### 17 More Students to Enroll for 2nd Term

Seventeen additional full-time students have been approved to enroll for the second semester beginning January 20, Dean Charles A. Thigpen reports. This number includes eleven first-time enrollees and six students returning to the Bible College after an absence of a semester or more.

The evening school enrollment has not been ascertained, Mr. Thigpen said. The total registration for the year, including the summer session and the 287 registered in the fall, should go well beyond the 330 mark. "We have experienced a 15 per cent increase in enrollment this year over last year," the College official stated.

# December Gifts Form Items of Praise

Gifts from Free Will Baptist churches and friends of the Bible College during December have formed items of praise to God by members of the College staff. ### **Conference To Feature Three Speakers**

The 22nd annual Bible Conference, April 4-8, will feature as speakers Dr. Samuel H. Sutherland, president of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles and newly elected president of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges; the Rev. J. R. Davidson of Vienna, Ga., pastor and an early founder of Free Will Baptist Bible College; and the Rev. Guy Owens of Detroit, Mich., pastor-evangelist.

The conference program will also include special music by the College music department and daily missionary prayer band services. The first service will begin Sunday evening, April 4, at 7:30. Services are scheduled each morning and evening Monday through Wednesday with the five-day meeting closing at noon on Thursday, April 8.

Associated with BIOLA for almost 30 years, Dr. Sutherland has been its president since 1952. Prior to his work as a Christian educator, he did pastoral work in California at Grace Presbyterian Church, Los Angeles, and at Calvary Church, Hollywood; he also worked with the Church of the Open Door at Los Angeles, and has had a wide experience in young people's Bible conferences.

He graduated from Occidental College in 1922 and from Princeton Theological Seminary in 1926, followed by honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1938 and Doctor of Laws in 1948.

The Rev. Mr. Davidson attended Eureka College, Ayden, N. C. He was one of the early founders of Free Will Baptist Bible College, having served on the Board of Christian Education for the denomination since 1935. Mr. Davidson, instrumental in raising the funds and locating the College, was business manager for the school from 1942 to 1947. He served on its Board of Trustees from 1937 to 1964. The denominational leader has held pastorates in Georgia, North Carolina, Texas, and Tennessee.

The Rev. Guy Owens, a native of North Carolina, graduated from Free Will Baptist Bible College in 1959. Active in Free Will Baptist work for several years, Mr. Owens was pastor of Gum Swamp Church, Greenville, N. C., the oldest Free Will Baptist church, and is presently with the Philadelphia Church in Detroit.

Services will be held in the College's Memorial Auditorium with the exception of the Wednesday evening service which will be held uptown in the 2200-seat War Memorial Auditorium. College officials have announced that conference guests cannot be accommodated in the dormitories this year. A nursery will be provided for pre-school-age children of guests.



I want to share with you some of my views on our denominational situation that we need to be aware of. As a denomination, we are in a transitional period. We have been primarily a rural denomination. One of the saddest things that is happening in America today is that rural life is diminishing at a tremendous rate and our society is becoming urbanized. Our denomination is having to move with this trend and switch from a rural ministry to the metropolitan centers. The majority of Free Will Baptists who move from the old country church to the cities is being lost from our denomination. They either join some other denomination or cease going to church entirely.

We are having to go into the cities and find a nucleus of Free Will Baptists, buy property on an inflated market, and establish churches. If we could salvage all these Free Will Baptists who are moving to the cities, our task would not be so difficult. It is almost like starting a new denomination in most of our cities. These new churches are usually heavily in debt and are small. They must have time to grow and build local church plants before there will be a great potential for other denominational ministries. There is little or no potential for growth in the rural areas. We must look to the city churches for our denominational growth.

Free Will Baptist Bible College faces a tremendous responsibility in training the kind of leadership that can take its place in the churches of these metropolitan centers. The hour is late and we must not be slowed down in our task.

I think a word of tribute is in order to many of our churches for the outstanding record of giving in the light of this transitional period. Many of the small rural churches and the new churches in the cities are giving as generously to denominational causes as any church group. Our entire denominational program is being supported in most part by small churches that could well use all their money locally.

A vesper program entitled "Sound the Trumpet" will be given at 3:30 p.m. March 7 by the music and speech departments.

A faculty music recital will be presented at 8 p.m. March 12 by Donald E. Clark, soloist; Mrs. Ruth Pitts, soloist; and Mrs. Sarah Nicholas, pianist.

"Seven Years Underground," a Christian drama, will be presented at 8 p.m. March 19. Miss Lydia Radu, speech instructor, is writer and director of the play. It depicts the faith of one woman, Dr. Mary Vaska, against loyalty for the Communist party displayed by her two sons Alec and Ivan. The setting is Romania.

Dr. Vaska's two sons had informed the Communists of her lectures against Communism. She was sent to a concentration camp where she spent the next seven years of her life. The only thing that kept Dr. Vaska alive was her faith in God.

Miss Radu recently gave a speech recital at the College. The program was about Marie Antoinette, one of history's most controversial women.

Mr. Clark will be guest soloist at Oklahoma Baptist University's annual fine arts music festival February 26. He will sing the role of Christ in the presentation of "The Passion According to St. Matthew" by J. S. Bach.

### **Summer School** Plans Announced

Six courses of Bible, music, history, doctrine and sermon preparation are on the agenda for the 1965 summer school at the College. June 1-11.

Courses of instruction are listed below:

Th 201s-Free Will Baptist Doctrine 1\*

The doctrines of the Free Will Baptist denomination are studied, with emphasis placed on those elements that distinguish us from other denominations.

Instructor: R. E. Picirilli Credit: One semester hour

Bi 401s Romans II\*

This is an analysis of chapter six through eight of Romans. The course concerns itself mainly with understanding the message.

Instructor: F. Leroy Forlines Credit: One semester hour

PT 200s Sermon Preparation and Delivery

This course is to aid the student in constructing and presenting a gospel message.

Instructor: Charles A. Thigpen Credit: One semester hour

Mu 103s Music in the Local Church

Plans are formulated in this course for the development and enrichment of music in the local church. This study is designed to aid primarily the pastor and music director.

Instructor: Donald Clark Credit: One semester hour

Bi 302s General Epistles I\* The background, authorship and setting of each book is carefully reviewed, studying mainly the interpretation of the text itself.

Instructor: Ralph Hampton Credit: One semester hour

> SS 208s History of Free Will Baptists

This is a study of the origin and subsequent history of the Free Will Baptist denomination.

Instructor: Ralph Hampton Credit: One semester hour \*(This course is continued or will be continued. Credit is granted for each unit of study.)

### **Texas Layman** Gives \$1000 to College

For the third consecutive year, a layman from Bryan, Texas, has led all other donors by presenting a gift of \$1000 to Free Will Baptist Bible College.

C. F. Goen, who has supported the school throughout its history, sent the gift to the College treasurer just before the close

"I don't want praise for this effort," Mr. Goen said in a recent conversation. "I just want to help provide a better place for young people to get their education."

The Texas cattleman is a deacon of the Brightlight Free Will Baptist Church near Bryan.

The gift has been receipted to the Building Fund to help clear the \$20,000 loan yet due to a local bank. College officials explained that the \$20,000 indebtedness is the only outstanding obligation the institution owes.

"Perhaps the Lord may use Mr. Goen's giving to challenge others to make liberal gifts," President L. C. Johnson said.

### CHRISTIAN SERVICE REPORT: 578 HEAR IN ONE DAY

"Practical experience prepares our students for Christian service."

This was the observation of Lloyd Plunkett, director of the Christian Service Department at the College.

"Of course," he added, "the personal witnessing of the students proves valuable to those to whom they minister also."

"For example, yesterday (Sunday, February 7) was a good day for the Christian Service Department. A total of 578 people listened to 40 of our students as they presented lessons from God's Word."

Of that 578, there were 66 in classes at the Cloverbottom Hospital and school for the mentally retarted. At the Ross Hotel, six people were in the service, seven at the Harris Nursing Home service, 26 children at Martha O'Brian Center, and about 45 at the Tennessee Preparatory School service, he explained.

"Eight prisoners were in the service held by Bible College men at the State Prison Farm, and at the main State Prison 387 were in the chapel for a service of music, a sermon and testimonies by Bible College men; 28 prisoners in solitary confinement and five on 'death row' were given the same service," Plunkett stated.

Another area of practical work

for Free Will Baptist Bible College students has been opened, he announced. Evangelistic services will conducted at the Nashville Union Mission twice monthly on the second and third Wednesday nights.

This is the first opportunity in several years for students to take part in rescue mission work. The mission, in downtown Nashville, holds evangelistic services each night along with its ministry to derelicts and homeless people The service will include singing, preaching, testimonies, and personal work by a group of seven Bible College students, Plunkett concluded.

### REGISTRATION REACHES 342 WITH 2ND TERM **ENROLLMENT**

The second semester registration of 18 additional day students and nine evening school students has brought to 342 the total number of students who enrolled this year for training at the Bible College.

# 1965 Summer Session To Be June 1-11

The 1965 summer session will open June 1 with six courses of Bible, music, history, doctrine, and sermon preparation being offered.

"This will be a wonderful opportunity for pastors, Sunday school teachers, laymen and other Christian workers to enjoy two weeks of Christian fellowship while earning up to three hours of credit in college work," Dean Charles A. Thigpen said. "Students may also enroll for the courses on a non-credit basis."

The objective of the summer session is parallel and complementary to the general objective of the College: "This Bible College is devoted to the promotion and impartation of higher Biblical education and training as may be deemed essential to the equipment of Christian workers, teachers, ministers, and missionaries of both sexes."

"The need has long been felt," said Dean Thigpen, "for training that will be accessible to Free Will Baptist workers already engaged in such services as pastoral or lay work. Here, then, are two weeks of intensive training designed especially for these persons who cannot take out time to attend the ordinary college term."

### ACADEMIC LEVEL OF COURSES

Free Will Baptist Bible College will allow full college credit for the courses taught in the summer session toward a degree. However, those who do not wish to take these courses for college credit are encouraged to attend and will not be required to achieve the same level of work done by the college student.

### RESIDENCE

Regular provision for room and board will be made in the dormitories and dining hall, and these accommodations will be available to any student, married or single. Room and board in the dormitory may also be available for a limited number of married couples, though private cooking privileges will not be possible. The charges for these provisions are listed under the section on expenses.



Free Will Baptist Bible College is at the crossroads. It has come a long way since September 1942 when nine students enrolled for the first semester, launching our denomination on an educational journey which has made possible a more effective ministry for the past twenty-three years.

I am convinced that we started in the only possible way and that was to purchase a residence building at a very modest figure but in a nice section of Nashville. Other residences have been bought and converted to school purposes as the need demanded and finances would allow. The buildings that have been built for school purposes have been an auditorium, a student lounge, and dining hall and kitchen.

Being located in a section of the city where large homes and apartment buildings were available, the College has been able to meet its basic needs with the purchase of the type buildings mentioned above. The time has come, however, when such buildings are totally inadequate and cannot meet the needs of our present enrollment. New buildings must be built or the growth of Free Will Baptist College will have to cease and our present program made to suffer. Buildings built for family homes will not take the traffic of the present student body. Neither will the facilities meet the needs even though the buildings might endure the traffic.

Free Will Baptist Bible College will be coming to you and all of our people with perhaps the most challenging task with which we have ever been presented—the task of providing a Christian educational opportunity to every Christian young man and woman in our denomination. There is nothing that will guarantee the growth and expansion of our denomination like the right kind of an educational program. We must not fail this opportunity.

Young men and women from all over our denomination are knocking at the doors of Free Will Baptist Bible College. We will be calling on every Free Will Baptist church and individual to help us open these doors to these, our future church leaders.

### "...WHY CAN'T WE TURN THE TIDE?

As the tides of universal crises flood the happiness and security of society, fear and a sense of helplessness grip the hearts of Christian college students. They are faced with a critical world situation. Everything seems to be carried farther and farther out into an ocean of hopelessness by greed and lust. Some young Christians seem to eagerly rush out into the waves lest they be left behind, unwilling and perhaps unconscious that they can turn the tide.

With an optimistic attitude supported by a staunch, godless philosophy of life, young adults who know not Christ bravely look out over the horizon at a big world full of adventure, challenge, wealth. All it needs is more science, more philosophy, more so-called truth, to become a "best" world. Those of this ideological face would rush on, sweeping the poor, the hungry, the primitive masses out into the sea.

They would say, as lovers of pleasure, "We want no starvation or sadness around us." These individuals, growing by numbers even now until they are changing the world with their ambition, would rid themselves of family institutions, Christian homes, democracy at its best, and Christian education. They would say there is no morality except what is right in their own eyes; there is no limitation on man; he is free!

Except for the grace of God, every Christian student would have been out there with them. But why are we so different now? If that question had been asked of everyone of us, we would have given God the credit. We would boldly and rightly stand up and say that we have the Truth, the only Truth. And in having such we think ourselves far different in character from those out "there." Actually, basically, we're no different in nature, in ways of life, in customs. But we do have Christ. Certainly, we, as Christian students, are being presented with the problems of the world; but in view of the Bible, it is up to us to heed what we hear, to recognize our own responsibility in turning the tide from fear and immorality to peace and salvation. Our aims should be centered around Christ; He is the one who can turn the tide of this lost world with all its evil people. He is the one who takes away the fear, who convicts of immorality, who gives hope.

Christian campuses must have Christian students.

It is a truth that Satanic forces are active on these campuses. Why shouldn't they be? . . . It is in such places that their evil work is overcome the most. The more dedicated we become to Christ, the more dedicated Satan becomes to destroy our faith. The aim of the Christian school then is that of building character—building people who can turn the tide of sin, people who are strong, faithful, worthy. Yet the Christian school cannot do it all. We have to take advantage of what it has to offer. One day we too will be out "there." If we're not strong in the things of the Lord, we will be as a ship without a sail, a plane without wings. We won't be able to fool the world. Our actions will reveal the truth of our character. Where do we stand now? Do our thoughts, our actions reveal a shallowness of individual Christianity? Just how far from that sinner are we? No doubt, we're only a step away . . . and that, by the grace of God.

Fortunately, most of us on this campus have a real purpose in life. But it is not without reason that others never see us praying, reading God's Word, studying diligently. As a man thinks, so is he, and his actions speak so loudly that others cannot hear what he says.

How encouraging it is to see someone live a dedicated life, without blemish, unselfish, loving, forgiving. We are fortunate to have those individuals in our faculty, administration, and student body. But they cannot carry the burden alone. Everyone must do his part. The time has come when the responsibility can no longer be shifted to another's shoulders. Either we must all turn the tide, or no one will. Our responsibility continues where their perspective ends.

We must not feel defeated by the world, for we serve a Saviour who will overcome the world. As Paul the Apostle said, "We are troubled on every side, yet not distressed: we are perplexed, but not in despair: Persecuted, but not forsaken: cast down, but not destroyed; Always bearing about in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body."

Looking at ourselves as we really are—not as we like for others to think we are—then we can begin to accomplish something. We can make our own campus a lighthouse for our people . . . and for others who are rushing along with the tide.



"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord . . ." Paul's admonition to the Corinthian Christians was no doubt given because they were fickle and shallow concerning spiritual things.

A great many mature Christians are deeply concerned that along with the rise of church membership during the past several years there has been a rise in the crime rate in this country. There has never been a time in modern history when the church was as active as it is today. Huge sums of money are spent and the church is better off educationally, financially, and physically than at any other time in its history. With all of these assets, it is not being able to influence society as it did with a handful of early believers who were able to shake the Roman Empire. The average layman is wondering why he is getting so little reward and inner satisfaction from all the investment of time and money he is making to his church. The average pastor is also perplexed and wonders why his messages and his efforts are failing to feed and move the people of his congregation.

Perhaps most of us are alarmed as to why we are so insensitive to spiritual things even though we wish we were. These are days when we must be true and steadfast to the Lord in spite of the lack of revival fires which motivated our forefathers. Paul seems to be saying that in spite of a lack of emotional surges which we long for, be steadfast and unmoveable. If God chooses to give us revival fires which (Continued On Page 3)





### Registrar Reports 343 Enrolled During Year

The official report from the registrar's office lists 343 students registered during the past year, the largest number for any one year so far. New students were 170 while returning students numbered 173. A further breakdown shows 201 men and 142 women.

Ministerial students numbered 145 and missionary candidates 25.

### WEST END AVENUE PROPERTY PURCHASED

The purchase of a 21-room, cut-stone building from Dr. R. W. Grizzard, adjoining the present school property, has been approved by the College Board. of Trustees. The \$75,000 addition is the first step in a Bible College major expansion campaign presented to the 1965 National Association. The Board of Trustees has announced plans to build a modern college plant at its present site by securing near-by properties as they become available.

The building, a massive three-story structure, is well constructed and designed, and can be easily adapted to

use by the school. The first floor has 12-foot ceilings, and two 12 x 24-foot rooms will be especially valuable for classroom space. Present plans are to use the building for classrooms and teachers' offices in order to relieve temporarily the crowded conditions which existed last year. A two-story, cut-stone garage, also suitable for use, is located behind the main building.

"The purchase includes an acre and a half of land and is an excellent beginning for the

expansion program," Dr. L. C. Johnson said. This added land will be the site for construction of future buildings needed by the school. The lot gives the Bible College 100 additional feet of land facing West End Avenue, one of Nashville's main thoroughfares, which is also U. S. Highway 70S. The property extends back the full width of the block 400 feet to Richland Avenue. Surrounded by a mossy three-foot high stone wall, the lot joins the school's present Haven property on the west.



for Teachers.


Miss Wisehart, English teacher at the Bible College from 1955-1963, has been on leave to complete her Ph.D. in English.


### STUDENT BODY

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### \$50,000 ENDOWMENT CREATED

The alumni of the Free Will Baptist Bible College adopted as their project for the current year the challenge of building an endowment through life insurance policies. The project immediately met with much enthusiasm. It is believed that within the first six months approximately \$50,000 has been raised in this way.

A complete report will be given at the annual alumni meeting during the Bible Conference, April 3-7, 1966."

# PARAMORE TO HEAD EXPANSION CAMPAIGN

The Bible College Campus Expansion Program will be headed by Rev. Jack Paramore, Greenville, N. C., evangelist, President L. C. Johnson has announced.

"We are glad to secure the services of Mr. Paramore to head up this campaign," the College official said. "Mr. Paramore knows the Bible College and its ministry, and his experience as a member of the College quartet and as a Free Will Baptist evangelist for the past seven years enables him to present our plans and needs to the Free Will Baptist people over the various states."

Dr. Johnson further announced that recent plans by the Board of Trustees call for the expansion of the College campus in its present

location in a one-million dollar program. As announced to the National Association in July, plans include the purchase of near-by land and construction of suitable buildings for a modern college plant. An academic building and one or possibly two dormitories are the first units planned, the president said. The first step in this direction was taken recently in the purchase of valuable property on West End Avenue which also adjoins the school property line on Richland Avenue. The school now owns two vacant lots which may be used for new buildings.

A 1958 graduate of the Bible College, the Rev. Mr. Paramore has been closely associated with the school for the past seven years and serves at present as president of the Alumni Association. He has been leading the Alumni project to raise \$100,000 in endowment money through an insurance program among Alumni members.

Mr. Paramore will begin his duties for the Bible College in early December. While continuing his evangelistic ministry, he will promote the expansion campaign by holding Bible Conferences, campaign rallies, and Bible College days (Continued on Page 2)

Posters, displays, and promotion material spring up over night on the campus. Socials and special programs are sponsored by the societies as they compete for the attention of each

in-coming student. Then on the last night of "Rush Week," the new students make known their choice and enlist in that society.

The award is made on the basis of athletic achievements, academic standing, and the school spirit displayed. The competition is keen, but always in a Christian spirit. Lasting friendships begin to form and spiritual ties are bonded in the weekly society prayer meetings.

Through the whole year, the spirit and vigor created by the societies infects everyone, oftentimes even the faculty and administration. The contributions made by these groups are innumerable and the school life would indeed be dull and empty without them.


President L. C. Johnson reported that an early meeting with Rev. Jack Paramore, director of the project, would further establish the campaign plans.

# ALUMNI CHOSEN "OUTSTANDING YOUNG WOMEN"

### Arkansas Alumni Set \$1,000 Goal
