministry of Bible instruction to deaf youngsters.

Dr. Johnson will speak at the 11 o'clock service Monday and Wednesday; and Dr. Picirilli, who is registrar of the school along with his teaching duties, will speak each day.

The Bible College invites prospective students of senior high school age or older to make reservation in the College dormitories. Although the space is limited, accommodations will be extended to as many applicants as possible. A nursery will be provided for pre-school-age children of out-of-town guests.



A description of the closing days of this age is given in II Tim. 3:1-5. One thing Paul tells us to look for is "... a form of godliness." He does not say men will be against God. They will not be cursing God as some communists do. Paul does not say that men will stop going to church. In fact, he indicates the opposite. I used to think that in the "last days" there would be a great wave of anti-godliness. No doubt there will be some of this as evil men wax worse. But the thing to look for in the church to tell us if we are in the last days is religion without power.

As religion loses its power, it puts on more form. In every denomination I know of there has been a rapid growth towards formal church services. Very few churches any more feel they could go through a Sunday morning service without the guidance of a bulletin. There has never been a time when the church kept as close a check on the attendance and income of its members as today. There has never been a time when the church was so beholding to the mimeograph machine, filing cards, and printer's ink as today. The church has never had more or better organized activity. The Protestant Church has never been more regimented.

Form has characterized the Roman Catholic Church throughout its history, but is now being brought into Protestant denominations. Service and activity have never characterized the heart and essence of Christianity for Protestantism. Yet service and deeds have been at the heart of the meritorious system of Roman Catholicism. Love for and devotion to God is the heart of Christianity.

There should be sincere prayer by every born again believer for God's power to be renewed in our midst. Where are the tears of penitence and shouts of rejoicing which we once knew?

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

Th 302s—Pastoral Problems 1\* This course will give attention to some

of the practical problems faced by the pastor in his local church and its functions.

Instructor: L. C. Johnson Credit: One semester hour

PT 450s—Parliamentary Law

The purpose of this course is to acquaint the student with recognized parliamentary procedure. The application of parlia-mentary law to the transaction of church business receives special emphasis.

Instructor: Ralph Hampton

Credit: One semester hour CE 202s-Daily Vacation Bible School

In this course the aims, methods, organization, and administration of Daily Vacation Bible School are given attention. Materials and their use are also studied.

Instructor: Mrs. J. B. Hall

Credit: One semester hour

Bi 400s-Romans 1\*

This is an analysis of the first part of the book of Romans. Attention is given to pertinent background information, but the course concerns itself mainly with under-standing the message of the book.

Instructor: F. Leroy Forlines

Credit: One semester hour CE 203s-Education in the Local Church

The total educational program of the local church is analyzed and evaluated in this course. It is designed to help the pastor or lay worker enforce the teaching task of the church.

#### **By What Standards?**

Everything is judged by some standard. The standard has to be either qualitative or quantitative. For instance, a merchant evaluates his business by the number of customers he has. Quality in this instance does not play a big part; he is looking for a high volume of business. A salesman is judged by the number of sales he makes. A bank is judged by the number of depositors.

There are other things that are evaluated from a point of view of quality. A church may be a good church and successful without having a large membership. A school may be a good school without having an expansive campus with expensive buildings. A church is a good church if it is fulfilling its mission of winning souls and ministering to the saints. Nowhere in the Bible does the Lord place a premium on numbers.

A school is a successful school if it is fulfilling its mission. Every school should have a definite objective and should be judged by whether or not it is fulfilling that objective. Free Will Baptist Bible College was brought into existence by its founding fathers to put bettertrained ministers into our pulpits and to put qualified missionaries on the mission fields. This was its main original task.

Free Will Baptist Bible College should be judged by whether or not it has met this need. It will not be long before we have a hundred mission stations around the world. I was recently told by the home missions director that every home missionary has attended Free Will Baptist Bible College. For the last few years we have



The first students to graduate from the expanded educational programs are Ella Rae Jones, Mobile, Ala., Patsy Tyson, Decatur, Ill., and W. B. Hughes, Columbia, Tenn.

Miss Jones and Miss Tyson have earned B.S. degrees from the Bible College as the result of having completed a regular nurses' training porgram in a hospital and having completed two years of study at Free Will Baptist Bible College. Instituted in 1960, the program for nurses at the Bible College has its first graduates this year although several young women are in process and some may graduate each year hereafter. The B.S. degree program for nurses was designed especially for young women who wish to enter foreign missionary service as a registered nurse.

The Rev. Mr. Hughes is the first graduate of the Th.B. program since it was established in 1962. Mr. Hughes earned his B.A. degree in 1953 at the Bible College and re-enrolled in September of 1962 for the additional year of special studies for ministers. Living in Columbia, Tenn., 45 miles from Nashville, Mr. Hughes drove to Nashville three times weekly for almost two years in completing his work, traveling some 15,000 miles.

## DODD ELECTED TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Reverend Damon Dodd, pastor of Horton Heights Free Will Baptist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, was elected to the Bible College Board of Trustees by the National Association held in July at Kansas City, Missouri.

Beginning his ministry in 1933, Mr. Dodd has pastored churches in Missouri, Tennessee, and Georgia. He was elected to the Free Will Baptist Foreign Mission Board in 1942 and served a four-year term before resigning in 1945 to go to Cuba. Mr. Dodd graduated from Free Will Baptist Bible College in 1944, one of the first graduates of the College. Immediately following graduation he went to Cuba where he spent three years in the early work of Free Will Baptists there. In 1949, the Free Will Baptist minister became Executive Secretary of the National Association, a position which he held for four years. Continuing his broad outreach of missions work, he then accepted the position of Director of Home Missions for four years.

A native of Flat River, Missouri, the 48-year-old minister has become versatile in his varied ministries. He has written three books, including a Home Missions study course, Go Home and Tell Thy Friends; a book on stewardship, All of Mine for Him; and his last book, The Free Will Baptist Story. Mr. Dodd is a writer for the adult and junior departments of the Free Will Baptist League, and at present is one of the consulting editors for the new materials for the Church Training Service.

Mrs. Dodd is also a former student of the College, graduating with her husband in 1944. The Dodds have two daughters, Marilyn, 18, who is planning to enroll in Bible College this fall, and Barbara, who will soon be 12.



### \$125,000 Gift Budget Adopted



A budget of \$125,000 in gifts was adopted for the Bible College by the National Association in July. This budget represents an increase of \$40,000 over last year's budget.

President L. C. Johnson, in explaining the 47 per cent increase, stated that increased enrollment, increased student services, and rising costs of living necessitate a much larger budget. It was estimated that the rising costs of living alone adds \$6,000 to operational costs each year.

Gifts for the general fund during June totaled more than \$7,000. School officials feel that this is a good start for the coming fiscal year but point out that gifts must average more than \$10,000 each month to meet the 1964-65 budget.

According to the administration of the College, "no student will be denied services which are normally expected that a college render to its students. A student should not be shortchanged in his education in the name of denominational loyalty. To prevent this, Free Will Baptists must place in the hands of the Bible College the necessary money to guarantee the highest quality of education for its students."

The Bible College faculty faces its greatest challenge as it teaches 254 day students who enrolled for the fall semester beginning September 8. A record freshman class of 132 pushed registration to the highest point in the school's 23-year history.

President L. C. Johnson announced that approximately 30 more students have enrolled this year over last year. "We are glad that no student has yet been turned away because of a lack of space," he said.

The student body includes 179 single and 75 married students; also there are 149 men and 105 women. Evening school registration is expected to bring the total fall enrollment to 285.

Representing 28 states and one foreign country, the student body includes 132 freshmen, 52 sophomores, 31 juniors, 23 seniors, and 16 special students.

Dean Charles A. Thigpen said there will be no registration and no tuition or fees. Any student or any adults from Nashville churches may attend the class.

This is the first study of this type to be offered, Mr. Thigpen stated. He expects a good attendance each week.

#### AT CONFERENCE

The 15th annual Missionary Conference to be held October 5-7 will feature five returned missionaries, all former students of the Bible College.

Developing the theme of "Mission High Fulfilling," the program will include messages by Sammy Wilkinson (Brazil), Eula Mae Martin (Brazil), Mrs. Wesley Calvery (Japan), Bill Jones (Africa), and John Moehlman (Panama).

The three-day meeting will begin at 7:30 Monday evening with morning, afternoon, and evening services on Tuesday and Wednesday. Dr. L. C. Johnson, College president, will conduct the devotional periods during the conference.

A good number of out-ofstate guests are expected for the conference, which will be held in the College's Memorial Auditorium. School officials announced that the school dormitories will not be able to accommodate guests this year.

The Missionary Conference is sponsored by the home and foreign missions departments of the National Association of Free Will Baptists.

## Students Promote Evangelism At Fair

One of the most outstanding events in the early part of the fall semester was the participation by scores of students in operating a booth on evangelism at the Tennessee State Fair in Nashville September 21-27. With the help of Nashville pastors and the local Master's Men, Lloyd Plunkett, director of the practical work department, secured the booth and supervised its decoration and display materials.

Emphasizing a Christian witness and the distribution of gospel tracts, the personnel stationed throughout the day at the booth also rendered special music to the fair-goers by quartets, trios, accordian, and trumpets amplified by a public address system. While not engaged in the music programs at the booth, the students circulated throughout the various sections of the fair to make personal evangelism efforts.

Mr. Plunkett said the full effect of the personal witnessing will never be known (several individuals did stop to inquire about the College or to talk with the pastor in attendance), yet the public was made aware of Free Will Baptists and their concern to lead men to Christ. A good number of Free Will Baptist church people called at the booth to express their approval of the effort.

We have more than a hundred young men studying for the ministry and perhaps fifty interested in missionary work. The other members of our student body are just as willing to do God's will as the ministers and missionaries.



when we are thinking of the living Word being made Flesh, it seems proper for Free Will Baptist Bible College to reaffirm its position on the written Word, the Scriptures. There has never been any doubt but that this institution has believed in the verbal (every word), plenary (full) inspiration of the Scriptures. It has often been stated that at Free Will Baptist Bible College we are not seeking to find out if the Bible is true or untrue, but we are simply here to learn what it teaches. This is not to imply that there is a lack of evidence to prove the inspiration of the Bible, but in the final analysis the acceptance of the inspiration of the Bible is an act of faith. The Bible says, "The fool has said in his heart there is no God." Notice the place the heart plays in coming to this decision. He did not say there was no God as a result of an intellectual search but rather as a result of a heart that was wrong.

Let us take the matter of the Creation of the world. There is plenty of evidence to prove that some intelligent being created this world. The most foolish thing in the world is to say that this world just happened to be, and yet if a man's heart is not right with God, he can easily believe the evolutionary theory. We are taught in the Bible that "Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God. . . . " So out of the attitude of a man's heart will come his views of the Bible and of God. So here at Free Will Baptist Bible College the inspiration of the Bible has always been accepted by faith, and we spend our time trying to understand its message.

There has been a tremendous attack upon certain portions of the Scriptures in the last half century. Some outright deny that the Bible is any more than a book telling us about the acts of God and of men who lived in the past. It is very unfortunate that many of the major seminaries that were established to train ministers to believe the Bible and to preach it now teach them that much of it is only a muth.

There are others who are not as outright in their attack upon the Word of God. They claim the Bible to be the Word of God when a man experiences a message. They make experience the determining factor. We believe the Bible is true whether men ever experience its message.

There are still others who claim to believe in the inspiration of the Bible, but see no danger at all in being brotherly and holding fellowship with those who deny it. They are the ones who tell us that it is unchristian to be harsh in our judgments against those who deny the full inspiration of the Scriptures. They take the position that we have no right to make this important matter a test of fellowship.

Free Will Baptist Bible College definitely feels that all those who question the inerrancy of the Word of God should be exposed and identified as being dangerous religious leaders. There is nothing more clearly taught in the Scriptures than this. "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? And what communion hath light with darkness? And what concord hath Christ with Belial? Or what part hath he that believeth with an infidel?"

So at this Christmas season, Free Will Baptist Bible College expresses once again its firm commitment to the eternal truths of God's Word. Jesus Christ himself was an imbodiment of this Word, and it is He that we worship at this Christmas season.

### Georgia Church Increases Support To Bible College

The Free Will Baptist Church of Savanah, Georgia, under the leadership of Pastor Henry Van Kluyve, has recently added \$100 each month to its support to the Bible College, according to a letter from Mr. Van Kluyve to President L. C. Johnson. The church now gives \$200 monthly to the school since it had been giving \$100 each monthly previously.

This action was taken in response to appeals from the College this year that gifts from churches and friends of the school would practically have to be doubled to provide the support needed to finance the school's present operation.

Responses from different sections of the denomination have been encouraging, Dr. Johnson stated. The churches in Michigan have made special efforts during the fall to double their gifts.

Another church in Georgia has increased its giving to the Bible College \$10 monthly, a pastor of a fairly new South Carolina church wrote that it had started regular monthly support for the first time, a Missouri church has recently increased its giving \$25 monthly, and other church leaders have expressed plans to increase their support or to begin regular support.

A keen loyalty to the College was expressed a short time ago when a faithful church lady wrote that when their annual church letter was being prepared recently, she noticed that no gifts had been made during the year to the Bible College. This lady mentioned to the church members her disappointment that no help had been given to the Bible College which they could report to their association. The church discussed the matter and voted out a gift of \$50 right there to send to the College.

With the cost of education spiraling upward each year and with the increased study body and increasing services offered the students, Free Will Baptists are faced with the task of investing more of the Lord's money in Free Will Baptist Bible College and its teaching program for Christian youth.

## Are You Planning a College Day in Your Church?

Special services were held for the Bible College at Farmington Church near Flat River, Mo., November 28-29. Rev. Paul J.
